Under the measure, the county could hold an election on the question of creating a juvenile board, which would be composed of the county judge, the judge of the 91st District Court, and a third member to be selected by the two judges.

The bill would empower the Commissioners' Court to decide whether board members should be paid a salary; and, if so, they could be paid a maximum of \$100 per month. It was understood that the

bill would be on the Legislature's calendar as a "local bill."

The proposed act follows: Section 1. There is hereby created, subject to a majority vote of the qualified electors in the county, the Eastland County Juvenile Board. The Board shall be composed of the county judge of Eastland County, the judge of the 91st Judicial District, and a third member who shall be selected by the county judge and the district judge. The

third member must be a resident of the county and shall serve for a term of two years. The county judge and the district judge shall appoint his successor. The county judge shall be the chairman of the juvenile board.

Sec. 2. (a) The commissioners court of Eastland County shall order and call the election within 90 days after the (Continued on page 2)

# Jury Returns 'Guilty' Verdict; Gives 2 Years

A 91st District Court jury deliberated three hours Monday and found Jimmy Don Poe, 19, guilty of gun theft and recommended a sentence of two years in the penitentiary.

Poe, of Eastland, had been indicted for stealing two guns from J. P. (Pete) Warren of

Eastland on Jan. 9, 1964. The weapons, a double-barrelled shotgun and a Remington semi-automatic .22 caliber rifle, were valued at approximately \$70.

Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge presided after Judge Frank Sparks disqualified himself, and sentenced Poe to two years.

Attorney W. B. Wright of Cisco was counsel for Poe and District Attorney Perry Brown was prosecuting attorney.

The jury went out at 2:20 p. m. and returned at 5:30 with the verdict. Jurors were R. C. Long, C. A. Claborn, both of Rising Star; W. B. Eaves, E. H. Lawson, Sam B. King and W. B. Norton, all of Cisco; Billy Earl Simpson, D. B. Warren and J. V. Garrett, all of Gorman; W. E. Read of Ranger; A. D. Taylor of Eastland and R. L. Sharp of Desdemona.

The jury was called back in Tuesday morning and dismissed. A jury commission also came in Tuesday morning and began preparing new jury lists for the coming term of court.

## Dallas Man Pleads Guilty, Fined \$200

Sammy Lloyd Hogue of Dallas pleaded guilty to aggravated assault in 91st District Court in Eastland Tuesday and was fined \$200 and costs by Visiting Judge Floyd Jones of Breckenridge.

Originally indicted for assault with intent to kill in connection with an incident at an Eastland drive-in restaurant last year, the charge was reduced to aggravated assault.

After sentencing by Judge Jones, a motion for a new trial was filed by Hogue's attorney, Hermes Nye of Dallas.

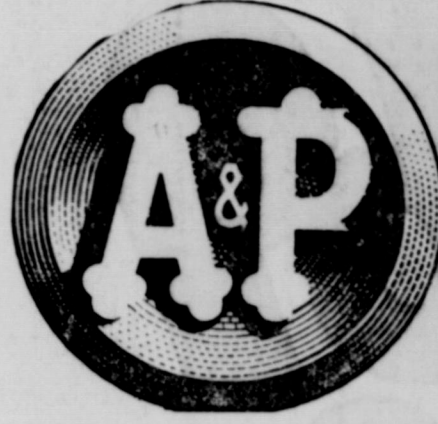

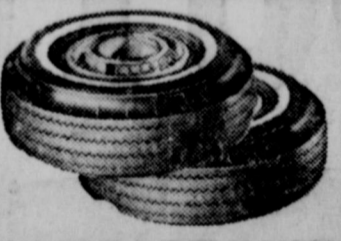

## Supersonic Air Missions Slated Over This Area

LITTLE ROCK AFB, Ark. — B-58 aircraft assigned to the 43rd Bombardment Wing, here, are scheduled to fly supersonic missions from Paducah, Tex. to Shiner, Tex., next week. Flights will be within a 40-mile corridor and according to the following schedule:  
March 29 and 30 — The B-58s will be over the starting point (Paducah, Tex.) at 1:30 p. m. and over the ending point (Shiner, Tex.) at approximately 2 p. m.  
March 31 — Over the starting point at 12:30 p. m. and again at 1:30 p. m. and over ending point at approximately 1 p. m. and 2 p. m., respectively.  
April 1 — Over starting point at 1:30 p. m. and over ending point at approximately 2 p. m.  
April 2 — Over starting point at 12:30 p. m. and again at 1:30 p. m. and over the ending point at 1 p. m. and 2 p. m., respectively.  
All times are Central Standard. The aircraft will pass over Austin, Tex., approximately 15 minutes after leaving the starting point.  
The aircraft, flying faster

than the speed of sound and above 35,000 feet, will create sonic booms along the path of flight.
