All-New Property Improvement Loans Are Announced Here

There's something entirely new about property improvement loans in Eastland, according to an announcement made this week by two building materials dealers and the local bank officials.

It's a liberal new property improvement program that

will enable local people to borrow up to \$7,500 to remodel, redecorate and/or add additional comforts and conveniences, and take up to seven years to repay.

The announcement was made jointly by Eastland National Bank, Crowell Lumber Co. and Hanna Hardware and Lumber Co., who are cooperating in the program to provide funds and services for property improvements.

And another brand new feature of the program this year is its virtual unrestricted nature: under this plan, a resident may elect to improve or add just about anything that will improve his property. And this includes building a garage, a carport, or needed outbuildings. Inside, the plan will cover air conditioning, carpeting as well as the usual jobs of painting, papering, and general repair and improvement. Under the new plan, a

Evangelist To Preach Here At 1st Methodist

Rev. Lester Davenport, pastor of the First Methodist Church announced this week that Dr. Frank L. Turner, Conference Evangelist of Fort Worth, will be the guest speaker at both morning and evening services at First Methodist Church Sunday, June 20.

Dr. Turner was a pastor in the Central Texas Conference for several years, holding pastorates in Fort Worth, Hamilton, Ballinger and Cisco. In 1938, he was elected President of McMurry College in Abilene which position he held for four years. During his presidency, the school was entirely freed from indebtedness and more than \$150,000 added to plant and property and the school raised in Academic Standing to membership in the Southern Association of Colleges.

In 1942, he resigned his place with McMurry to enter the field of Evangelism and was appointed a General Evangelist at the ensuing Conference.

Since that time, he has conducted more than 250 Revival Meetings across the Southwest and Central States. These campaigns, which have been held in both large and small churches, have resulted in almost 4,000 conversions and additions to the church while other thousands have reconsecrated their lives to Christ at the altar of his Church. Where he has preached, there has been a distinct spiritual uplift to the church and community. He comes again to Eastland after preaching for the church at the morning service several Sundays ago.

Late Sgt. Tyrone Cited for Valor

Placed in the Congressional record in Washington recently was the story of Army Sergeant Willie Tyrone's heroism just before he was killed in Viet Nam recently. The story was placed on record by Sen. Robert F. Kennedy. After being wounded and his battalion becoming low on ammunition in the Viet Nam war-torn country, Sergeant Tyrone sent a message for help; however, when helicopters arrived with ammunition for the battalion and to rescue Tyrone, he waved them off because the Viet Cong were too close. Every ranger in the battalion was killed within a few hours, when the Viet Cong attacked. "Tyrone died because he refused to endanger the lives of others who tried to rescue him after a battle against the Viet Cong," according to a story appearing in the New York Journal American.

Hospital Visits Should Be Enjoyed, Not Just Endured

Many people do not realize in the patient's recovery. Every person who visits a patient in the hospital, you play a part in the patient's recovery. Hospital rules and regulations may seem unnecessary and possibly too stringent, but

they have been established over a long period of time in the best interests of the patient. Many times rules governing visits are the result of the doctor's wishes or perhaps those of the patient.

When calling upon a friend in the hospital, the first thing to remember is to limit your visit to 15 minutes. If the patient wishes to discuss his illness, be a good listener, but don't ask questions or add comments to prolong the discussion and try tactfully to switch the topic away from his sickness.

Invariably, when the patient is first admitted, visitors come in droves at a time when he is least able to cope with them. The time to visit is during convalescence when he is more himself and in better shape to receive you. During the period of initial hospitalization, a brief, cheery note or get well card shows you are concerned about your friend and that your thoughts are with him.

When the patient has several other visitors in his room, and after you make your presence known, if they do not indicate that they are leaving, it is desirable that you leave and return another time. Actually, only two visitors should be in the room at a time to avoid overcrowding which may hinder the activities of the nursing staff or physician.

If the physician or minister should call upon the patient while you are visiting him, you should immediately withdraw. Such consultations are privileged and should be conducted in private.

If you notice signs of weariness or discomfort, it is a good time to cut your visit short. It could be that the patient may have personal needs that he is not able to attend to until you leave.

It is always comforting to those in the hospital to know that members of the family are being looked after. You can perform a real service to the patient by relieving any anxiety he may have in this regard by offering assistance to his family while in the hospital.

In addition to things which you can do to make your visit worthwhile, there are those things which may have an

adverse effect on the patient. He certainly doesn't want to hear of a similar case that resulted in dire circumstance, a condemnation of the course of treatment or ridiculing those responsible for his recovery. If the patient does not bring up the nature of his illness, do not probe for information. His illness is a personal thing and he may find it embarrassing to discuss.

The patient looks forward to getting well and returning home. It is inconsiderate to discuss unpleasant situations or bad news that will have to be faced. Any added worry or anxiety will tend to hinder the patient's recovery. Besides, chances are he will not be able to resolve an unpleasant situation at home until he is back in familiar surroundings.

One of the most abused liberties taken by a visitor is to smoke during a visit. Even though the patient may be a smoker, an excess of cigar, cigarette or pipe smoke may make him feel nauseated or a little more sick.

Before you make a trip to the hospital, it is suggested that you first call to see if the patient's condition will

permit him to have visitors and just as a reminder, the visiting hours at Eastland Memorial Hospital are 2:30 - 4 p. m., and 7 - 8:30 p. m.

Children under 12 years of age are not permitted in patient areas.

If the patient has undergone surgery, it is best to wait until the third post-operative day after major surgery or the second after minor surgery.

When the patient is on the road to recovery, he wants to see his friends. When properly handled, a visit breaks the monotony and becomes a pleasant respite to which he looks forward. If children accompany you, and it becomes necessary to have them remain in the hospital's main lobby, it would be well to observe the principles of hospital etiquette by making sure they are attended.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

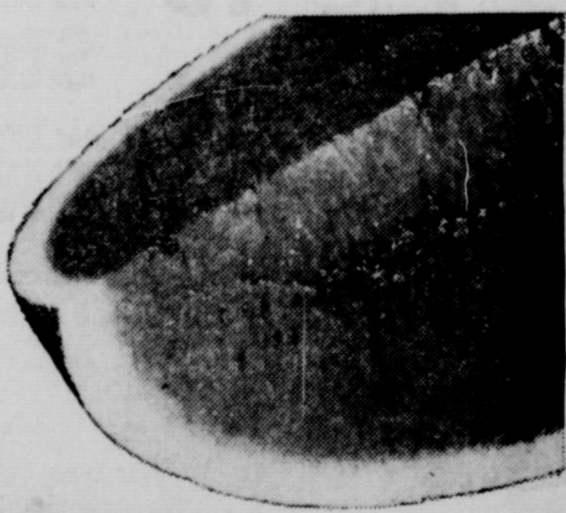

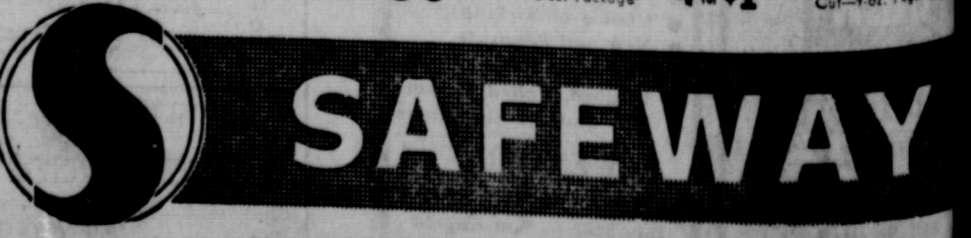

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Class of '17 First to Wear Caps & Gowns

Forty-eight years ago, on May 18, 1917, eight students graduated from Eastland High School. As one of those eight, I will try to give a brief history of our class.

Members of the class were Dewey Wilson, Wesley Beard, Homer Blackwell, Gussie Sun-

mons (now Mrs. Gene Andrews), Bess Harrell (now Mrs. George Glasscock), Elsie Morton (now Mrs. Carl McCombs), Myrtle Harrell, Irene Collins and myself, then Edith Roue. Of course there were many other classmates who had been with us down the years but for various reasons they could not remain to graduate with us.

I started to school with the class in the fourth grade in the white two story frame building with a bell tower on the roof. The room teacher was Mrs. McDaniel. Next year we were promoted to the 5th grade and got to move upstairs. Our teacher in the fifth grade was Miss Bell Wilson.

In September of 1911 our new red brick school building opened her doors. The old plank structure had been razed and cleaned away. Nothing remained the same as the year before except the old cemented cistern where we obtained our drinking water.

Then came our high school years, four grand and glorious

years. How could I ever have met the problems of later life, how could I have kept my home and reared my children without the memory of those joyous years without the wonderful training that they afforded?

Our teachers were sincere and took a personal interest in each of us. They were all very different, but each had such a fine personality that it is hard to decide which one had the greatest influence upon my life. These teachers included George Brogdon, superintendent who is now deceased; T. Emmett Richardson, who is now co-owner of Toombs-Richardson Drug; Mrs. Richardson (Miss Elizabeth Toombs), and T. Emmett Richardson (now deceased).

During our high school days football was not known in EHS but we took great pride in our boys' basketball team which was undefeated. The boys on this team were Wesley Beard, Hubert Toombs, Guy Parker, Joe Johnson and Milton Lawrence. We played match games

with the surrounding towns. These games were played on the "down under court" between Butler Drug Co. and Martin Day Grocery Co.

Our class was very special in many ways, but I suppose the most important thing that would distinguish us from other classes is the fact that we wore the first cap and gowns that were ever worn in Eastland High School. They were also the last that were worn for 10 or more years here.

Another very unique thing was our Thanksgiving feast in 1916. The table was first covered with white linen, then spread to a depth of about four inches in freshly dried autumn leaves in which nuts were hidden. Set among the leaves were the bountiful dishes of turkey, possum, chicken, sweet potatoes, salmon salad, fruit salad, vegetables and pickles, while the corners of the table were graced with delicious custards, plate pies, cakes and home made bread.

I should like to explain further about this "possum" on the menu. It was all Mr. Brogdon's idea. He sent the boys hunting for the possum and the girls volunteered to prepare the food, except the possum. Finally Irene agreed to cook it, and she made a beautiful dish of the whole possum stuffed and baked.

The Senior picnic was the only entertainment during our senior year in which the teachers did not take part. Mr. Brogdon played jokes on us all the time and now it was our turn to play a joke on him. Up to May 2 he had denied us our annual picnic. Although it was in the middle of the week and at the time when every minute should count on our reviews for final

exams we each invited a partner and prepared a lunch for a "moonlight picnic."

Sundown found the senior class, Miss Eppie Jean Grove (our chaperon) and 10 invited guests gathered around the little table down in the park. The park at that time was on the west side of the north bridge near the depot. There were no residences or other buildings in this area except a tabernacle then.

In January, 1917, Mr. Brogdon announced to our class that a scholarship would be offered from the College of Industrial Arts (now Texas State College for Women) in Denton to the young lady who made the highest grade average. This was the first girls scholarship to be offered in EHS.

We all worked very hard

for the honor and finally, just moments before we were to go upstairs for our commencement exercises, Mr. Brogdon announced our grades. Dewey Wilson was our valedictorian, Wesley Beard was salutatorian and I had made the highest average among the girls. The scholarship was presented to me along with my diploma at our closing exercise. (Written in 1957.)
