WASHINGTON, Mar. 1 (AP)—The government won in the supreme court today in its contention that the 1933 resolution prohbiting payment of obligations in gold applied to contracts for bullion as well as to coin.

The 5 to 4 decision was delivered by Justice Cardono. Dissenting were Justices Van Devanter, McReynolds, Sutherland and Butler.

These were the four who dissented to the celebrated su-

preme court opinion upholding, in effect, the legislation.

The opinion affirmed rulings by the first circuit court of appeals and the Massachusetts federal district court that a contract for gold bullion could be paid off at its face value in present-day revalued money.
