Ground beef - or hamburger - is designed for huge appetites and pocketbook ease. This ground beef accounts for about 25 percent of all beef sales.

Lowrance, medi- ground beef usually indicates ground beef with a high proportion of beef fat, and many people prefer it for the rich flavor imparted by the fat. Lean ground beef is made from the chuck or various cuts of beef which are leaner than those that go into hamburger. It costs a bit more per pound, but is probably the most efficient purchase.

Ground round steak is the leanest of all ground beef, and usually sells for about the same price per pound as sliced round steak. It costs more, but shrinks less in cooking than other types of ground beef.


Handle ground beef as little as possible. Too much handling make the finiched product tough and packed.

Keep ground beef under refrigeration and use it within three days after purchase.

DALLAS--Personal income for the State of Texas rose \$1,782 millions of dollars from 1961 to 1963, from a total of Temple of Fort Worth. \$19,569 millions in 1961 to \$21,-351 millions of dollars in 1963.

Major sources of income in 1963 were from Wage and Salary Disbursement \$13.934 millions, Manufacturing \$2,814 millions, Wholesale and Retail Trade \$2,778 millions, Services \$1,489 millions, Government \$2,999 milions, with State and Local Governments accounting for \$1,433 millions, while the Federal Civilian total was \$774 millions. Farm income totalled \$863 millions while Non-farm totalled \$2,077

milions. Per capita income in Texas rose from \$1,973.00 dollars in 1961 to \$2,068.00 dollars in 1963, according to Harry C. Mayers, Director, Dallas Field Office, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Set To Open Day Early This Year

AUSTIN - Ranchers in the battle-blitzed big game country have embraced the bonus early opening provision for the fall deer season in regulatory responsibility areas, reports J. Weldon Watson, executive director of the Parks and Wildlife Department.

The proposal to open the season on Saturday, November 14, rather than the traditional November 16 as provided by state law, got a resounding sanction at the public hearings in early summer.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission, which originally proposed the early opener, promptly acknowledged the support at its next meeting and set the wheels in motion to effect the historic change.

The extra weekend arrangement will be followed in most of the counties where the wildlife resources are managed directly by the Commis-

The 102 counties still under General Law will not be affected by the early opener since the November 16 date is set by law and therefore is unyielding.

Watson said the earlier opening date will not generally affect the usual December 31 closing of the season.

"These are two extra days allowed to give the hunters a break and to harvest a greater share of the deer herd which has now grown to saturation proportions in some areas,' said Watson.



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
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
