



Absentee For 'Big' Election Begins Oct. 14

Absentee voting in the Nov. 3 general election will begin at the county clerk's office Oct. 14, it has been announced.

At mid-week, 30 applications, mostly from service men, had been received by the clerks office for balloting by mail in the election.

There were 4,747 poll taxes and 597 exemptions issued this year, the tax office reports.

Some countians who think they are not eligible to vote in the Nov. 3 election may be able to qualify themselves in time, despite the fact that the deadline for poll tax payment passed Jan. 31, it is reported.

These exceptions include:

Young men and women who have become 21 this year, or who will become 21 by Nov. 3. The election code provides that they may obtain a poll tax exemption certificate from the county tax assessor-collector's office on any regular business day up to and including Oct. 2. If they are 21 by election day, they will then be eligible to vote in all elections on the ballot.

The state allows those newly-moved to Texas to vote free their first year. So, if a person has attained eligibility to vote in Texas by being 21, and by having completed his first year of residence and has a bona-fide intention of making Texas his residence, he can go by the tax office and obtain a poll tax exemption certificate.

Fans are reminded that district competition games begin 30 minutes earlier and kick-off time will be 7:30 p.m. in Maverick Stadium. District-wise, the big gun Friday night will probably be the Baird invasion of the loud-touted Ranger team.

Countian Found a Demand and Is Filling It With Unique Farm Project

A \$52,000 potential annual gross from an acre of land in Eastland County.

That's farming! And it's not mink or chinchilla raising either. The product is tomatoes. Good red tomatoes.

Not just plain old ever-day, run-of-the-mill tomatoes either. These are tomatoes of quality, with a capital "Q." Long on flavor, long on looks and long on consumer appeal.

And therein lies the secret — marketability. In the winter months housewives want flavorful tomatoes the same as in the spring — and Wayne Westerman of

near Rising Star is supplying the product. Growing vine-ripe tomatoes in the winter, in quantity.

All you have to do is simulate spring growing conditions — and that involves heating, ventilating, pest control and all the tender vine-handling procedures that go with producing a fine product.

The 27-year-old Westerman, a returned native of Rising Star, is going to have approximately 13,000 vines under his plastic-covered greenhouses this year. He started his seed in Eastland County sand and liquid fertilizer on Aug. 2, and began transplanting into the large houses on the 10th of August. He expects to see first fruit just before Thanksgiving — when the consumers are looking for a good tomato for their tables.

With careful management and 60 degree night time temperatures in the protected houses, Westerman hopes to reap ten pounds of tomatoes per vine. That's 130,000 pounds and his market price averages 40 cents per pound. This is his third year in operation and it will be the first that he'll do most of his own packing, in eight pound boxes. His market outlets are in Rising Star, Cross Plains and an Abilene re-packer. The gross looks good, but the expenses are high too — rolls of plastic to cover an acre aren't cheap, and neither is labor, fertilizer or other necessities. However, the ambitious grower has one big saving. He heats his houses with natural gas from wells right on the home place. (Continued on Page 4)

57 Per Cent of Peanut Acres Now Planted

Over half of Eastland County's peanut growing land was planted in spite of extended drought through August and the race is on now to see if the late planted-nuts will mature before the first frost.

The announcement from the county Agricultural Stabilization Conservation committee comes as somewhat of a surprise because earlier estimates had set total planting far lower.

Gilbert Meredith, ASCS manager, reports that 21,109 acres of the county's allotted 38,000 are reported planted by members of his observers staff.

In fact, 416 out of 990 farms in the county got seed in the ground.

A lot of the acreage was planted in August and farmers are hoping that the crops mature before the first frosts come.

Also surprisingly, Meredith reported that ten per cent of the state's total cotton allotment is in Eastland County.







(Continued from Page One) A 1959 Texas Tech civil engineering graduate, Westerman was born near Star, moved to New Mexico with his family when he was young and came back to the homeplace to live about four years ago. He and his wife, Ann, have three children, 2, 4 and 5. His father is C. C. Westerman. Idea for the tomato hot-house came to him at Tech and he thought it was original at the time, but found that it's catching on with a lot of growers over the nation. So he was able to get good advice and help in setting up the project. One of his close counselors on the mysteries of tomato culture has been Dr. John E. Larson, vegetable horticulturist from Texas A&M.

Dr. Larson was among a group that visited Westerman's tomato haven this week. Others were County Agent J. M. Cooper, Ben McKinnis, and Gilbert Meredith. Westerman's first crop yielded 8,000 pounds and he's actually planning two crops for this fall and winter, with the second crop to bear from about March 1 until July 1. It takes 120 days from seed to fruit so Westerman will have to have his seedlings ready to go when the first crop's vine are cleared out. Two full time employes are Milton Bynum and Charles Young.

Tomato growers might like to know that Westerman uses these varieties: Monapal, Step 390, Step 431, Tuckross V and O, and this year he's trying a development of his own.

The Barnes and Bailey circus carries its "big top" on large truck mounted spools, spreads it on the ground mechanically, and then raises it into the air with help of ponderous elephants wearing special work harness. Stakes are driven mechanically and the big show goes into the air with amazing speed and efficiency.

During the performances the circus will feature trained horses, elephants, monkeys, seals, lions, ponies, dogs, bears, trampoline acts, jugglers, tight wire artists, and clowns.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q - I have a service-connected disability which requires continuous treatment. I plan to travel abroad this summer. What arrangements shall I make regarding medication and treatment?

A - You should contact the VA Clinic now treating you to obtain appropriate supplies of prescribed medication to carry with you, and for suggestions about obtaining medical supplies and services abroad. In case of a medical emergency, you should contact the American Embassy or Consular Office.

Q - Are veterans ever required to pay for care received in Veterans Administration hospitals?

A - The circumstances under which a veteran might be charged for care received in a VA hospital arise rarely. It is possible that a veteran admitted to a VA hospital, is later determined not to have a legal entitlement. In such a case the veteran would be billed for his care. Also a veteran may be admitted for injuries sustained in an automobile or industrial accident and "third party" liability determined later. If the veteran is awarded damages based wholly or in part on the cost of the medical services involved, the VA may seek payment.

Q - How do you get a veteran who requires medical treatment into a VA hospital?

A - The veteran or his physician applies for admission which is forthcoming if he is eligible, needs hospital care and a bed is available. (In service-connected cases, a bed is always available.) In the case of a sudden emergency, the veteran may be taken directly to the hospital but someone acting for the veteran should communicate with the VA Hospital by telephone or telegraph beforehand to facilitate admission.

Q - When I am discharged from the service, will I be entitled to any pension from VA?

A - Pension benefits are available to veterans who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not attributable to their military service provided they have had 90 or more days active service, any part of which was served in wartime, or if they were discharged for disability. The veteran must also meet certain income limits. Get in touch with the nearest VA regional office to get further details.

Q - I recently retired from Civil Service employment and am filing claim for non-service connected pension from the V.A. Will my retirement pay be considered income for pension purposes?

A - Retirement benefits based on a claimant's own employment are not considered income until the amount of the claimant's personal contribution has been received. After he has received an amount equal to his personal contribution all payments will be considered income.



At the same time, Connally said he himself may have "no precise role" in the presidential campaign, although there is a possibility he will make some out-of-state speeches for the ticket.

Goldwater - for - president headquarters under direction of Tad Smith of El Paso, working with State Republican Chairman Peter O'Donnell of Dallas, already is operating full blast a few blocks from the state capital.

State financial outlook is rosier than ever, but state agency spending plans are breaking all records too.

Gov. Connally gave reporters a briefing on fiscal matters in a photo-slide illustrated press conference.

State agencies, he reported, are asking a whopping \$689,472,181 increase in spending for the 1966-67 fiscal period. He emphasized, however, they aren't likely to get it.

Connally pointed to possibility of a \$2,500,000 surplus at close of the 1964-65 period next August 31. He also estimated there will be \$623,800,000 available for appropriation by the Legislature next year. This is some \$153,400,000 more than the present level.

State agencies, however, have proposed spending of more than \$813,000,000 from the general fund, \$3,800,000 from all funds.

Connally said he wanted to make "abundantly clear" that review of the requests did not represent his approval.

Fewer boys are being sent back to the State Training School due to better parole supervision, Youth Council Director James Turman reports.

Rate of return has dropped to 26 per cent, lowest in history, Turman told the Council. He calculated the dollar saving for the last year at \$217,000.

A steadily-increasing highway death rate is bringing demands for corrective action. The death rate is up 14 per cent from last year. Total number of fatal accidents is up 13 per cent.

There have been 1,860 fatalities this year, compared with 1,631 in 1963.

Is it possible to feel safer standing in the same building with a nuclear reactor than at home?

According to the statistical picture, you are safer at a nuclear reactor site than in your own home.

Accidents, rated the number

three killer in the nation and number four killer in Texas, occur more than 50 per cent of the time in or about the home.

The atomic industry, on the other hand, has one of the nation's best safety records.

With such a potent power at hand, scientists have built in safety device upon safety device - surrounding nuclear power sites with tons of water, walls of the densest brick, lead shields and sensitive monitoring system routinely checking all personnel.

Recently, a group of top men in the field got together to study and learn the "what if" about nuclear accidents.





Oil and Gas Production Worth \$5 Million Yearly In County

Oil and gas production in Eastland County is the main source of economic activity here. Using just-published U. S. Bureau of Mines figures as a base, the Association has projected what oil and gas activities mean in this county. In 1962 Eastland County was producing more than 636,000 barrels of crude oil and 5 billion cubic feet of natural gas. The oil was valued at \$1.9 million; the natural gas at \$631,000.

Eastland County ranks 139th in the state as total value of oil and gas production.

"Demand for Texas crude picked up enough last year to give us an increase of about 3 per cent over 1962 on a statewide basis. This slightly improving trend seems to be holding this year as more autos are put on the road and nationwide business conditions accelerate," said James L. Sewell, president of the Association. "It will be several months, however, before we know to what extent individual counties are participating in the current market."

The dispersion of oil dollars through Eastland County business channels and the healthy effect given property values by petroleum industry activity are indicated by several figures published by the Association.

It is estimated that royalty payments to Eastland County landowners who are fortunate enough to have producing wells on their property create a "crop" worth about \$317,000 annually. These and other farmers and ranchers who have leased acreage for exploration receive additional rental and bonus payments, but sufficient current data is not available for measuring the amount.

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$688,000 in Eastland County last year in the search for new fields and in the development of zones where production has been found. The Oil and Gas Journal reports that 31 wells were drilled in the county in 1963, resulting in 6 oil wells, 2 gas wells, and 23 dry holes.

Drilling operations included 12 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$452,000 of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the Association estimated.

Petroleum industry payrolls contribute about \$2.1 million a year to the county, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 450 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

The state government's financial interest in Eastland County operations is measured by the \$132,000 a year which the operators and royalty owners provide the state government in production taxes. These payments are in addition to those paid to local units of government and schools as property tax. Oil and gas property taxes are reflected in local support of many Texas school districts. For example, 30.5 per cent of the local taxes for the Cisco School District comes from oil and gas operations; 27.3 per cent at Eastland.

Lone Star Plans Natural Gas Line

DALLAS — Lone Star Gas Company has made preliminary plans for construction of a 57-mile natural gas transmission pipeline of 20-inch diameter designed to dramatically increase the availability of natural gas to the company's South Texas market area, according to E. A. Brown, Lone Star's executive vice president of operations.

Mr. Brown said that the new line, extending from Bartlett, Texas to United Gas Pipeline Company's Buda Compressor Station in Travis County, will be built in order to obtain additional gas reserves for use in Waco, Texas and the area south of Waco. The line costing approximately \$3,000,000, will have capacity to deliver an additional 45,000,000 cubic feet of gas every 24-hours. It will reinforce gas supplies on the entire Lone Star market area consisting of some 500 communities, towns and cities in Texas and Southern Oklahoma, Mr. Brown pointed out.

Line surveys and purchase of right-of-way are now under way by Lone Star. Preliminary plans call for construction of the new line in the near future and completion of the line by mid-December. This schedule will make these new gas reserves available to area consumers during the coming heating season, Mr. Brown added.

Report Is Given On Bond Sales In Past Month

Guy Parker, chairman of the Eastland County Savings Bond Committee, has announced that the county's August savings bond sales totaled \$11,598. Sales for the first eight months of this year were 5236,187, which represents 53.6 per cent of the 1964 sales goal.

Total sales in Texas for the first eight months of the year were \$100,643,333. Savings bond sales have increased approximately \$900,000 compared to the same period in 1963.

"In a recent brochure the Treasury Department stressed the tax advantages of buying E bonds. While the interest is subject to federal income tax, the reporting of E bond interest may be deferred until the bonds are cashed or reach final maturity. This means that the owner of the bonds can choose to cash his bonds in years of lower income. This fact makes the E bond particularly attractive to the large investor and for those persons either planning retirement or supplementing an existing retirement program," Chairman Parker stated.

The predicted rice harvest, most of which will be completed in October, tops the average by 33 per cent.

Beef, particularly lower grades, will continue plentiful, as it has been for more than a year, according to USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service. So plan on lots of hamburgers and meat loaves for October menus.

A larger turkey crop than last year's promises a big supply of these poultry favorites this month.

And cheese and Bartlett pears, both in greater supply than last year, will offer lots of easy-to-prepare taste enjoyment.


