Year-by-year, dating back even to Aug. 2, 1965, the building blocks have gone up, culminating in what is now "Eastland, Texas, 1965."

Geography was Eastland's mother, and tradition unquestionable labels the late C. U. Connellee, as the town's fath-

partner, J. S. Daugherty, who provided the land and built the first courthouse so that the county government could be moved from Merriman and located in the center of the county. That first court-

house was located in the Stubblefield Building, (what is now site of Corner Drug Store), and today bears a historical

marker as the first permanent building in Eastland.

Streets, alone, today honor the Connellee and Daugher-

Each year there have been other accomplishments: the building of Eastland Lake in '21; dedication of the present courthouse in '28; the community built Eastland Memorial Hospital, completed in '52, and expanded almost yearly; Lake Leon dedicated in '55; a new elementary school and gymnasium in 1964; and hundreds of other accomplishments scattered here and there through the years.

New business houses have been added. Others are in the planning stages.

Several projects have been launched and are in various

stages of completion. Others are needed.

Last year, the city took a giant step, in the organization and chartering of the Eastland Industrial Foundation, as a tool to be used for luring industry to the city.

Presently an area-wide labor survey is being taken to evaluate accurately, the amount and quality of labor

available - another tool to be used in "hardselling" industry on this area.

The Eastland Jaycees are in the midst of a project to develop Ringling Lake, to further the city and area's claim of recreational facilities.







The numbers continued to build up. The price dropped to a low of 12.40 in August 1961. The market has improved steadily since.






