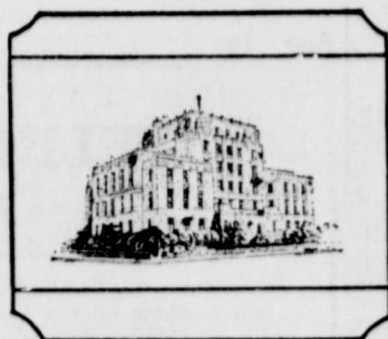

Births Exceed Deaths-- Summer Best for Stork

 During the past two years,
 1964 and 1965, births in East-
 land have out - numbered
 deaths each year by about 20,
 according to the files at City
 Hall.

In 1964, there were 102 ba-
 bies born in Eastland and
 that number was reached and
 exceeded in 1965 by three
 births, making a total of 105
 births for the year.

More babies (15) were born
 in July of '64 than any other
 month of that year; whereas
 in '65, the busy month for
 mothers and new babies was
 June and July, each month
 bringing 11 new equally wel-
 comed cries to the town.

The total of births, month by
 month, for 1964 was as fol-
 lows: Jan., 6; Feb., 3;
 March, 11; April, 4; May, 11;
 June, 10; July, 15; Aug. 8;
 Sept., 10; Oct., 11; Nov. 5;
 and Dec. 8.

In 1965, the number of new

babies, month by month, was
 as follows: Jan., 10; Feb., 7;
 March, 5; April, 6; May, 10;
 June, 11; July, 11; Aug., 10;
 Sept., 8; Oct., 9; Nov., 10;
 and Dec., 8.

Deaths in 1964 totaled 89;
 and in 1965, 88. There were
 no deaths in June of '65 and
 only one death during August
 of '64. More deaths (13) oc-
 curred during November of
 1964 than any other month;
 and in 1965, 12 persons died
 during October.

The number of deaths,
 month by month, in 1964 were
 recorded as follows: Jan., 7;
 Feb., 12; March, 8; April, 4;
 May, 9; June, 4; July, 8;
 Aug., 1; Sept., 6; Oct. 7;
 Nov., 13; and Dec. 10.

Last year (1965) the num-
 ber of deaths in Jan. was 9;
 Feb., 10; March, 8; April, 9;
 May, 4; June, none; July, 7;
 Aug., 8; Sept., 5; Oct. 12;
 Nov., 7; and Dec., 9.

4 1/2 Inches Snow Tops Winter Weather Week

Street, Charter, Sewer, Airport Study Groups Set By Commission

Long - range looks into the
 future needs of the City of
 Eastland are being taken right
 now.

Four special study groups,
 including business and pro-
 fessional men as well as city
 officials, have been named by
 Mayor Frank Deaton and
 Mayor Pro Tem James Reid.
 The four major study areas
 and their organization are:

Streets — H. T. Wilson,
 chairman; Frank Crowell, M.
 H. Perry, and Commissioner
 Bill Hart.

City Charter — Virgil Sea-
 berry Jr., chairman; Tru-
 man Brown, Marcus O'Dell,
 Don Vieregiver, and Commis-
 sioner Dr. M. A. Treadwell
 Jr.

Sewer — Bob Perkins,
 chairman; Milton Fullen, Clint
 Bray, and Commissioner Cur-
 tis Koen.

Airport — Dr. Bob Alexan-
 der, chairman; Jack Arring-
 ton, Jay Staggs, and Com-
 missioner James Reid.

Mayor Deaton, who will be
 over-all chairman, said in an-
 nouncing the special study
 groups:

"Eastland is going to be free
 of bonded indebtedness in the
 next two years and will have
 this money available to spend
 for a better Eastland."

First mention of the organ-
 ization of the study groups
 came at a recent chamber of
 commerce "free - think"
 meeting, during which citi-
 zens pooled their gripes and
 hopes for the city. At that
 meeting Mayor Deaton an-
 nounced that preliminary
 work was being done to for-
 mulate the study panels.

The individual groups will
 function separately, doing re-
 search, taking opinions, and
 collecting data, so as to be
 able to make concrete sug-
 gestions and recommendations
 to the City Commission, prob-
 ably within about 90 days.

Allen Murder Trial Gets Underway Monday

Chances for an early jury
 selection in the Ivan J. Al-
 len murder trial which gets
 underway Monday in 91st Dis-
 trict Court is considered
 slight.

Approximately 25 persons
 have already been excused
 from the 150-name special ve-
 nuer list, Presiding Judge
 J. Frank Sparks reports, and
 it was expected that several
 others would ask to be excus-
 ed before Monday morning.

District Attorney Perry T.
 Brown has filed notice of
 qualifying jurors on the
 death penalty, which will fur-
 ther reduce the number of
 prospects, it is reported. (The
 death penalty provision auto-
 matically permits both de-
 fense and prosecution to in-
 crease their number of chal-
 lenges from ten to 15.)

Mr. Allen, 70, is under
 grand jury indictment for
 murder with malice in the
 Nov. 14 fatal shooting of
 his nephew, Dr. Albert F. Reidel Jr., 37,
 on the Allen ranch south of
 Ranger.

Shirley Sue Harvick, 30,
 who is also under indictment
 for murder with malice in the
 Nov. 14 fatal shooting of
 her husband, was originally
 scheduled to go on trial
 Monday, Jan. 24, but the
 trial has been postponed until
 Feb. 21, it is reported, indica-
 ting that another special ve-
 nuer list will be necessary.

Eastland Attorney's Virgil
 T. Seaberry Jr. and Bill B.
 Hart have reported that they
 are ready to go to trial.

 ter, Mrs. Eura Martin of Dal-
 las four brothers, L. E. Lan-
 caster, J. H. Lancaster and
 Frank Lancaster, all of Cisco,

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211,548 deer are Shot in Season Ending Dec. 31

AUSTIN — The 1965 Texas big game hunting season just ended produced an estimated 211,548 deer and 12,852 wild turkey for sportsmen, according to preliminary figures based on field reports by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel.

It was emphasized that the totals are not final and serve only to provide "an early estimate of the kill." The official totals will not be available until the shooting preserve records are compiled later this year. These are based on the approximately 9,000 reports made by land owners, land renters and others who operate hunting facilities throughout the state and who charge for hunting privileges.

Under the law, these records are required to be turned over to the department by May 1 each year. The books, designed for itemizing harvest results, are meticulously kept by conservationists eager to cooperate under the state's game management program, said a Department spokesman.

The records not only cover deer, turkey, antelope, javelina, and exotic species but small game, such as doves and quail, and also waterfowl, primarily ducks and geese.

Wildlife biologists termed the tentative harvest totals "conservative," particularly as applied to deer. Biologists and game wardens who cooperated in checking out the overall bag agreed the season was one of the best in modern times.

But management experts said the harvest made only a small dent in the enormous deer population, estimated to exceed 2,250,000 and added that only the most favorable weather and range conditions would avert a sizeable dieoff in some areas between now and next fall's shoot.

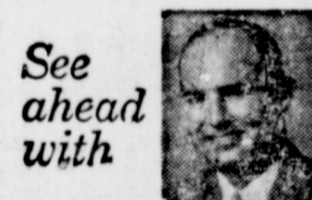

animals which are bred and raised in Texas and the western states to keep the producer broke and the buyer crazy.

Livestock are born in the spring, mortgaged in the summer, pastured in the fall — and given away in the winter. These animals vary in size, in color and in weight, and the man who can guess nearest to the weight and grade is called a "livestock buyer" by the public, a "robber" by the producer, and a "poor business man" by his banker.

The price of livestock, determined at more than 2,000 markets over the nation, including our own local livestock auction, goes up after you have sold or down after you have bought. A buyer for a California packer was sent to Eastland County to analyze the livestock market. After a few days close observation and very careful deliberation, he wired his office: "Some say the market will go up. Some say it will go down. I say the same. Whatever you do will be wrong. So, act at once!"

When you have light cattle, the buyers want 'em heavy. When you get some heifers when you get some steers finished they want heifers. When they're thin, they should be fat, and when the steers are fat, the buyer tells you the market on tallow is shot to pieces. And your market man says: "You shoulda been here last week!"

No Poll Tax Means No Influence On Decision

(Reprinted from the January issue of THE TEXAS OUTLOOK, official publication of the Texas State Teachers Association.)

NEITHER the law man nor the bad man of the early West felt safe without his gun. Even with his "shooting iron," he could not fight with his gun hand tied behind him.

Citizens are in a similar position if they don't qualify to vote in 1966—or any year. Times have changed. We've substituted ballots for bullets. The vote is our weapon. But

unless a citizen uses his vote, he is in the position either of being without a gun or of tying his gun hand behind him, or both.

In our form of government, a citizen who doesn't vote is almost helpless to fight for or against anything which affects him—and that includes just about everything.

Some folks don't like the poll tax. At this point, however, it is not a question of whether we like the poll tax. This is simply the only avenue to the voting booth in all except federal elections.

Congress has instructed the U. S. Department of Justice to file lawsuits against Texas and other states which have the poll tax, in an attempt to abolish it as a qualification for voting. Whether they succeed is problematical. But the three federal judges trying the Texas case have made it clear that no decision will be made before January 31, the deadline for poll tax payment. They have urged Texans to go ahead and qualify to vote in the usual way for 1966.

To neglect (a) to qualify to vote, or (b) to vote, is to commit ourselves to second-class citizenship. It means that we are willing to let

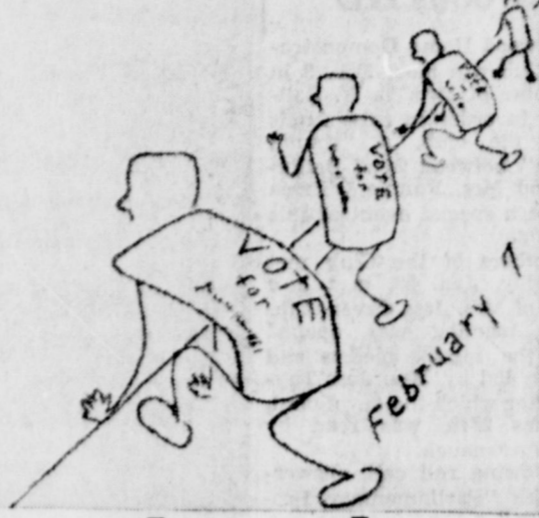
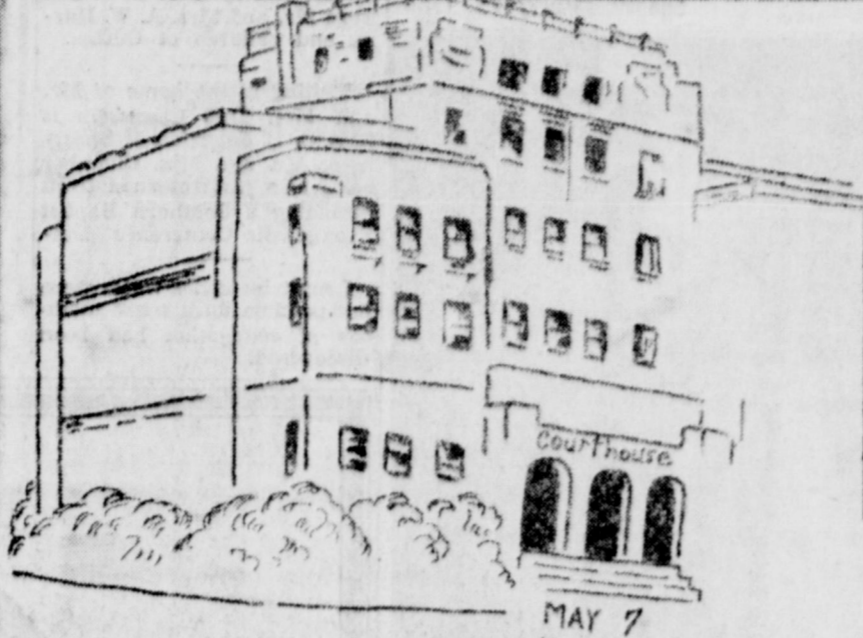

In reporting this today, William J. Driver, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, said some 4,606,000 veterans are eligible to receive the dividend payments, which will be made throughout the year on the anniversary dates of the individual policies.

Although the amounts due individual veterans will vary considerably depending on the veteran's age, the amount and type of insurance in force and other factors, the amount to be paid in 1966 averages out at \$47.50 for World War II policyholders and at \$73.75 for World War I policy holders.

Of the total dividend, Mr. Driver said, \$209,000,000 will be paid to 4,400,000 veterans of World War II who hold National Service Life Insurance policies, and the remaining \$15,200,000 will be shared by 206,000 World War I veterans who have U. S. Government Life Insurance policies.

Korean Conflict veterans hold low-cost, non-participating type policies that do not provide for payment of regular annual dividends. The dividends represent primarily a return to the policyholders of part of their premium payments since the death rate of insured veterans continues to be lower than the mortality rate upon which premium payments are based by law.

The Veterans Administration head said the payments would be made automatically on monthly anniversary dates, and that no application is required.
