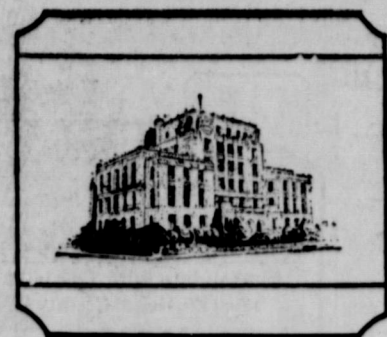

Wanted: 1 Good Rain

"Rain, rain, don't go away!"
Eastland County rainfall during the first four months of this year is below average and below last year's total. April was particularly dry with only 1.16 inches recorded, according to Official Weather Observer James Smith.

Total for the year to date is 5.90 inches — below the average of 7.21 inches, and last year's 7.75 inches for the first four months. Rain was above average this year during January and February, but dropped to a low .54 of an inch in March.

Rain in April fell on eight days — .03 of an inch on the second; .04 on the fifth; .05 on the sixth; .06 on the eighth; .03 on the tenth; .12 on the 15th; .03 on the 25th; and .80 on the 26th.

Low temperature for April was a 39 degrees recorded on the 16th and high was 89 degrees, recorded twice, on the 22nd and the 24th.

Virgil T. Seaberry Scholarship Established

A scholarship fund in the amount of \$1,000 honoring the late Judge Virgil T. Seaberry, to assist deserving Eastland High School graduates in furthering their education, has been established by a 1941 graduate of the local school, according to an announcement by Supt. Wendell Siebert and School Board President J. T. Gregory.

The gift came through the generosity of Robert E. Huchingson, now of Normandy, Mo., and steps have been taken by the local board to administer the scholarship fund. Grants will be made in the form of non-interest bearing loans, the first of which is expected to be made this year from the fund, Supt. Siebert said.

The board has issued the following statement in reference to the fund:

"Whereas, Robert E. Huchingson of Normandy, Mo., and a 1941 graduate of Eastland High School, has in 1965 contributed to the Eastland Public Schools of Eastland, Texas, the sum of \$1,000.00 to establish a scholarship fund to assist deserving students to pursue a course of higher education, such fund to be dedicated to the memory of the late Virgil T. Seaberry, and the Board of Trustees of the Eastland Independent School District desires to carry out the wishes of said donor with regard to such fund.
