In Lampasas County at an estimated cost of \$52,000 6.6 miles of base and surfacing on FM 2942 from US 183 in Lometa east and north.

Approximately 15 miles of new farm-to-market roads are proposed under this program and approximately \$150,000 is provided for the grading and Comanche County from State Highway 16 at Downing, southeast to Promontory Park at Proctor Reservoir, 5.0 miles; McCulloch County, from FM 1121, south to US 377, 4.3 miles; and San Saba County from FM 45, 2.5 miles County from FM 45, 25 miles north of Richland Springs, west to county road, 6.0 miles.


