World Day of Prayer Will Be Observed Here

The World Day of Prayer in Eastland will be held on Friday, Feb. 25, at 10 a. m. in the First Presbyterian Church, according to Rev. Eugene H. Surface, pastor of the church.

Observed each year on the first Friday in Lent, the World Day of Prayer is sponsored by United Church Women of the National Council of Churches. It has a meaningful history of almost 80 years. Prayer and giving for the world - wide mission of the church have its primary purposes.

World Day of Prayer is truly world-wide in character. Basically the same service is used by groups in approximately 125 countries and areas of the world, Rev. Surface stated. This provides an extraordinary opportunity for fellowship at a deep level and the experience of Christian unity in prayer with Christians all over the world.

World Day of Prayer observance has the following five elements: an awareness of and a commitment to the reality and power of prayer; a concern for the need of all peoples for the message of the Christian Gospel; openness, a service open to all, without denominational, racial, national or cultural distinctions; the use of the same theme and service as the basis for planning and observing the day everywhere in the world; and offerings for the united outreach of the church.

The World Day of Prayer began with the vision and dedication of one woman. In the providence of God it has grown to involve millions of women around the world.

the newly erected stage at Bell Hurst.

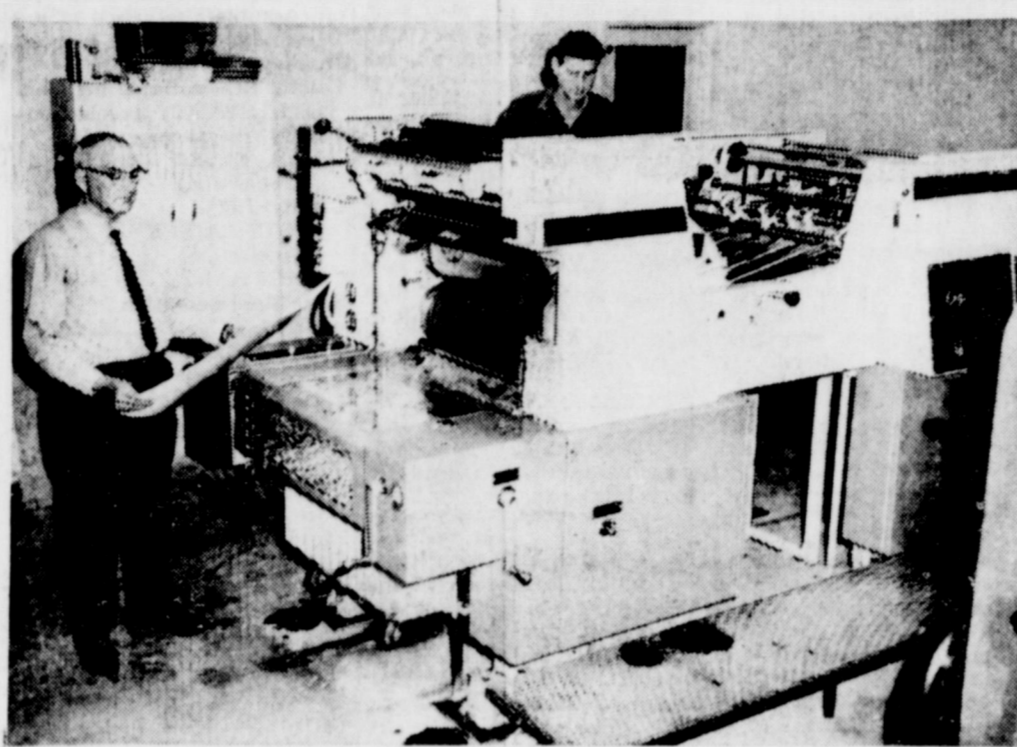

Irrigation Course Set Four Nights In County

A four-night irrigation short course will be held in DeLeon and Gorman Feb. 28 - March 4, according to Eastland County Assistant Agent Bill McCutchen.

The first two nights of the course, Monday and Tuesday, Feb. 28 - March 1, will be held at the agriculture building in DeLeon; and Thursday and Friday March 3 and 4, at the high school auditorium in Gorman. Each meeting will begin at 7:30 p. m.

Carroll Wayne Keese, irrigation specialist with Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be principal speaker. His program will include irrigation management and other problems.

A native of Bandera County, Keese is a graduate of Bandera High School and Texas A&M College, having both Bachelor and Master degrees from A&M in agricultural engineering.

He was reared on a ranch and for five years was an

outstanding 4-H Club member. From August 1952, until August 1954, he was a member of the United States Air Force. He held the rank of First Lieutenant when discharged.

In his present position, Keese works closely with county agents of Texas on programs and problems related to irrigation, including soil and water engineering.

This short course was initiated because of the tremendous boom in irrigation in Eastland and Comanche Counties. It is hoped that it will help many people "get on the right track" with their irrigation projects.

"Irrigation of peanuts and other crops will probably be one of the best shots in the arm to the overall economy that this area has had in years," states McCutchen.

Floyd Key, Comanche County Agent, and Bill McCutchen wish to encourage everyone interested in irrigation to participate in the short course.

FFA Week Now Underway Here

Vocational agriculture students in Eastland High School will join Future Farmers of America members throughout the nation in activities to focus attention on the importance of agriculture during National FFA Week, Feb. 19-26.

"Agriculture is More Than Farming" is this year's FFA Week theme. The boys will undertake a campaign to inform the general public about the importance of the agriculture industry to America, the growing need for farming, and of the numerous and wide variety of opportunities that exist in the broad field of agriculture for young men who have a background of farm experience and training.

"We have such an abundance of food in America that people are taking farmers for granted," said Winiford Parr, vocational agriculture teacher and FFA advisor. "Actually, farming is now and always has been our largest and most vital industry, and it is becoming increasingly important with our expanding population," he continued.

Membership in the FFA is made up of students of vocational agriculture in high school. The organization's activities are designed to help develop leadership and good citizenship, and to stimulate the students to better achievement in their study and work toward successful establishment in farming or other agriculture occupations.

The Eastland FFA Chapter has 46 members. Officers are: President — Jimmy Jordan; Vice president — Steve Perdue; Secretary — Sam Beggs;

Treasurer — Bryan Garner; Reporter — Larry Robertson; Sentinel — Phil Hunt.

The national Future Farmers organization has approximately 450,000 members, with 9,000 chapters in the 50 states and Puerto Rico.

Future Farmers choose the week of George Washington's birthday each year for the observance of National FFA Week. Although usually recognized as a Revolutionary War General and our first President, Washington's first love was the farm. He was one of the first in the nation to practice contour planting, crop rotations, fertilization, and other soil conservation and improvement methods.

College's Building Loan Is Increased; Work Will Start

The U. S. Public Housing Agency has approved a \$40,000 increase in the loan to Cisco Junior College for use in constructing a new men's dormitory and a student union building, according to word here Friday from Congressman Omar Burlison.
"This increase plus \$330,000 loan in August, 1964, and an earlier increase of \$70,000 brings the total financial assistance to \$440,000 for a new brick dormitory and a student union building," the telegram said.
The Cisco Junior College board recently awarded a contract to B & W Construction Co. for the two buildings. The supplementary loan was asked to permit erecting the structures without omitting alternate items.
The architect for the two buildings was in town Friday for conferences with Acting President Leland Willis, Dr. H. C. Brown of the board of regents and others. He was working on a fine arts building, which is due for bidding soon, as well as the dormitory and student union.
Mr. Willis said the contractor was due to have his construction superintendent in town Monday. The FHA was expected to issue a work order this weekend for construction work to begin immediately.
The board of regents held a brief meeting late Thursday on details on the project in order to speed issuance of the work order, Mr. Willis reported. The college hopes to have the buildings ready for use next Sept. 1.

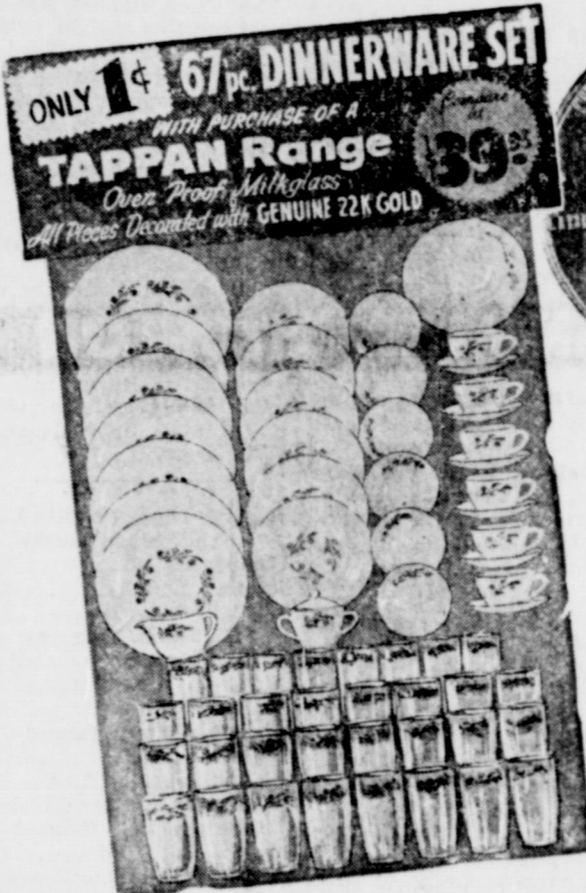
