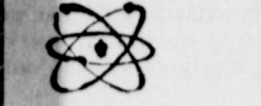

Mavericks Chill Wildcats, 14-6

The Eastland Mavericks took the starch out of a bigger and highly-rated Rising Star Wildcat squad, 14-6, before a packed stand of home fans in Maverick Stadium to add No. Two Win to their books.

Rising Star's one score came on a fluke with the opening kickoff when End John Hutchinson recovered the opening kickoff in the Eastland end zone for a touchdown. The quick ring-up of six points on the scoreboard set the local fans to wondering "What happened?" Try for extra point failed.

And it wasn't until early in the second quarter that the Mavericks put together the right combination for a score of their own. It started with a long punt return by Quarterback Jerry McCullough, and a quick-quick drop on the receiving Wildcat on the 20. Two Wildcat plays later a fumble put the ball with the Black and Reds.

Three no-gainers and a five-yard penalty left the Mavericks with less than bright hopes so near the goal. Then on a fourth and 14 situation, McCullough surprisingly repeated the third down play, and the pass to Back Johnny Moylan was true as a bell and 35 yards later Moylan was in paydirt to knot the score. Try for extra point failed.

A clicking pass to End Larry Wilson mid-way in the fourth quarter set up the winning touchdown for the Mavericks. Halfback James Fullen took and moved the ball within a whisker of the goal to bring the fans to their feet. Then four plays later on a fourth down situation, 155-pound Fullen, who had turned in a hard-smashing, ground gaining game, went over for the second Maverick score. Quarterback McCullough ran the pigskin over for the two extra points — handing the fans the 14-6 victory. An Eastland threat fizzled midway in the first quarter with a fumble recovered by Rising Star, and in the second, a pass interception by the visitors put the lid on local hopes after a long drive. Also in the second quarter, a score was just a finger-tip away when a pass from McCullough, intended for 130-pound Back Gene Wilson, who was all by himself, just missed by a fraction of an inch, within 20 yards of the goal. Rising Star just about had themselves another score early in the new half when Guard Bill Boles, last man in sight, dropped a runaway Wildcat who had already cleared the field and could smell the goal line in his nostrils. In the last minutes, Eastland was close again, but double fumbles changed hands with the ball so much that the game ended as it had stood.

'Eastland to Get More Industry' Stockholders Told at Annual Meet

"Eastland can and will get some more industry" the some 85 persons who attended the first annual Eastland Industrial Foundation Corp.'s stockholder and backers' meeting were told at Lone Cedar Country Club Thursday evening. Purpose of the meeting was to bring the public up-to-date on the progress made by the Foundation, to handle routine business and outline plans for the future, including soliciting support of the entire community for this important work.

President Tom Wilson presided and began by introducing these dignitaries at the head table: County Judge and Mrs. Scott Bailey; Mayor Frank Deaton; Mr. and Mrs. Buddy Carter; Mr. and Mrs. Jay Staggs; Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Perry; Mr. and Mrs. Milton Fullen; Mr. and Mrs. Virgil T. Seaberry Jr.; and the Rev. Haston Brewer, who gave the invocation.

Assistant Treasurer Buddy Carter presented the treasurer's report. Especially cited were Don Viergever, in his dual role as chamber of commerce president and local manager for the Munsingwear Corp.'s Hollywood-Vassarette plant here, and James Smith, immediate past president of the chamber.

Mr. Frank Sayre presented a slide presentation, which showed the development of the Hollywood-Vassarette plant which has recently been the Foundation's major task. The building's space was increased some ten thousand square feet under the enlargement program, up to its present 28,000 square feet. A paved parking lot has recently been completed at the plant by the Foundation.

During the brief remarks, Viergever, speaking for Munsingwear, thanked the Foundation for the manner in which it has handled the expansion for his company, and then as a chamber director, outlined how the chamber, the Foundation and the general public work together on the important business of getting industry. Viergever also suggested the administrative needs of the foundation, showing that by using the talent available, much can be accomplished. "Eastland will get more industry," he said, "because of

the many assets working toward that end." President Wilson gave a history of industrial foundations in general and the Eastland organization specifically, and stated that Eastland's is one of relatively few in the state, emphasizing that the town is up-to-date on that count. "The Foundation is one of the many things that will help us get industry," he said, citing good schools, good churches, adequate water, transportation, and other assets as important links in the chain of success. Director, Virgil T. Seaberry Jr. was re-elected to the board without opposition, and Jay Staggs closed the program by stating the importance of industry on community economy. "Without industry, a town's economy is purely at the hands of nature," he said, "if the weather is good, crops are good and economy is good, but when the weather

isn't ideal, the process breaks down. Industry helps stabilize the economy." In summation, it was pointed out that the Foundation has gone a long way with the acquiring and expanding of the Hollywood-Vassarette plant, but that there is still much to be done in other avenues, and this will require the help of every interested person in the community. Citizens are invited to join the worthwhile team by contributing as much as possible so that more can be done for the industrialization of Eastland. The purpose of the Foundation, stated Wilson, is simply: "To get more payrolls."

The chicken-fighting cases have been making the rounds of the courts in this county since early in the year, and the county has been out some \$600 in the various proceedings, it is reported by a reliable source.

Tuesday's Vote Cost \$875.84

There is hope that all the action of the state senate is not as expensive as last Tuesday's constitutional amendment election. If you were among the few in Eastland County who voted, your ballot cost the county about \$1.40, according to figures tabulated at weeks end. Had more people voted the per vote average would have been less, of course.

In all, the election cost the county \$875.84 and there were only 608 votes cast. The total cost includes \$706.50 for election clerks, \$92 for printing of ballots and \$77.34 for election supplies, bought from an Austin firm.

Box by box, here's the clerk cost: Eastland, \$78; Olden, \$55 (includes \$5 for rent of a voting site); Ranger, \$101; Carbon, \$32; Gorum, \$57; Desdemona, 36.50; Kokomo, \$35; Pioneer, \$79; Rising Star, \$46; Cisco, \$128; Scranton, \$35; and Nimrod, \$24.

According to a report, the 59th session of the State Senate passed 786 bills and resolutions of 1,906 considered. It also presented 27 constitutional amendments for citizens to consider at special elections. The first was Tuesday; nine will be decided early in November and the other 17 will come up for vote in 1966.

—Modern equipment (both diagnostic and therapeutic) to keep pace with the advances in medicine.

The job of marshaling all this talent into a well-coordinated team requires good administration which is the framework on which a hospital is built.

The administrative staff keeps the hospital running in an orderly manner, makes sure that all functions are carried out and that the hospital is physically and financially sound.

Administrative functions include management of the hospital as a whole and of its individual departments. Supervisors or department heads manage their own departments and report to the administrator.

As the chief executive officer, the administrator shoulders the main responsibility of seeing to it that the hospital continues to operate successfully, that it meets the needs of the community, that it fulfills its responsibilities as an educational and research center, and that it expands when necessary to serve an ever-increasing number of patients.

No one person could do all this alone. The administrator works closely with many individuals and groups to receive counsel and assistance. The medical staff and the board of trustees are two groups which are extremely important members of the administrative team.

On call 24 hours a day, hospital administrators combine prayer, faith, professional training, hard work, leadership, a sense of humor and humility in carrying out their responsibilities.

**THERE IS AND** has been from time to time talk about a museum for Eastland County. Certainly, there's enough antiques around to stock such a place and everybody will agree that it should be done. We like an idea that Mike Collins, Eastland banker and an official in the county historical society, has come up with. Mike suggests that the museum not be limited to a room or a building. Let's have a farm yard layout.

In other words, let's get a few acres of land and move in a genuine log house from somewhere in the county, an old log barn, and assorted other small buildings that were typical of the Eastland County farm in the early days. And let's equip the house and the buildings with authentic relics from the days gone by.

Perhaps it would be in order for the county historical society to appoint a committee to start work on a project of this type. Certainly it would attract tourists and peel that a simple museum. It would attract tourist and might be self sustaining. If you like the idea, too, tell Mike about it.
