Pop Garrett, County Supt., At Conference

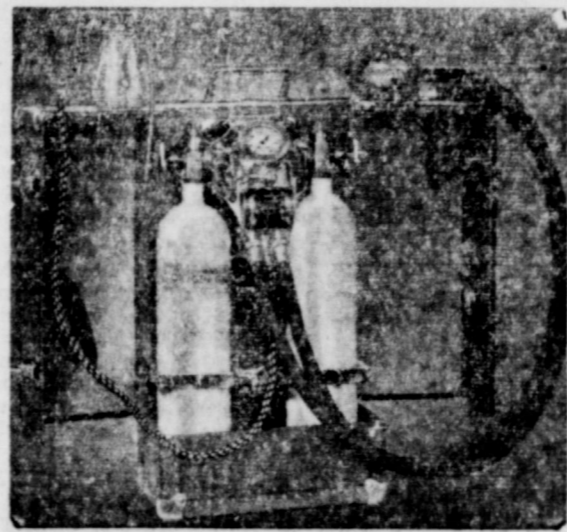

Assistance Is Asked By Firemen On Fund For Defraying Cost

Confident that numerous contributions will come in to help them defray the cost of the important device, the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department is undertaking to purchase a Stephenson portable resuscitator, a machine which has saved many, many lives.

Cost of the device is \$575.00. The resuscitator will be on display in the lobby of the Eastland National Bank for two or three weeks and also will be shown several nights in the foyer of the Majestic Theater.

Fire Chief Billy Johnson has named a committee consisting of Hank Sims, Wayne Jackson and Don Daniel for this project.

Mr. Sims, who is with Texas Electric Service Company and

familiar with resuscitation through safety work, said:

"I consider this machine as good or better than manual resuscitation and it sooner or later will save a life, in some emergency. It is the latest model, one brought out in very recent years, and its service can be used up a pole, down in a hole, or anywhere. We'll be only too glad for the hospital or any other institution or individual to have its use, as the purpose, of course, is a public service to the community."

No larger than a suitcase, the Stephenson resuscitator has been described as an amazing gadget which can work miracles on victims of accidents causing breathing failure, such as drowning, electric shock, smoke suffocation, gas poisoning, or shock from an automobile accident.

It also works for a patient struggling to breathe after a heart attack or bad spell of asthma, breathing for the patient until nature can take over, he said.

The instrument is easy to operate and the only fuel needed is oxygen, available at any filling station or welding shop.

Proven cases of lives saved by the resuscitator are on record in almost every city of any size in the country, it was explained.

The Fire Department wants to keep the gadget miracle worker on the job here, but needs cooperation from the public, whose lives will be made more secure through its purchase.

Contributions to this project may be left at the bank or with any member of the fire department.

Willman, Honoree Of Banquet, Started His Postal Stint In '09

Ed F. Willman, who is retiring from 47 years' postal service — and will be honored by a banquet local citizens are giving him at the First Methodist Church tonight — is a native of Mason, Tex., and began his work with the postoffice department there.

Acting Postmaster Mareno Johnson is arranging tonight's banquet.

Mr. Willman was born Feb. 1, 1886, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Willman. His father was a rancher and dairyman.

After receiving his education in the Mason schools, he worked in a Mason drugstore a while, then went with the postoffice there July 1, 1909. Following his serving as assistant Mason postmaster, he was employed in the Army camp postoffice and in the main postoffice in Waco in World War I days.

After the war, he transferred to Brady, coming thence to Eastland Dec. 1, 1919, and serving in the local office continuously since that date.

Oct. 21, 1929, he married Miss Louise Boren of Carthage, Tex., who was teaching school in Eastland. The couple, who reside at 106 E. Williams, have one child, a son, Jim Ed Willman, an Eastland High School valedictorian who presently is a senior at Southern Methodist University, Dallas.

Mr. Willman is a member of the official board of the First Methodist Church, the 9:49 Class of that institution, and the Masonic Lodge, belonging to all branches of the fraternity except the Commandery.

He isn't worried about "spending the time" in retirement, for he loves to hunt — deer, birds and squirrels — and to fish and gets a kick out of going to all sorts of athletic games. For years, he himself played tennis a great deal. Mr. Willman also enjoys gardening a figure that since the rains, a garden might do well this season.

Two Mavericks Rate Near Top In Scoring Honors Of District

At the end of regular season play in District 7-A, the Eastland Mavericks find themselves in third place in the final basketball standings, and with two men ranked near the top with high scoring honors.

Dale Slatton is second on the list of the top ten highest scorers with 174 points, and Benny Cates is fourth with 128 points. Paul Hinds, of Ranger, leads the pack with 199.

Slatton's total for the entire season, including 12 non-conference and 10 conference games, is 872 points for an average of 16.9 points per game.

All in all, the Mavericks enjoyed one of the most successful seasons in years. They had a crack team all the way, and two of their game were lost by the bounce of a ball. They lost their first game to Cross Plains by only one point, 45-44. They lost their final game of the season to Gorman by only one point, 43-42. They lost their second meeting with Ranger by four points, 60-56, only after an extra period.

The Mavs had a fast, cooperative team, feared by every team in the conference. They played before bigger home crowds than had turned out in many years.

The entire team will be back next year with the exception of Cates, who graduates.

Rain and Hail Storm Develop .46 Moisture

A rain and hail storm brought .46 more moisture to this lucky area Wednesday night.

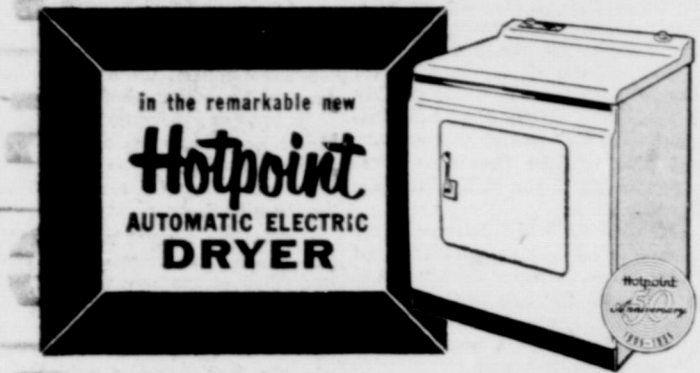

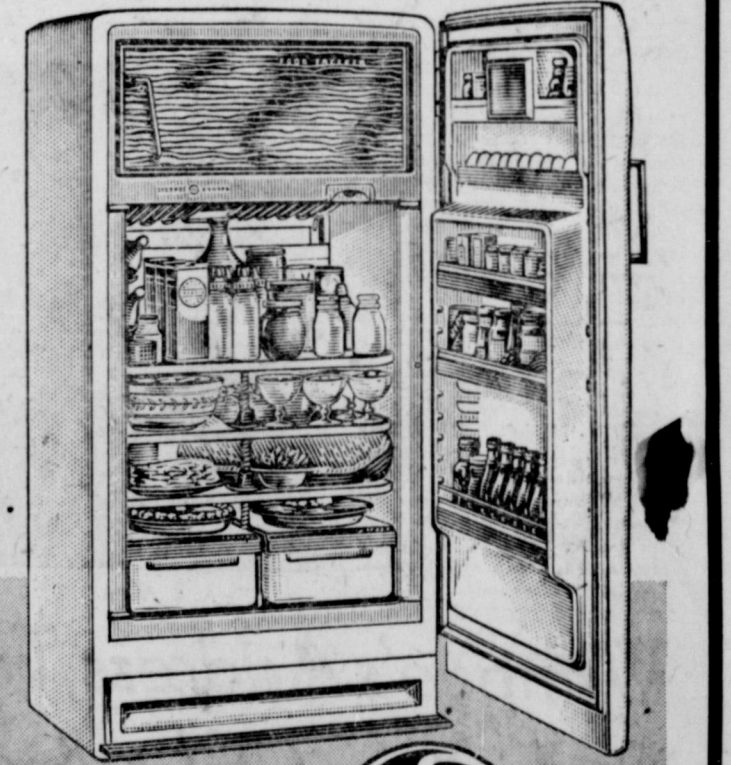

Tarleton Bumps Rangers, 84-73, Monday Night

The Tarleton State Ploowboys, currently tied for the Pioneer Conference basketball lead, threw Stan Burnham's Ranger Junior College Rangers to their fourth loss here Tuesday night, as they fashioned an 84-73 victory.

The loss ruined the crowning of the Rangers basketball queen, Miss Sandra Sturdivant of Hernalleigh, in pre-game ceremonies.

Free throws hurt the Rangers considerably, as they benefited from only 21 of the gratis tosses while the Ploowboys were netting 30. Tarleton hit 27 field goals while the Rangers managed 26, nine of which came off the arm of Bubba Canuteson, who hit 19 points to lead Ranger's scoring.

Bob Davis, however, led both units as he meshed 10 field goals and seven free shots for 27 points. Teammate Byrch Swafford hit 25.

For the Rangers, Lonnie Wood mustered nine points.

The Rangers' next outing has been scheduled against San Angelo here Saturday night. San Angelo is tied with the Ploowboys and Arlington State for the Pioneer Conference lead.

Graham Talks In Hotel Lobby For Missionaries Who Traveled 2 Days

MADRAS, India — The hotel lobby was in the process of coming to life. It was 6 a.m. The desk clerk was sleepy. Indian porters were shuffling about in their white trousers and tough bare feet.

Billy Graham, the American evangelist on tour of the Far East, strolled into the lobby. He had to catch an early plane to fill his busy schedule.

Four ladies, three white and one Indian, were standing off to one side. They approached Billy rather nervously and introduced themselves as missionaries, one from Canada, one from the United States and one from Great Britain. They had come from the Poona District, several hundred miles away.

"We rode an old broken-down train for two days to hear you speak," one said, "but it had engine trouble and did not arrive in time. Would you give us a brief message now that we might take it back to our people?"

She told Billy that a Sunday School class, composed of aged women and named the House of Peace, had been praying for many months that God would bless his meetings in India.

"They sold their extra rice and sent 10 rupees (about \$2) to help pay expenses of the meetings," she said.

Visibly touched by such self sacrifice, Billy pulled out his Bible and began one of his most unusual and impressive services. He read, beginning at II Thessalonians 1:3:

"We are bound to thank God always for you, brethren, as it is meet, because that your faith groweth exceedingly, and the charity of every one of you all toward each other aboundeth."

"So that we ourselves glory in you in the churches of God for your patience and faith in all your persecutions and tribulations that ye endure . . ."

Then Billy remarked: "God will honor your faith and your sacrifice as you spend your lives in dark places of the world, taking the living message of Jesus Christ to hungry people. The things you suffer now will be as nothing when we meet the Master face to face. Don't let anything stop you from telling this wonderful story of God's love and grace."

By this time a fairly large crowd had gathered. The porters had stopped their shuffling to listen. The desk clerk was no longer sleepy. There had never before been a church service in his lobby before dawn.

All bowed their heads when Billy began to pray. One of the things he prayed for was that God would make him worthy to minister unto such devoted saints.

"God bless you," he said as he shook hands with each one of the missionaries.

He climbed into the bus for the ride to the airport.

All the workers in the hotel lobby went about the business of getting ready for another day.

Graham's Tour Has Created More Good Will Than Lend-Lease Dollars

DELHI, India — The triumphant tour of India by Billy Graham, in addition to its eternal values, has provided something tangible for the world to see now. It has created more good will for America here than all the millions of lend-lease dollars.

Billy is a clean-cut American that people can see. They can listen to what he says. He isn't some vague figure in the national budget that never filters down to the people in a language they can understand. The people of India like what they see in Billy and they have been listening with rapt attention to what he says. In less than three weeks he has talked to over half a million in person.

Along the same line, Russia accomplished with one airplane what dollars can never do. Nehru was presented a Russian plane while he was in Moscow last year. It is a beautiful well-built plane. Everywhere Nehru goes people see the plane and remember that it is a gift from their Russian "friends."

Billy's tour has been phenomenal, beginning with riots in Bombay which focused world attention on the fact that he was here. At every city and hamlet he has been met at the airport by civic and church leaders and ordinary people. He has had enough flower garlands to make him hump-shouldered. Five little girls got up at 4 a.m. to watch him catch an early morning plane. He

has drawn crowds of 10,000 at 7 a.m. and 100,000 at 7 p.m. to hear him preach. A man walked 400 miles to shake his hand.

Thousands made decisions to change their way of life after listening to his simple message of Jesus Christ. This was true at every stop — Madras, Kottayam, Palamcottah and Trivandrum. When his plane landed at Hyderabad for a 30 minute stop en route to Delhi, a crowd of 5,000 rushed Billy to a nearby field where a loudspeaker was set up. He preached and gave an invitation. Scores responded. They were different people when they waved goodbye minutes later.

Other thousands greeted him with song and flowers when he landed at Delhi. Dag Hammarskjold, secretary - general of UN, who landed two minutes later, arrived in comparative obscurity. Billy is an unofficial ambassador who did not come criticizing. He came with a message of love and goodwill. Unlike one U.S. tourist who said, "These foreigners don't understand anything," Billy has words of praise everywhere he goes.

"I have fallen in love with India," he said. "When I leave I hope to be an ambassador for India. I have been overwhelmed by the friendship that has greeted us everywhere and the tolerance with which people of other religions have greeted us." The people love him for the words of hope and praise — they love him even more because he means them.

Texas Elite Surveyed For Duck Details

AUSTIN — Some important contributors to the future planning for waterfowl in Texas shall remain anonymous because they are the select 4500 license holders chosen at random for a statewide hunting survey.

These key informants have been assured that they need not sign their reports since, according to the Director of Wildlife Restoration, past experiences indicate that some persons approached for individual hunting data suspected a trap. And the comparatively few who declined to cooperate for that and other reasons threw the results of the spot check out of line.

The director emphasized to the special group in the original approach that a similar survey made last year "was in part responsible for the relaxation of duck regulations for the 1955-56 season."

Specifically, on the basis of the information obtained through the survey, the duck season in Texas was increased from 60 to 75 days. In that case harvest statistics were compared to carry over population figures and allowances made for greater hunting privileges.

Simultaneous with the opening of the fall duck shoot, the select 4500 were sent introductory letters with a questionnaire labeled: "Texas Waterfowl Kill Survey." The hunters were asked to use the form as a basis for filling out an identical card mailed them at the end of the duck season.

Significantly, the participants were admonished: "If you were not successful on your hunting trips we would like to know that, as it is just as important to determine the number of unsuccessful hunters as the number who were successful."

The survey determines the number of days waterfowl were hunted; where; what kind bagged, and the number of ducks and geese harvested during certain specified periods. Technicians have found these questionnaires invaluable in helping compile the total season's combined bag and in determining where hunting pressure is concentrated.

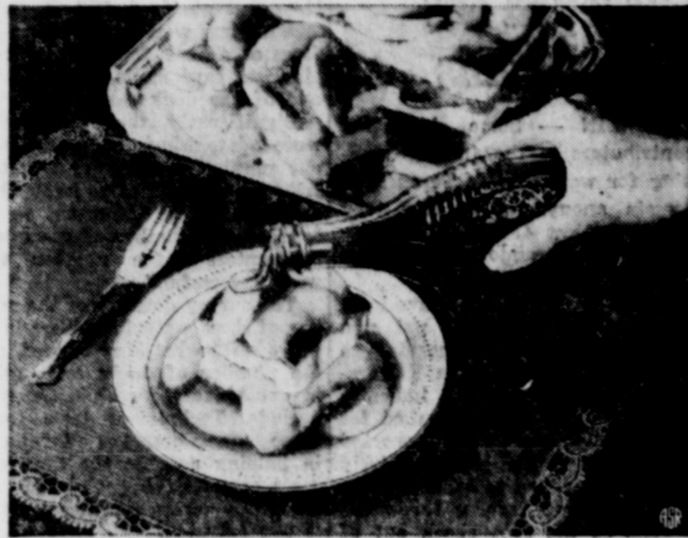

Peach Cake At Best With Maple Pour-On

1 egg, unbeaten
Fresh peaches, sliced
Maple-blended syrup

Measure cake mix into small bowl. Add water and egg. Beat 2 minutes until smooth and creamy. Pour batter into 8x8x2-inch square pan, which has been lined on bottom with paper. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 30 to 35 minutes. Cool cake; then split into two layers. Spread sliced peaches between layers and on top of cake. Cut in squares and pour syrup over each serving.

INCOME TAX FACTS

Under the 1954 Internal Revenue Act, all persons who have a gross income over \$600 must file income tax returns, except if the taxpayer is 65 or older he need not file a return unless he has gross income over \$1,200. This is because persons who are 65 or older have two exemptions which automatically eliminate any tax liability for income under \$1,200.

The old established date of March 15 by which income tax returns must be filed was abolished effective last year. All federal tax returns for individuals may now be filed on or before April 15. Although many persons believe that a tax return need only be postmarked by the due date, such is not the intent of the statute. Tax returns are supposed to be in the office of the Internal Revenue Service by the due date specified.

Tax forms and instructions will be received by most persons during January. The instructions being distributed this year contain the following statement: Internal Revenue Service will mail Form 1040 ES, as far as is practical, to each person who may need it. Anyone else required to file should obtain the form from an Internal Revenue Service office in time to file by April 15, 1956.

Declarations of estimated tax are required from all persons who expect gross income of more than \$400, plus \$600 times the number of exemptions which may be claimed, if more than \$100 of the income will not be subject to withholding.

Single persons with more than \$5,000 and married persons with more than \$10,000 expected gross income must file reclearations of estimated tax even though all of the income is subject to withholding.

Declarations of estimated tax, except those for farmers, must be filed by April 15. Like the income tax return, this date is one month later than the deadline for years before the new Revenue Act went into effect. However, the quarterly installment payment dates remain the same—June 15, September 15, and the last one on 15 of the following year.

If a person, other than a farmer, desires to file his income tax return and pay his tax in full, he may do this on or before January 15 instead of paying his last quarterly installment. It does not relieve anyone from filling the original declaration of estimated tax and making three payments on it. However, in most cases this provision does remove the possibility of a penalty for an under estimate of tax liability.

Farmers have special provisions concerning declarations of estimated tax, and may postpone the filing of any estimate until January 15 of the following year.

The penalty for underpayment of tax liability on the declaration of estimated tax was reduced by the 1954 act. There is now no

underpayment if the taxpayer remits at least 70 per cent of his tax as shown on his final tax return. If there is an underpayment, the penalty is 6 per cent additional amount which should have been remitted. It is expected that there will be more strict enforcement of this provision in the future by the Internal Revenue Service.

Protect Your Child

As a parent, you can help make your community a safer place for children.

"Crazy drivers," long a menace to youngsters, are rapidly being driven off the streets by alert police officers. Another equally dangerous criminal—the molester—can also be stamped out, with your assistance.

Most children trust adults—and it is this very confidence that often makes them victims of molesters. Law enforcement agencies throughout the country, with the aid of school officials, are working diligently to apprehend such deviates. But it is the parents' responsibility to make youngsters aware of the pending danger when meeting or talking to strangers, who often use candy, toys or a ride in a "nice shiny car" as bait.

To protect your child against possible harm, teach him these few simple rules:

1. Never accept a ride with a stranger.
2. Don't go with persons who offer you toys or candy.
3. Never go with strangers who ask you to help them. (Offers such as "Will you help me find my dog?" are often used to tempt trusting children.)
4. Never play in alleys or in old buildings. Don't wait for playmates near public toilets.
5. Always go directly to school, with a pal. After school, go straight home.

If a stranger should attempt to molest your child, tell him to report it to the first responsible person he meets—the safety boy, his teacher, a theater manager or the owner of the nearest business establishment. Ask him always to notice the appearance of the person, and to obtain the license number and color of car, if an automobile is used.

This information will assist local police officers in their continuous crusade to safeguard your child.
