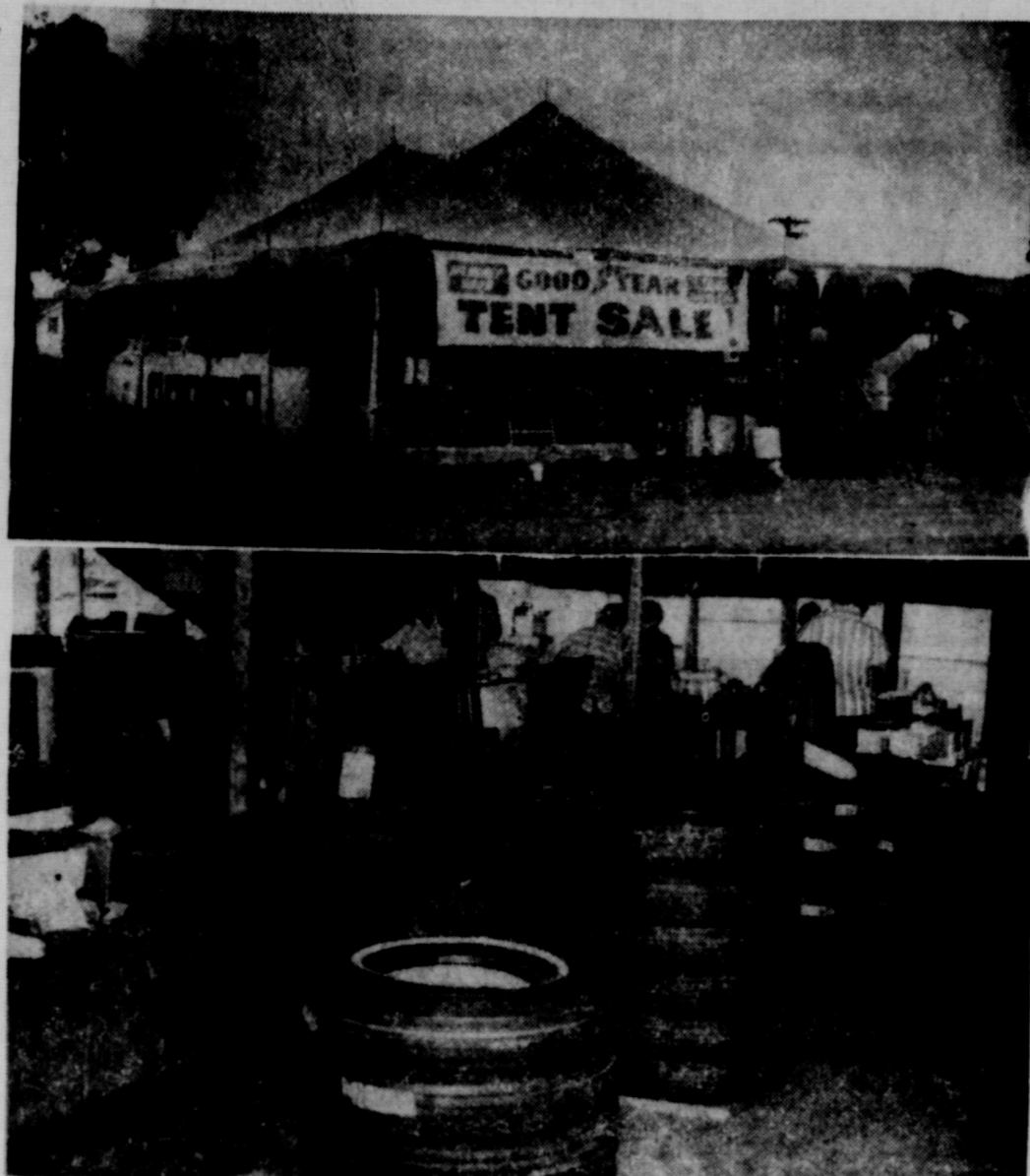
The county pecan crop is going to be good from the sandy, well-cared-for orchards but not so good from the native bearers in the bottoms.

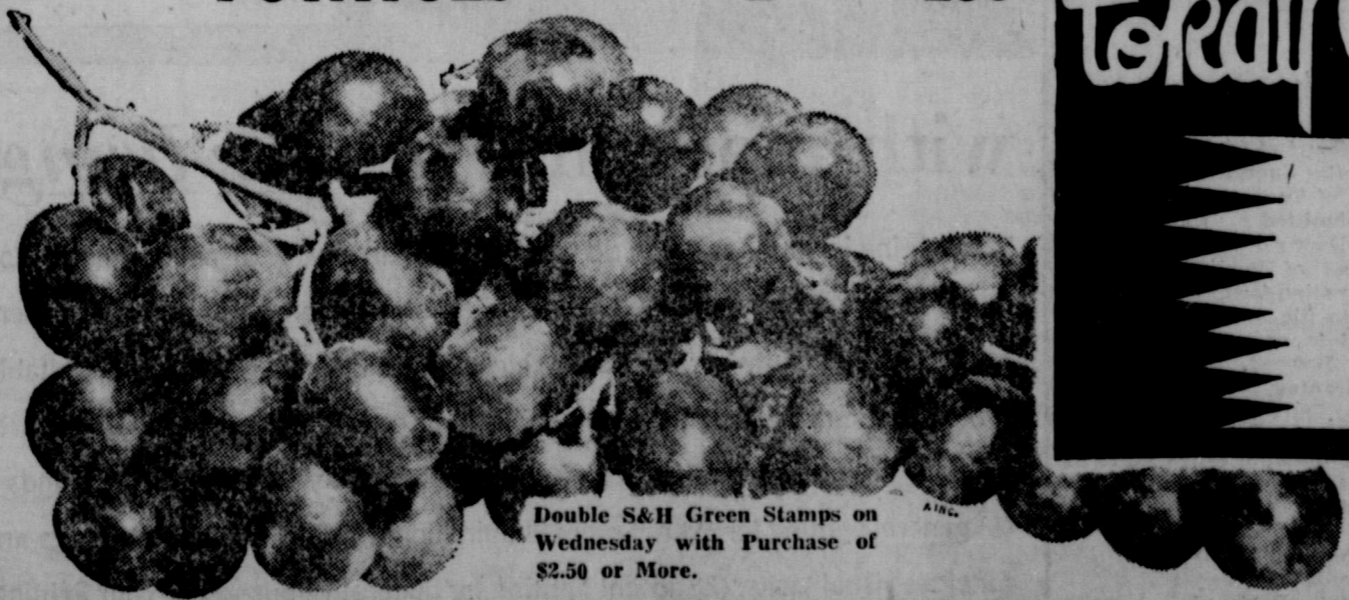

may be used to pay engineers, attorneys, construction foremen, and laborers needed in the planning and installation of facilities, and to pay other costs related to the improvements, including the acquisition of rights-of-way and easements.

Loan funds may also be used to finance shifts in land use, including the development of recreational areas.

Applications for loans are made at the local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration.

A borrower's total indebtedness for these loans cannot exceed \$500,000 when the loan is made from appropriated funds and \$1 million when made from insured funds.

Loans are scheduled for repayment within the shortest time consistent with the borrower's ability to pay. The maximum term on all loans is 40 years. However, no repayment period will exceed any statutory limitation on the organization's borrowing authority nor the useful life of the improvement or facility to be financed.

Deer Hunting Is Set To Open Day Early This Year

AUSTIN — Ranchers in the battle-blitzed big game country have embraced the bonus early opening provision for the fall deer season in regulatory responsibility areas, reports J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The proposal to open the season on Saturday, November 14, rather than the traditional November 16 as provided by state law, got a resounding sanction at the public hearings in early summer.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission, which originally proposed the early opener, promptly acknowledged the support at its next meeting and set the wheels in motion to effect the historic change.

The extra weekend arrangement will be followed in most of the counties where the wildlife resources are managed directly by the Commission.

The 102 counties still under General Law will not be affected by the early opener since the November 16 date is set by law and therefore is unyielding.

Watson said the earlier opening date will not generally affect the usual December 31 closing of the season.

"These are two extra days allowed to give the hunters a break and to harvest a greater share of the deer herd which has now grown to saturation proportions in some areas," said Watson.

The interest rate on a direct loan is four and one-half per cent. The interest rate on insured loans varies but may not exceed five per cent.

The Farmers Home Administration will assist the applicant in making the first determination regarding the engineering feasibility, economic soundness, cost estimates, organization, financing, and management matters in connection with the proposed improvements.

After preliminary determinations have been made, applicants will be expected to provide the technical services necessary to design the improvements, prepare estimate of costs, and complete arrangements for organization and financing. However, if the applicant lacks the resources to carry out this work, the FHA may provide additional technical assistance.

If the loan is made, the FHA will make periodic inspections to see that funds are used as agreed upon and that construction meets approved standards.

This is a non-profit organization, and taxes and bonds would not be raised to pay for this loan. It would be paid for only by the people on the system. People not on the system would not be under obligation who ever to pay for the system.

BROWSING with BEV.....

Too much wax, oil and polish can actually dim the beauty of wood finishes. Furniture manufacturers themselves point this out. The best cleaning care, according to the American Walnut Manufacturers Association, is to wash furniture with suds and water. Wash it once or twice with a cloth wrung out of

warm soap or detergent suds, then wipe all surfaces with a clean damp cloth and rub dry. All wood pieces — modern or antique — thrive on this basic cleaning, as the suds remove various types of soil which are not affected by simply applying another coat of oil, polish or wax.

When all surfaces are thoroughly clean, use any preferred type of finishing touch.

Polishes or waxes applied too often tend to build up a film which reduces the beauty of the original finish. Authorities recommend that most furniture be waxed only once or twice a year.

There's a new kind of cotton rickrack on the market. It's no-iron variety, which means that the edges won't curl after each washing.

When painting your home, always follow the sun. Paint the north side early in the morning, the east side late in the morning, the south well after noon, and the west side during the late afternoon.

Place cotton denim or canvas sneakers on shoe trees to dry after washing them. This enables the fabric to dry more smoothly and eliminates puckers around the toes.
