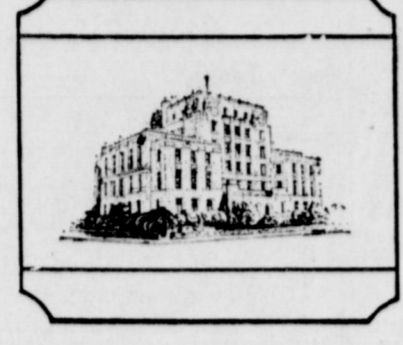

Woman, Son Die in Collision Friday East of Ranger

A hazardous intersection at Highway 108 and U. S. Highway 80 east — three east of Thurber — resulted in two more highway fatalities late Friday.
A collision of a car and a truck at that spot Friday at 3 p. m. killed the woman driver of the car and her 10-year-old son.
The victims were Mrs. Virginia R. J. Both were thrown from their car in the smashup. The wreckage of the car was scattered over a wide area.
Justice of the Peace W. E. Weaver pronounced the woman and child dead at the scene. The bodies were taken to Edwards Funeral Home in Strawn, then to Truett-Reed Funeral Home in Stephenville.
The truck driver was unhurt.
Investigating Highway Patrol Sgt. James Beggs and Patrolman Neal Binford said the Howards were driving north on State 108 and the westbound truck was driven by Roy Hart, 25, of Dallas, employe of a Dallas furniture company. The truck was owned by Strickland Trucking Co.
The officers said this raises to eight the number of traffic deaths within 200 yards of that intersection during the past year.

County's School Executives Get Briefing on Law

Nine Eastland County school executives attended the area-wide informational meeting in Mineral Wells Wednesday, according to County School Supt. O. L. Stamey.
The local group was among some 125 people attending from 25 counties. Meeting at the high school library, the delegations heard representatives of the Texas Education Agency, including Dr. J. W. Edgar, discuss the various aspects of the new Title I and Title II provisions of Public Law 89-10 — the federal program for the assistance of school districts, based on the number of youngsters whose parents earned less than \$2,000 a year.

The program can be secured individually by districts or in a cooperative program, it was explained, but many aspects of the program are still uncertain, and many details are to be worked out, the TEA officials explained. The Title II program primarily concerns library needs it was explained.

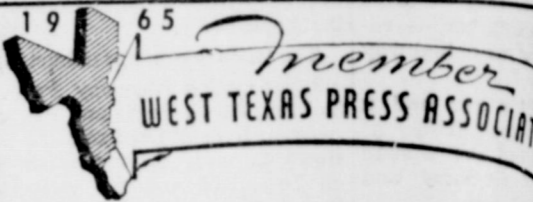

Inductions, 15 To Be Examined In August

Called for induction on August 8, three Eastland County men, according to Mrs. Jewell, clerk at the local Selective Service Board No. 36. Giving calls to take their places were 15 men. The draft boards will be holding a considerable number of 19 year-olds by fall if calls remain high, it was announced last week by Sel Morris S. Schwartz, Selective Service director. Those inducted in August included mostly 21-year-olds; never men examined in August for future induction will consist mostly of 20-year-olds. The statement made by Schwartz followed receipt of an amended September quota for Texas of 1,459 men and an estimated October call of 1,780. Recent monthly quotas have been around 700 to 900. Increased attention upon the classification of college students has resulted from the declining age of involuntary induction during recent months. Local boards have been instructed to mail current information questionnaires to all

married men 19 to 26 years old who have no children, except in cases where current information is in files. "Men who have children or hardship conditions will be deferred formally, those who have wives alone will continue to be passed over for the draft for the time being; but those not living with their wives, or wives and children in a bona fide family relationship will be subject to the draft at once," Schwartz said.

hesitate to negotiate with a potential employer of female help without knowing for sure that there would be enough extra female labor available to staff another such sewing industry. "Your help in completing and returning the enclosed survey - AT ONCE - is very important in helping to determine the information which is necessary to interest future industrial prospects in locating their plant in Eastland County," he continued in the letter. The survey includes both men and women from ages of 16 and up. A form should be completed on each member of the family. Individual information on the survey is being handled as confidential, but the compiled data will become available to all those who have an actual need for it. An employment survey taken recently in Midland, asking for replies only from females interested in light manufacturing employment, revealed that there were 2,539 such persons in that county - further showing the number by age groups, by present employment, by whether their husbands was employed, their marital status and education and special training. Such information about the entire Eastland County labor market is considered vital and necessary for future industrial expansion. 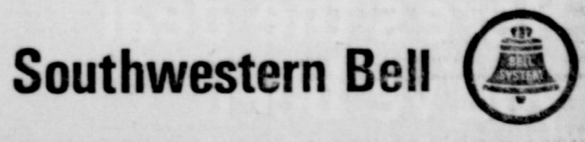

Browsing With Bev

Sweaters are important parts of fall and winter wardrobes. They can be high fashion items as well as practical.

Selection of a sweater usually depends on several considerations: Individual preference, activity of the person, clothing budget, and the method of care the garment will require.

Sweaters are cut and sewn as in regular fabrics, or are shaped by full fashioning where the designs are knitted to a particular shape. The full fashion sweaters are more expensive.

Many of today's sweaters have decorative trim. Take time to evaluate the extra cost of decorative trim in relation to the service the sweater will

get and the maintenance cost. The trim should require the same care as the rest of the sweater.

The finish around the sweater neck is important. Necks can be finished by single or double thickness of ribbing. For soft yarns, as cashmere or nylon, a double thickness keeps the shape more adequately.

Buttonholes should be of fine stitches with well-tacked ends.

Always read labels carefully for care instructions. Jot down a description of the sweater on the label and use it for future reference. If sweaters are inadequately labeled, do not purchase.

Careful laundering of sweaters is essential. Wool sweaters should be washed in cool water with a mild, neutral soap, then blotted and dried flat. Some of the wool fibers are treated chemically for stability and are machine washable. Many of the synthetics may be machine washed and dried at low temperatures.

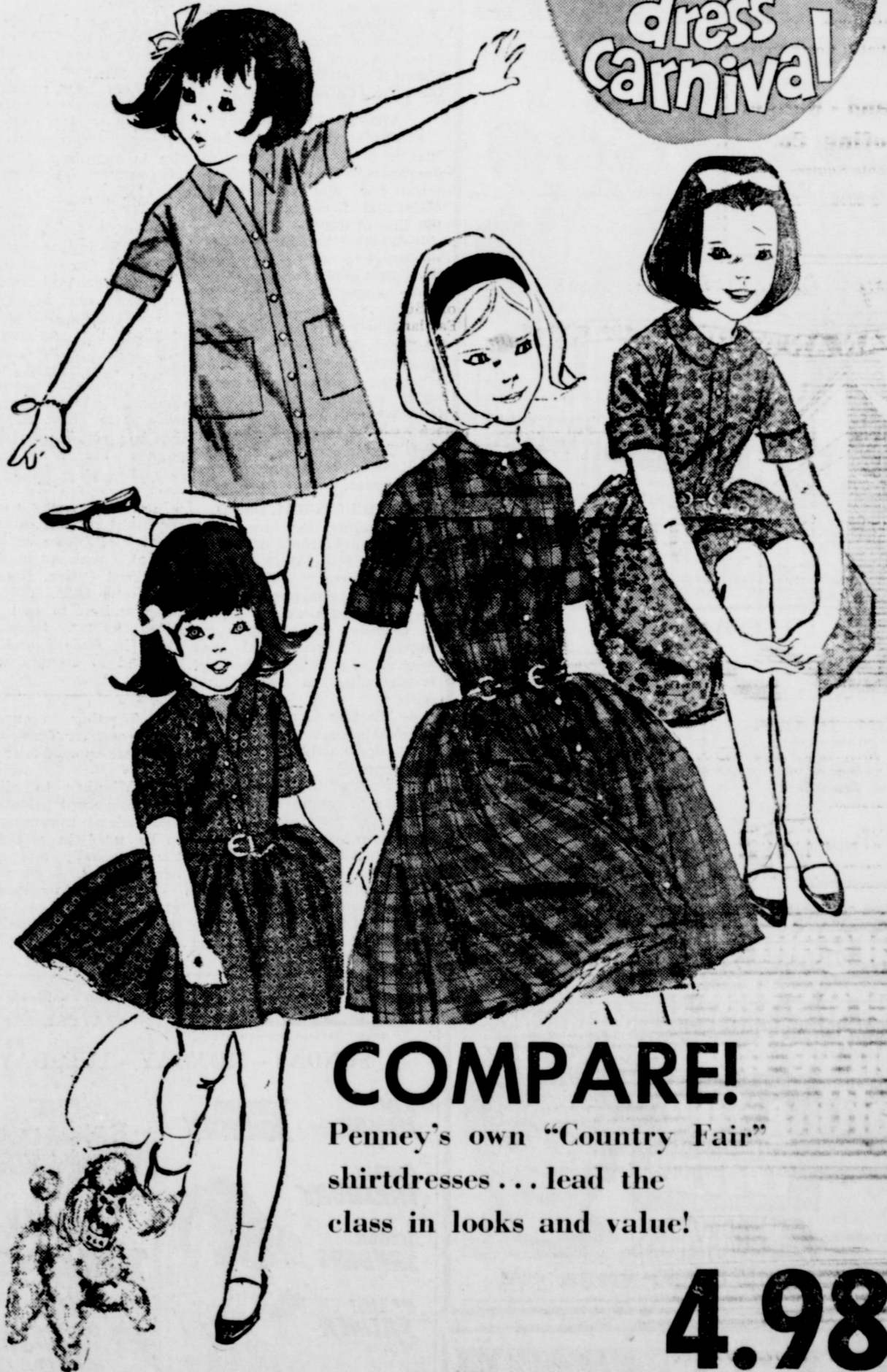

Publishing of Proposed Amendments Begins

Beginning Sept. 7, Eastland County voters will join other Texans in voting on 27 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution in three separate elections.

The other two elections will be Nov. 2, 1965, and Nov. 8, 1966, the general election. This newspaper has begun publication of the complete texts of certain of the amendments.

On Sept. 7, 1965, voters will decide only one proposed Senate membership will be increased from its present 31 members to 39 members.

The ten amendments to be voted on Nov. 2, 1965, are:

1. SJR No. 14, which proposes to provide a four-year term for the governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public
2. HJR No. 11, which proposes to authorize loans to students at institutions of higher education by creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund.
3. HJR No. 5, which proposes to increase the amount of bonds that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to \$400 million.
4. HJR No. 8, which proposes to raise the salaries of the lieutenant governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives, and for increasing the daily expense allowances of legislators while in session.
5. HJR No. 81, which proposes expansion of state welfare medical care programs

In order to qualify for federal aid for medical care for indigent, aged, blind, dependent children, and disabled persons.

6. SJR No. 24, which proposes to raise the amount of ad valorem taxes allocated for higher education.

— Whether to broaden the field in which the school teacher retirement fund may be invested.

— Whether to increase the terms of House of Representative members from two years to four years, starting in 1967.

— Whether to allow establishment of mandatory retirement of judges at age 75, with the authorization that the legislature could set the age at 70 if it wished. This proposal, also would provide authorization or removal of judges when they are unable to carry out their duties.

— Whether to allow certain hospitals to be exempt from ad valorem taxes in Houston. This pertains only to Houston.

VOTING IN 1966

On Nov. 8, 1966, voters will decide:

— Whether to change the date on which House of Representatives members begin their terms to the second Tuesday after the first Monday of each odd-numbered year. State senators currently begin their terms on that date, but house members may be sworn into office as soon as general election returns are canvassed.

— Whether to repeal the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas, and to allow the legislature to establish a new voter registration system.

— Whether to allow men residents of Texas to vote for president and vice president before they establish eligibility for Texas citizenship.

AID TO VICTIMS

— Whether to allow the legislature to set up a system of payments to widows and children of law enforcement officials and firemen killed in the line of duty.

— Whether to allow military personnel to vote in state and local elections if they have met other voting requirements of Texas.

— Whether to provide that legislature to set up a method for dissolving hospital districts when they are no longer needed or wanted.

— Whether to provide that annexations by school districts and junior college districts shall not invalidate previously voted taxes.

AGRICULTURAL LAND

— Whether to allow local units of government of Harris County to consolidate some of their functions. This is a localized question only.

— Whether to set up a plan to provide tax benefits for owners of agricultural land near cities so long as the land is dedicated to agricultural use.

— Whether to authorize regional airport authorities. This is primarily a North Texas proposal.

— Whether to allow the legislature to set up a statewide retirement disability and benefit system for officials and employees of all local units of government.

— Whether to expand from \$200 million to \$400 million the state loan fund for water development loans to cities and water systems.

Navy Steps Up Drive To Enlist More Young Men

The Navy has begun an all out drive to enlist high caliber young men to serve in this time of need, announced Chief Warrant Officer M. M. Jones, of the Dallas Recruiting Station as he stopped in Cisco Wednesday.

A veteran of 29 years Naval service, the CWO said that the Navy doesn't consider this a crash program, as "our complex Navy still requires the new enlistee to attend a technical school of his choice after recruit training to enable him to operate and maintain the complex equipment in our ships today."

A new program called Cache provides for an enlistee to receive a 120-day, or four-month, deferment after enlistment in order to wind up business, finish school, etc., he explained. The recruiting officer recommended that ex-servicemen look into the new program that is being offered for them.
