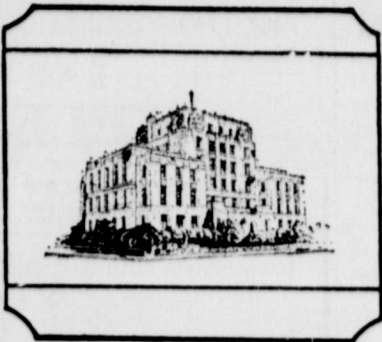

Auto Crashes Into Home -- Heavy Damage

A run-away auto crashed into the E. O. Moore home at 1208 S. Seaman St. late Sunday night, resulting in a clipped highline pole, extensive damages to the house, furnishing and to the auto, as well as injuries and a DWI charge to the driver. The 68-year-old Clyde man was taken to Eastland Memorial Hospital after the 11 p.m. crash, where he was treated and released, and taken on to the County Jail. Charges of driving while intoxicated were filed in Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's court by City Patrolmen Neal Seabourn and Jack Greiger, who investigated the incident. The man's 1965 Rambler American was attempting to turn onto S. Seaman St. from Highway 6, when the vehicle went out of control, completely severed a highline pole, and crashed into the south side of the house. Mr. Moore said that exterior damage would amount to quite a bit and interior damage, which included breakage of a new television set, dishes and lamps, would be several hundred dollars. The man posted \$500 bond Monday and was released from the county jail. There were no apparent injuries to members of the Moore family, but the crash caused quite a bit of concern and lighted up the neighborhood, it was reported.

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Only Four Contested Races Loom For County's Voters

Organization of the county commissioners court, the district's Austin representative, and a Cisco justice of the peace are decisions to be made by some or all of Eastland County voters in the May 7 Democratic Primary. Incumbent Scott Bailey is being contested for his county judge post by John Hart. Gorman precinct voters will decide between Incumbent Glenn Justice and Dick Foster for the commissioner post from that precinct. Cisco precinct voters will choose between Incumbent C. B. (Kunt) Dill and Charles Pence for commissioner from that precinct. This county has two candidates in the state representative race in Saul Pullman of Eastland and Morris Newham of Ranger. Others in the race are John Musselman Jr. of Albany and Burke Musgrove of Breckenridge. In Cisco A. A. Hutton is opposing Incumbent W. L. Lewis for the Cisco Justice of the Peace office. Eastland County voters will also vote in the Congressional race which pits Incumbent Omar Burleson and Elden Mahon of Abilene. This county's state senator, Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells, also drew opponent Vernon Smith. Cisco Begins Peanut Dryer Work Plans

(From the Cisco Press) A survey committee began work today on plans to build a peanut drying plant and storage warehouse for this region after local farm and civic leaders agreed Monday night that the project was needed and possible. The group met at the Chamber of Commerce offices. The survey committee was named as follows: Douglas Fry, chairman, J. P. McCracken, Sam Kimmell, Gene Abbott, J. R. Recker, Don Schaefer, Ken Bostick, Troy Lamb and Oscar Schaefer. Jim Smothers, manager of the CofC, was named secretary of the committee. The project definitely will include a 20-unit drying plant for peanuts and a large storage warehouse. Mr. Smothers said. It also was decided that it would be built in Cisco. The survey group plans to meet again next Monday night to decide whether the project will include a peanut shelling plant, the definite site, and whether to form a cooperative or a corporation to own and operate the plant. Mr. Smothers said they also would invite machinery manufacturers to attend the meeting to help determine the investment size. It will exceed \$100,000, he added. A representative of the Farm Home Administration, which will be asked to help with financing, will also be invited to the meeting to outline plans for setting up the organization and applying for a loan, Mr. Smothers said. "Workers are enthusiastic about the outlook and the need for a peanut plant," Mr. Smothers said. "They are convinced that it will provide a service that our planters desire. We of the Chamber of Commerce are doing everything we can to assist with the progress of the project."



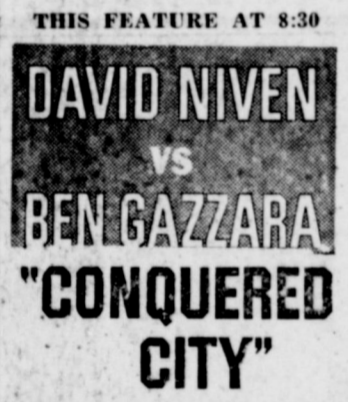

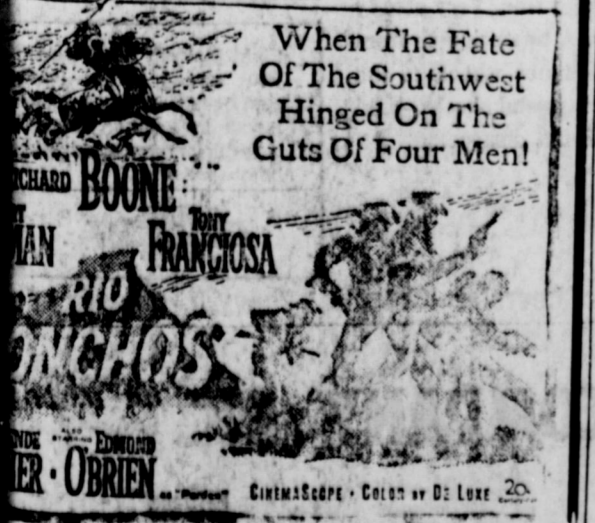

Senator Tower graduated from Beaumont High School in 1942 and then served three years aboard a Navy gunboat in Asian waters. He received a B.A. degree in Political Science from Southwestern University, Georgetown, Tex., in 1948; worked for a time as a radio announcer and insurance salesman; then in 1953 received an M.A. degree in Political Science from Southern Methodist University in Dallas. He did post-graduate work in 1952 and 1953 at the University of London in Great Britain. In 1951 he joined the faculty of Midwestern University in Wichita Falls, where he taught until June 1960 and where the Tower family now maintains their home.

benefits and have not signed up for Medicare, now is the time for action," according to R. R. Tuley, Jr., Social Security district manager in Abilene.
Almost every older person in the Nation is eligible for health insurance under the new law passed by Congress last year, Tuley said.
Tuley said that health insurance benefits begin next July. "I cannot overemphasize the importance of prompt action by all those who are eligible," he said.

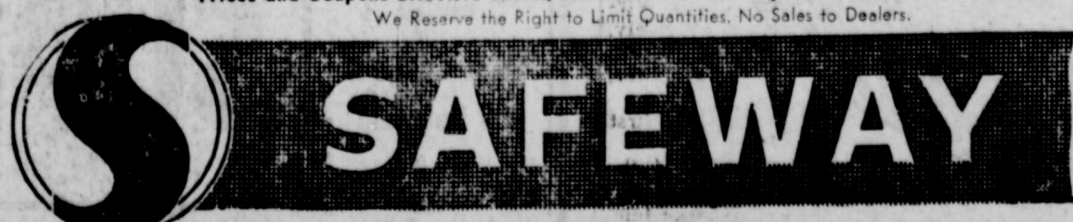

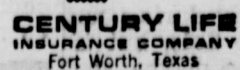

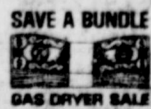
