BILLIONS OF GOLD IN CALIFORNIA

For years and years California has been advertising sunshine. Now the publicity agents of the Golden Coast state are advertising gold-gold said to be under the surface of the earth. State Mineralogist Walter Bradley is the big ace of the publicity men. He is telling it to the world that more gold remains hidden in the earth of California today than has been mined in the state since gold mining began in 1849. Indeed, Colonel Bradley is telling it to the world that most enginers believe that at least two billion dollars worth of gold-half the amount of gold held in United States banks-remains in California soil awaiting lucky miners.

Is this a hint that the California tourist crop of 1933 is expected to hit a new high level?

It appears that President Roosevelt made a great mistake when he put over his tree planting plan to furnish labor to an army of the unemployed. He should have turned the recruits loose in the placer fields of the Golden Coast state and made it possible to increase the gold reserves of the nation by an additional two billion dollars.

He never sleeps at the switch, but he missed the 112% two billions said to be under the thin surface of his adopted state. Now a wild cry will issue from the throats of thousands-"California, here I come."

SEN. HOPKINS' STATE BANK BILL ON THE WAY

Texas lawmakers are to be congratulated. The senate bill sponsored by Sen. W. K. Hopkins to allow the state banking commissioner to liquidate hard-pressed state banks without pressing them into receivership was passed Thursday by the house of representatives.

Representative Emmett Morse of Harris county looked after the passage of the bill. It tracks the Roosevelt regulation for the liquidation of hard-pressed national banks the nation over without placing them into receiverships or bankruptcy, thus having hundreds of thousands of dollars for the depositors who are most concerned. In other words, the Hopkins bill was designed to reduce the cost of closing out state banks and to increase the yield from assets.

It is an enactment worth while and the lawmakers should be given the thanks of all the people.




