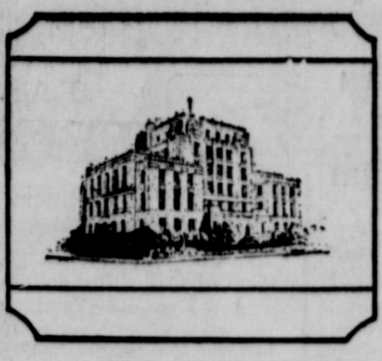

## Horton Is Buried Tuesday Services

Funeral services for James Edward (Jim) Horton, 74, prominent Eastland business and civic leader, were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday at the First Methodist Church in Eastland with Rev. J. Lester Davenport officiating, assisted by Rev. Cyrus Barcus of Hillsboro, former pastor. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery with Arrington Hammer Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Horton died at 2:30 a.m. Monday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after suffering a heart attack. He had entered the hospital shortly before midnight.

A wholesale tire dealer, Mr. Horton represented Seiberling Tire Company and was one of the oldest Seiberling dealers in the nation.

Born July 2, 1891, in Lincoln, Neb., he moved to Eastland with his family in 1919 from Topeka, Kan.

The Rotary suspended its regular Monday luncheon meeting in honor of Mr. Horton and stores and firms in downtown Eastland closed during the funeral services.

Mr. Horton was a past president of the Rotary Club and vice president at the time of his death. For years he had been editor of the Rotary Gusher, printed weekly for the membership. He was a member of the 9:49 Men's Bible Class of the Methodist Church, a longtime active member of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, and was a supporter of Boy Scout activities.

An avid sportsman and gun collector, Mr. Horton was Texas champion state trapshooter in 1925. His collection of antique and contemporary models was mounted on the wall of his downtown office. The collection includes some of the guns used in the famous Santa Claus bank robbery in Cisco.

Mr. and Mrs. Horton would have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary at the end of this month.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Horace Horton, of Longview; one brother, Horace Horton, of Chicago, Ill.; one sister, Mrs. Edwin Montgomery, of Lake City, Fla.; and three grandchildren.

## County Bank Deposits Total Over \$17 Million

Bank deposits of the five banks in Eastland County totaled \$17,757,177 at the end of the first quarter, and loans amounted to \$9,263,295.

Only the loan figure is up from immediate past reports, but individual banks in the county have shown increases in certain areas.

The present deposits total is below the \$18,273,538 recorded at the end of 1964, and slightly lower than the five-bank total of \$17,842,764 reported at the end of the first quarter of 1964.

Only the First National of Cisco and the Eastland National reported higher first quarter deposits than three months ago. The first quarter totals are traditionally lowest of the year, accounting for the lower figures, it is reported.

The First State Bank of Rising Star recorded a substantial increase from its year-ago figure, but was down from the last 1964 report.

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## Courthouse Dedication Is Remembered

The dedication of Eastland County Court House was recalled recently by H. J. Tanner from one of the programs distributed that day, May 30, 1929, when the new building was dedicated to soldiers of Eastland County who served and were killed during World War I.

Today, in the court house, remains a memorial tablet some ten feet by six feet in size, containing the names of those soldiers, according to Mr. Tanner.

Construction of the court house began Jan. 1, 1928, and was completed Dec. 1, 1928, at the cost of \$312,000. Present the day of its dedication were the late Judge Hickman, chief justice of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals; and W. P. Leslie and O. C. Funderburk, both members of the Appeals Court.

The program was introduced by the late Judge Clyde Garrett and memorial services were conducted by the American Legion.

Closing the ceremony was a reading given by Mrs. Lexie Dean Robinson of Rising Star, who was later chosen as Poet Laureate of the State of Texas.

## Allotment Transfer Could Ruin Economy, Grower Says

The threat to Eastland County's peanut economy was vividly explained by Claud Fuller, Gorman area farmer and president of the County Farmers Union, for the Eastland Lions Club at the luncheon meeting Tuesday.  
 The threat is from proposed farm legislation, Fuller said, that would permit the transfer of allotments, which could conceivably strip this county of its peanut-growing ability and thereby affect the entire area's economy.  
 (Presently allotments are granted to a particular farm or site of land, but under the proposed legislation, allotments would be transferable from person to person, and would permit, for example, the purchase of Eastland County allotment — with a yield potential of some 30 bushels to the acre — to fertile, irrigated lands, where the yield might be up to 175 bushels to the acre.)  
 Fuller was one of a group of Eastland and Comanche countians who went to Washington recently to voice objections to the legislation. He explained how his group had called on Cong. Omar Burleson, who was sympathetic to the locals' plea, Cong. Pogue of East Texas who feels that allotment transfers might be

beneficial to his cotton-raising constituents; Sen. Tower, and Sen. Yarborough's staff.  
 Action is expected to be taken within the next 30 days, and Fuller invited interested persons to write, particularly to Cong. Burleson, who may be addressed at the House Office Building, Washington 25, D. C.  
 Earl O'Brien was program chairman for the day and County Agent J. M. Cooper introduced the speaker who farms four miles north of Gorman.  
 President Leon Musgrove presided and Ed Ethridge introduced these guests: Sutton Crofts of Cisco; Joe Dennis of Ranger; Clint Bray, transfer new member from Cisco; E. E. Blackwell, chairman, Garland Garrett and Guy Lyerla, Agricultural Stabilization Conservation Committee for Eastland County; Glenn Scallorn, formerly of Eastland, now of Del Rio; Sam Kimmell of Cisco; and Ross Wilson of Gorman.  
 The legislation in question is known as the Title 6, Transfer and sale of Allotment clause of the Farm program.  
 Kimmell announced that the Eastland County Farm Bureau has also taken action to oppose the measure.

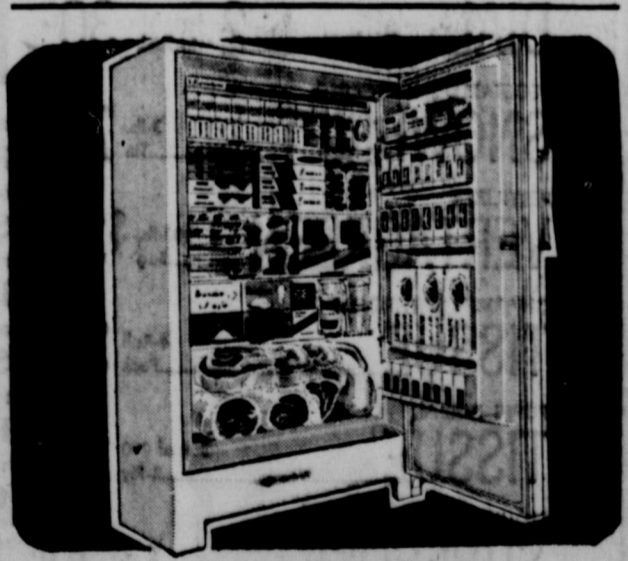

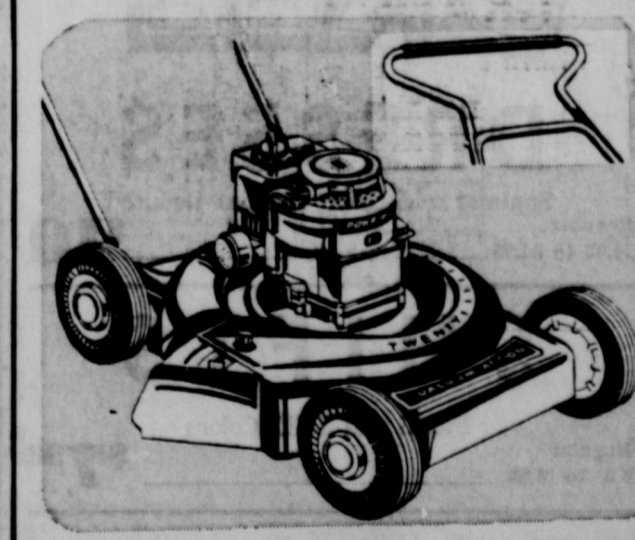
