Two thrillers featured Little League play here Thursday night with the Lions coming close to their first defeat of the season. The double-header saw the Bulldogs edged out by the League-leads, 6-5, while the Medics outscored the Comets, 11-9.

The first game of the twin-bill was one of the best defensive games of the season. The Bulldogs played tight ball except in one inning to hold the Lions to a one-run victory.

The second frame was the big inning for Manager M. G. Cartwright's charges. The Lions scored six runs on six hits. That was the only inning the Lions could score in, however.

The Bulldogs jumped out front in the top of the second inning as Jimmie Lewis scored on a hard hit single by Roger Thomas. In the third inning they added three

more runs, getting three hits. Their final tally came in the sixth frame. Manager Bud Lovelace got men on second and third with just one away, but then Lindell Garrett whiffed. Harold Evland was the next man up and he hit a hard single scoring Mike Thornell from third. The tying run, represented by Roger Thomas, rounded third, but didn't try for home. The Lions' ace catcher, Elijah Govan, capitalized on the mistake and whiffed the ball down to third baseman Bobby Cartwright, who made the tag for the third out.

Winning pitcher was Cartwright. He gave up four runs and four hits in three innings. Babba Hunter hurled the final three innings, allowing only one run and two hits. Losing pitcher was starter Raymond Lusk. Lusk allowed six runs and seven hits in three frames. Reliever Pat Westbrook, gave up just one hit and no runs in the final two innings.

Cartwright homered for the winners and Govan doubled. Pat Westbrook doubled for the Dogs.

Parker Points To Bonds As Sure Savings

The slogan "Safer Than Cash" now applied to United States Savings Bonds doesn't begin to tell the full story, according to Guy Parker, chairman of the County Savings Bonds Committee.

"Not too many people know about the fine service the Treasury offers to bond holders," Parker declared. "This service is one of the outstanding features that make the Savings Bond one of the best investments ever offered."

"A good many of us already know that we can get our lost, destroyed, or stolen bonds replaced without cost. But this is just the beginning. The Bureau of the Public Debt, which is the branch of the Treasury that handles all bond records and redemptions, leaves no stone unturned to see that the original intent of the purchaser is carried out in the disposition of bonds."

Parker called special attention to the provision allowing for bonds to be issued to co-owners. He cited the example of the man who died suddenly without an adequate will. He had several thousand dollars in Series E savings bonds, issued in his own name and that of his wife as co-owner. The estate seemed to be in for a long period of litigation. The widow, who needed funds badly, had been told that the savings bonds must become a part of the estate.

Upon advice of a friend, the widow wrote to the Treasury Department. She was quickly informed that the bonds were her property and could be cashed at her discretion. According to regulations, whenever a bond owner dies, the bond instantly becomes the sole property of the surviving co-owner.

"The Treasury has thousands of such cases in its files," Parker said, "proving once again that savings bonds not only make wonderful nest eggs for future security, but are an excellent means of providing for loved ones after death."

Mrs. Johnson said that the Star Route will replace the Highway Post Office which has been in use for over a year. There will now be two arrivals daily from the south, at 5:30 a.m. and 2 p.m., and outgoing south mail will leave at 5:40 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The Highway Post Office will continue to operate Cuero and Dublin, and mail from and to Eastland will be transferred there. City pickups around the square, in the courthouse and in front of the post office will also be changed.

New cards are going into the boxes this week showing pickup times. Mail will be picked up at 10 a.m. and 3:45 p.m. at the courthouse, Monday through Fridays. On Saturday there will be just one pickup, at 10 a.m.

Pickups at mail boxes around the square will be made at 10 a.m. and 3:45 p.m. everyday but Sunday. Mail will be picked up in the box in front of the post office at 10 a.m., at 3:45 p.m. and at 6:15 p.m.

Mrs. Johnson said some 300 collectors have sent letters to be back stamped "Last Trip," on the Highway Post Office run. Practically every state and some foreign countries are represented.

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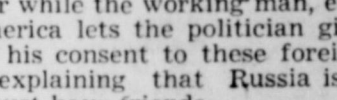

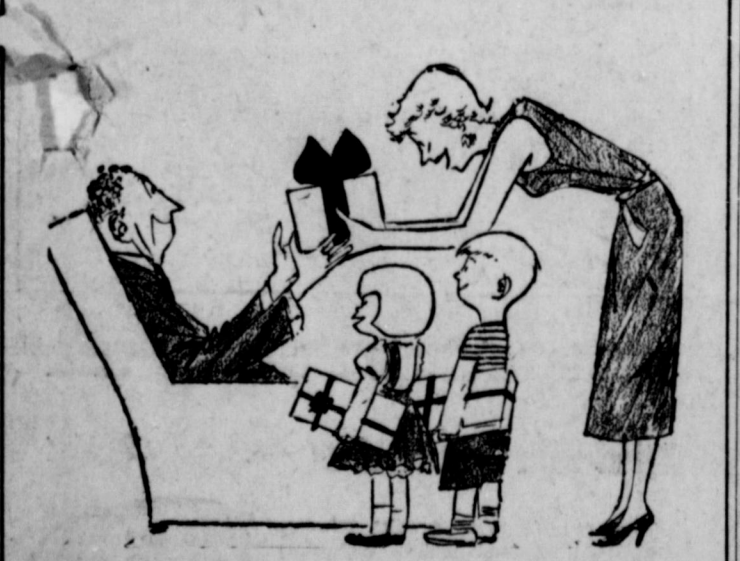

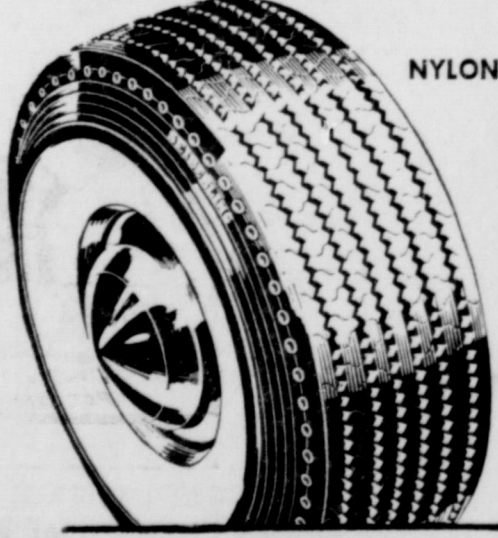

There'll Be No 'Beef' Over These Budget-Wise Beef Dishes

GROUND BEEF can be used in so many good-tasting and economical ways. The U.S. Department of Agriculture predicts that the supply of beef will continue heavy and with prices low. And here, homemakers, are two new recipes using ground beef.

We think you'll enjoy the pickle supper loaf, a tempting combination of sweet pickle relish and ground beef that has a country-kitchen aroma and flavor. So does the pickle meat ball casserole, which makes good use of two plentiful meats—ground beef and pork.

Pickle Supper Loaf (Makes 4 servings)

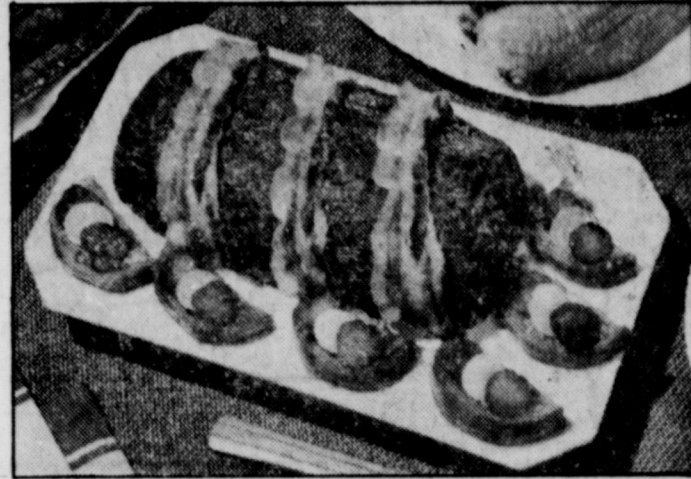
One pound ground chuck, ¼ cup sweet pickle relish, ½ cup fine dry bread crumbs, ½ cup milk, 1 egg, beaten; ¼ cup chopped onion, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 3 slices bacon.

Mix ground beef, pickle relish, bread crumbs, milk, egg, onion, salt and pepper until evenly combined. Shape into loaf on rack in shallow baking pan. Top with slices of bacon.
Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 40 minutes, or until done.

Pickle Meat Ball Casserole (Makes 4-6 servings)

One pound ground beef chuck, ½ pound ground pork sausage, 1 teaspoon salt, ¼ teaspoon freshly ground pepper, 4 slices bacon, ½ cup chili sauce, ¼ cup sweet pickle relish, ¼ cup water, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, 2 medium-size onions, sliced; one 1-pound can baked beans.

Combine beef, sausage, salt and pepper; mix well. Shape meat mixture into 1½-inch balls.
Fry bacon over medium heat until crisp. Remove bacon and

drain on absorbent paper; crumble bacon. Brown meat balls in bacon drippings. Drain off all but 2 tablespoons drippings. Combine chili sauce, pickle relish, water and brown sugar; mix well. Pour over meat balls and add onion slices.
Cook over low heat 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Combine baked beans and bacon in greased, 1½-quart casserole. Arrange meat balls and sauce over bean mixture.
Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 45 minutes.

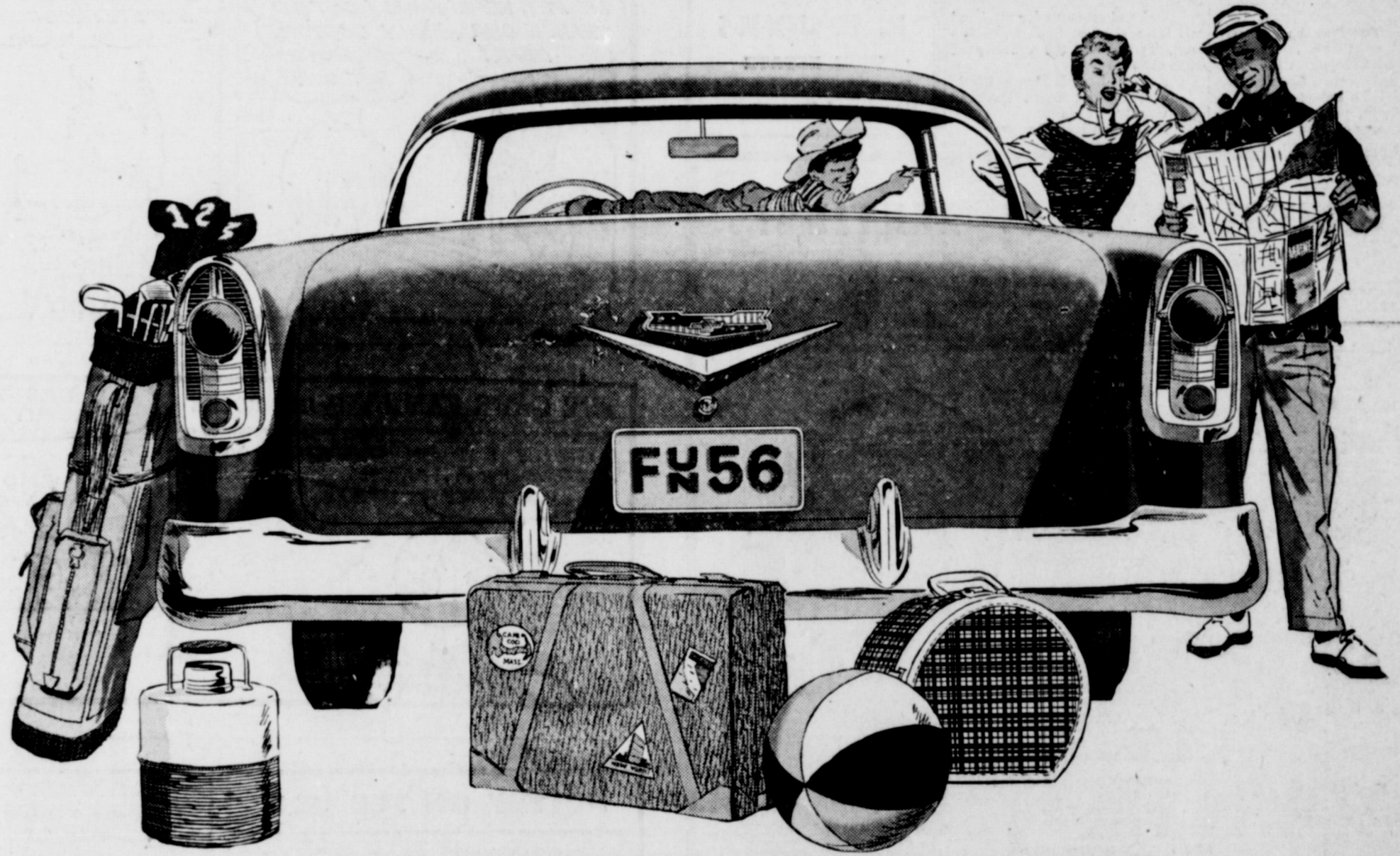
