



Bible Comment:

The Greatness And Power Of Love

THE most complete and perfect exposition of the nature, meaning and application of love in daily life is found in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Paul begins by contrasting love with things that men might de-sire to possess. These include fluency and power of speech, the gift of prophecy, wisdom to understand mysteries, a strong faith, and even sacrificial charity. But without love, all these things profit nothing. It is in such terms that Paul reveals the
