

New Plant Is Going Up!

Hollywood - Maxwell's new home is fast nearing completion. From all indications the building will be completed and ready for the corset company to move into by Oct. 1.

Contractor for the new building, Stanford Engineering Co. of Midland, said this week that the building will be completed by Sept. 15. That will give Hollywood - Maxwell plenty of time to occupy the \$60,000 structure by Oct. 1.

Roofing was going on the building Monday, and the

structure was beginning to take the form of the architect's drawing. Hollywood - Maxwell will consolidate all of their three factories here into one when the building is completed. Further expansion of the plant has also been indicated.

Herb Tanner, manager of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce, also announced that Herndon Norris, president of Hollywood - Maxwell Co., has accepted an invitation to be present for the grand opening to be held after the

company has moved into their new home.

"We invited all of the officers of the company and their wives," Tanner said. "Mr. Norris assured me that he and a number of other officials would be here."

Tanner also said that the high school band would be on hand for the opening. "We plan to congratulate the company in big style," he explained.

Hollywood Maxwell employs some 250 full time employees here and has an

annual payroll of a half million dollars.

The company has been in operation here since Oct. 1, '46. They started with one branch and expanded until they now have three. To assure continued growth, the company asked the C-C Industrial Committee to build them a new factory building. Hollywood - Maxwell signed a 10 year lease on the building with a five year option. Eastland citizens raised \$12,500 of the \$60,000 needed to build the factory building.

Today is the last day to vote absentee in the first primary election. County Clerk Johnson Smith said that some 150 ballots had been mailed out so far. All should be returned by noon Saturday.

compares to about 100 voters two years ago and 200 in the last presidential election. Smith said he expected the number to swell to about 200 before the day is over, and said he "would be available" anytime until the midnight deadline.

Like everywhere in the State, the political picture has taken the front this year. Candidates were still busy Tuesday trying to stir up interest, which has lagged considerably here.

Telegram publisher O. H. Dick announced today that the paper would be printed late Saturday night and delivered Sunday morning so that complete results of the county and state races can be given. The big election board will again be up on the south side of the square in Eastland.

Observers were pointing out that the referendum questions being offered the voters could be somewhat confusing. If the voter is against compulsory attendance at integrated schools he will have to vote "for specific legislation exempting any child from compulsory attendance." The same is true on the question concerning "perfecting state laws against intermarriage." To vote against intermarriage the voter must vote in favor of the ballot.

Trinkle made the statement in a featured story under a three

column headline in Sunday's Star-Telegram. His story follows: "If present plans jell, Eastland County's Lake Leon will be the backdrop for one of Texas' most ambitious country club projects this fall.

"On gently rolling woodland hard by the picturesque lake,

"Only it isn't a dream any more.

County Promises Aid To Firemen

A \$250 a month appropriation for the five fire departments in Eastland County was approved Monday by Eastland County Commissioners.

Approval came after representatives of the five departments met with the Court and asked financial aid to help fight fires in rural areas. The Court, on a motion by J. M. Bennett, voted to give each department \$50 a month for the next three months. At the end of that time, the Court will try to work out a permanent solution, the fire fighters were assured.

Fire Chief Billy Jack Johnson and City Manager James Young represented Eastland at the meeting; Fire Chief Charlie D. Isbell represented Ranger; Fire Chief Bill Button, Rising Star; Fire Chief J. D. Thompson, Gorman; and Fire Chief L. E. Sublett, Cisco.

Johnson served as spokesman

for the group. He pointed out that so far this year the five departments have made 42 rural calls.

"Citizens of the five towns have had to pay the cost of this protection," he asserted, "through

city taxes." He went on to say that he realized that getting money was a problem for the county, "but the city has the same problem."

Jack Chamberlain, "so we're going right ahead with our plans."
"Construction of the Lone Cedar Country Club clubhouse will begin in October. The complete building program has been outlined over a five-year span but depending on growing county enthusiasm, may be finished in half that time."
"After the clubhouse is completed, men and machines will turn to the rest of the project, the golf course, swimming pool, boat docks, gun club, tennis courts and duck blinds ("one of the finest duck landings in West Texas"), says Neil Day of Eastland.
"Lone Cedar School used to be an old landmark in Eastland County, thus the club's name. It will be located off Lone Cedar Road."
"The original plan had its inception in a holding company of 62 recreation - bent Eastland County citizens — 20 each from Eastland and Ranger, 10 apiece from Cisco and Gorman and two from Strawn."
"From the first our plans were to go first class," says Dr. Jim Whittington, "and we've kept that as our target. Our aim is to have one of West Texas' finest courses. How can we miss?"
"The site was a natural. Lake Leon is a beautiful lake, seven miles long and three miles wide at its extremities."
"First the land was bought, then a right of way through which to build a one-mile road to the property. The road was built."
"An Abilene engineering firm was called in and aerial photographs made of the terrain. Specialists planned the club and laid out the course."
"The \$150,000 clubhouse will look to the southeast across the lake, facing into the prevailing wind. Four thousand feet of the club property skirts the lake and three of the holes on the proposed 18-hole course are on the lake."
"The course will play 6,394 yards and carry a par of 71. The land is well timbered with oak, mesquite and live oak trees."
"Some day," one spokesman said this week, "if Ranger, Cisco, and Eastland will pool resources for one big invitational golf tournament instead of the three separate events they have now, we can draw one of the best amateur fields in Texas to one of the best tournaments in the state."
"The club is only minutes away from Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, Cisco and Strawn. The latter city is the farthest at 16 1/2 miles."
"Golf isn't the main attraction. That's why all other sports facilities are receiving equal attention."
"We know Eastland County, to date, has had inadequate recreational attractions for the young people," said Jack Chamberlain Jr., "and many have been leaving after finishing school."
"With this club available to members and families, there will be more incentive to stay. The country's future rides on its youngsters."
"And with Eastland County's forward - thinking citizens running interference for the youngsters, the future looks good."

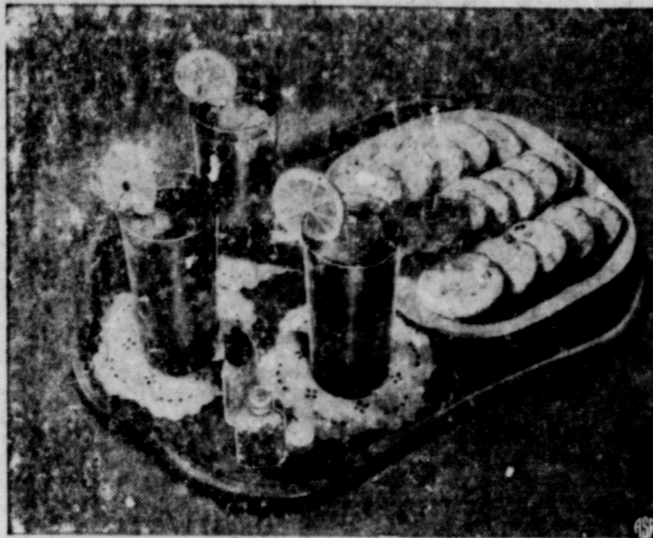

You can freeze and keep rolls of these icebox cookies handy for munching in a matter of minutes.

Orange Pecan Cookies

- 1/2 dissolve 6 saccharin tablets (1/4 grain each) in 1/4 cup unsweetened orange juice
- Cream in a 6-cup bowl 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Sift together 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with orange juice mixture
- Blend well into dough 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- 2 tablespoons pecans, finely chopped

Shape dough into a roll 2 inches thick and wrap in waxed paper. Chill in refrigerator until firm enough to slice, about 2 hours. Cut into 1/4-inch slices and place on ungreased cookie pan. Bake on rack slightly above center in 400° oven (moderately hot) for 12 minutes. Makes 18 cookies. Calories per cookie: 44.

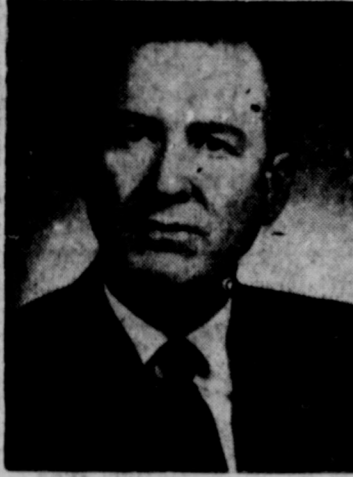

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Ideal School Sizes Brought Out As Educators Meet At A&M

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, (Spl.) — How many pupils should a high school have? The question was answered Tuesday at Texas A. and M. College.

The speaker, C. O. Fitzwater, chief of total school administration, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Education, Washington, D.C., said at the meeting of Texas school administrators that "many authorities say and the report of the committee for the White House conference on education, also states, that a high school should have a minimum of 300 pupils, or 75 pupils per grade and 12 full-time teachers; and that the minimum size of an elementary school should be 175 pupils and seven teachers for a six-grade school."

What about the minimum size for school districts?

Possible Advantages

Mr. Fitzwater declared that "for years authorities have advocated and the White House conference on education report likewise states, that a school district should have at least 1200 pupils and 40 teachers; but they also point out that those of that size cannot be adequately self-sufficient from an educational standpoint and that there are possible advantages in efficiency and economy in those that are considerably larger.

"However," Mr. Fitzwater said, "only a small portion of the school districts in the nation, about 11 per cent in 1954-55, employed 40 or more teachers. Furthermore, most recognized units established in recent years fall considerably short of the minimum size recommended."

Progress Report

The speaker said that the "progress Texas has made in reducing the number of its school districts is outstanding. According to information collected for use in the White House conference on education only five states had a larger percentage — wise reduction in the number of their school districts from 1948 to 1955; in 1948 Texas had 5145 districts but in 1955 only 1875, a reduction of 63.5 per cent.

"Moreover, in the same period, still speaking of Texas, the number of one-teacher schools was reduced from 1200 to 217; the number of school districts operating a school from 900 to fewer than 50; and the percentage of districts, not school systems, employing 40 or more teachers was more than doubled.

"These are indications of significant change, or major improvements in the school administrative structure."

More than 300 are attending the meeting of the Texas Association of County Superintendents, Texas School Administration and the Texas Association for Instructional Supervisors.

Of the total 23,000,000 donations of blood obtained by Red Cross since February 1941, some 21,000,000 donations were provided for military and defense and 10,000,000 donations were provided for civilian use.

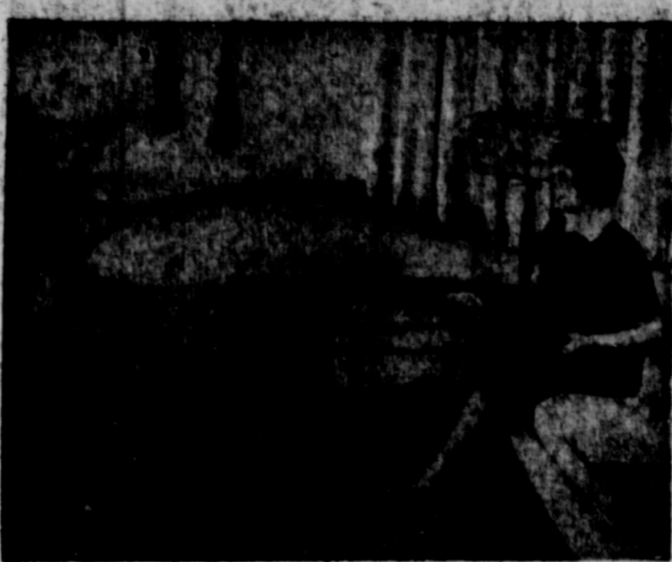
(Continued from Page One) for instance. You probably haven't even realized the town has had any growth in the past year. But it has, as indicated in the new telephone directory just out. This

Parents Are Urged To Get Birth Proof for School Children Early

The State Department of Health today asked all parents of children who will enter public schools for the first time in September to make requests "now" for copies of the children's birth records.

Most school systems require a birth certificate to prove the child was six years old on or before September 1.

"Making early requests for birth records will save parents and us time and trouble," said State Registrar W. D. Carroll.

Last year the department processed more than 60,000 requests during the months of August, September, and October.

"This year we're trying to avoid the fall bottleneck," Carroll said. "We're ready to give immediate service to applications coming in between now and mid-July."

All parents have to do is furnish the child's name and date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name and the name of the father. That information, plus the statutory fee of fifty cents, will buy anyone a copy of their birth certificate—provided the original certificate is on file.

It's a good bet the original will be on hand. Carroll's office keeps track of some ten million birth and death records, some dating back to 1903.

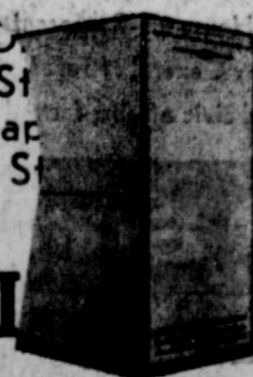

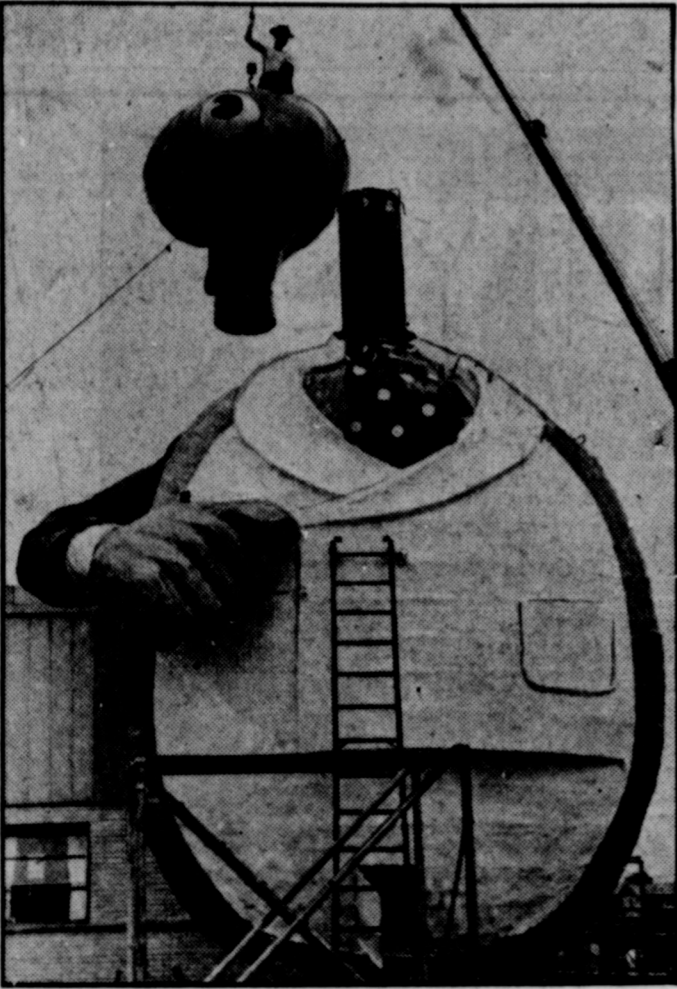

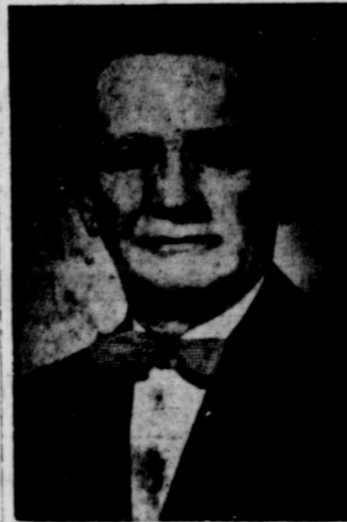
