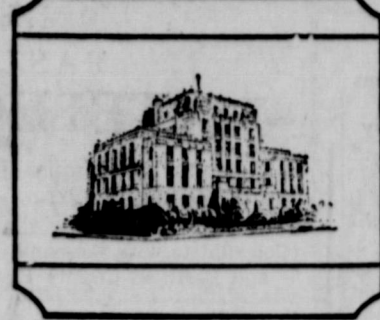

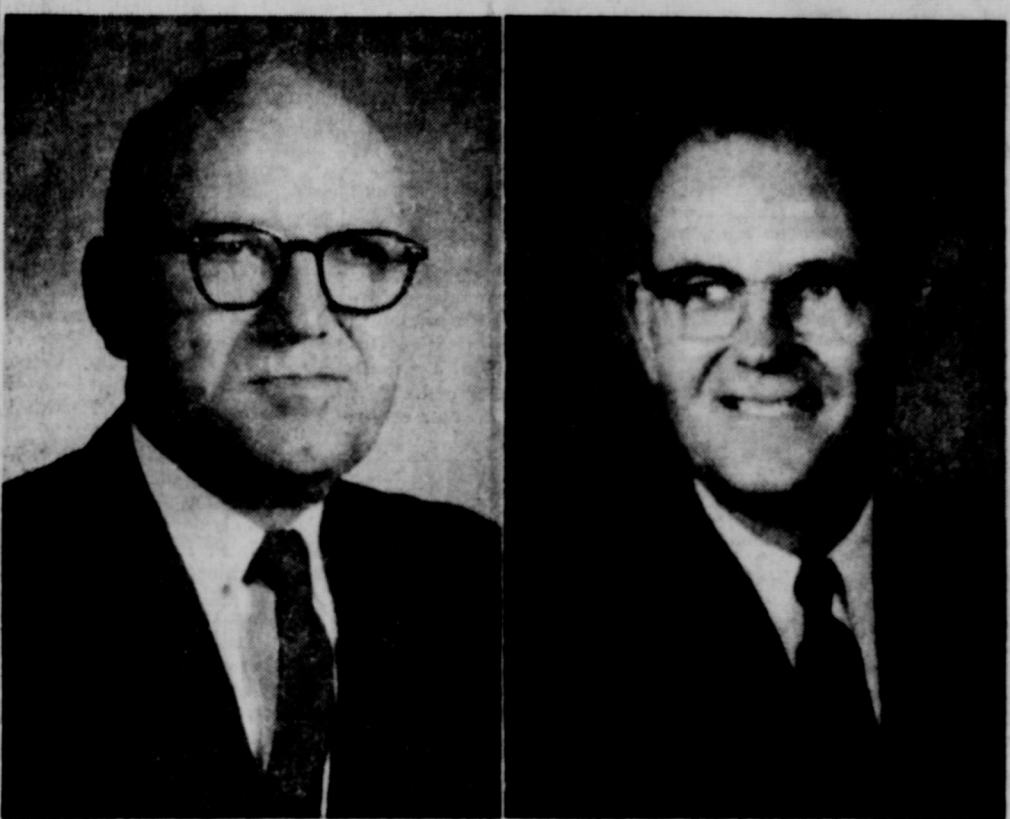

We plan only to increase the stores' efficiency and service to the food buying public, in keeping with the policy and reputation of our stores in other places."
JRB Supermarkets operate in Brownwood, Bangs, Cross Plains, Coleman, Abilene, and Lampasas.
"Our policy of stocking our stores with complete stocks of nationally advertised foods, including Shurfine and Always Fresh lines, has made the JRB Supermarkets the leading stores in their localities, and we plan to continue this policy," Mr. Beadel said. "Our high quality meat markets, in which we carry only the best quality graded meats, and our produce departments in which we offer only the finest fruits and vegetables, have contributed considerably to our success in the supermarket field. In addition, as an added bonus, we give S&H Green Stamps, the nation's leading redemption stamp."
J. R. Beadel and Company is owned by J. R. Beadel and Allen Beadel, both of Brownwood. The Beadel brothers have been in the retail grocery business for twenty years and previous to that time were engaged for many years in the wholesale grocery business. Their entire career has been spent in Central and West Texas and both men are firm believers in the future growth and development of this section of Texas.

Eastland's Future Depends on 'IF'

Eastland-Made Bud Vases To Be Gift Features at L.A. Convention

When Loins from all over the world gather in Los Angeles, Calif., in July for the International Lions Convention, Texas, Eastland County and an Eastland-made product will be signally presented.
Not only will Texas Loins be of a native son to the international presidency of the world service club, but an Eastland-made product will be among the foremost gifts presented to officers and dignitaries.
The Texas delegation gifts committee has ordered 1,000 pair of combination bud vase-candle holders from Romco Pottery Co. and the Eastland plant is presently in full production creating the works of art to be given to incoming officers and dignitaries.
Local Romco plant manager Jimmy Little announced that the giant order is to be shipped to Waco by June 25, from where it will be transported to the West Coast July 7-10 convention site by a Lion trucker.
The order, placed by Harry E. Rankin of the South Side Lions Club in Fort Worth, district governor of 2-E-2, and chairman of the special gifts committee of the Texas delegation, will amount to some \$2,500 plus individual boxing and shipping, Little said. Selection of the Romco item was made by Rankin and a group who visited the Eastland Retail Outlet on East Main St. recently. Negotiations for the contract were handled by Mrs. Roger Seebebe and Little.
The bud vase is a regular Romco item but is being made up special for the unusually large order, Little said, and "probably will bear a 'Romco — made in Eastland' sticker."

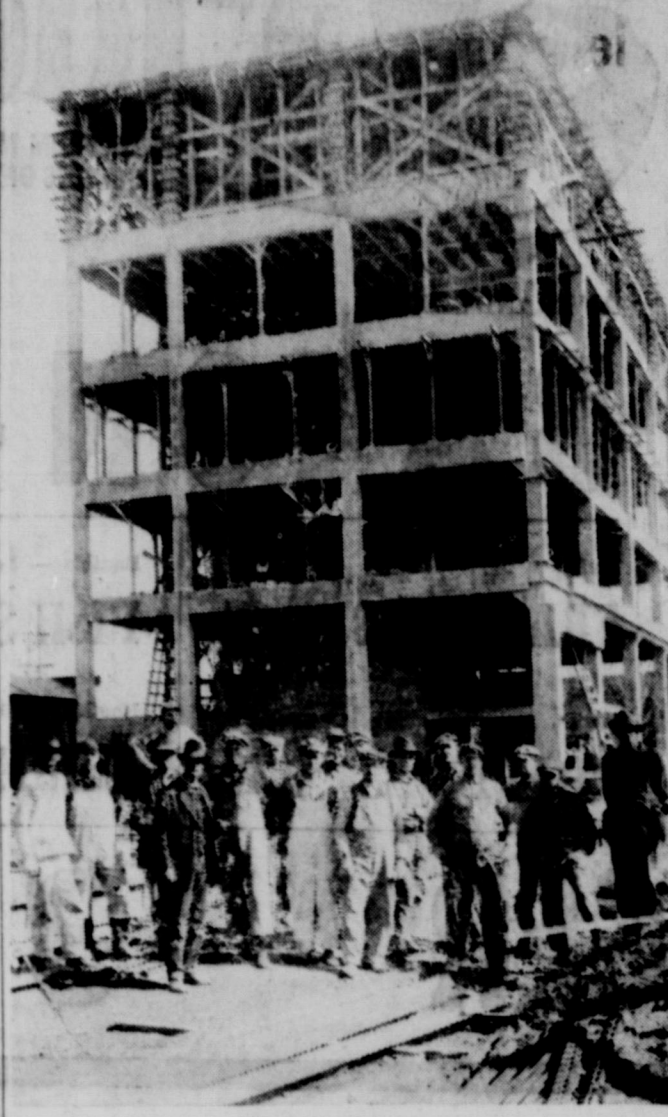

Dr. Treadwell Is Speaker For Rotary Meeting

"Be afraid enough of cancer to see a doctor about any symptoms and do something about it." That was the advice of Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Eastland physician and surgeon, in a talk Thursday at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club.

The program was arranged by Rotarian Sam Kimmell, and the speaker was introduced by Mrs. Austin Flint of the county cancer society chapter.

Cancer is the nation's second leading cause of death, Dr. Treadwell said. Much research and experiment work are going on throughout the world to find a cure for cancer and Dr. Treadwell predicted that it would come in the not too distant future.

Dr. Treadwell told of the various types of cancer and suggested symptoms to watch for. These included:

Skin cancers, moles if they grow, headaches or dizziness for brain cancer, lung cancer, bleeding or unusual pains for stomach cancers, yellow skin for cancer of the liver, blood in urine for kidney and bladder cancer, prostate gland checkups, lymph node enlargements should be checked on, knots for thyroid gland cancer, bone cancer and breast cancer in women.

The percentage of people who are cured of cancer when it is detected early is going up every year, Dr. Treadwell said. He suggested semi-annual chest x-rays for smokers and annual checkups and x-rays for everyone.
