

Delegation In Austin Today To Ask Highway Accesses

In the daily chatter among the people of Eastland there has been lately a serious subject that pops up frequently — the new highway.

Proposed route of Interstate 20 will by-pass the city of Eastland.

After many weeks of hard, tedious work, their efforts are being recognized.

On Thursday, July 29, (today,) at 3 p.m. in the office of the Head of the State Highway Department, Mr. Greer, in Austin, Eastland municipal leaders are meeting to put forth their request for an access road which will run from the new, federally-supported highway into the city of Eastland.

The highway will veer away from Eastland and there will be a clover-leaf intersection at the junction of Interstate 20 and Highway 6.

Interstate 20 will by-pass the city of Eastland. Although the road is already under construction at two points in the county, Eastland residents with active interest in the possible effect the bypassing will have on their city, have been hard at work to do something about it.

After many weeks of hard, tedious work, their efforts are being recognized. On Thursday, July 29, (today,) at 3 p.m. in the office of the Head of the State Highway Department, Mr. Greer, in Austin, Eastland municipal leaders are meeting to put forth their request for an access road which will run from the new, federally-supported highway into the city of Eastland.

The highway will veer away from Eastland and there will be a clover-leaf intersection at the junction of Interstate 20 and Highway 6. Another major clover-leaf is planned east of town near Harry Jordans. Both intersections are financed by the state, and the access road and intersection under request, Eastlanders are asking to be state supported.

The Eastland leaders are putting before Mr. Greer a request for a access road which will run from an intersection between the two points already planned and will be built by the state from the

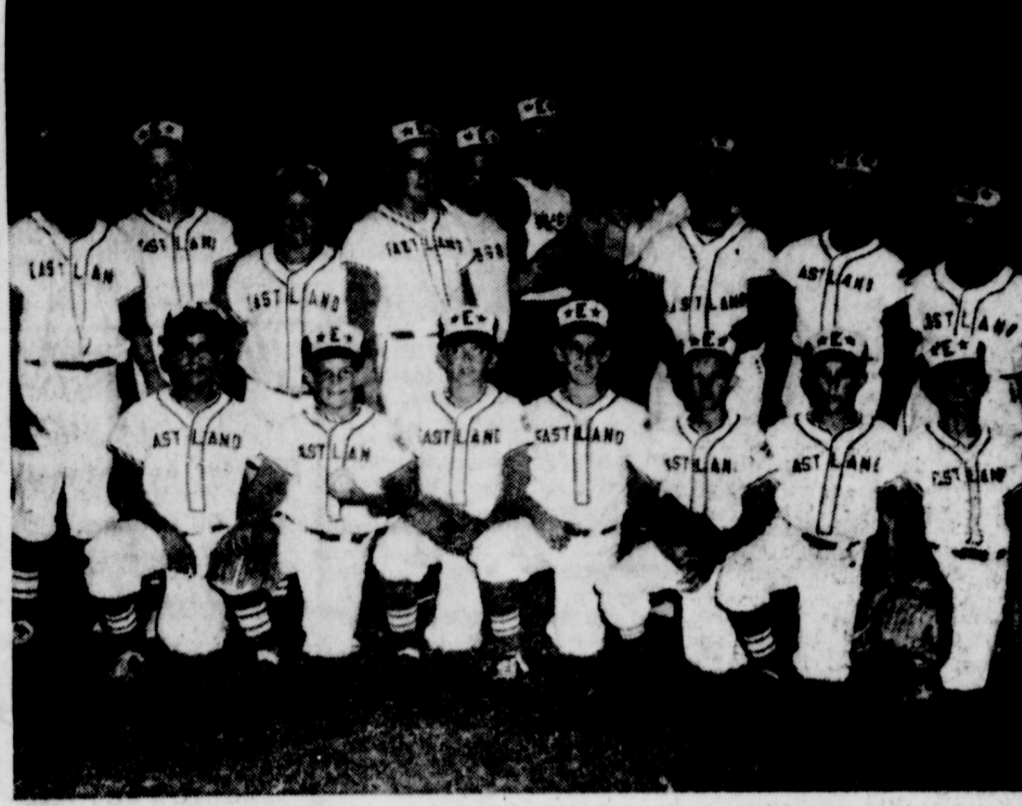

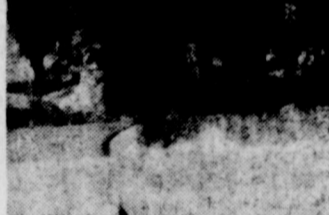

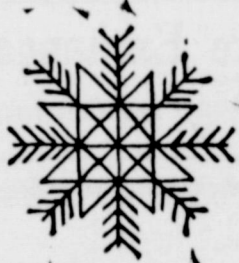

County Commissioners met last Monday, July 26, in the Commissioners Courtroom for a regular meeting.

Commissioners approved several tax reports and conferred with C. E. Burt regarding the financing of several improvements to the courthouse, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

They also talked with local and district engineers for the State Highway Dept. and approved the payments of the utility adjustments in Carbon for the Farm to Market road to K'komo, the Judge stated.

The courthouse improvements will consist of extensive remodeling of the Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals, enlarging library facilities and offices of the judges. This action was recommended by the Eastland County Bar Association, Judge Bailey said.

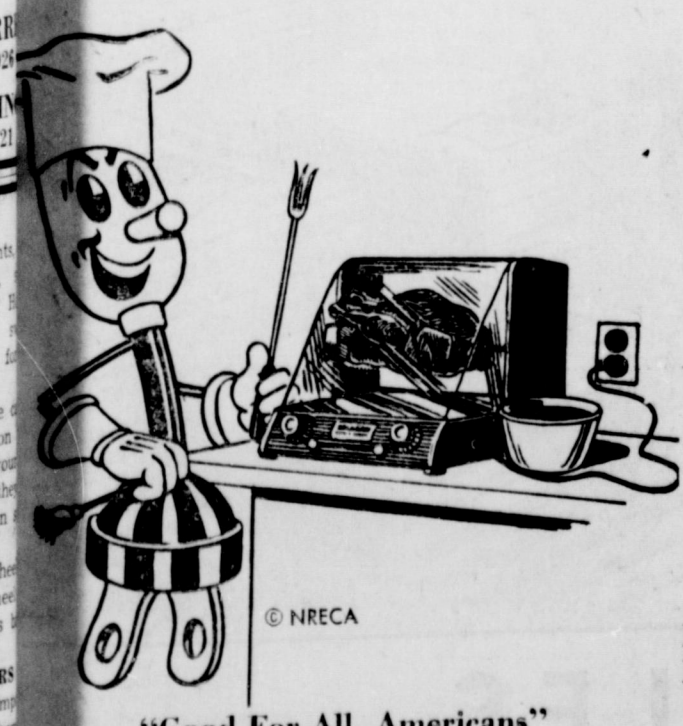

Browsing With Bev

Nonfat dry milk and skim milk are among the many dairy foods in abundance now as the nation observes June Dairy Month.

These forms of milk actually are whole milk with most of the fat removed.

Skim milk is sold in containers, house-to-house or at nearly all dairy counters, just as other fluid milks. It needs to be refrigerated to stay at its fresh best. Skim milk may be used just as whole milk, as a beverage or in cooking. You may choose this form of milk to reduce calories or cost of the finished dish.

Nonfat dry milk is the powdered form of skim milk. It is convenient to store on the pantry shelf, safe to tote on warm weather outings, easy to use at a moment's notice, and usually is a "best buy" for the economy-minded shopper.

When reconstituted with water, it too can be used in place of whole milk. Or, add the powder to a recipe, along with other dry ingredients, and add water with other liquids. Try instant nonfat dry milk in your own Pancake Mix.

This is a dry mix that you can prepare ahead of time and keep in a tightly covered container until used. For mix that will make 10 to 12 pancakes, you'll need 1½ cups flour, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons baking powder 1

teaspoon salt and ½ cup instant nonfat dry milk. Sift together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt. Then mix in the dry milk and put in tight container until you want to use it.
To make the pancakes, add 1½ cups water, 2 eggs and 3 tablespoons melted butter. Combine the water, eggs and butter, add mix and blend well. Pour about one-third cup batter for each pancake onto hot buttered griddle. When bubbles appear, turn and bake other side. Serve with butter, syrup, apple sauce, cottage cheese or other toppings.

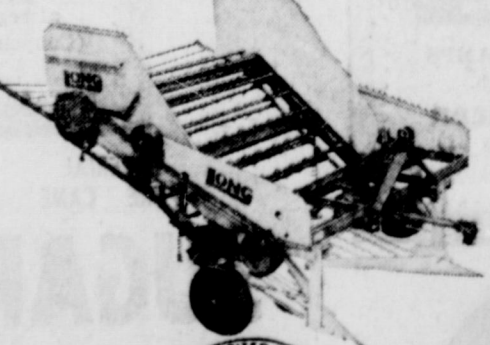

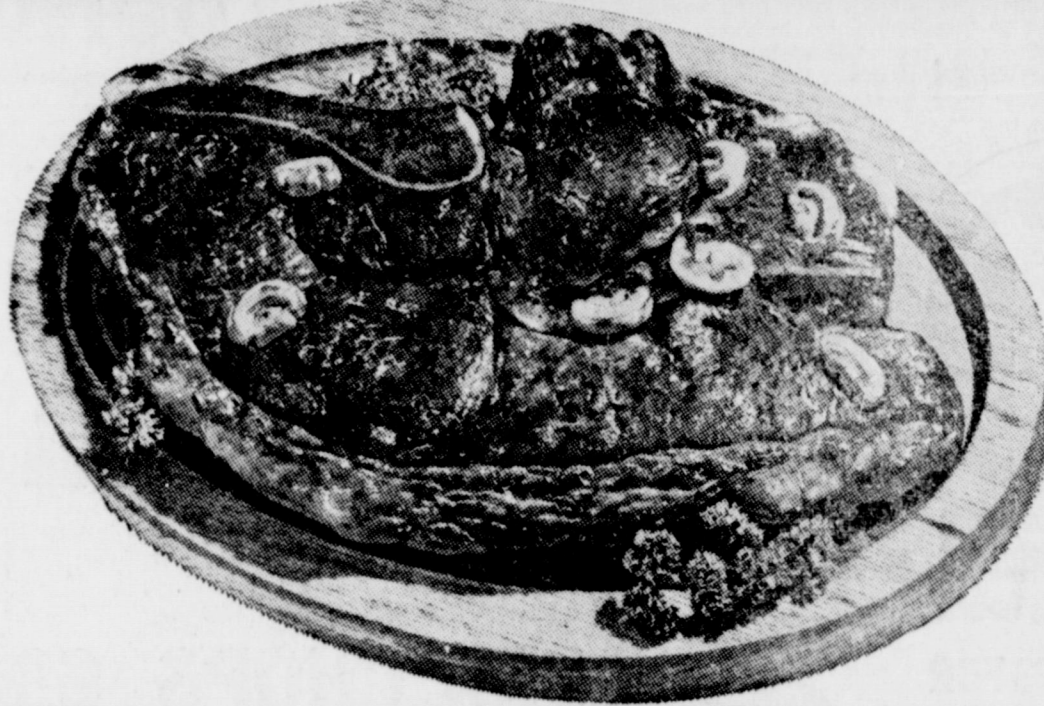

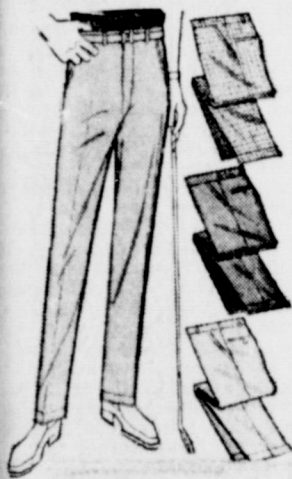

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an Amendment to Section 24, Article III and Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, to allow an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature for the Lieutenant Governor and for the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and increasing the per diem allowance of Members of the Legislature.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 24. Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. Senators shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature. All Members of the Legislature, including the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives, also shall receive from the Public Treasury a per diem of not exceeding Twenty Dollars (\$20) per day for the one hundred and forty (140) days of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days. This Amend-

ment shall be self-enacting and appropriations heretofore made in the General Appropriations Bill for the biennium ending August 31, 1967, for the salaries of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall not be invalid because of the anticipatory nature of the legislation.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of Government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller for each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session.

"Sec. 2. That Section 17 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and during

ing the time he shall receive the same salary as the President of the Senate, and shall be entitled to the same mileage as the President of the Senate. The President of the Senate shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. The Lieutenant Governor shall, while he acts as President of the Senate, receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature and the same mileage which shall be allowed to the Members of the Senate, and no more; and during

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57 proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows: "Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not apply to him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of the Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iiii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications above specified for membership in the Commission; (v) one (1) member shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iiii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iiii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term in question. Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year.

"(6) It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with his performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of parties to Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, or it may find just and proper, and wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant. The rights of an incumbent so retired to retirement benefits shall be the same as if his retirement had been voluntary.

"(10) All papers filed with the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing

ing of testimony, Commission, or Supreme Court; provided that the record loss shall be of a confidential character.

"(11) The Commission shall by rule procedure before the Court. Such rule shall provide for a procedure for the removal of a Justice or Judge from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with his performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a Justice or Judge in any proceeding in his own retirement.

"(13) This Section is declaratory of, and in addition to, the methods of Justices and Judges elsewhere in this Constitution.

Sec. 2. The proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday first Monday in 1965, at which time shall be held on the following: "FOR THE PURPOSES OF THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS, the Justices of the District and Criminal District Courts and the Justices of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission shall have the power to remove the Justices of the District and Criminal District Courts and the Justices of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission from office, and to retire such Justices and Judges for disability, as the case may be, as if their retirement had been voluntary.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election of the Amendment shall be as required by the

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Mrs. Ethel B. Gilmore, Pioneer Researcher And Writer, Named To Area Historical Survey Group

Mrs. Ethel Brookes Gilmore, 79-year-old native Texan, resident of Ranger since 1919 and a widely known genealogist and historian, has been named as a member of the newly-formed Eastland County Historical Survey Committee.

Mike Collins of Eastland, chairman, recently informed Mrs. Gilmore of her appointment to the group.

Mrs. Gilmore has had hundreds of feature stories and historical articles published in the Ranger Times, other newspapers and publications.

Born on Nov. 13, 1885, at Decatur in Wise County, she is the daughter of the late H. and Margaret Jane Brooks, who owned and published the Decatur Democrat.

The late Mr. Brooks was noted as one of the most brilliant of pioneer Texas historians and publishers. He was fearless in his frontier journalism and readily earned the colorful nickname, "The Fighting Editor."

"The Democrat was a success," Mrs. Gilmore recalled

the other day, "but father sold it and moved to Henrietta, where he established The Henrietta Enterprise. Soon he heard of the new town of Panhandle in Carson County, and decided to ac-

cept the challenge of this new opportunity and to let mother remain and operate The Enterprise."

Early one morning, Mrs. Gilmore said, her father hitched his team of horses to a buckboard, loaded up some carpenter tools, threw in "a shirt tail full of type," type rules, a "chase" and an old-fashioned ink roller, more commonly known in the printing trade as a "brayer."

As soon as possible after arriving in Panhandle, the energetic Brookes built a typesetter's desk and also constructed an old-fashioned wooden George Washington hand press on which the first issue of the Herald was printed. The date was July 22, 1887, and Mrs. Gilmore has photostatic copies of some of the first issues of that Panhandle Herald which continues in operation to this day.

In 1889, H. B. Sanborn made the pioneer editor and printer a most generous offer to him to leave Panhandle and come over to the "fast-grow-

growing" cowtown village of Amarillo. Brookes accepted and established The Amarillo Champion which he published for 16 years.

The white-haired longtime Ranger resident says that back in those early years lumber was not available up in the Golden Spread area. The office of the Champion was located in a tent, the base of which was surrounded by a sod wall about three feet high. And the Brookes family made their home in a similar tent.

Mrs. Gilmore recalls that after numerous heated political battles, and a disastrous fire which razed The Champion's quarters to the ground, her illustrious father decided to pull up stakes and return to the Pacific Coast where he had served as a missionary during his early manhood.

After publishing The Roseberg (Ore.) Plain-Dealer for about two years, Brookes again sold out and then went into the logging business at Holbrook, Ore.

An unfortunate disaster terminated his venture in the lumber business — and resulted in his death.

A fire broke out in his logging camp and the commissary was enveloped in flames. The former editor bravely entered the blazing building and rescued his only son, Harry, from the inferno.

But in doing so, the effects of the searing flames and acrid smoke drew the curtain of death on the pioneer journalist's long and colorful career in Portland, Ore., with his loved ones around him.

Brookes, who was a Methodist minister prior to his entry into the newspaper publishing field, had time for civic, religious and irational activities in addition to his business chores. He was a Royal Arch Mason and also a member of the Elks Lodge.

Two years later — in 1906 — his widow and her two daughters, Mary and Ethel — returned to Texas and settled at Fort Worth.

Mary Kouncelor Brookes, society editor of The Fort Worth Record, was sent to Salt Lake City, Utah, to write a feature about the Mormons. Colonel Ousley, editor of The Record, then called Ethel Brookes in to relieve her sister while in Utah on the special assignment.

"My first job," Mrs. Gilmore recalled the other day, "was to cover Jan Paderevski's concert."

"When my sister, Mary, came back from Utah," Mrs. Gilmore added, "she started Texas' first dramatic page in shows and I covered the nentshows and I covered the audience, especially the boxes, made notes of the socially prominent present and how elegantly they were attired."

"I held the society editor's job until I married my late husband, Ben F. Gilmore of Fort Worth, on Sept. 24, 1908."

The Gilmore family moved to Ranger in 1919 where he was employed as head cashier for the Texas & Pacific Railway. Mr. Gilmore passed away on Dec. 28, 1928 in Ranger.

Mrs. Gilmore's late husband was Esteemed Lecturing Knight for the Ranger Elks Lodge when the late Dr. Harry A. Logsdon was Exalted Ruler of the local B. P. O. E. unit.

Five children were born to the couple.

They are Mrs. Margaret Knight of New York City; Mrs. Mary Gilmore Bouite, Abilene; Benjamin Brookes Gilmore, Dallas; Thomas Landrum Gilmore, El Segundo, Calif., and Henry Harold Gilmore, Monterrey Park, Calif.

Mrs. Gilmore has five grandsons and two granddaughters.

She has had a busy career as a writer and historian, and now — as her 80th birthday draws nearer — she busies herself with daily household chores, reading, listening to radio, watching television, thinking back over events of years gone by. Yes, and pouring historical articles out of her venerable Underwood typewriter.

"I grew up on the Brookes small ranch — named Breakview," she reminisced. "Our house was the only one between Amarillo and the LX Ranch, 16 miles away."

"We had a very deep well, and the cowboys always stopped by for a drink. There was a small faucet on the suction rod pipe."

"I knew most of them and they called me 'Miss Sweetie,'" she said, "and one of them gave me some of the best advice I ever received in my lifetime."

"Miss Sweetie," he told me, "when a cowboy comes to this well singing and cheerful, you can figure he's alright. If another comes along with his head bowed and tries to avert looking at anybody, you just leave him be and don't say a word."

"And, if a man a-foot without stetson and boots comes by for a drink of this water, you just take off and run like blazes for the house!"

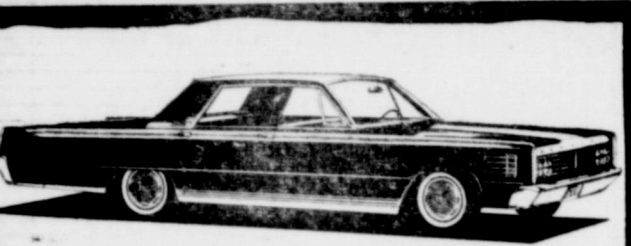

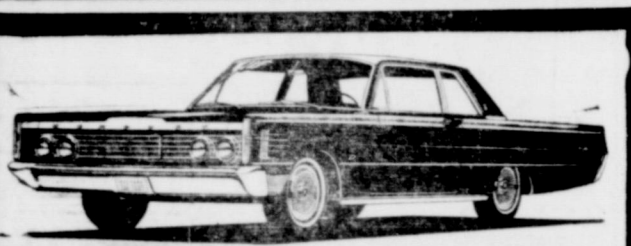
