Many of China's foreign loans are in default, but as yet she has not attempted to repudiate liability on any of them. It would be rather amusing if China were now to repudiate some of the loans in which France is mainly interested on the grounds that economic distress rendered it advisable for China to retain the money in her own coffers. If she did, we cannot see, outside of the use of force, what France could do about it in view of her actions toward the French debts to the United States.

It is to be remembered the negotiation between Paris and Pekin over the French share of the Boxer indemnity, which France demanded in gold, at a time when it was difficult for the Chinese to make payment in that currency. In the end France had her way and China paid as demanded. No doubt China is watching the action of France in the matter of her debts to the United States and perhaps at a later stage will take advantage of the precedent France has created.

A precedent has been established and there is no knowing what may happen in the future. France is far more wealthy in gold than England, yet England pays her debts. It tcannot be said that France cannot pay if she wishes to; and to plead poverty in such a case would not be an ex cuse that she would accept from her debtors.







#### A STATEMENT FROM A CITIZEN OF THE UNITED STATES TO HIS FELLOW CITIZENS:

ON Saturday I saw Franklin Roosevelt inaugurated as 32nd President of the United States.

I heard his inaugural address.

Nine hours before he spoke, the Governor of the State of New York came out of a meeting with the banking authorites and declared a bank holiday.

Why?

Solely because he knew that a public fear, by reason of its unthinking demands, was threatening to put our banks in a position where they could no longer properly serve our public. Governor Lehman wisely declared a bank holiday to give us—the public—time to realize that.

He gave us time to remember that:

- 1. We, the public, put our money into banks for safekeeping.
- 2. Banks must be reasonably paid for that service.
- 3. Banks must therefore put part of our money to work, to earn interest for us, and to pay the bank for protecting us.
- 4. The law says clearly what part of our money can be so put to work.
- 5. The banks, by law, put that money to work; they make legal investments to pay our interest and the bank's expenses.
- 6. At no time—even peak-prosperity—could the banks sell all these securities to pay each of us every dollar—without causing us and our banks great losses.
- 7. For all of us to ask our banks to pay each

of us every dollar at one and the same time, is to force heavy loss upon ourselves as well as our banks. Governor Lehman declared the holiday to make us soberly realize all that.

He gave us a chance to realize that we live in the soundest country in the world . . .

...that it has the safest and sanest form of government.

...that since the adoption of its Constitution in 1789 we and our forebears have been through five wars, ten panics—and have come out of each stronger, healthier, richer, saner.

Our country was sick. It is getting well.

But our country has every means of cure that it ever had: in ability, in natural resources, in energy, in inventiveness, in patriotic leaders—and in citizen-courage.

We have the envy of the world for that strength. So now—just as we would stand by a sick relative, would do nothing rash, would trust the doctors we have chosen—so let us trust the leaders we have chosen.

We elected President Roosevelt because we trust him. His pledge on Saturday:

"There must be provision for an adequate but sound currency . . . "

—moved every citizen who heard it. That man, our President, knows our ailment. He knows our distress. He knows our unemployment. He will leave no step untaken which will put men back in jobs, and food back on tables.

As a citizen, the bank holiday has given me time and cause to set down a code which I am following:

"I trust my government.

"I trust our banks.

"I do not expect the impossible.

"I shall do nothing hysterical. I shall act as nearly as I can to normal. If it is normal to carry little cash in my pocket when there is plenty to go round, I shall carry little now. There never was a time when every one on earth could possess all his cash in his pocket, his stocking, his safe-deposit box, or anything else.

"I know that if I try now to get all my cash, I shall certainly make matters worse.

"I will not stampede. I will not lose my nerve. I will keep my head."

Meanwhile—in the event that occasion requires it—it will be found that the New York Clearing House banks have prepared themselves, with the approval of the Government, to furnish such need of currency as will enable every householder to carry on his normal affairs uninterruptedly.

People who have jobs will probably be paid in full in cash. At Macy's, for instance, its 8,000 people will be paid in cash Tuesday morning.




