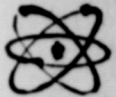
Play will be confined to one day so that participants may be back to their pulpits over the weekend.

My dad makes dots on the wall, calls it a song," the second said, "and gets \$25 a week."

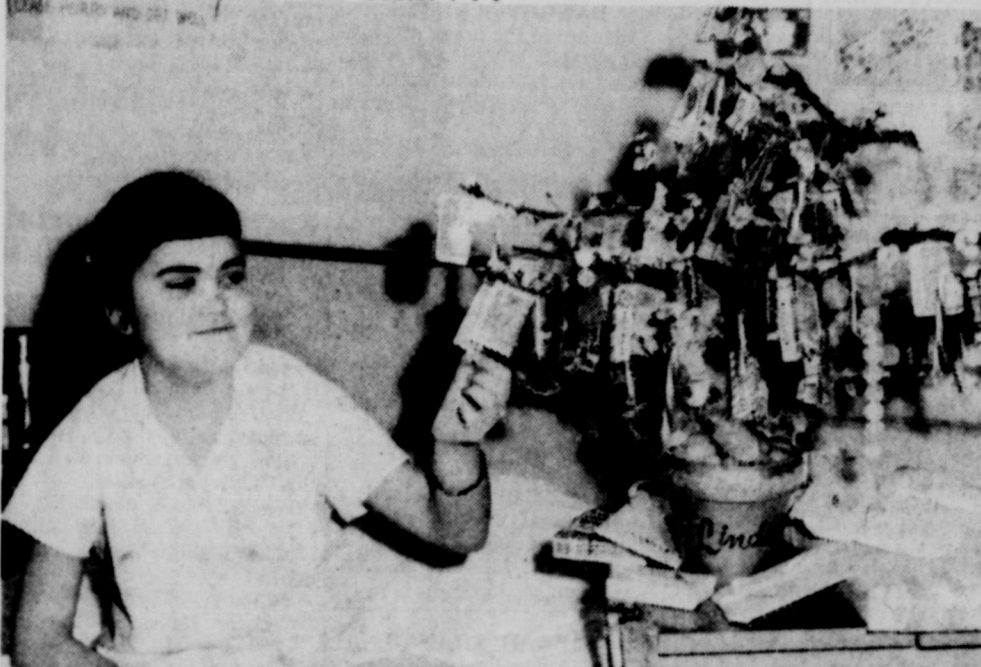

## EC-65 Seminar Is Planned May 4th

The next EC-65 Seminar in the Eastland County program to find job opportunities will be held in Cisco on Tuesday, May 4, according to an announcement Friday. This will be the 5th in a series of five training meetings being sponsored by the county civic organizations in cooperation with the Texas Industrial Commission.

The EC-65 project, which was set up last winter, is the pilot industrial development program which is being conducted by the state Industrial Commission with the aim of training community leaders in the techniques of attracting new industrial payrolls to the county.

Theme of the May 4th seminar will be "where to find industrial prospects." It will include talks on existing industries, home-grown industries, and working with professional industrial development personnel employed by utilities, railroads and banks.

Local arrangements for the meeting are in charge of A. R. Rutherford, Cisco member of the county steering committee, and Gene Abbott, chairman of the Cisco CoFC industrial committee, assisted by Manager Jim Smothers of the chamber.

## Project 'Clean-Up' Begins for Reunion City Beautification

Eastland's going to have its nose powdered for the 1965 Homecoming Reunion in June — and the spruce-up is beginning immediately.

It's a two-phase clean-up undertaking, sponsored jointly by the City of Eastland and the city's Civic League and Garden Club. With the Homecoming just around the corner in June, the brightening up of the city will require the cooperation of every homeowner and resident in town.

The Civic League's entry in the Annual Clean-up Drive is one of education and information for citizens and the city provides the wherewithal to remove the accumulated trash and raked-up debris.

The Civic League has named Mrs. Jim Horton chairman of the drive, recalling the splendid job she did on this project a few years ago, and Mrs. Horton has already set to work, appointing committees and urging participation. The last two weeks of April have been set aside as time for the individual home spruce-ups.

War has literally been declared on unsightliness to Eastland's beautiful trees as Mrs. Horton's asked particular attention to the removal of web worm and mistletoe parasites. Dead limb trimming, hedge shaping and cleaning of beds and walks will add to the overall beauty too.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reports that city employees will begin the pickup of accumulated debris Monday, May 3, and asked that all please have their debris boxed and ready to go then, so that the job can be complete during the first two weeks of May.

Men are traditionally taken off other important jobs for the special clean-up, and if it can be handled on schedule it certainly helps the city workers get their jobs taken care of, he said. Trucks will begin on the west side of town, and move eastward, picking up with flatbed trucks and dump trucks all the collected debris, not ordinarily moveable by trash truck. This will include trimmings, boxed leaves and other accumulations which have been picked up in yards, garages and homes. The city is particularly concerned with the cleaning of alleys, and is urging all residents to use garbage cans with fitting lids to keep the alleyways clean.

The schedule allows citizens two whole weeks to do their cleaning and picking up, so that all the carry-off may be ready when the city trucks come by.

Mrs. Horton has named the following assistants for the drive: Mrs. Milton Hunt, Mrs. Marene Johnson, Mrs. H. V. O'Brien, and Mrs. James Glenn. These women will assist Mrs. Horton in publicizing the drive and seeking cooperation of local residents.

Mayor Frank Deaton has issued an official proclamation relative to the special clean-up, and in so doing urged the complete cooperation of Eastland residents.

The Civic League and Garden Club urges you to give special attention to the following points:

BEAUTIFICATION — Check on the need for painting and repairing houses, etc.; planting seed and plants, pruning shrubbery and trees, and removing dead wood. Vacant lots should be cleared of rubbish and weeds.

SAFETY — Give attention to pruning trees and shrubs which create dangerous blind corners. Remove fire hazard. Remove dangerous objects which might injure children; especially remove discarded refrigerators and deep freezers that have doors which lock.

HEALTH — Destroy weeds such as ragweed and Johnson grass. Clear out breeding

places of flies and mosquitoes. Clean-Up '65 is underway. The special pick-up services and a cleaner, more beautiful Eastland will be its result. All rubbish must be out by that date. (See Chart on Page Eight)

## All-Stater Terry Treadwell Signs Intent Letter at H-SU

ABILENE — Terry Treadwell, 63, All-State guard from Eastland has signed a letter-of-intent with Hardin-Simmons University.

Terry, son of Dr. and Mrs. M. A. Treadwell, Jr. of 500 South Dixie, has led his class

scholastically through junior high and high school carrying a 95 scholastic average. This year he will be class valedictorian.

Young, versatile Terry rewrote the record books at Eastland High during his playing days. He scored an amazing 1,840 points throughout his tenure. This past season he averaged 27 points and 20 rebounds per game, besides being named to numerous All-Tournament, All-District, and All-Area teams.

Treadwell is also the top-notch tennis player in District 10-A, and Region II A, and is considered as one of the favorites in state championship competition. He has participated in the high school band as first trumpet player, where he has won district, region, and state honors.

Besides his outstanding scholastic and athletic achievements, Terry is also an active member of the First Baptist Church where he is a member of the Church Choir.

"With his spiritual, academic, and athletic background, I feel Terry will develop into a tremendous university basketball player and perhaps one of H-SU's all-time greats," Henson said.

This fall Treadwell plans to enroll in the University's pre-med program. Terry's signing is the fourth outstanding area cager to choose Hardin-Simmons University within the past two weeks.

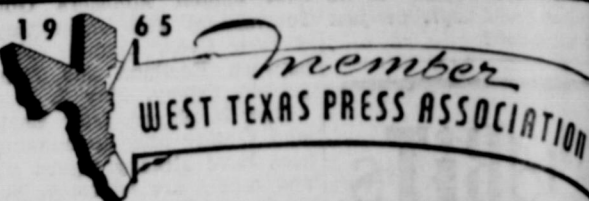

# Countians Will Join In Honoring 'Gov.' Creighton

Eastland Countians will be joining in a statewide celebration honoring Texas Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells Tuesday, when he, as senate president pro tempore, becomes "Governor-for-a-Day" in Austin.

Sen. Creighton, who has represented the 22nd senatorial district which includes this county, since 1960, will assume duties Tuesday as chief executive of the state, by virtue of his election on Jan. 12 to the post which made him third in line of succession to the governorship. It is the highest position that may be held by a member of the state legislature.

Attending special Austin activities from Eastland will be Judge and Mrs. J. Frank Sparks, Mr. and Mrs. Virgil Seaberry Jr., Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sayre, James Reid and Mike Collins.

Planning to attend from Cisco were Richard Moore, Mr. and Mrs. Grady Hogue, T. M. Rosch, Sterling Drumwright, C. B. Dill, Scott Bailey and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Sitton.

Mayor Morris Newnam was expected to head a delegation from Ranger.

Others were expected to attend from Rising Star, Gorman and elsewhere in the county as well as the district.

Both Gov. John Connally and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith,

will be out of the state Tuesday, resulting in Sen. Creighton's elevation to governor.

In assuming the responsibilities of the governor's chair, Sen. Creighton will carry on all routine duties for the day. Following a brief ceremony in which he will take the oath of office, a reception is to be held for friends and guests during the morning at the governor's offices in the capitol building. A press conference is scheduled with the capital press corps, and for some 50 visiting newsmen, television and radio representatives are expected for the event from all major areas of the state.

The Eastland County Bar Association has issued a proclamation honoring Sen. Creighton, as has Mayor Frank Deaton of Eastland.

At the noon-hour, Governor Creighton will join his family for luncheon at the executive mansion. Later, he will resume his official activities in the capitol offices, where a number of conferences and meetings with constituents and other state and district leaders will be held as a part of the day's official program.

A dinner honoring Governor and Mrs. Creighton will be held at the Commodore Perry Hotel in Austin.

Indications are that the day's various functions will involve a number of prominent officials from industry, as well as political and judicial posts, at both the state and national levels and that most of these personages will be present for the evening festivities and banquet program.

Sen. Creighton has taken an active role in numerous community and state-level projects since his graduation in 1950 from the University of Texas School of Law.

As a partner in the Creighton & Creighton law firm with his father, the late J. R. Creighton, and brother, John R. Creighton, he was in 1952 and again in 1954 honored as one of the outstanding men in Mineral Wells. He served as local president and later as state vice president of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, and a national director of the U. S. Jaycee organization.

Creighton is past president of the Mineral Wells Lions Club. In 1959, he was named president of the Palo Pinto County United Fund, and has served as district commissioner of Boy Scouts and regional vice president of the Texas chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army.

Prior to his election in 1960 to the office of Senator for his 10-county district, Creighton served eight years as county attorney for Palo Pinto County. Married to a Mineral Wells girl, Sue Sparks, they are the parents of three sons, Thomas William Creighton, Jr., 13, Kenneth Roy Creighton, 11, and Mark Creighton, 8. Many friends in Mineral Wells recall that Tom and Sue were married on a national network program, known at the time as "Bride and Groom."

As a member of the state senate, Creighton served as chairman of the Interim Election Law Study Committee of the 58th Legislature, prior to election to his present post as head of the senate body.

Approximately 1,300 rural low-income individual farmers and rural residents raise their income level.

outside income. The head of the household may lack the education, skill, or physical strength necessary to hold down a steady off-farm job. People in this income group are there through no fault of their own, in most cases, stressed Mr. Cooper, and want to better themselves.

Economic Opportunity Loans to farmers may be made to improve their farming operations; to buy a small tract of land; to purchase livestock; machinery, and equipment; to construct or repair needed farm buildings.

These loans may be obtained by farm and rural families to finance non-agricultural enterprises that will develop and additional source of income or expand existing enterprises to supplement their earnings. Examples of non-agricultural enterprises are farm machinery repair shop; beauty shop; a small rural washateria; saw and lawn mower sharpening shop; rural grocery store or service station; post and wood cutting business; custom garden work; tree and shrub spraying business; small fruit stand, etc.

Rural families who need a small amount of capital to improve their incomes may borrow up to \$2500 for 15 years at 4-1/2 percent interest. Mr. Cooper emphasized that the loan must generate at least a modest increase in their level of living.

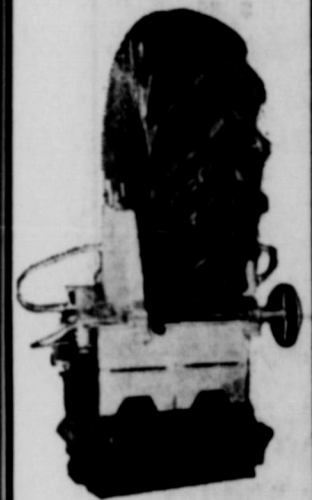

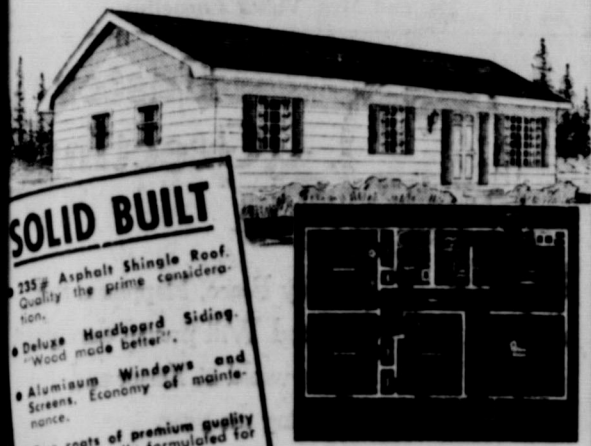
