
### "Rain, rain, don't go

awav! Eastland County rainfall during the first foulr months of this year is below average and below last year's total. April was particularly dry with only 1.16 inches recorded, according to Official Weather Observer James Smith.

Total for the year to date is 5.90 inches — below the average of 7.21 inches, and last year's 7.75 inches for the first four months. Rain was above average this year dur-ing January and February, but dropped to a low .54 of an inch in March. Rain in April fell on eight

days - .03 of an inch on the second; .04 on the fifth; .05 on the sixth; .06 on the eighth; .03 on the tenth; .12 on the 15th; .03 on the 25th; and .80 on the 26th. Low temprerature for April was a 39 degrees recorded on the 16th and high was 89 de-


