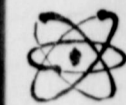

ner Funeral Home.

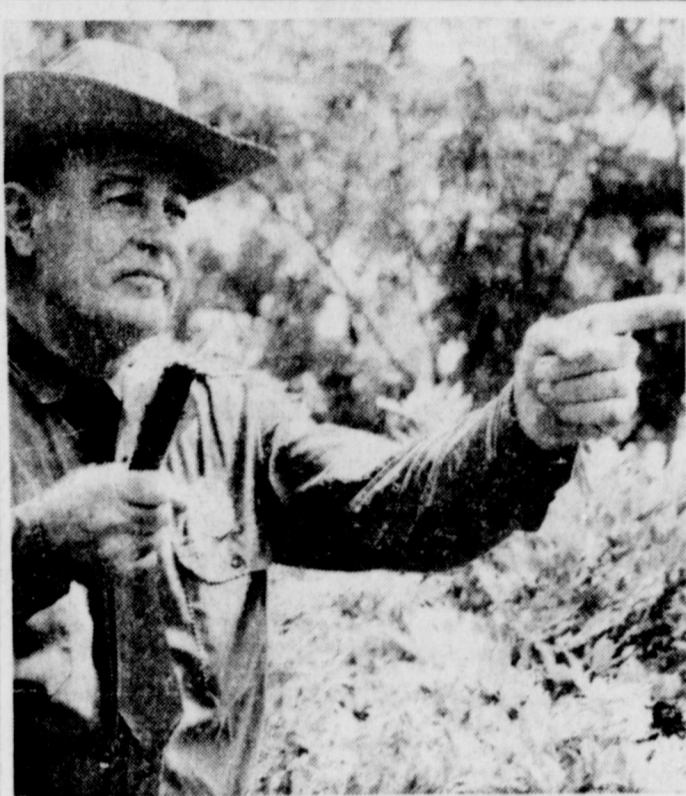
P. E. Thorp, 89, Funeral Services Held Tuesday

City Commission Discusses Meters, Painting Towers & Building Code Proposal

Eastland City Commission-
ers discussed several topics
including a city building code,
parking meters and the Amer-
ican Legion Hall, but took little
action during an hour-and-a-
half session Monday evening at
the City Hall.

Mayor Frank Deaton, Com-
missioners James Reid, Curtis
Koen and Bill Hart were
present, and granted tentative

approval for assisting with
the development of an adult
softball park, as requested by
two commission visitors.

Truman Maynard and M.
C. (Dutch) Godden requested
assistance in leveling and
assistance in leveling and prop-
ark to be built north of Safe-
way Grocery, just off East
Main St., on property own-
ed by Mr. Cornelius Tyrone.

The adult teams, both men
and women, have not had an
Eastland site for their some

old.

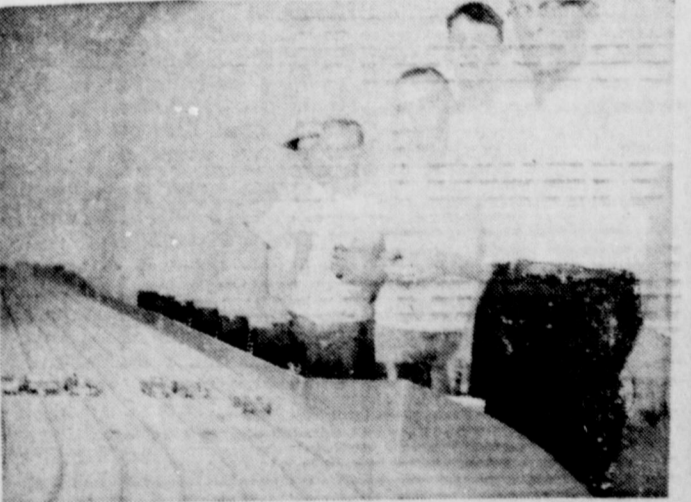
Mr. C. S. McGowen of Baird

CITY COMMISSION

(Continued from page one)
Otis Knox was a brief commission visitor.

Commissioners studied a proposed contract being considered by the Volunteer Fire Department and the American Legion, which would turn the American Legion Hall over to the volunteers for their use. No action was taken.

The Commissioners agreed to make a lease arrangement with a man who wants to lease the house at the old pump station north of town, in exchange for certain repairs and general maintenance and upkeep. City Manager Lewis Tiner was asked to make arrangements with the man. The house has been vacant since Neal Seabourn moved out of it.

It was generally agreed to wait until next spring before considering the application of bacteria to the disposal plant as recommended by an agent that has been calling on the manager and commissioners recently. It is generally understood that the cost would be \$300 initially and about \$50 a month thereafter to continue the chemical program. Improvements do need to be made, Tiner explained, stating that the sludge is not staying in the holding tanks long enough and resulting in backlogs and a smelly condition.

Commissioner James Reid reported that he had actually been "thanked" for recent action in declaring a vacant East Main St. building a nuisance and having it cleaned up. Mayor Deaton also told having been thanked by two persons.

Commissioner Koen asked about dust from the recent work on S. Daugherty St. which has not been repaved. Several have inquired of him, he said, about the dust problem, and Tiner explained that the stretch would be topped as soon as his work crews catch up enough to get to it. (Crews are presently working in the new addition laying a sewer line, with some 1,200 feet in, and about that much to go, plus coming back and putting in man-holes, Tiner said. The city will be paid \$35 per tap when the homes tie into the system, recouping the cost of putting in the lines, he said.)

Commissioner Hart asked about up-dating the city's population and city limit sign and asked Tiner to look into the matter, and then brought up another topic which has been kicked around quite a bit before — painting of the water towers on City Park Hill. Tiner displayed estimates that he has accumulated over the years, showing that cost would be some \$4,237 for sand-blasting, rust-proofing and painting the exteriors. The commissioners were generally agreed that they'd like to see it done, but cost is too high now. Thoughts were expressed about maybe not sand-blasting, because the metal is felt to be in good condition, and maybe securing estimates for simply painting. More action is expected.

Commissioners discussed the work being done by C. C. Jones, developer of the city's new Valley View Estates, but took no formal action.

Volunteer Fire Chief Wayne Jackson talked with commissioners about the American Legion VFD contract after getting it approved by the voters, and the commission agreed to give the volunteers the profit from a soft-drink machine at the swimming pool to pay the insurance on the building.

Vandalism was discussed (Jackson pointed out that there are 114 broken windows in the building now) and the commissioners agreed, on Attorney's Hart's advice that the city can file civil suits against the parents of youngsters who do damage to a public building and collect for the repair. This method will be pursued after the volunteers repair and restore the building, which has suffered at the hands of vandals for quite some time.

Grand Jury Indicts Hall Murder With Malice

A 91st District Court grand jury returned an indictment Monday morning against Robert Lee Hall, 12-year-old Eastland resident, charged with the July 29th slaying of his brother Johnny Hall, 22. District Attorney Perry Brown stated that the death

penalty probably will not be sought because of circumstances surrounding the shooting which occurred at an East Main St. moving firm.

The grand jury spent most of Tuesday morning considering the cases of six Ranger youths — ranging in age from 17 to 21 — who have been charged with theft of tires, wheels and automotive parts in Ranger last weekend. The six are each under \$1,000 bond. The loot, recovered by Ranger city and county officers, included seven tires and wheels, one manifold, one generator, one starter and a box of mechanics tools.

Hall is being held in county jail, having been denied bond by Justice of the Peace Wes Dalton. Johnny Hall died from a .38 caliber revolver wound sustained at 3 p.m. Thursday, July 29, at the offices of the moving firm where both he and his brother were employed.

McCracken and James E. Cotton, both of Cisco; Mitchell Campbell, Dick Foster and Hoyt Bryant, all of Gorman; Melvin Adams and Freddie L. Bennett, both of Ranger; and Jim Ray Cox of Rising Star.

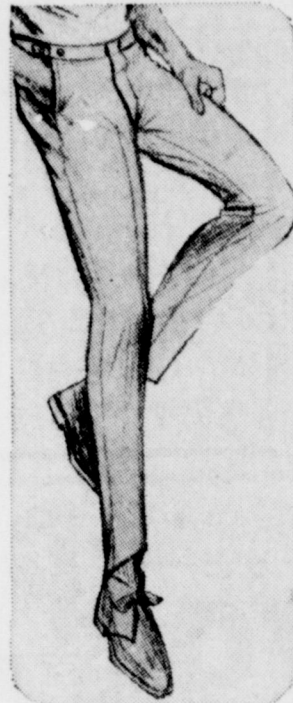



Hunting, Fishing Licenses Due At Dealers Sept. 1

AUSTIN — The annual scramble for hunting and fishing licenses will be eased this fall by earlier shipment of the permits to the approximately 2500 dealers throughout the state.

Bill Marks of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department staff, said arrangements have been advanced to have all licenses in the hands of dealers well before the new state fiscal year begins September 1.

The total consignments will comprise 775,000 fishing licenses and 736,000 hunting licenses of which 175,000 will be exempt hunting licenses.

In the past, efforts to make last-minute delivery to avoid conflict with the old license routine caused some inconvenience among sportsmen and also a sizeable problem for the harassed dealers, said Marks.

"We expect to have the licenses in the mail very shortly," said Marks. "Of course, there will be the usual rare instances of unrecieved shipments, unavoidable in handling the great number of parcels, but the extra time will help us adjust these cases."

Marks wanted to make it clear that the new licenses will not be good until September 1 and that the old licenses will be invalid after this date.

Sale of hunting and fishing licenses provides more than half of the revenue needed to finance departmental operations, including costs of the vast experimental projects leading toward better luck for angler and better shooting for the hunter.

The ordinary sports fishing license cost \$2.15 and the resident hunting license \$3.15. There are numerous exemp-

tions, such as for those under 17 and older than 65 years. But in the case of deer hunting, these privileged persons need a special exempt license to provide the proper tags, which may be obtained for an issuance fee of 25 cents per license.

Olden FFA Adds Livestock Chain

The Olden FFA Chapter has recently been awarded \$97, livestock chain. These animals will be awarded to chapter members and the members will return purebred livestock (either dairy or beef heifer), swine or an animal to the chapter from registered sheep, to begin a the first offspring.

The chapter has a pig-circle, put into operation in 1956.

Journal was kept by the and here is the complete, by day list of activities happenings of their "trip lifetime".

The first day was July 26, ter two days and nights ing a bus, we arrived at as L. Sommers Wilder- Cande Base, located 22 north-east of Ely, Minn-

esota, and three miles from the United States-Canadian boundry. We were assigned canoes, paddles, and our food upon arriving at the base and met our guide, Roy Cerny. Later we saw a film on what we were to expect that night at the campfire, but it didn't look very rough. We went to bed early to try to catch up on the sleep that we couldn't get on the bus.

Tuesday, July 27, 1965: We were up at 5:30 this morning and were busy on last minute preparations for the voyage. After breakfast at 7, we took off for the "trip of a lifetime." After paddling until 11:30 we were convinced that it was going to be a hard trip so we stopped for lunch and a short rest. We started back out at 12 and went into a strong headwind which forced us to land at 2, and made camp for the night.

VERY, VERY WET
July 28, 1965: After an early start, we paddled until 2 and laid over the rest of the day to fish. I didn't believe we could have gotten any wetter than we were. All loading and unloading of the canoes was done off-shore. We went to bed early because we are going to have to make up the time we laid over.

July 29, 1965: We left early to catch up for the time we missed, and between paddling and portage, half the boys were wondering if they could survive six more days of it. It is now 9:15 and it is starting to rain. In our canoe there is a boy who left this pack about half way down the portage and Bill Boles has gone back to get it. He is back and he just dropped his camera in the water and he is quite upset over it. We paddled the rest of the day and camped just before dark. It has been raining all day and we are all wet and cold but we have only one portage to go before reaching our destination. We have just eaten supper and are turning in.

FISH FOR BREAKFAST
July 30, 1965: It is 7 and we are trying to put on our wet clothes. We are about to eat breakfast: consisting of oatmeal, fish, and hot coco. We have now arrived at Darky Lake where we will spend the night. We are about to go fishing and it is still raining. The fishing is great so far. Charles has caught 6 pike, 1 walleye, and two bass. We will have them for supper. After supper everyone is concentrating on drying clothes — but is still sprinkling. We have decided to spend one more night here. Roy, the guide, said if it stayed cloudy a couple of days longer it would get down to 40 degrees. This started everybody to getting their things dry. It is late so everyone is going to bed.

July 31, 1965: I was up at 6 this morning to help the cook, Ervin Addy of Cisco, because it was my (Charles Moseley) turn. We have just eaten and are cleaning things up. It has stopped raining at the present time but we will have not seen the sun in three days, and it is getting colder. We are still having a hard time drying our clothes. We are planning to go fishing again in a few minutes, but the storm that is building has made fishing bad for we only caught 4 pike. We have just had these for supper and are going to bed.

HEAVY PACKS
August 1, 1965: We were out on the lakes this morning to start our long journey home and back to the base. Between paddling and portaging we are all about shot. The packs are beginning to get heavy. As for the present time the sun is shining and we are fixing to make camp for

the night. We are seeing some awful beautiful country up here.

August 2, 1965: We were up early this morning to get started down the Beartrap River, it started out fairly well but it got terrible. We were wading up to our waist in mud. After walking on up the creek, the guide found out that it was closed the rest of the way. We then back-tracked 2 miles and took a 140 rod portage to Beartrap Lake. We are now fixing to eat a quick dinner and start out again. This was sure a lot of fun but it was lots of work. We paddled until 6:30 and camped for the night.

August 3, 1965: We were up at 5:30 this morning and out on the trail after a quick breakfast. We stopped at 12:30 for dinner which consisted of peanut butter sandwiches and salomae. We have a 380 rod portage after dinner which we are all dreading.

NO BEDS LEFT
We have just finished the mile and a half portage and it was rough. After the hard day our hearts were set on spending the night at the Ranger's cabin but when we arrived we found that the ca-

bin was already taken. This was a real letdown because it had 14 real beds in it. We are now heading for U.S. point where we will have to spend the night.

August 4 1965: We were out at 6:30 this morning and it is cold but our fearless guide said "let's go" and we went. We are planning to eat breakfast at Wind Lake for some reason or another. We arrived at the base camp at 2 and after cleaning our gear we took steam baths and it really felt good. It really gets you clean but to stay in a room that is 170 degrees is pretty hard.

I went in and stayed for about 10 minutes (Charles Moseley) and then took a cold shower and after doing this several times you were feeling great. In all it has

been a long trip but we can truthfully say that all would enjoy it again next year.

August 5 1965: We started home at about 5:30 this morning and after we had eaten dinner we were invited by Mr. Priest to go on a cruise through Lake Superior and after talking to our advisors we took a 2-hour ride in Mr. Priest's 50 foot cruiser. It was a lot of fun and we all saw some great sights. We are now back on the bus and heading to Des Moines Iowa and back down the same way we started.

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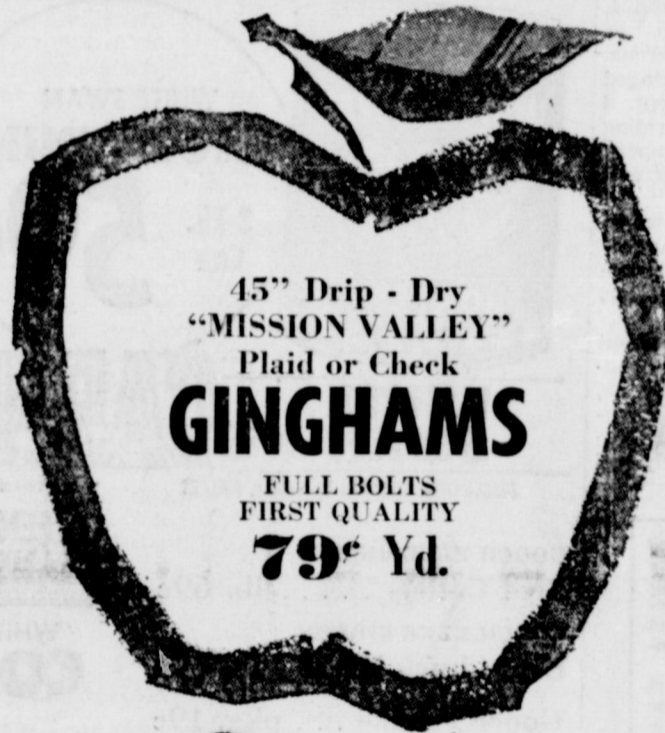

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called or returned on any day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and the same amount shall be allowed to the Members of this Senate, and no more; and dur-

ing the time he administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday following the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and allowing a per diem for Members of the Legislature not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the 140 days of each Regular Session and 30 days of each Special Session."

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the Commission and after consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (1) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (2) two (2) District Judges; (3) two (2) members of the State Bar who have respectively practiced at least ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (4) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judicial office in, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or cause public discredit upon the judiciary, or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts, and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any Judge against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
