County's Qualified Voters For '66 Total About 6,000

Approximately 6,000 people are going to be making some important decisions in Eastland County during 1966.

That many are believed to be legally qualified voters, and as such, will by their marks on ballots decide the fate of office seekers and outcomes of issues.

A total of 3,562 poll taxes were paid before the Jan. 31 deadline, and reliable estimates are that there are from 3,000 to 3,500 over-age exempt persons in the county — bringing the total eligible to vote somewhere in the 6,000 neighborhood.

(Poll tax figures are for the previous year, i.e. 1965 poll tax qualify one to vote in 1966.)

The present figures are above 1964's 2,915; but below other recent poll tax election years.

The 1961 totals, the one that qualified voters for the most comparative to this year elections, were 4,185, indicating that there might be less enthusiasm this year, than for the same elections four years ago.

The 1963 total, which set the stage for 1964 voting, for the county was 4,257. Poll tax sales in 1962 were 3,962 and 2,915 in 1964. Both preceded what is generally termed "off" election years, and therefore would be lighter.

The State Department of Public Welfare reports 1,334 over-age persons on their rolls in Eastland County.

Heavy sales of poll taxes were reported for January with the courthouse tax office recording 1,321 during January and 1,736 for the entire tax period, from Oct. 1.

Sub-station poll tax sales are as follows, according to Edgar Altom, tax collector:

Gorman, 308; Rising Star, 198; Cisco, 810; and Ranger, 510.

Monday, Feb. 7, is deadline for filing for the May 7 Democratic Primary it is reported, and that fact points out that there is still time for candidates to give notice of their intention of running this year for office.

In the 1962 election, 5,331 voters went to the polls in the first primary and 5,250 made it to the runoff.

In 1961 2,110 paid poll taxes at the county tax office; 970 at the Cisco sub-station; 578 in Ranger; 438 in Gorman and 89 in Rising Star.

Poll tax sales were spurred by various groups and individuals throughout the county with Jaycees clubs in Eastland, Ranger and Cisco conducting active campaigns, which included posting of signs, and the painting of sidewalk signs to remind citizens of the importance of becoming qualified voters.

The various newspapers in the county also encouraged poll tax purchases.

Third Cold Spell Hits, Dips Mercury Again

Old Man Winter took a third swing at this area this week as another Arctic front moved through early Tuesday, dropping temperatures to 22 and whipping up a sizeable dust storm.

Moisture was forecast for Tuesday night and Wednesday, indicating that for the third week in a row, the county might be cloaked in snow and ice.

High temperature Tuesday

was in the mid-30s and the teens were seen for nighttime as predictors took another stab at keeping up with the West Texas weather.

The groundhog (did) (did not) see his shadow Wednesday morning — MARK ONE, depending on whether you think there are ground hogs in Eastland County, and whether you think the rodent's sight of his shadow determines the weather for the next six weeks.

Farmers and ranchers are agreed that the cold weather is doing nothing but good for the grass and crop lands, late though it was.

Winter didn't come until January, and total moisture for the month just ended amounted to 1.29 inches, with seven inches of snow, according to Official Weather Observer James Smith.

Low temperature during January was four degrees on the 23rd, and the low temperature was below freezing on 26 different days during the month. High for the month was 70 — on the first day.

County's Welfare Recipients Receiving \$86,893 Monthly

13 Employees Administer Plans

Eastland County recipients of payments from the Texas Department of Public Welfare receive a total of \$86,893 per month, according to Mr. Leo Thames, supervisor of Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

There are 13 employees of the Texas Dept. of Public Welfare in Eastland County and their salary range depends on Merit System classification. The Local Public Assistant

offices have four public assistant workers who visit in homes, and two workers going into two surrounding counties, working on the following adult category cases: Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind and Aid to Permanently and Totally Disabled. These workers are Mrs. Lola Rogers, Mrs. Vivian Aikens, Miss Elsie Glenn and Mrs. Frances Walters. Mrs. Margaret Corbell works with Aid to Families with Dependent Children.

Other employees in the local offices are Mrs. Jeanette Bell and Mrs. Mary Rowch, both secretaries, and the following: Mr. Charles Butler, adult unit supervisor, and his secretary, Mrs. Helen Reneau;

Mr. Thames and his secretary, Mrs. Marleece Kendrick.

Mr. D. E. Frazer, regional director who directs 21 counties, and his secretary, Mrs. JoAnn Greenwood.

There are some 100 employees in this region assignment of the Texas Dept. of Public Welfare. Regions are based upon Public Assistance population (same as worker assignments). There are 20 other regions in the state.

A total of 1,334 Old Age Assistance payments, for a total of \$80,799, are made to persons in this county each recipient averaging \$60.57 a month.

SHEEP FLOCK INSPECTION BEGINS THURSDAY IN COUNTY

Bill McCutchen, Assistant Agent, has announced that the Texas Animal Health Commission assisted the Animal Health Division of the United States Department of Agriculture will inspect all sheep flocks in Eastland County, Thursday, Feb. 4, 1966. All inspections

are under the supervision of Dr. James B. Henderson, area veterinarian, and will be conducted in Eastland County by Don Boaz, and Douglas Fry. As a result of two outbreaks of sheep scabies within the last year other states have imposed dipping requirements that hamper the marketing of Texas sheep. Relinquishing of these requirements will be considered upon an inspection of all flocks without evidence of scabies being found. Industry cooperation is needed so that the necessary inspections may be conducted in an organized manner with a minimum of inconvenience to the sheep producer.

The County Chairman of the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and the Agricultural Extensive Service through the local County Agent are assisting in the cooperative effort.

What happens to the bacteria count when homemakers launder with cold water detergents?

Many inquiries have been received along this line, and to answer these inquiries the U.S. Department of Agriculture began new tests with actual family washes.

This was done as part of long range research on survival of bacteria in home laundering, using both hot and cold water. Earlier studies

indicated that large numbers of bacteria survive laundering with both hot and cold water.

In recent tests with cold water detergent, comparisons were made with and without disinfectants. The same concentration of disinfectants were used with cold water which proved effective with hot water.

With no disinfectant, far more bacteria survived in cold water than in hot water

washes. When scientists added the appropriate amount of chlorine in the wash cycle, or quaternary disinfectants in the rinse, bacteria count was cut to 4 or less per square inch of fabrics at the end of the spin-dry-cycle — regardless of the water temperature.

When laundry was washed in cold water with a cold water detergent, on the other hand, the addition of phenolic or pine oil disinfectants in the wash cycle was relatively ineffective in reducing the bacteria level.

Water temperatures ranged from 57 to 64 degrees Fahrenheit during cold water laundering and 122 to 140 degrees Fahrenheit during hot water laundering.

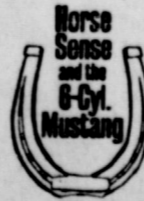
