






## Mr. Bell liked to make things better ...

After Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone in 1876, he did not est on his laurels. He helped form the National Geographic Society, leveloped the basic method of making phonograph records on wax discs and pioneered a method of locating icebergs by detecting echoes from them. Ie made suggestions and contributions that helped give us air conditioning ind the iron lung. For 46 years after inventing the telephone, he lived a rigorous and creative life.
