MAVS DEFEAT LOBOES, 14-8, FOR THIRD WIN

Eastland's Mavericks took advantage of every break — many of which they made for themselves — played heads up football Friday night and defeated the strongest team they had tackled this year The Mavs undid Cisco, 14-8.
A miles-long caravan of local fans went to Cisco to see their team's victory.
The game, which had been rated as a toss-up, was entertaining with a lot of good playing, although nine fumbles and three pass interceptions marred the offensive games of the two teams. Cisco lost four fumbles and two pass interceptions while Eastland had five fumbles and lost the ball once on an interception.
Gene Wilson, sophomore quarterback who came in when Jerry McCullough was injured in the second quarter, was one of Eastland's big offense guns, assisted by John Moylan and James Fullen. For Cisco, Larry Hargrave was the top ground gainer with 102 yards in 19 times up.
Larry Pilgram, linebacker, was the top defensive Lobo, with Mark Gerrard close behind. To Tommy McCullough, Bill Boles and Moylan were outstanding on the defense for the Mavericks.

Cisco took the kickoff to open the game and promptly fumbled, Moylan recovering on the Lobo 38. On fourth down, Eastland kicked to the Cisco 14. Two plays later, QB Bobby Smith was trapped near the goal line and then punted out to his 44. On 3rd down, McCullough passed to Moylan on the Lobo 4, and Fullen plunged over to score. McCullough skirted left end for two more points.
Late in the second quarter, Gene Wilson intercepted a Bobby Smith pass and ran to the Cisco 30. Moylan got two and Fullen made three yards. Wilson took a 16-yard pass, and Moylan circled left for nine yards and a touchdown. Fullen's kick was blocked.

Cheerleaders Ask for Cheers - Here's How

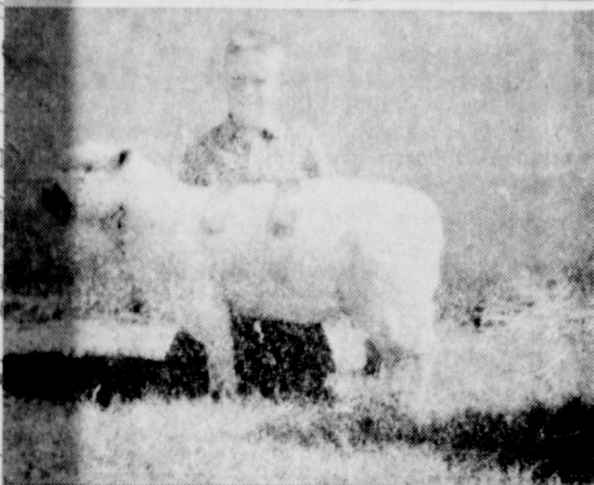

Convicts Take The Glory Out Of 'Easy Life' For Youngsters Of County

"Don't despise the simple things of life." That was the stern advice to Eastland County youngsters from inmates of the Texas state penitentiary during "Operation Teenager" in Eastland Friday morning. More than 2,000 public school and junior college students sat in wide-awake wide-eyed awe as three convicts told their own life stories and sounded warnings for those who sat free outdoors. Many of the teenagers wept openly as the tales of broken homes, broken hearts and broken lives were unfolded. The three anonymous inmates gave no outward sign of their hard, cruel lives as they appeared in their spotless, freshly-ironed white uniforms, looking for all the world like "the boy next door." Neither was over 21 years of age, but the total of their sentenced time amounts to 271 years, it was announced. On stage at the Majestic Theater they appeared as they do at what they now call their "home", only with numbers, no identity. No one told of coming from a large family and drifting into the wrong with a friend and the good feeling of having self respect.

The least important to us now are the things we used to think were the most important — fast cars, hot dates and high living."
