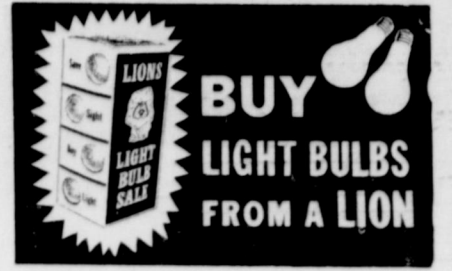

**Job Vacancies To Be Filled By Safety Agency**

AUSTIN — Career employment in the ranks of the Texas Department of Public Safety uniformed services is currently being offered young men between the ages of 21 and 35, it was announced today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director.

"More than 100 of these positions of trust and public service will soon be open for qualified men," Garrison said. "They include opportunities for advanced education, excellent physical conditioning and a permanent career of serving mankind."

There are four branches of service for which men are directly recruited — Highway Patrol, License and Weight, Motor Vehicle Inspection, and Driver Licensing. Trainees are assigned to the service for which they are best suited. Upon graduation from the 16-week training program at the modern DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, the trainee is commissioned into one of these services. At the academy, he will receive a salary while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms, and many others.

Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more holidays each year; 12 days sick leave each year; \$10 per month longevity for each five years of service; modern liberal retirement privileges based on age and years of service; travel expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniforms and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Garrison urged interested men to get their applications in early. June 6 is the deadline for receipt of applications for the June 11 examination for the next training school opening August 9.

### Dept. of State Is Looking For Job Candidates

Department of State Recruiting Officer will be in the Dallas-Fort Worth area beginning February 14. They are looking for qualified young people for positions in American Embassies and Consulates in some 300 cities, from Adelaide to Zagreb. They are also looking for candidates for positions in the

"home" office in Washington, D. C. "These jobs must be filled by the best-qualified young people we can find," said one of the Recruiting Officers who has served at Foreign Service posts around the world. "Our standards are high, and we plan to keep them that way; but those fortunate enough to qualify will find a challenging, interesting career with an added 'bonus': the satisfaction which comes from serving one's country in a vital capacity," she added. Consideration for Foreign Service positions will be given to experienced secretaries who are single and have shorthand skill, and to communicative clerks with recent experience in cryptography or teletype. Applicants must be American citizens who are high school graduates at least 21 and able to pass qualifying tests. Salaries are from \$4,641 to \$5,190 per year.

### Naval Reserve Units Need 5 More Officers

**BROWNWOOD** — U.S. Naval Reserve Surface Division 8-40(S) in Brownwood has vacant pay billets for five Naval officers, according to an announcement by Lieut. Alton R. Goddard, commanding officer. The Division meets every Wednesday from 7:30 to 10:30 p. m. at the Navy building on Howard Payne College campus. Officers and men with billets in the unit receive a day's pay for each weekly drill they attend. Lieut. Goddard invited any Naval Reserve officer in ready or standby status to visit the Navy building any week day or Wednesday night to learn about the opportunities of the Reserve program. The Brownwood unit serves Reservists from throughout this West Central Texas region. Reservists are ordered to active duty for training once each year for a 14-day period.

They serve alternately at sea and shore stations and receive full allowances and regular pay during these assignments. Usually, the Reservist gets a choice of training duty. The Navy has a building and facilities worth more than \$100,000 and the Brownwood unit rates high among the Reserve organizations in the 8th Naval District and the nation, Lieut. Goddard said. The unit was organized soon after the end of World War II and has always been a part of the national ready reserve program. "We particularly need additional officers to help with the administration and training requirements of our unit," Mr. Goddard said. "We would be glad to see any Reserve Officer who thinks he might be interested in affiliating with us."

**New Provisions  
Of Safety Act  
Now In Effect**

AUSTIN — The Texas Department of Public Safety said today a new amendment to the Safety Responsibility Act clearly states that a person who willfully refuses to surrender within 10 days licenses suspended under the Act is subject to criminal charges carrying a penalty of up to a \$200 fine.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, explained that the amendment, effective January 1, 1966, was enacted by the last Legislature after an Attorney General's opinion held the "surrender provision" of the Act unconstitutional because it required the suspended licensee to surrender his license "immediately." The opinion held this wording was too indefinite.

Garrison said that with the new amendment now in effect, the following action is taken when a person becomes involved in an accident coming under the provisions of the Safety Responsibility Act and does not report liability insurance coverage:

1. An original notice is sent by first class mail requesting the person to deposit security or otherwise comply with the law.
2. After a period of some four weeks, if he has not complied, an order of suspension and demand for surrender of his driver's license and vehicle registration plates is sent by first mail.
3. After a reasonable period if the suspended items have not been surrendered, an order is sent out to file criminal charges against him, to obtain a warrant for his arrest, and to secure possession of the suspended licenses.

The DPS Director explained further that basically, the Safety Responsibility Act is designed to encourage motor-

ists to be financially able to pay damages in installments cover any damage they might do to others.

Under the law, the Department is required to suspend the driver licenses and all motor vehicle registration plates of both the operator and owner of vehicles involved in an accident coming under the SR law, unless:

1. Evidence of liability insurance coverage in the minimum amounts of \$10,000 where one person was injured or killed, \$20,000 where more than one, and \$5,000 for property damage is reported to the Department of Public Safety.
2. A release signed by damaged or injured persons is filed with the Department of Public Safety.
3. A signed agreement to pay damages in installments is accepted by the damaged or injured persons, and filed with the Department.
4. The operator and owner are found to be not liable in a civil suit for damages by a court of competent jurisdiction, and a copy of such findings is filed with the Department.
5. The operator and owner deposit with the Department cash or bond security in an amount sufficient to cover any judgment or damages resulting from the accident that might be obtained by damaged or injured persons, which in no case shall be less than \$200. In addition, the operator and owner must file proof of financial responsibility for the future and maintain it for five years.

**Peanuts Placed  
 On State List Of  
 Plentiful Foods**

COLLEGE STATION — March is blowing in a wave of plentiful foods, says Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Spotlighting the March plentiful list are peanuts and such products as peanut butter. This huge supply of peanuts is a result of the 1965 record production of 2,490 million pounds.

Other plentiful reported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture include potatoes, prunes and prune juice, fresh oranges, rice and eggs.

Irish potato stocks on Jan. 1 hovered near a record. These huge stocks, coupled with a big winter crop, are creating especially large supplies. Bake some in foil for your first spring cookout.

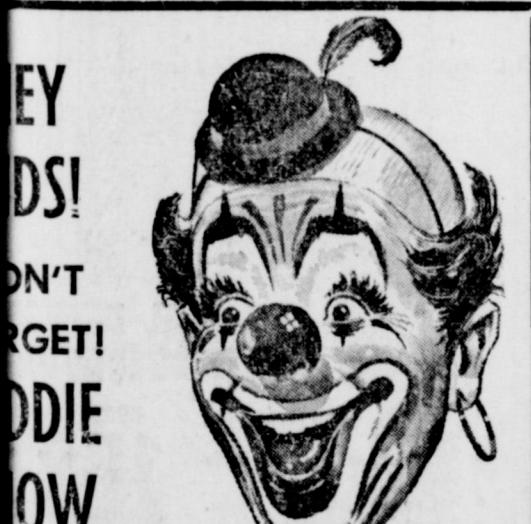
Prunes and prune juice also are available in large quantities a result of an above average California prune crop and a sizable carryover. Both prunes and prune juice can give that added spark to breakfast.

A very good quality orange crop is sending large supplies of these tasty fruits to markets, in spite of some freeze damage in Florida. Shipments are seasonally heavy.

The third week in March is National Rice Week — and 1966 has been declared International Rice year. Rice production has continued to set records, so look for big supplies this month.

The March, 1965, farm price of eggs was the lowest for the month since 1944 according to USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. Although egg production this March is expected to be below last year, retail prices should be attractive to shoppers. Be sure to include your favorite egg dishes on March menus.

## UPGRADING IS PLANNED FOR LONGHORN CAVERN

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission announced plans for a concession-financed renovation and construction program for converting famed Longhorn Cavern near Burnet from "just a scenic hole in the ground" to a facility worthy of its rating as the nation's third largest underground attraction.

The Commission awarded a projected 20-year contract to a group of Austin and Burnet, Texas, businessmen. The group would be committed, without cost or liability to the state, to immediately erect an all-purpose \$75,000 headquarters building, including a modern restaurant.

The original installations plus recurring property additions and refinements would revert to state ownership after twenty years and anytime during the interim should the operators default in any manner.

The proposal was signed by two Burnet men, James L. Luther and W. Glen Anthony and two Austin men, Ed J. St. John and Vic Mathias. The agreement stipulates that appropriate advertising, publicity and promotion of the area will be provided.

The elaborate project would mark the first substantial work on the giant subterranean area since the original improvements more than 30

years ago.

Plans call for a modern new surface installation and general overhaul of sub-surface fixtures to embellish the natural wonders. The Commission said construction work is expected to be timed so that the cavern site, ten miles from Burnet just off Highway 281, will be ready for the 1966 tourist season. The Commission noted that the historic area is on Park Road 4 leading to Inks Lake State Park, six miles away on a scenic drive connecting with Buchanan Dam and other Highland Lake showplaces.

Peak cavern attendance was 64,155 reached two years ago. Last year's total was 53,615. The Commission observed that the cavern, linked with

historic incidents dating back to pre-stone age times and used as a hiding place by both the Confederate Army and notorious outlaws, "is a much neglected asset of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and deserves a better rating than a mere hole in the ground." It added:

"When the extensive new construction and renovation has been completed, the cavern will provide one of the state's most fascinating and most beneficial recreational facilities."

Tales of unexplored depths and hidden treasure embellish the mystic tours along lighted walkways, past intriguing areas called the Queen's Throne, Cathedral Room, Chandelier Room, Jacob's Wall and Frozen Waterfall.

The cavern, rated only behind Carlsbad Cavern in New Mexico and Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, was formed an estimated 500 million years ago by a mighty earth movement that permanently sealed the hard granite formation. It has a constant year around temperature of 64 degrees.

General stability has enhanced the natural ruggedness and particularly the delicate effects from stalactites, stalagmites, calcite crystals and massive flowstone deposits. Potholes, solution domes, channels and pits constitute the more common erosional features.

Remains of prehistoric creatures have been found far underground but comparatively few types of plants and animals have been observed, beyond bats, cave crickets and algae. Flint and primitive tool definitely linked the stone-age man with this area.

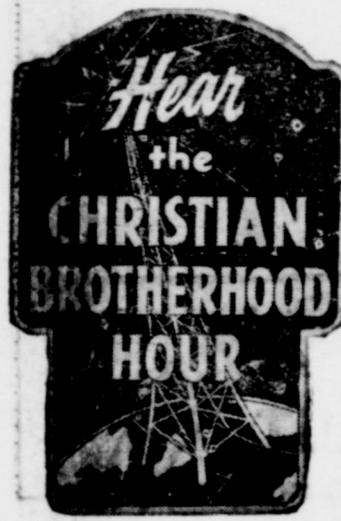

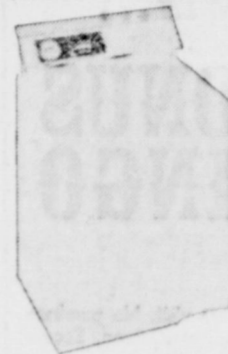

## GI LOANS FOR WWII VETS WILL TERMINATE IN 1967

WACO — World War II veterans have just a year and a half left to obtain GI guaranteed or insured loans, Jack Coker, manger of the Veter-  
ans Administration Regional Office in Waco, pointed out.  
Deadline for World War II eligibility is July 25, 1967, he said.  
Eligibility has been expiring for World War II veterans according to a formula that adds ten years to the date of their last discharge from active wartime service plus one year for each 90 days of that service. The date reached by this formula is the individual deadline date for each veteran.  
Thus eligibility has already expired for many World War II veterans but the July 25, 1967, deadline terminates the program for all of them, even through the formula would give a longer period of eligi-  
bility.  
Veterans who were dis-  
charged for a service-con-  
nected disability will be eligi-  
ble until the final termination  
date of July 25, 1967; this also  
applies to widows of veterans  
who died of service-connected  
disabilities.  
Those eligible may obtain a  
guaranteed loan to purchase  
a home, a farm or to buy or  
start a business.  
The formula for determin-  
ing the length of time Korean  
Conflict veterans will be eligi-  
ble for GI loans is the same  
as for World War II veterans.  
However, Korean Conflict en-  
titlement did not begin to ex-  
pire until Jan. 31, 1965, and  
the final deadline date is Jan.  
31, 1975, Coker said.  
Korean Conflict veter-  
ans discharged for service-  
connected disabilities and wi-  
dows of Korean Conflict veter-  
ans who died from such dis-  
abilities may take advantage  
of the final 175 deadline, the  
VA manager added.  
He pointed out that a veter-  
an's loan cannot be guaran-  
teed unless the loan applica-  
tion is received by the VA be-  
fore the veteran's eligibility  
expires.  
Loan applications are ordi-  
narily sent to the VA by lend-  
ers. The veteran, therefore,  
should see that his loan ap-  
plication reaches the VA be-  
fore his entitlement expires.  
An application for a Certi-  
ficate of Eligibility is not a  
loan application, Coker warn-  
ed.

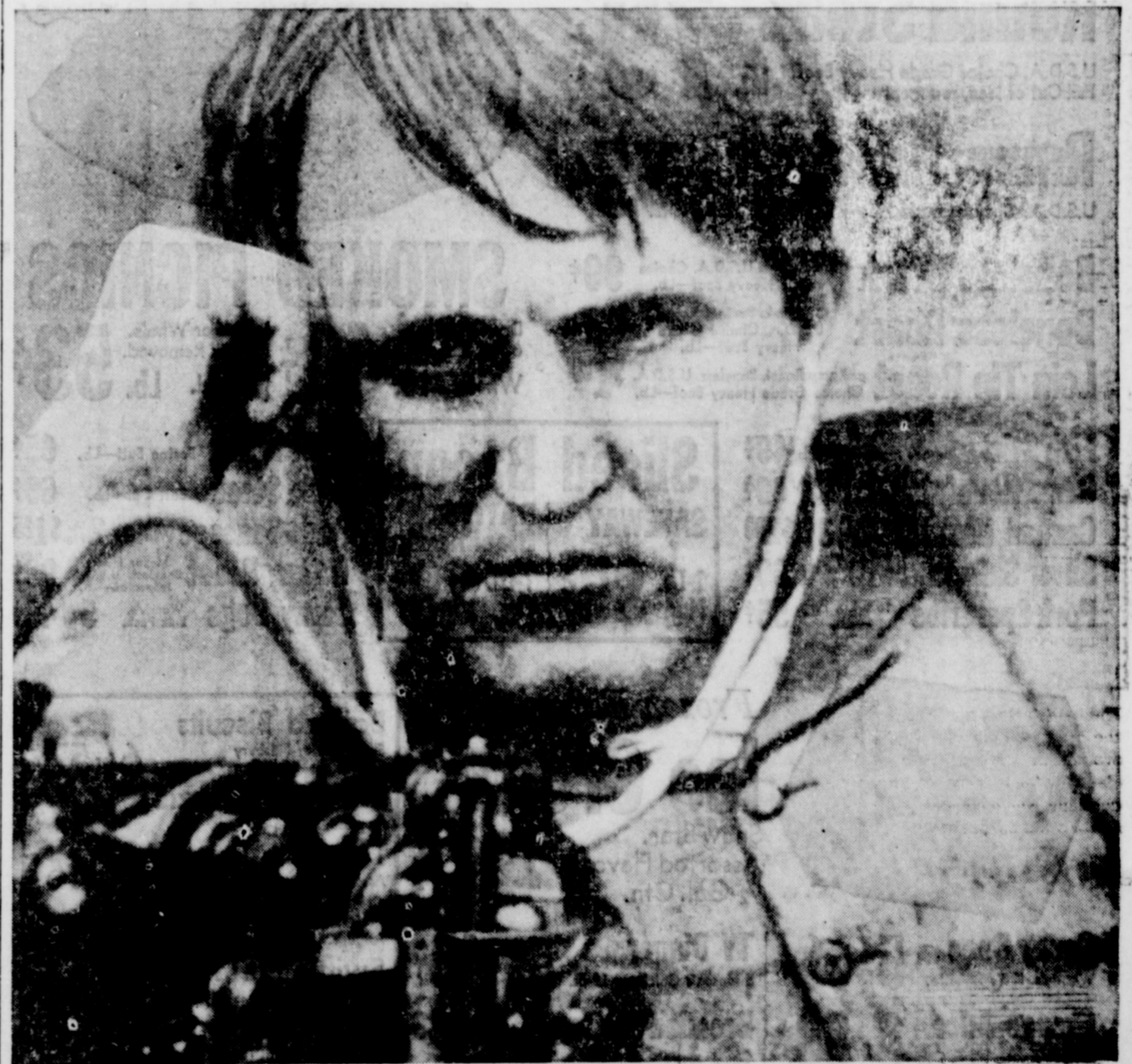

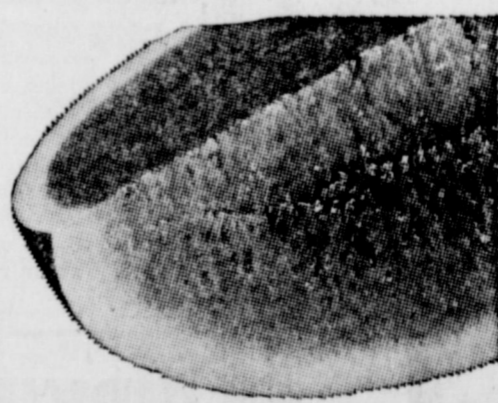
