Preparation Underway For Sept. 7 Election

Writs of election are being served by County Judge Scott Bailey for the Sept. 7 election, for the purpose of deciding whether or not to raise the number of State senators from 31 to 39. If the bill doesn't pass, eight senators will have to run against each other in the next election, the Judge stated.

The bill being voted on reads as follows: "Proposing an amendment to sections two and 25, Article III to provide for increase in membership of State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix membership of House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population, and to delete limitation on that no single county is entitled to more than one senator."

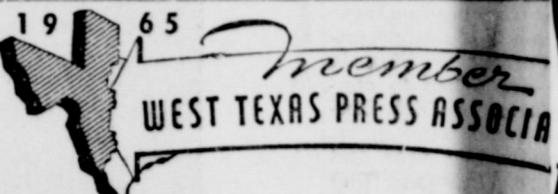

creased \$280,118 in July over the same month in 1964, but liquor stamp sales dropped off \$108,182 and wine stamp receipts declined \$53,458, according to Comptroller Robert S. Calvert.

State Auditor reports that as of August 31 last year the University of Texas system held investments worth nearly \$463,000,000.

Fourteen Texas cities have filed applications to participate in the Texas Aid Airport Program, which will have \$200,000 to spend during the coming fiscal year. Texas draft boards will be inducting a "considerable number" of 19-year-olds by fall, if draft calls remain high, according to Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director. Amended September quota for Texas is 1,459 men; estimated October call, 1,780. This compares with recent monthly quotas of 700 to 900. Schwartz said that mostly 21-year-olds will be called in August.

Beginning Sept. 7, Eastland County voters will join other Texans in voting on 27 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution in three separate elections.

The other two elections will be Nov. 2, 1965, and Nov. 8, 1966, the general election.

On Sept. 7, 1965, voters will decide only one proposed Senate membership will be increased from its present 31 members to 39 members.

The ten amendments to be voted on Nov. 2, 1965, are:

SJR No. 14, which proposes to provide a four-year term for the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, treasurer, commissioner of the General Land Office, and certain statutory state officers.

STUDENT LOANS
HJR No. 11, which proposes to authorize loans to students at institutions of higher education by creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund.

HJR No. 5, which proposes to increase the amount of bonds that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to \$400 million.

HJR No. 8, which proposes to raise the salaries of the lieutenant governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives, and for increasing the daily expense allowances of legislators while in session.

HJR No. 81, which proposes expansion of state welfare medical care programs in order to qualify for federal aid for medical care for indigent, aged, blind, dependent children, and disabled persons.

SJR No. 24, which proposes to raise the amount of ad valorem taxes allocated for higher education.

Whether to broaden the field in which the school teacher retirement fund may be invested.

Whether to increase the terms of House of Representatives members from two years to four years, starting in 1967.

Whether to allow establishment of mandatory retirement of judges at age 75, with the authorization that the leg-

Whether to allow certain hospitals to be exempt from ad valorem taxes in Houston. This pertains only to Houston.

VOTING IN 1966
On Nov. 8, 1966, voters will decide:

Whether to change the date on which House of Representatives members begin their terms to the second Tuesday after the first Monday of each odd-numbered year. State senators currently begin their terms on that date, but house members may be sworn into office as soon as general election returns are canvassed.

Whether to repeal the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas, and to allow the legislature to establish a new voter registration system.

Whether to allow men residents of Texas to vote for president and vice president before they establish eligibility for Texas citizenship.

AID TO VICTIMS
Whether to allow the legislature to set up a system of payments to widows and children of law enforcement officials and firemen killed in the line of duty.

Whether to allow military personnel to vote in state and

local elections if they have other voting requirements in Texas.

Whether to provide for the dissolution of a hospital when they are no longer needed or wanted.

Whether to provide for annexations by school districts and junior college districts shall not invalidate previously voted taxes.

AGRICULTURAL LAND
Whether to allow units of government of County to consolidate their functions. This is a calized question only.

Whether to set up a tax benefit for owners of agricultural near cities so long as the is dedicated to agriculture.

Whether to authorize regional airport authority. This is primarily a North as proposal.

Whether to allow a state retirement disability and fit system for officials and employees of all local units of government.

Whether to expand \$200 million to \$400 million state loan fund for water development loans to cities water systems.

Whether to expand three member Texas Criminal Appeals to five members.

Whether to allow state to accept private and federal matching to be used in rehabilitating the physically and mentally handicapped.

Whether to remove from State College from list of schools eligible in the University of permanent fund.

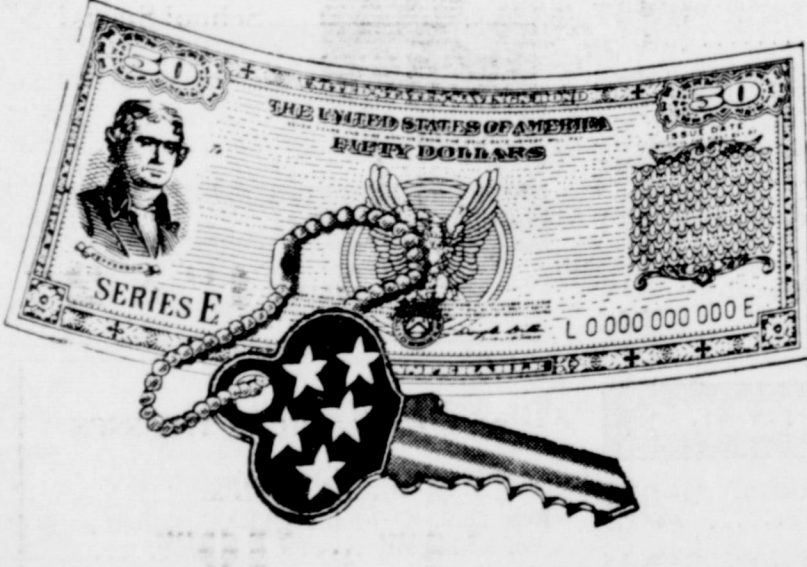

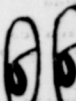

Browsing with Bev

Selecting the right cheese for a meal or dish depends on many things, chiefly personal preference. You'll find that flavors, textures, aromas and appearances vary widely. Some will suit you best for some recipes; others will be more suitable for other occasions.

Although produced in this country, some cheeses bear a foreign name, a clue to the place of origin. Hundreds of cheeses have been developed the world over and astonishingly many show up at most local dairy counters. Our favorite cheese in the U. S. is cheddar cheese, which represents almost 80 percent of the nation's cheese production. This, too, is a cheese of foreign origin, named after the town of Cheddar in England and brought to our shores by the early settlers. Cheddar has many names—"American" cheese, for example, store cheese, rat cheese and sundry others. Like cheddar other cheeses also bear the name of the town or country where they originated. Swiss muenster, limburger, parmesan, roquefort, edam, gruyere and neufchatel are good illustrations of this.

Should you prefer a mild-flavored variety, you'll like cottage, cream, neufchatel, primost or the processed cheeses and cheese spreads. If you hanker for a "riper" or more flavorful cheese, your choice may well be brick, edam, gouda, gruyere, muenster, port du salutor swiss. And for an even more robust flavor, there's blue, roquefort, gorgonzola, camebert, gammelost, limburger, parmesan, provolone, romano and sapsago.

If cheddar is for you, you will find a good range of flavors to choose from. Depending on how long the cheese has been aged, cheddar flavors vary from mild to sharp. Also, some cheese makers alter cheddar flavors

by adding ingredients such as sage or pimiento before ripening.

When planning the family menu, remember cheese ranks as a top quality protein food, a nutritious alternate to other meat-type foods. It is also a good source of such important nutrients as calcium and riboflavin.

Describing a watermelon is not quite so easy as it sounds. For watermelon shapes range from round to oblong; color to almost black - solid color striped with a paler green, or marbled.

Too, the flesh may be white, cream-color, honey-color, yellow, pale red, red or scarlet. The seeds can be white, white with two black spots, cream-colored tipped with brown and striped with brown around the edge, yellow with a black stripe around the margin and with black spots, dark brown, reddish-brown, russet-brown, black, "sculptured" or as if engraved with ornamental characters, pink, or red.

But there's one thing all good watermelons have in common - delicious taste. And you'll be seeing a lot of watermelons during the next few weeks.

On hot summer days, nothing beats icy cold watermelon for instant refreshment. Cut in slices or juicy wedges, it's considered one of the favorites of summer.

Melon balls can give additional variety to your watermelon serving. Fill sherbet glasses about two thirds full of watermelon balls, and add one-third cup of unsweetened grapefruit juice to each glass. Chill and serve with a garnish of fresh mint.

For a tasty pair, combine cubes of watermelon and plump blueberries in a large serving bowl. Sprinkle with powdered sugar, chill and serve as an entree enhancer or serve yourself dessert.

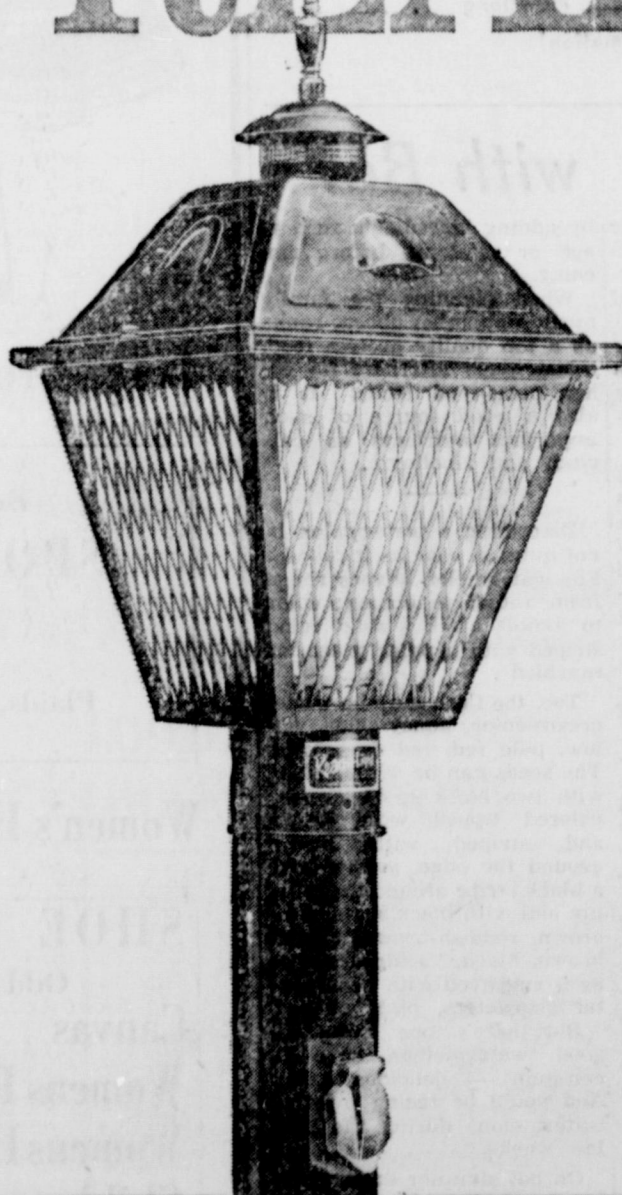

Motor Vehicle Inspections To Begin Sept. 1

AUSTIN—There is a touch of Texas tourism in the 1966 Texas vehicle inspection sticker, said Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, as he announced the new vehicle inspection period to begin on September 1, 1965.

"On that date, all official inspection stations will begin issuing the colorful new sticker, a part of which is a replica of the flag of the Lone Star State," he continued.

In making this announcement, Garrison urged motorists to secure new stickers as soon as possible even though they are not required by law until April 16, 1966.

Garrison noted that this inspection period marks the beginning of the 16th year of compulsory vehicle inspection in Texas and that during that time, vehicle defects as causative factors in motor vehicle traffic accidents have decreased continually.

During 1965, the reduction brought this rate to an all-time low, which compares most favorably with the lowest rates in the nation.
