Funeral services for Mrs. Nora Graham were held Sunday at 2 p.m. in the Hamner Funeral Chapel with interment in the Eastland Cemetery.

Rev. Richard Smith officiated with Rev. Barber assisting. Pallbearers were Truly Carter of Cisco, W. R. Usery of Carbon, A. M. Thurman of Gorman, and Tom Haley, Charlie Murphy and Joe Matthews of Eastland.

Mrs. Graham was born Nora Frances Morris, Feb. 10, 1862 to Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Morris of Garner, Ark.

She was converted at the age of 12 and joined the Methodist Church, of which she remained a member throughout her life. She became the bride of J. E. Graham Sept. 9, 1880 in Garner and in 1904 they moved from Arkansas to Carbon, where they lived for 26 years before moving to Eastland.

Lake Leon Sanitation To Be Enforced

Persons planning to build on the shores of Lake Leon may save themselves a great deal of money if first they check the elevation of their planned cess pool or septic tank, it has been disclosed.

Regulations governing such construction require cess pools and septic tanks be constructed at a mean elevation of 1385 feet or above.

At a recent meeting of the Eastland County Water Supply District, it was reported several people have constructed cess pools below the 1385-foot level and that during recent rains some of the pools overflowed.

The board has the authority and may inspect and condemn cess pools and septic tanks built below 1385 feet, according to David D. Pickrell, secretary.

Pickrell pointed out that certain state sanitation laws are being violated at the lake and that "Some people have encroached upon the land without our permission."

Mr. Pickrell added that in his opinion there are a few houses built below the 1385-foot level and (Continued on Page Two)

Buddy Moser paced the winners at bat, getting four hits in five trips to the plate. He had a tripple, a double and two singles, in driving in four runs. Losing Pitchers was Terry Moore, who relieved R. D. Ables on the mound,

only to give way to Jody Cooper. The unbeaten Lions started off fast, scoring two runs in the first inning and seven in the second to get their winning runs. The Dogs didn't score until the third inning, getting a single run, but added three in the fourth and another in the fifth.

Winning pitcher was Bobby Cartwright. Cartwright hurled three innings, giving up one run and four hits. He was relieved in the top of the fourth by Bubba Hunter, who pitched four hit ball during the remaining three innings giving up four runs. The losing pitcher was Raymond Lusk. Lusk got into bad trouble in the second frame, and gave way to Tom Lovelace. Raymond gave up five hits and eight runs in one and a third inning. Lovelace hurled the rest of the game, giving up four runs on six hits.

Thursday night the Medics meet the Lions and the Bulldogs play the Comets.

Work On Safeway Store To Begin Next Monday

Work on the new Safeway building here will get underway next Monday, Ira C. Kiker Jr., public relations manager of Safeway Stores, Inc., announced today.

Kiker said that B&H Construction Co. of Fort Worth was successful bidder and will start "physical construction" June 25. Completion date is expected to be sometime in mid-November.

"We can expect to open the store sometime in December if everything goes as planned," Kiker said.

B. and H. Construction Co. has recently completed a new Safeway store in Breckenridge and is now constructing a similar store in Stephenville.

The new store is to be built at the corner of East Main and Hal-bryan streets. The building will contain some 7500 square feet of floor space with a huge off-the-street lot for customer parking.

"The interior will contain all the latest developments for the retail distribution of foods and allied products," Kiker said. "It will be completely air conditioned and will be decorated in the gay, pastel colors that we are using in our present developments."

Special Water Rate In Summer Is Impossible, City Dads Say

"We would like to, but we just don't know how in the world we could do it,"

That's the answer Eastland City Commissioners have given to requests from some citizens for a special summer water rate. In fact, commissioners expressed some doubt that the present water rate will be sufficient to meet operating expenses.

Horace Horton, newest commissioner, came up with these figures. Since Sept. 1955, when the City began using water out of the new lake, the City has had an average monthly income of \$6601.59, while expenses have averaged \$8827. That leaves a deficit of \$2200.

During the four remaining months of the fiscal year, the City must sell \$12,000 worth of water to break even for the year.

"Since \$9142.88 was the income in August of last year, it is impossible to break even and the City will show a deficit of approximately \$13,000 for the first year of operation under the Leon Lake setup," Horton reasoned.

Average expenses each month were broken down as follows: tax bond assessment, \$3704.45; water bond payment, \$1500; salaries, \$2450; maintenance and supplies, \$780; and miscellaneous expenses, \$392.55.

June 20, 1952, Eastland citizens voted 348 to 5 in favor of approving \$1,500,000 worth of bonds to build Lake Leon. At the same time they voted for the City to purchase all of their water from the newly created Water Board.

"We have to meet our contract with the Water Board," the City fathers explained, "and we still have to operate our water department."

Jumping Jack Minnows Get Reprieve At Lake

Larry McGraw, Eastland member of the Eastland County Water Supply District board of directors, told The Telegram today that the Board had decided not to ban the Mexican Jumping Jack minnow at Lake Leon.

The action came after a week-end of rumors and more rumors concerning the huge jumping minnow that has become a favorite bait at the new lake. McGraw said the District has been advised by the State Game and Fish Commission that the Jumping Jack, or Rio Grande Tetras, *Astyanax Fasciatus Mexicanus*, is not harmful. The Commission advised members of the Board that the species does reproduce at a rapid rate, but said that the Jumping Jacks would die off in cold winters.

According to reliable sources, the Board had tentatively agreed before hearing from the Fish and Game Commission, to ban the minnows if they proved harmful to the fish population. Elbert Richardson, patrolman at the Lake, told the Board the minnow was cannibalistic and that a school of the minnows frequently attacked larger fish.

Richardson said Sunday that the minnow was to be prohibited from Lake Leon and that "after the first of July anyone caught with this minnow will be fined."

Various bait dealers said that Richardson had informed them the minnow was to be prohibited and advised them not to stock them.

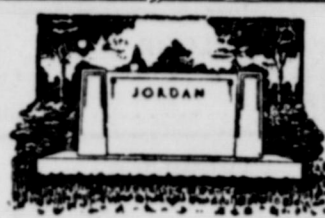

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Corrugated Fasteners
POPULAR MECHANICS has some excellent suggestions for the proper use of corrugated fasteners, a convenient means of holding mitered joints. The common but incorrect method is shown in the top detail—crossing the wood grain at 45 degrees.



This weakens the wood and gives the joint little strength. Instead, the magazine suggests bending the fasteners at right angles as shown in the center detail. Then they will be in line with the wood grain.

Another good tip: Use corrugated fasteners having widths less than half the thickness of the stock to be joined. It's wise also to drive them from opposite sides, situating them so they are not opposite each other. To make a split turning involving two pieces of wood, join the pieces with the corrugated fasteners driven into the stock beyond the limits of the turning.
