the intelligent and earnest Christian, who knows his New Testament, there is no such thing

as secular work.

IM Paul admonished the early Christians, whether they are or drank, or whatever they did, to do all to the glory of God.

It might seem a strange and incongruous conception to one engaged in work of plain drudgery, or to one doing a routine task, day after day. A great part of the world's daily work is drudgery, if one thinks of it in

that way.
What of the "woman's work," that until the emergence of appliances and household helps (in-cluding more male participation in the work of the home) was 'never done"?

Even the work of the artist in many instances has its element of

Drudgery is almost more a matter of the spirit than of the nature of the work. There is a sort of finished

whole in the work of the world, and to have a part of it in the right spirit is to achieve a certain

mastery of life.

But the glorification of work should never justify or excuse unnecessary work, or antisocial conditions under which work is sometimes done.

### **Hunting Fines During Past Season Disclosed**

hunting season including four per ons fined for selling deer, was revealed in the latest arrest report announced by the Director of Law Enforcement for the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

The new compilation showed 462 arrests during December with all but 57 of those charged, paying fines ranging from \$5.00 for trespassing to \$200 for possession of game birds before the legal sean opened and the same fine for hooting deer from an automobile. Fines paid totaled \$14,222.90 plus \$826.33 in court costs.







The director emphasized to the special group in the original approach that a similar survey made last year "was in part responsible for the relaxation of duck regulations for the 1955-56 season.

Specifically, on the basis of the information obtained through the survey, the duck season in Texas was increased from 60 to 75 days. In that case harvest statistics were compared to carry over population figures and allowances made for greater hunting privi-

Simultaneous with the opening of the fall duck shoot, the select 4500 were sent introductory letters with a questionaire labeled: "Texas Waterfowl Kill Survey." The hunters were asked to use the form as a basis for filling out an identical card mailed them at the end of the duck season.

Significantly, the participants were admonished: "If you were not successful on your hunting trips we would like to know that, remain anonymous because they as it is just as important to determine the number of unsuccessers chosen at random for a state- | ful hunters as the number who





# ITS THE LAW

### INCOME TAX FACTS

in Tokas &

Under the 1954 Internal Reveue Act, all persons who have a gross income over \$600 must file ncome tax returns, except if the taxpayer is 65 or older he need not file a return unless he has gross income over \$1,200. This is because persons who are 65 or older have two exemptions which automatically eliminate any tax liability for income under \$1,200.

The old established date of March 15 by which income tax returns must be filed was abolisheed effective last year. All federal tax returns for individuals may now be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. Tax returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will e received by most persons during January. The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement: Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may Mrs. Don Doyle was hostess to meeting would be held at 7:30 file should obtain the form from

> Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who ed, if more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to withholding.

Single persons with more than income must file reclarations of estimated tax even though all of

Declarations of estimated tax, except those for farmers, must be filed by April 15. Like the income tax return, this date is one month later than the deadline for years before the new Revenue Act went into effect. However, the quarterly installment payment dates remain the same-June 15, Septtember 15, and the last one on 15 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farm er, desires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 15 instead of paying his last quarterly installment. It does not relieve anyone from filling the original declaration of stimated tax and making three payments on it. However, in most cases this provision does remove the possi of a penalty for an under estimate of tax liability.

Farmers have special provisions concerning declarations of estimated tax, and may postpone the filing of any estimate until January 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of tax liabilty on the declaration of estimated tax was reduced by the 1954 act. There is now no

5. Always go directly to school, with a pal. After school, go straight home.

If a stranger should attempt to molest your child, tell him to report it to the first responsible person he meets—the safety boy, his teacher, a theater manager or the owner of the nearest business establishment. Ask him always to notice the appearance of the per-son, and to obtain the license number and color of car, if an

automobile is used. This information will local police officials in their continuous crusade to safeguard your child.


