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
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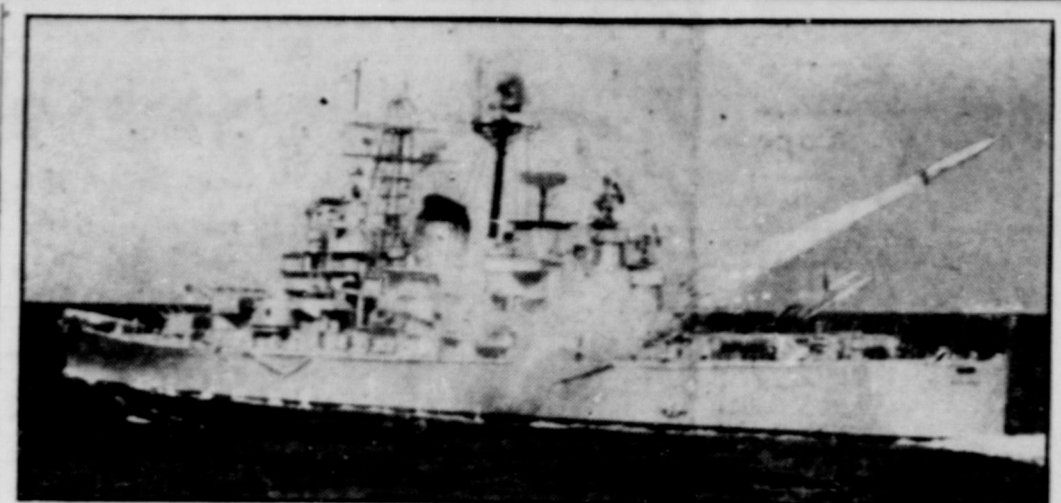

Seesee, New Game Bird, To Be Released In Palo Duro Canyon

Another new game bird, described as "a hair smaller than bobwhite quail," is being introduced into Texas in an effort to bulwark native upland game species.

It is the seesee partridge which originated in Pakistan, according to the assistant director of wildlife restoration of the Game and Fish Commission. The first air shipment of sixty-seven seesees is being held in pens in the Palo Duro Canyon area, south of Amarillo, where the fleet birds will be released after they have recovered from the exhausting flight.

The new species are found in the dryer parts of West Pakistan and are accustomed to rugged barren areas.

Meanwhile, wildlife biologist A. S. Jackson of Canadian, who supervised receipt of the seesees, reported progress on a previously introduced exotic wild game bird. A Cottle county rancher said he saw a female red-legged partridge and young. This is the first brood reported of this large game bird which was obtained from Spain.

Dear Sirs:

Your recent article on the naming of the new Little League field starting my old head buzzing. I am sure that all will agree that the only possible name for the field would be Wright Field. Jim is only one of a host of others that spend themselves freely for the betterment of Eastland. I would like to propose an idea that would provide recognition for these persons. Most of them would not want attention drawn to the work that they are doing but I believe that it is only fair to the community to let Eastland know who are really working for civic betterment and not just talking about it.

The following is a rough draft of how this recognition might come about. I would suggest that each of the following organizations—Lions, Rotary, Chamber of Commerce, Ministerial Association, American Legion and VFW—appoint one of their members to a town-wide committee with the purpose of Selecting the Man of the Month. The basis of selection must be worked out by the group but it could include such items as: the development of new business opportunities, the successful conducting of some special drive i. e. Red Cross, United Fund, etc., outstanding activity in the church of their choice, special assistance to the program for youth, etc.

I would further suggest that a letter of commendation be drawn up by the committee to be presented to the Man of the Month at a regular meeting of one of the above organizations. At the close of the year, I would suggest that a Man of the Year be selected from the 12 men of the month and a special plaque suitably inscribed be presented to him at some town-wide banquet such as the Annual Chamber of Commerce dinner.

I would further suggest that the Eastland Telegram print in full the letter of commendation along with a short biography and picture and also that KERC would tape an interview with this personality.

I can think of at least 10 men that I think would qualify for this recognition. As we become aware of the efforts to make our community a better place to live, I believe that we will strive harder. We must not "hide our lamps under a bushel."

setting, designed by H. Neil Whiting, assistant professor of drama, is a tree-house. At one point during the play, six persons are on the platform in the substantial tree built for the performance.

"The Grass Harp" is a story of elderly love, family affections and differences, and the triumph of individual freedom. The characters present a cross-section of a small Southern town.

A kind-hearted spinster, who feels she has been driven away from home by her sister, takes refuge in a tree-house in the woods. She is accompanied by a Negro mammy and an adolescent boy. The sister is outraged, the whole town is shocked and angry, and an armed posse invades the woods to capture the traitors to society and march them back to civilization.

Capote says the play's meaning is simple: "You can't escape from the realities of life. You can't run away from life to live in a tree or any ivory tower."

However, his characters prove their right to live in a tree if they want to.

Relying heavily upon lighting, music and sound effects, "The Grass Harp" is described as a "mood play." There is a good deal of comedy to lighten the serious moments, however.

Sound effects for the production include crickets, frogs, whip-poorwills, rustling leaves and many other sounds of the deep woods. Music includes "Night Soliloquy" by Kent Kennan of the university music faculty and "Acadian Songs and Dances" by Virgil Thomson of the New York Herald Tribune.

The costumes and settings are designed to give a feeling of nostalgia. Southern flavor will be carried out in the actors' speech.

It is the mark of the highest and finest discipline in life. Love has as its allies righteousness and truth, endurance, faith, hope—all of these are the very essence of love.

Love, too, is persistent; it never fails. When prophecies and eloquence are done, and whether or not there be knowledge, love will continue, for love is the true goal of all divine purpose and human endeavor. The things that abide are faith, hope and love, but the greatest of these is love.

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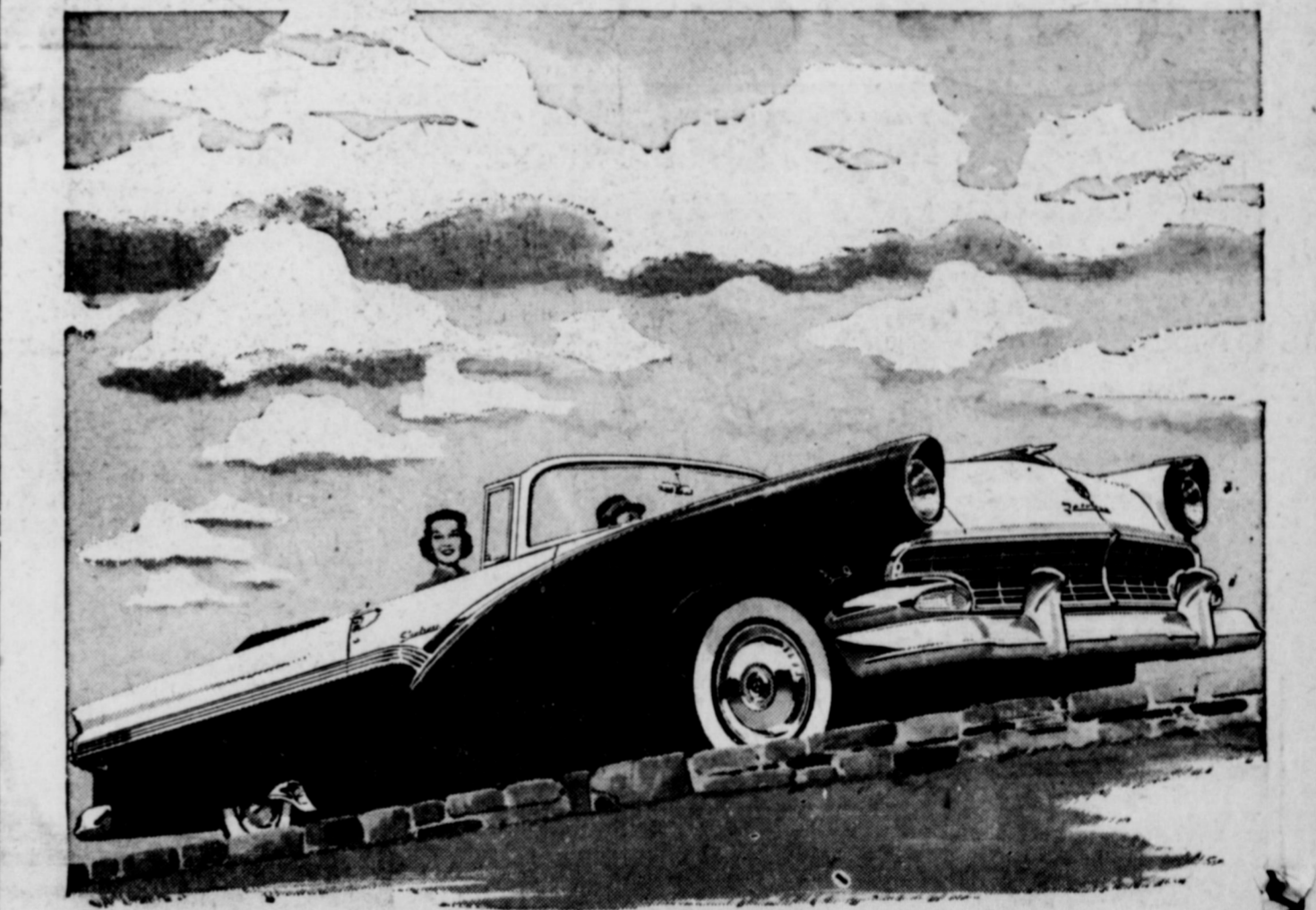

2. The losing candidate has been in office too long with too little accomplished for the people he is supposed to be representing, or he may have never been in office but also does not have a winning platform.

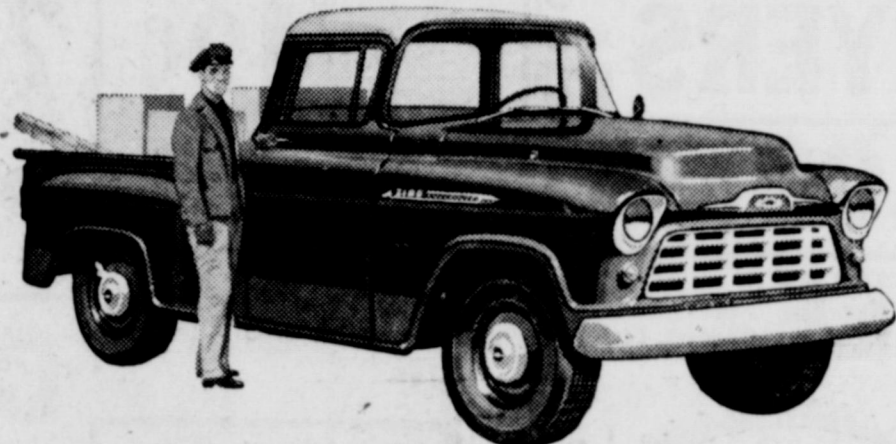
