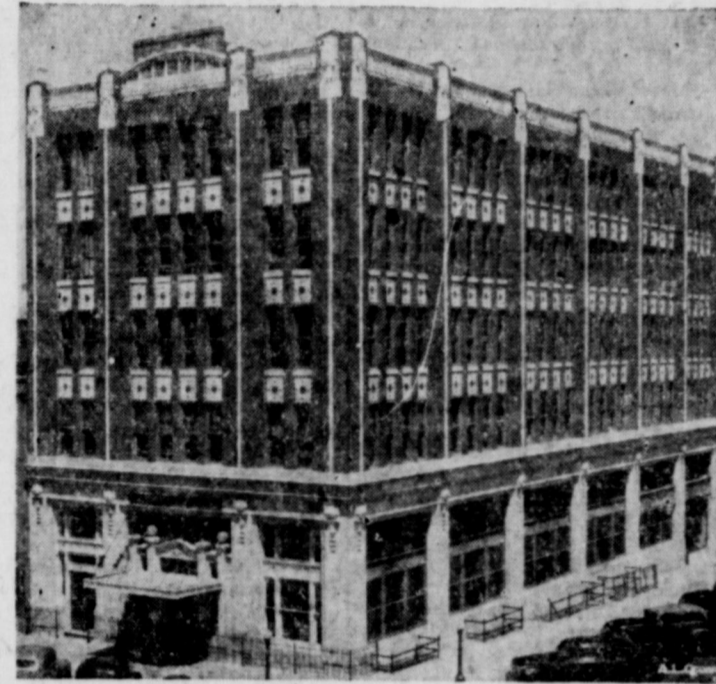




## Petroleum Building Purchased By Moody

### Remodeling Work Outlined By Owner



**PETROLEUM BUILDING**—Sale of the Petroleum building to a Fort Worth real estate man was announced today. Extensive remodeling of the building is underway.

Sale of the six story Petroleum Building on the east side of the square was announced today. The building, with the exception of the first floor, which is owned by the Eastland National Bank, has been purchased by T. J. Moody of Fort Worth.

Moody, owner of two insurance companies, announced at the same time that remodeling of the building is already underway. Plans to air condition the entire building were also outlined by the Fort Worth man, who owns extensive real estate holdings in both Fort Worth and Houston.

T. W. Moody, son and business partner of the new owner, said, "We plan to fill the building up. We are fixing it for tenants, and plan to air condition all four floors above the bank."

Moody did not disclose the sales price. He purchased the building from E. W. Patton of Houston, who has owned it since 1948. The new owner owns several office buildings in Fort Worth and Houston. He said that all but one of the buildings were remodeled and "filled to capacity" after they were purchased by Moody. The other needed no remodeling.

"We, of course, have plans to attract other industries and businesses here to locate their headquarters in the Petroleum Building," the younger Moody, friendly and optimistic, said. He praised the cooperation of the Eastland National Bank, owners of the first floor of the building. Moody owns the corner lot, the basement and the top four floors. He said that he knows of only one other building in Texas that is jointly owned.

Asked what the name of the building would now be, Moody smiled and said, "We like the name it has. We plan to attract a lot of oil men here and can promise them the best in air conditioned office space."

A reporter asked why Moody had selected Eastland, his first non-metropolitan real estate purchase.

"We think Eastland, and for that matter, Eastland County, is on the comeback," he said. "Dad first came here during the oil boom and he lost 11 oil rigs without bringing in a single well. You could stand on one of his rigs and pitch a rock in any direction and hit production, but Dad just couldn't bring in a well. That's when he decided on real estate."

Fagg and Jones will continue to have local control of the building for Moody.

Remodeling plans include putting a new roof on the building, dropping the ceiling of the lobby and corridors, and redoing the lobby in Plexstone, a new material.

"Of course we are going to have to repaint the entire fourth floor and do a lot of other work," Moody stated.

By Thursday a lot of the remodeling will already be completed. The huge air condition unit has already been installed, and workmen were busy on all floors.

Moody said, "We plan to have air conditioned office space soon at reasonable rates." The building is already equipped with an automatic self-service elevator.

### Local Marine Reserves Eye Trip To California

The Eastland Platoon of the 87th Special Infantry Company U.S. Marine Corps Reserve will go on full scale maneuvers Sunday, July 22.

That's when the men who spend Monday evenings training at the Armory shove off for Camp Pendleton, California, and fifteen days of field training as regular though temporary components of the rugged Marine Corps. Captain R. P. Haun, platoon leader of the unit, will take all of the unit's officers and enlisted members to the Marine Corps Base on the coast of Southern California. The Reservists will fly to Camp

Pendleton aboard Marine Corps transport planes. The planes will leave the Abilene Air Force Base at 9 a.m. However, members of the unit will spend the day prior to departure at the Armory with the parent unit in Abilene checking equipment and getting final instructions.

Two four-engine R5D transports will be used.

Captain Haun said the trip will take about six hours. Upon arrival at Camp Pendleton, the unit will be met by officials of the Marine Corps. Members will be taken by bus to the permanent barracks where they will make their home during the training period.

During the first week of training, the hometown Marines will spend much of their time on the rifle range, sharpening up their marksmanship. Range training as well as all other training, will be under the supervision of seasoned Marine Corps officers and non-commissioned officers.

The 87th Special Infantry Company also will take part in simulated maneuvers and will observe the latest Marine Corps tactics as demonstrated by regular Marines.

Each training day will start at 6 a.m. Captain Haun said "Lights Out" about 10 p.m.

"We'll have a busy schedule," he said. "But there still will be time for plenty of recreation after the day's work is over," he pointed out that the California Coast affords some of the finest ocean swimming in the world. Unit members will also be able to sail or fish on the bay. There are many tennis courts and baseball diamonds, as well as nightly motion picture shows, boxing matches, and special entertainment.

Captain Haun said the second week of training will be spent running through infantry tactics, such as "Combat in Towns," Platoon and Fire Team Tactics, Bayonet Training and the full scale night problem.

Captain Haun said that there is still plenty of time for men in the Eastland area to join the Reserve in time to attend summer training.

### County Clerk's Office Relates County History

The County Clerk's office in Eastland County Courthouse tells the life story of Eastland County and its inhabitants.

In this office records are kept on the same subjects in nearly the same way that information has been kept for over 80 years. But changes in the manner of record reflect the progress of Eastland County since 1874.

The first records were kept in the handwriting of A. J. Stuart in 1874. He was the first county clerk. Earlier transactions are recorded but present county clerk Johnson Smith said that Eastland County was attached to different counties for judicial purposes before actually becoming a full fledged county.

In the county clerk's office, books are in shelves waist deep all the way around the room. Smith said there are over 1,000 books

which are priceless to Eastland County people.

If the books—over 500 of them in constant use—were destroyed, the only replaceable records are the birth and death records which are also recorded at Austin.

The only way the books of records, leases, deeds, mortgages, etc., could be replaced if accidentally destroyed, would be by abstracts the public might have, and then there is the great possibility that some of the information would not be correct. For the earlier dated files, there would be no (Continued on Page 6)

### Honesty And Integrity Is Price Daniel's Platform

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles written by the six candidates for governor for this newspaper. Today's article is by Price Daniel. Next: J. Evetts Haley.)

When I announced for Governor on March 26, I said that honesty and integrity in the halls of Government and in a political campaign would be the cornerstone of my program.

We must restore unity and good will among our people and maintain their confidence in the State Government. To accomplish this, I propose formation of a Citizens' Law Enforcement Commission composed of one Grand Juror from each of the Supreme Judicial Districts of Texas. This Commission would have the authority to subpoena witnesses and investigate all allegations of past or future misconduct in the State Government. I also propose legislative reforms, including a strict lobby registration law.

My program also stresses improvements in our Public School System. I believe Texas should have the best Public School System in the nation; it should be

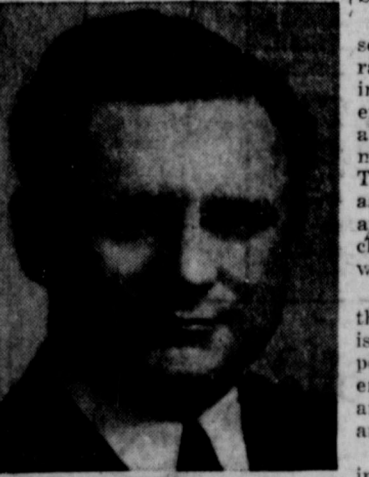
financed with Texas money. I oppose general Federal aid to education because it would put us in jeopardy of Federal control over what we teach, how we teach it, who can go to school together, and everything else. We must have new school buildings, educational class rooms, higher teachers' salaries, and improvements in the Teachers' Retirement program in accordance with the Constitutional Amendment to be voted upon in November.

Other planks in my platform include the strictest State narcotics laws in the nation, with a maximum death penalty for those who sell heroin to juveniles under 18; improvements in our highway farm-to-market roads and highway safety; more adequate pensions for our aged citizens; improvement of our mental and tuberculosis hospitals; attraction of new industries to use our national resources here at home; a long-range water conservation program for the entire State tailored to meet local conditions; full support by the State Government of the state welfare of our farmers and ranchers; and a balanced budget for the State Government, but with absolute opposition to any general sales tax or State income tax.

During this campaign I have sought to keep my part of the race on a high level worthy of the integrity of the Office of Governor. I have not dealt in personalities, but in running on my own merits and programs. I believe Texas needs clean politics as much as it needs clean Government, and I do not believe we will get clean Governmental candidates who engage in dirty politics.

My program is based upon the theory that the best Government is the Government closest to the people. I will resist further Federal encroachment upon the rights and responsibilities of the State and local Governments.

### Eastland County Represented By 25 At N.T.S.C.

DENTON — Eastland County was represented by 25 students at North Texas State College in the school year just ended, the registrar's office reported this week. Cumulative enrollment for the nine-month session was 6,342. These students came from 207 of the state's 254 counties, from 33 other states and from 11 foreign countries.

Dallas County sent 1,505 students to NTSC. Other counties represented by large groups were Denton 825, Tarrant 630, Grayson 179, Collin 160, Gregg 124, Cooke 112, Harris 104, Ellis 96, Wise 87, Wichita 85, Smith 67, Montague 62, Navarro 62, McLennan 56, Galveston 55, Bowie 51, and Hill 50.

These figures reflect the trend developed in the past three years at North Texas State of an enrollment increase of from 400 to 600 students each year.

To serve this steadily growing student body, the college will put into use three new buildings in 1956, complete two others in 1957, and begin construction of five more in 1958, President J. C. Matthews has announced.

### Hunter Hard Pressed In Fight For Top Little League Honors

Two Lions are fighting it out for leading honors in Eastland Little League play, with a Medicine and a Comet in hot pursuit.

Leading the League in batting is Bubba Hunter. Hunter, the Lions pitcher and third baseman, has hit safely 15 times in 33 trips to the plate for a .455 average. Only three percentage points back of him is Elijah Govan, who has 14 hits in 31 at bats. Ranking third in batting are the Medics Buddy Moser, who led the League at this same time last week. Moser has 15 hits in 35 trips to the plate for a .429 average and E. D. Ables has hit safely 12 times in 29 times at bat for the Comets, having a .414 average.

All will have opportunities to improve their averages tonight when the Lions meet the Medics and the Dons play the Comets. The Lions have also improved their standings in team batting. They now rank tops in that department, as well as leading the three other teams in games won. The charges of M. G. Cartwright have an overall average of .341 with 90 hits in 290 trips to the plate. They have scored 111 runs, and have

43 runs batted in to their credit.

The Bulldogs, despite the fact that they have won only one game this season, still rank second in team batting. They have a .267 average, with 67 hits in 251 at bats. Oddly enough they have hit safely more times than they have scored runs. They have only 66 runs to their credit, with 41 rbi's.

A .263 average puts the Comets in third place. They have 67 hits in 255 times at bat. They have scored 85 runs and have 41 rbi's to their credit.

The Medics, who rank second in the win-loss column, are last in batting. Actually they have more hits than either the Bulldogs or the Comets, but also have more at bats. They have a .252 average with 75 hits in 298 trips to the plate. They have scored 107 runs, with 44 rbi's.

Elijah Govan leads in the home

run race with five. Other Lions who have hit homers include Hunter, 3; Bobby Cartwright, 3; and Clark Connor, 3. Weldon Thomas and Lesley Varner were both robbed of homers when a Lion-Comet game was ruled no contest.

John Garrett has two homers for the Medics and Buddy Moser has one. Pat Westbrook hit two four baggers in one night for the Bulldogs and Jimmy Moylan has one homer. Wayne Harris collected the only homerun for the Comets.

E. D. Ables of the Comets leads in triples with two. Several others have hit one three bagger. Buddy Moser (Medics) and Govan each have five doubles to lead in that department. Both Tom Lovelace and Pat Westbrook of the Dogs have four each.

Leading in most extra bases is Govan, with 10. Moser is next with seven and Westbrook has six.

Tom Lovelace leads in runs batted in with 13. Next in line is Govan, with nine. The Comets have the busiest walkers. Jody Cooper and Mike (Continued on Page 6)

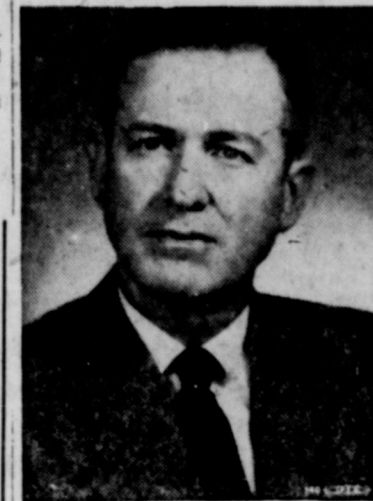

A new dual-action chemical for cotton defoliation and regrowth control will be widely available throughout the cotton belt this summer. After extensive testing by the USDA and State Experiment stations, American Cyanamid Co., producers of 3 A T (amion triazole), is introducing this versatile material commercially.

In addition to defoliating the crop, amino triazole has the unique, added harvesting aid of holding back new plant growth from three to five weeks. By slowing second growth after defoliation, amino triazole extends the harvest period, makes picking easier, and reduces trash and green stain to a minimum. The material's versatility makes it useful alone or in combination with other defoliant. Addition of small amounts of amino triazole to other water soluble defoliant will permit the grower to reduce by as much as one half the dosage of the other defoliant required.

Field tests on mature cotton have shown no adverse effect on seed germination, yield and fiber quality, nor any harmful soil residues. Other advantages of the new product include excellent storage characteristics, lack of bulkiness, compatibility with other chemicals and water solubility. Concerning the product, the U.S. Department of Agriculture recently reported, "Research that's defining proper application rates for the promising cotton plant defoliant and regrowth inhibitor, amino triazole, should lead to better and more extensive grower use of this new organic chemical this year."

**IT'S THE LAW**  
in Texas

**FINDERS KEEPERS?**  
"Finders keepers, losers weepers." Is this old rhyme true or false? Lawyers say it is not always strictly accurate under the law. It is sometimes rather difficult to define the rights of a finder in court.

There are some rather fine distinctions and exceptions to the "finders keepers" maxim that have plagued the courts — and finders — for generations. In the first place, the finder is not entitled to keep the property unless the original owner is not known and cannot be located. Neither may he keep it unless the object is

truly "lost," and not merely "mis-laid."

In general, property is legally "lost" when parted with involuntarily — through accident, neglect, forgetfulness or any other unintentional circumstance. Property is not lost in the legal sense when voluntarily left by the owner, intending to pick it up later — even though he fails to do so. Such property is "mis-laid."

Thus, if one loses a watch on the street by having the clasp break, not knowing where or when it was dropped, it is legally "lost." The same is true of a fountain pen falling through a hole in one's pocket unobserved. In such cases, the finder owns what he has found against all but the true owner.

On the other hand, a package left on the seat of a bus is "mis-laid" rather than lost. In one southern state, a pocketbook left in a barbershop by a customer was held to have been "left," not "lost." The barber was arrested and convicted of larceny when he spent the money that was in it.

Under the law the finder of either lost or mis-laid property should make a "reasonable effort" to find the real owner.

When articles are left on a train or bus, in a public hotel room, or even when dropped on a shop floor, under circumstances indicating that the true owner will later return to claim them, such items are not considered lost. The proper custodian to hold them for the owners return would be the proprietor or other person in charge.

Remaining unclaimed, the property sometimes goes to this custodian, sometimes to the finder. The distinction here appears to be whether the place it is found is private or semi-private, or a place used by the general public.



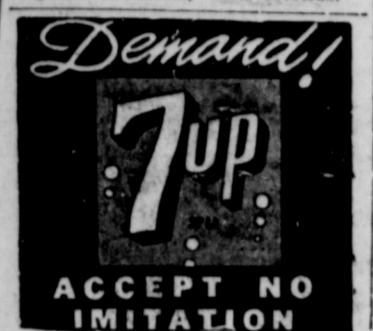

(Continued From Page One) way to obtain them. The largest number of books in the office are the deed records. County clerk Johnson Smith said that the 500th book is now being recorded in for the deed records. These contain all deeds, transac-

tions of all deeds, release of liens, oil leases, releases of oil leases, etc. The deeds of trust come next, numbering 104. The many other different types of volumes range from Criminal Docket and Fee Books and Labor Liens to Index of Wills Filed for Safekeeping and Assumed Name Record Books.

The attorneys use the books the most, the clerk figures, but the loan companies and credit bureaus get in their share of referring to the books.

The average man's name is recorded in the County Clerk's office at least five times—birth, marriage, military record, deeds and mortgages on property, cars, and his death. A man's name could appear five or 500 times easily.

Because of state laws, the very first and oldest records are kept, even though the public doesn't have much use for the older books any more.

The first marriage license issued in Eastland County was back on May 12, 1874. John L. Duffer and Mary S. Bowlin got it and were married by Justice of the Peace J. W. Watson on May 17, 1874.

Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Gardner were the first parents in Eastland County to record the birth of a child. Dr. J. O. Stevens delivered a baby girl to them on July 5, 1903.

About 500 of the 1,000 binders are downstairs and have been out of use for many years. The County Clerk and his deputies are responsible for all these books.

Insect damage to the books isn't any problem—they are in constant use most of the time.

However, if the books do get in bad condition and need repair, the only way they can be taken out of the Court House is for the County Clerk or his deputies to go with them and be wherever they are 24 hours a day. Smith said when Eastland County records are repaired, a firm does the work right there in the office, eliminating the necessity of his or one of his deputies' going with them wherever they go.

"This is a service office," County Clerk Smith said. "Many people refer to the records many times for many reasons daily. Seldom does anything upset the routine of this office."

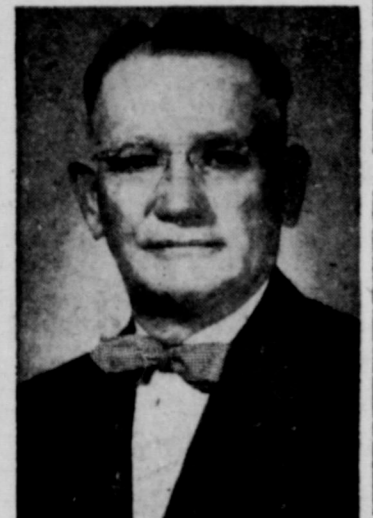

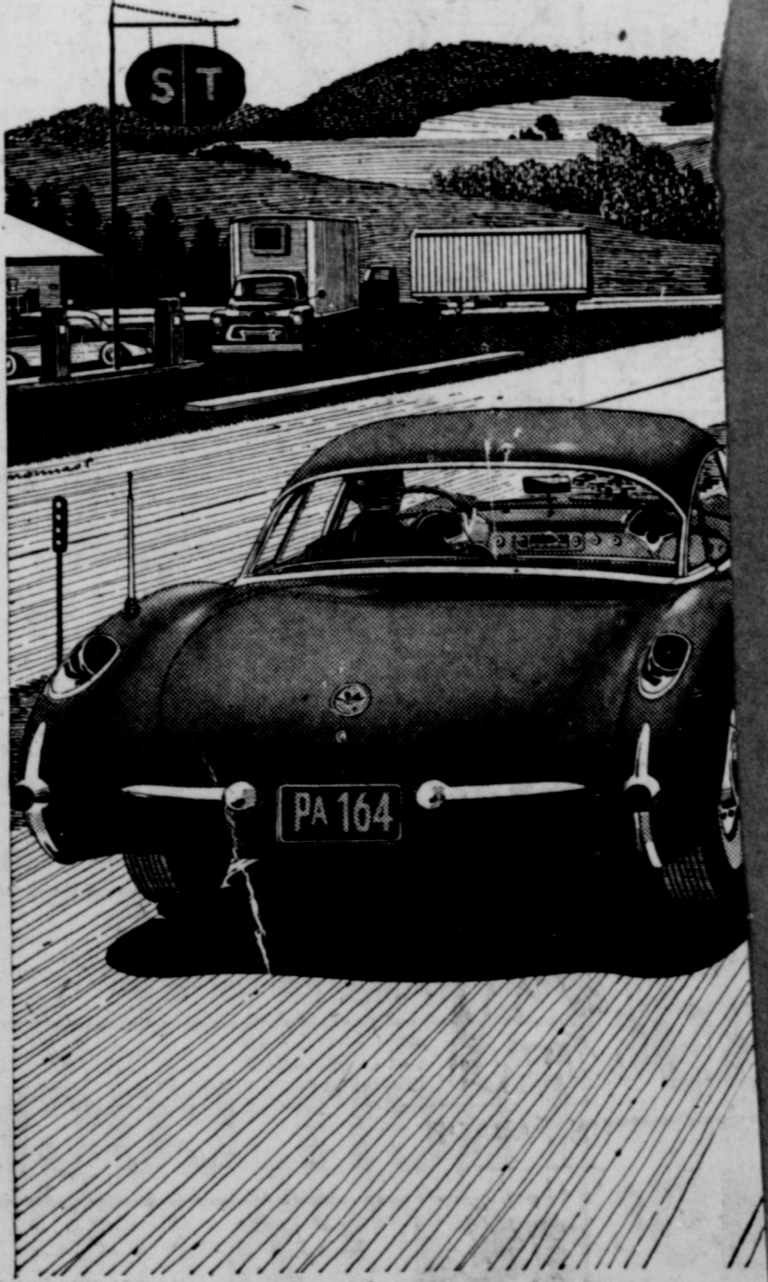
