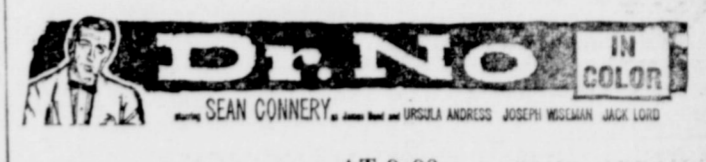
Among other activities members will attend the morning worship service at First Baptist Church as a family group on Sunday, Oct. 3.

Chevy Trucks For 1966 Are at Fullen Motor Co.

Principal improvements in the 1966 Chevrolet truck line include six new engines, an optional three-speed automatic transmission, a new three-ton series with payload capacity up to 34,000 lbs., a restyled more efficient heavy-duty cab design, and addition of several safety items as standard equipment.

To meet highly specialized needs of truck users, Chevrolet has revised and expanded its line to 266 models, including 101 new offerings which are divided almost equally between gasoline and diesel power.

The six new engines bring to 25 the number of different power plants offered—17 gasoline and 8 diesel. Discontinued for 1966 are the 153 cu. in. four and the 348 and 409 cu. in. V8's.

Gas engines new to the 1966 Chevrolet truck line are a 250 cu. in. six of 155 hp., a 366 cu. in. V8 of 220 hp., a 396 cu. in. V8 with ratings of 325 and 360 hp., and two V6's of 401 and 478 cu. in. displacement developing 237 and 254 hp.

Biggest appearance change in the 1966 Chevrolet truck line is a new short cab measuring only 92 inches from bumper to back of cab. Designed for the heaviest-duty models, it provides more efficient load distribution and more capacity for cargo in relation to overall length, yet retains the advantages of conventional cab design.

The new Chevrolet trucks are on display at Fullen Motor Co. in Eastland.

Several safety items have been made standard equipment on most models. Included are seat belts on all except chassis-cows and Step-Vans; windshield washer and two-speed electric wipers with no-glare arms on all but chassis-cows; right-hand mirror to match existing left-hand mirror on all cabs and panels; inside shatterproof mirror on pickups and suburban carryalls; backup lights on pickups, panels, suburbans, stakes, and Chevy-Van; corrosion-resistant brake lines on all models, and no-glare instrument panel on all but chassis-cows and Step-Vans.

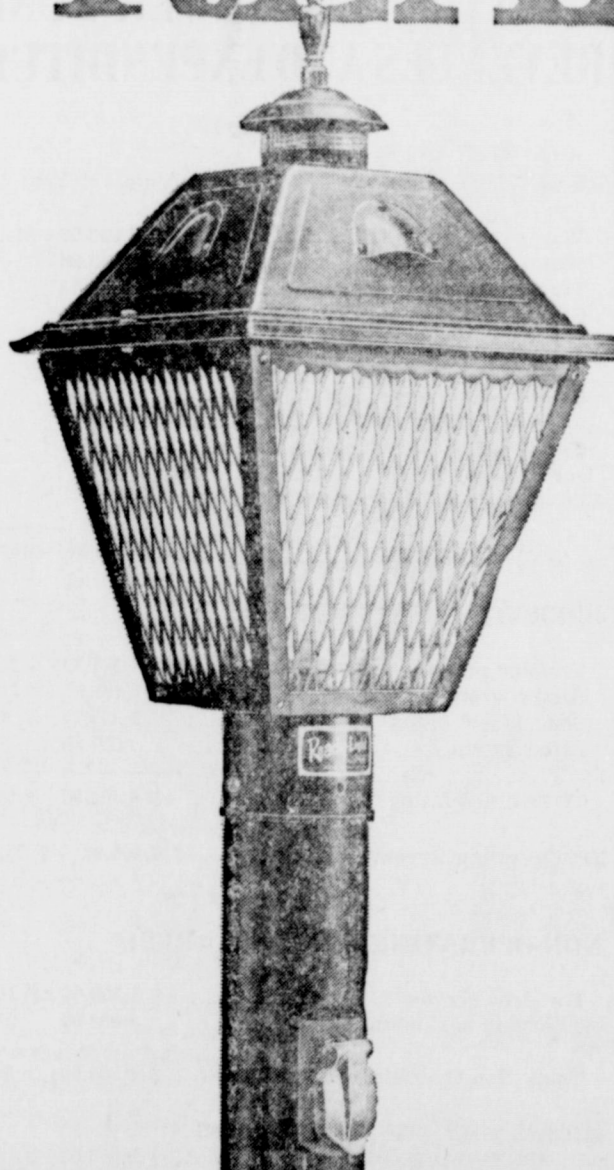


