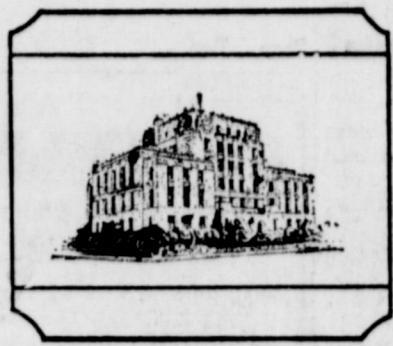

6,138 Books Read At Eastland Library in '65

Books read in 1965 by Eastland Library patrons numbered 6,138, according to the Library Committee of the Thursday Afternoon Club. A total of 4,357 of these books were read by juniors and teenagers, leaving 1,781, the number read by adults.

3 Cars Involved In Accident On Highway 6 North

An automobile accident, involving two cars and a pickup, occurred at 6:20 p. m. Wednesday, Jan. 12, about two miles north of Eastland on the Morton Valley road.

The three vehicles were a south-bound 1963 Chevrolet Sedan, driven by Francis Bond of Eastland; a 1962 Mercury Sedan, driven by Johnny Luttrell of Caddo; and a 1959 International pickup, driven by Curtis Warner of Eastland, both north-bound.

The Mercury received minor damages; the Chevrolet, heavy damages; and the pickup, no damage. Highway Patrolman Bob Rivers, who investigated, reported, Bond and Luttrell drove their autos into the borrow ditches to avoid what could have been a head-on collision, it was reported.

Bond sustained a broken rib.

INDICTMENT QUASHED IN ASSAULT TRIAL

The indictment naming a San Angelo Junior College student for aggravated assault with a motor vehicle was quashed in 91st District Court Thursday by Judge Frank Sparks on a motion by the defendant.

The indictment resulted from an incident in February, 1965, in which Highway Patrolman E. M. Rogers was struck by an auto while directing traffic at the scene of an accident east of Ranger on U. S. 80.

The motion stated that the indictment, as drawn, did not specify an offense, and that "gross negligence" was alleged. Apparently a new "information" will be drafted, and the case is re-set for trial on Feb. 14.

Another case, charging a local man with forgery and passing of a forged document, was dismissed on a motion by the state, citing "insufficient evidence." Dismissal of the case apparently brought an end to the case which had seen three different indictments drawn. A civil suit depends on this same indictment.

The prospective jurors called for the Thursday session were notified not to appear, when it became apparent that the cases would not come to trial. Four criminal and three civil cases had been set for the day.

Another trial, one for killing deer at night, was passed and re-set for Feb. 14 also.

Work on Appeals Court Nearing Finish As First Session Is Held

Brighter days are surely ahead for officials in the 11th Court of Civil Appeals on the fifth floor of the courthouse.

THE NATIONAL JAYCEE STORY:

The world's largest young men's civic organization began because young Henry Giessenbier, in St. Louis, Mo. felt that young men should not have to wait until middle age to participate in civic affairs.

Giessenbier was struck by the thought young men should be organized for the purpose of performing civic service and developing leadership in themselves. He called a meeting of interested young men and 32 responded.

By 1916 the work of the new organization had attracted attention of many others. The Jaycees had promoted projects aimed at securing greater participation in government, a better relationship among agriculture, industry and labor, less juvenile delinquency and a host of other activities.

Word about their activities spread and inquiries began to pour in from all parts of the United States. In 1919 Giessenbier sent a call to all known groups asking them to St. Louis to form a national organization. Twenty-four cities responded and on January 21, 1920, the United States Jaycees came into existence.

The Jaycees have grown until the present membership exceeds 200,000 in 2,500 local clubs.
