# TV, 4-Way Stop, Paving Are City Commission Topics

Eastland City Commissioners asked for a definite report and the cable company's microwave application, discussed a serious traffic intersection and talked of selling city property to the hospital, among other matters at a regular meeting at City Hall Monday evening.

Mayor Frank Deaton presided and all were present except Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. Only guest was Roy Thackerson of Ranger, Southern Television Systems Corp. employee, who was asked by the commission to bring a definite report from company executive Glenn Scallorn concerning the status of the microwave permit. All commissioners reported having had complaints from citizens regarding reception.

Thackerson explained that unusual weather conditions hampered clear reception.

The City Fathers discussed placement of street lights in the new Valley View division and agreed to confer with Mr. Frank Sayre, Texas Electric Service Co. division manager, about the type to be used.

Commissioners again agreed not to lease for grazing, land at Eastland Lake because of the future possible need for such for industrial purposes.

City Manager Lewis Tiner reported that Mr. Pat Miller had called to his attention the need for different traffic control at the corner of S. Daugherty and Plummer Sts., where "yield" signs now exist on S. Daugherty St. All agreed that this is a serious problem and noted that there have been quite a few accidents there. Mr. Tiner was instructed to confer with the State Highway Department as to which is better for the particular location, a blinker light or a four-way stop. Commissioner Bill Hart asked if the hospital buys the city property across Daugherty from the hospital, if parking along the street could be stopped to help the bad traffic situation. Commissioner Koen volunteered that it would be an inconvenience for the older people — to park in a parking lot and walk the distance to the hospital.

Thackerson explained that engineering firms have checked the cable company's tower to determine if they are capable of holding the 9 by 4 feet dish used in micro-wave transmission, and to check the "line of sight" aspects. "It can't be too much longer," he said. The Eastland application to FCC was made in 1962 and the Cisco application in 1961.

Commissioner James Reid asked if Scallorn hadn't left the impression when he appeared before the commission in November, that the microwave system wouldn't be in by Christmas. "What channels will it get?" Reid asked.

"4, 8, 11" he replied.

Mayor Deaton asked the visitor to contact Scallorn in Del Rio and find out whether the permit has been granted or not. Most complaints he's received, Mr. Deaton said, were from women who have difficulty watching "As The World Turns," a mid-day continued story.

Thackerson said he would find out about the permit.

During a discussion at the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday noon, Eastland Southern TV Service Man Kelly Coats said that the permit has been okayed. (The microwave facility reportedly will improve reception.)

Commissioner Koen reported the following:

Improper trash pick-up by city crews; poor television antenna service; that the Olden group has received their FHA insured water supply district loan of \$85,000; and asked if the city is going to make a deal on the property with the hospital board.

(The property is that owned by the city west of the hospital and consisting of a shop, a vacant house, property and the site of the old city hall.)

After a brief discussion of a possible price, the group decided it would be best to have the hospital board, or representative.

representatives, meet with the commission to work out details.

# County Sheep Will Be Checked For 'Scabies'

The Texas Animal Health Commission in cooperation with the USDA Agricultural Research Service is presently engaged in a statewide "scabies" inspection of all flocks of sheep within the state. Bill McCutchen, the assistant county agent, reports that Don Boaz with the Texas Animal Health Commission is in the county and is to begin inspections in the next few days. Farmers and ranchers will be contacted individually as to the time their flocks will be inspected.

The main reason for the inspection is to lessen the restrictions on transporting sheep from Texas to other states. California restrictions require sheep from Texas to be dipped twice from 10-14 days apart before being shipped. Other states have similar requirements. When

Texas sheep are scabies-free this should greatly facilitate shipment to other states. The Texas Animal Health Commission intends to inspect all of the flocks of sheep in Eastland County. If the sheep can be seen in the pasture they will not need to be penned as they can be inspected visually in most cases. If scabies are suspected after a visual check, they will need to be examined closely.

Sheep scabies, sometimes called scab or mange, is a contagious skin disease. It is caused by tiny mites that pierce the skin of sheep to feed, scabs, which give the disease its name form on the wounds. Infested sheep rub, bite and scratch themselves to relieve intense itching, and they lose wool from the affected areas. Untreated sheep may die after prolonged infection.

## NEXT CJC NURSING COURSE WILL START IN FEBRUARY

Those wishing to enter a nursing career now have the opportunity to apply for enrollment in the vocational nursing course at Cisco Junior College.

The next year-long nursing course, which prepares enrollees for licensed vocational nurses, will begin in February. The course last 52 weeks. The first 20 weeks, the pre-clinical period, is spent primarily in classroom study and work in the nursing arts laboratory plus short periods of hospital experience. During the last 32 weeks, the clinical period, students gain experience in the affiliating hospitals with four hours a week of classroom instruction. Affiliating hospitals pay a monthly stipend, starting at \$10 and increasing to \$60.

To be eligible for enrolling, an applicant must be between 18 and 55 years of age; have at least two years of high school education or the equivalent; and be in good physical and mental health.

Tuition costs \$120, payable \$10 per month if desired. The student buys uniforms (approximately \$30), books (about \$20), name pin, bandage scissors, nurses hose and watch. Total estimated cost for the course is \$295.

Application may be made to the administrators of affiliating hospitals, which are: Eastland Memorial, Ranger General, Graham of Cisco; and Shackelford County Memorial in Albany. Application may also be made to the course instructor, Mrs. Veneta Mitchell, who will be at CJC on Fridays and at her home after 4:30 p.m. Her home phone number is H12-1449.

# ELECTRIC CO-OP HAS MADE SECOND REFUND

The Comanche County Electric Cooperative recently made its second refund of Capital Credits to members and former members who received electric service during the years 1944, 1945 and 1946.

Manager W. J. Parks said, "We are very pleased to be able to make these refunds be-

cause this fulfills the Cooperative's obligation to truly furnish electric service at cost. It is necessary to retain the margins long enough to maintain a reasonable reserve fund against emergencies and to build a good member's equity in the Cooperative. The Cooperative now does have

these necessary funds and the Board of Directors and management are most happy that we can make these refunds." Each year the amount of money left over after all expenses of operation have been met is allocated to the members in proportion to their total bill. This money which is left over is not called a "profit" because it does not belong to the cooperative—it belongs to the members. For this reason, it is called the "margin" and is shown as be-

longing to the member in the ledger accounts of the Co-op. This year's refund of \$37,000 was mailed to the members in time for Christmas and gave an added boost to the economy of the entire area. There were over 3,000 individual checks and the amount represented 15 per cent of the total electric bills paid during the period 1944 through 1946.

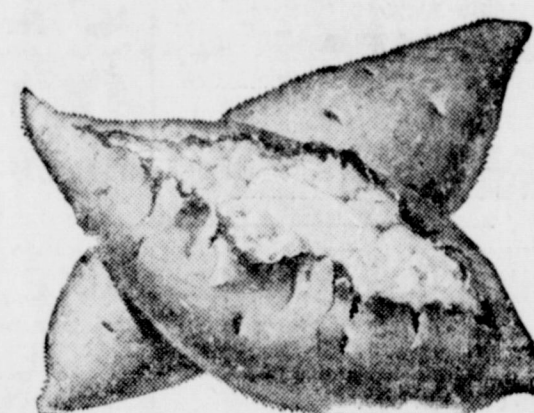

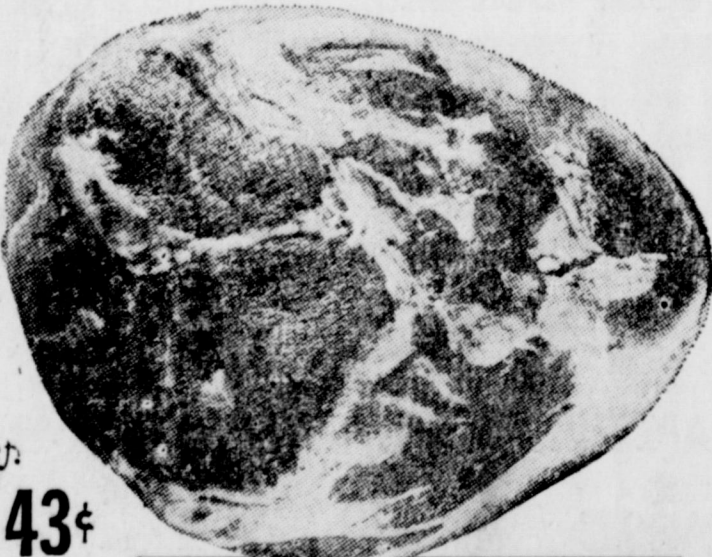
