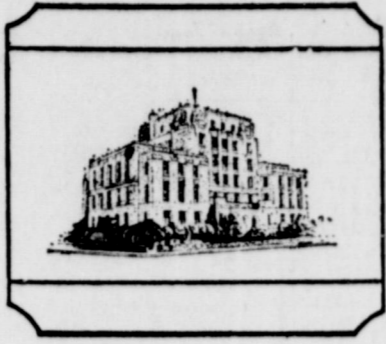

School Begins for 810 Youngsters

School year '65 began Wednesday in Eastland with enrollment virtually static according to Supt. Wendell Siebert.

School population was 810 at the end of last year, and pre-registration and other indexes indicated that the enrollment this term would be about the same.

Mid-August registration of elementary and junior high grades was excellent, the superintendent said, enabling officials to schedule classes and teachers loads much earlier this year than ever before.

There are three classes of first graders with from 78-80 beginning school for the first time and also three second-grade classes, with 61 total. Last-minute faculty appointments have been announced as follows by Mr. Siebert: Mrs. R. P. (Buddy) Haun, who has served as a substitute teacher in the system here before and in the Coleman system, will teach high school general science and biology.

Mrs. John L. Hart, who taught here about three months last spring, will teach freshman and sophomore English.

A Spanish teacher was not secured, Siebert said, but a check of junior and senior students showed that none would be handicapped on college entrance.

The complete school schedule began Wednesday and the youngsters are in for an early holiday this year, with Labor Day falling only three days after the beginning of school.

2.18 Inch Rain During August Below Average

A cool front moved through the area Tuesday night bringing showers as August ended and brightening hopes that good rains are just ahead.

Eastland officially measured .85 of an inch and Ranger had 1.30 inch. Cisco had .90.

Rain during August amounted to only 2.18 inches—far below the 5.83 inch average for Eastland County.

And rain during the first eight months of the year totals only 17.78 inches, considerably below the average of 20.37 through August.

Rain fell on only six days in August, with the heaviest on the last day at .85 inch and measured on the 7th, when .68 of an inch was recorded by Official Weather Observer James Smith. On the first, .04 of an inch was reported, .56 of an inch on the 16th; .03 on the 24th; and .02 on the 25th.

Average-wise, September is generally pretty wet in the county, with 5.79 average, and .45 measured during the month last year.

Peanut farmers and lawn-tenders still look for rain clouds.

Mavericks Duel Indians At Comanche Friday Night

The Eastland Mavericks will go scalp hunting in Comanche territory Friday night as they begin the 1965 football season with the Comanche Indians. Kick-off time will be 8 p.m. in Indian Stadium.

The Indians and the Mavs have been playing each other in opening duels for several years and the Indians have the better won-lost record. The Indians defeated the Mavs 18-6 last year.

The probable starters for the Eastland Mavericks Friday night will be Jerry McCullough, 165, quarterback; Ted Martin, 135, end; Johnny Moylan, 165, fullback; Bill Bass, 155, halfback; James Fullen, 150, end; Rodney McCoy, 165, tackle; Tony Lowrance, 165, tackle; Bill Boles, 155, guard; Roger Terrell, 150, center; David Hazard, 160, guard.

Both the Mavericks and the Indians have been through two-week training period and both appear stronger than last year. Eastland will have 14 lettermen back this year.

According to a reliable source, the main weakness seen in the Comanche eleven will be inexperience in the backfield. Eastland will attempt to capitalize on that advantage, Coach Millard Glass said.

According to Coach Glass, the Mavericks are in very good shape for the game with the Indians and the Mavs have also learned their plays extremely well, he comments. The Mavericks will be led by veteran quarter-back Jerry McCullough. Comanche will have 151-pound Bill Flannery, to call the signals.

Tommy McCullough and James West are the only reported injuries to the Maverick squad. McCullough required hospital treatment with head injury and West complained of a bruised kidney, Glass reported. Both will probably not be seen in action in the Comanche tilt.

Captain for the Mavs were elected last week and the following boys will represent the black and reds as captains:

Jerry McCullough, James Fullen, Bill Boles, and Ted Martin, all seniors.

The Eastlanders begin the season with 14 veteran lettermen, having lost six to graduation, and boost an excellent crop of newcomers, according to Glass and his Coaching Staff comprised of Shirley

Frazier and Harold Price. The Abilene Reporter-News has picked the Mavericks for fifth slot in the seven-team 10-A race, with De Leon tabbed to be the crown claimer this year. Here's the Abilene pickings: De Leon, first; Albany, second; Ranger, third; Clyde, fourth; Eastland, fifth; Baird, sixth; and Cross Plains, seventh.

Sept. 10 Is Deadline For Survey

Friday, Sept. 10, is the deadline for returning your Eastland County Employment Survey forms for tabulation, according to an announcement made this week by County Coordinator Jack Arrington of Eastland.

An urgent appeal was issued by Arrington reminding Eastland Countians the importance of returning the filled-in questionnaires for tabulation.

Response has been good, he said, but the survey cannot be accurate unless everyone participates, so that the end figures reflect the true employable totals, talents and skills.

The information on the questionnaires is being handled in a confidential manner, with only the combined data being used by industrial workers throughout the county as a tool to lure prospective industry to the county.

And citizens are reminded once again that the questionnaires are not applications for jobs — but inquiries as to who is available for work, and what skills and talents are possessed by countians who want to go to work, so that an accurate, up-to-date report can be made and used to attract industry here.

Forms were mailed to all postal, utility and other patrons in the county, and forms have been repeatedly printed in county newspapers to facilitate availability. Postage-paid, addressed envelopes were included with the prepared mailed-out questionnaires, and persons who use the newspaper-printed forms may address them to the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, post office box number 146, Eastland.

\$1.55 School Tax Rate Due for This Year, Next

The \$1. tax per \$100 assessed valuation now used by the Eastland Independent School District for maintenance should last at least another year, Supt. Wendell Siebert told the Eastland Lions Club at the regular luncheon meeting Tuesday.

The board has recently adopted the same tax rate of \$1.55 per \$100 assessed valuation, for this year and probably will be able to continue the rate for another year, he said. The 55 cents goes toward debt retirement.

The school has operated on the \$1. maintenance rate for the past 25 years, he said, but increased costs of educational expenses may require adjustments in years to come. State-wide educational expenses have doubled since 1949, Supt. Siebert explained. (Continued on page 6)

life resources, a public hearing will be held in Eastland County Monday, Sept. 13, at the courthouse.

At the public hearing, the proposed regulations will be read and explained to those present by Parks and Wildlife Department personnel. Pertinent questions the public may have will be answered. The full proceedings will be recorded and presented to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission when that body meets to prepare regulations for taking game and fish in the affected county.

Although the statutes grant the Commission and Department at least 90 days after the acts become effective in which to . . . conclude its investigations, hold its hearings, and promulgate its proclamations, rules, regulations and orders," Eastland County citizens can be assured that Department technicians are already at work on the program for their area. 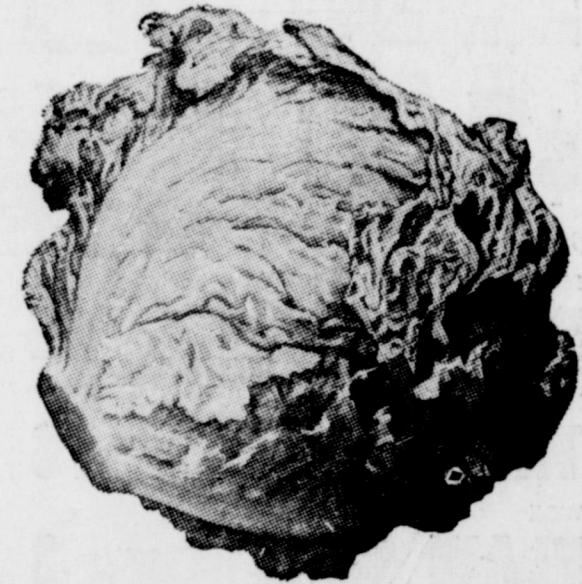
