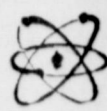

A world of Santas — dolls, of all kinds, in the Santa motif. Rag dolls, paper dolls, plastic dolls, corn-cob dolls, elaborate plastic creations... all with the Santa Theme. Clubs and organizations are being keyed to begin their preparations NOW for entry in the first annual Santa Derby in Eastland, and come the first of December, the town will be a virtual wonderland of Santas (and Mrs. Santa, Little Santas, Aunt and Uncle Santas, won't be overlooked either). All around the square in every window and from every door, visitors will be "Santa-ville" for sure. It's a promotion sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce and Mrs. Marene Johnson was given the go-ahead Thursday to develop the entire program with the assistance of her special events committee. Mrs. Johnson has involved plans which will set the key for the Derby. Prizes are to be awarded and details of the actual competition will be announced later — but for now, it's get your Santas ready. Those women, particularly, those who belong to Home Demonstration Clubs, and such creative organizations are being urged to put their creative abilities to work and see just how clever, how pretty, and how inviting their Santa ideas can be. School Tax Rate Is Static for Year

The school tax rate of \$1.55 per \$100 valuation for the coming year has been approved by the Eastland Independent School District recently. The \$1.55 rate, according to Supt. Wendell Siebert, remains unchanged from past year. Eastland tax valuations are up some \$500,000 this year, due mainly from a re-evaluation of rural property. Valuations now stand at \$7,181,850, compared with \$6,606,830. New home construction in town also accounts for the increase. The tax assessment is divided with 55 cents earmarked for the interest and sinking fund and \$1.00 for local maintenance. This tax rate is expected to remain constant as long as valuations and percent of collections remain constant, school officials report. Adoption of the budget for the coming school year isn't expected to be completed un-

necessary, according to Supt. Travis Hilliard. Bus routes will be the same as last year; however, lunch prices have been increased to 30 cents for students and 55 cents for adults. Teaching at Olden this year will be Mrs. Bossie L. Beatty, Mrs. Betty Jo Cooper, Mr. Gilbert Copeland, Mr. George Ellis, Miss Eunice Hamilton, Mr. Travis Hilliard, Mrs. Gloria Pickle, Mr. Bob Reese, Mrs. Elizabeth Vaught, Mrs. Oleta Wade and Mr. Jack White; also, an additional teacher will be hired. For the first time since 1948, football will be played in Olden, Mr. Hilliard stated. Both high school and junior high are in a six-man football district with Gorden, Strawn, Carbon, Putnam and Moran. Other games have been matched and a full ten-game schedule has been arranged. Lights are being installed and stands are being built at the old football field to accommodate from two to three hundred people.

Ranger Resident Is Oldest Social Security Beneficiary in Area -- Is 1 of Only 2 Originals

Phillip H. S. Williams, 92-year-old Ranger resident, is the only person in Eastland County who received a social security check for January 1940 — the first month that monthly benefits were payable — according to H. L. Weatherly, Social Security field representative for Eastland County.

Social security records are confidential, but in order to acquaint others with the provisions of the 1965 amendments, Williams gave permission to present this information for the benefit of the public.

Only two such persons still survive in the 14-county Abilene District in this "Club of Original Beneficiaries". And nation-wide, there are only 1,961 of these charter members.
Except for about 7 months during World War II when he returned to work, Williams has received a check for every month since January, 1940. Williams' first check, January 1940, was for \$26.46 per month; his current rate is \$65.00 per month. Now another raise has been made in social security by the 1965 amendments, and Williams' \$65.00 will be increased by 7% to \$69.60 effective Jan., 1965. Williams will get the regular check of \$65.00 on Sept. 3. On about September 20, he will receive a check for \$36.90 the increase for the months, January 1965 thru August 1965. Then on October 3, 1965, the new rate of \$69.60. No action by Williams is necessary. This will automatically be sent to him.
However, he will have to take specific action on the medical insurance part of the health benefits as provided in the 1965 amendments. He, as well as all other social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries are automatically covered by the hospital part, but he must make a voluntary choice as to the medical portion. He and the other 15 million age 65 beneficiaries will get full and complete information by mail before the end of the year.
Williams now resides at Western Manor Nursing Home in Ranger. A native of Kentucky, he came to Ranger in 1920 and was employed by the Stanolind Pipe Line Co. as a telegraph operator. Williams lived at Graford and Mineral Wells prior to moving back to Ranger in December, 1960. Until recently he had made his home with his son, T. F. Williams of
