



Mr. Burkett, who is a candidate for representative of this the 76th District, in his political propaganda, promises the people of the district many reforms and new laws which he contends would be to the advantage of the public, but we notice he does not discuss a subject that was an issue two years ago when he was making a campaign for the same office. At that time, he advocated the abolishment of the 91st District Court and proposed to annex Eastland County to the 90th District, including two other counties. Fortunately, for the district, and especially Eastland County, Mr. Burkett was not elected. Surely, the people of Eastland County do not want their district court abolished and will not be willing to vote for any candidate who has made the abolishment of the Court an issue in his campaign

You will recall that four years ago while Mr. Burkett was serving his fourth term in the Legislature, he introduced a private bill to abolish the 91st District Court; you will also recall that more than two thousand qualified voters of Eastland County signed a petition requesting Mr. Burkett to withdraw his bill, but despite this petition by nearly one-third of the voters of Eastland County, Mr. Burkett wholly ignored it and persisted in his efforts to abolish the court.

Our present representative, Paul Brashear, has ably represented the district and every part of it. For the people of Eastland County, he introduced a bill maintaining the Court and adding additional counties. This bill passed the House but died in the Senate.

We, the friends of the 91st District Court, urge the voters to support Mr. Paul Brashear in the coming election for a second term.

#### Trial Scheduled In September For Dallas Negro
