## Newnham Asks Court For Ruling On Ballot

Mayor Morris L. Newnham of Ranger, a candidate for the Texas Legislature, 63rd District, has filed a "motion for leave to file petition of mandamus" in the Supreme Court of the State of Texas, he revealed Saturday morning.

His action came following notification that A. E. Crawley, retired Ranger postmas- ter and Eastland County Dem- ocratic chairman, will not place his name on the county ballot in the May 7 primary election "unless ordered by proper judicial authority to do otherwise."

"I am taking this action in the interest of the voters and the candidates," Crawley said, "and since there continues to be a question on Newnham's eligibility, forcing legal

adequate time, should you so desire, to contest my action in court in time to have your name placed on such ballot if my conclusion should be erroneous."  
Crawley explained in his letter to the Ranger mayor that he based his decision on Section 19 of Article III of the Texas Constitution "which provides that no person holding a lucrative public office in the state shall — during the term for which he is elected — be eligible to the Legislature."

Since September, 1957, the mayor and no members of the Ranger city commission have received any financial pay for service in their offices, and Newnham bases his eligibility as a candidate on that point.

Crawley admitted, in his formal notification to the Ranger mayor Tuesday, that he was aware that Ranger's elected city officials serve without pay.

However, he informed the Eastland County candidate: "Unless your present office as mayor of the city of Ranger is a 'lucrative office' within the meaning of Section 19 of Article III of the Texas Constitution, you are in all respects entitled, qualified and eligible to appear as a candidate for such legislative office on the ballot of the next Democratic primary."

Newnham, 43-year-old civic leader and owner of Ranger Frozen Food Center, has been

Mr. Hansen, who retired some 15 years ago as the head of a statewide highway and bridge paving contractor, had gone to his ranch shortly before lunch to feed cattle and repair a fence. When he did not return home as planned, Mrs. Hansen went to the ranch. He had collapsed and died as he worked on a fence.

A doctor was summoned and pronounced Mr. Hansen dead of an apparent heart attack. He had suffered a serious heart attack in 1950 and two others since that time, but had been in good health for several years. He had managed his ranching interests at Nimrod and north of Cisco.

Mr. Hansen was born Feb. 24, 1898, at Exira, Iowa, and was married to the former Lillian Gorr on Aug. 10, 1929, in Shenandoah, Iowa. They moved to Texas soon afterwards. After four years in Cleburne as a construction foreman, Mr. Hansen and Johnny Galbraith formed a partnership that built roads and bridges throughout the state.

Mr. Hansen came to Cisco in 1937 to build the Highway 80 overpass over the M-K-T Railroad. He and his family serving as mayor since 1961 and has been a member of the city commission since 1959.

Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge, representing the five-county area since 1961, resigned in January to accept Gov. 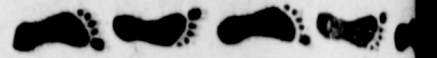

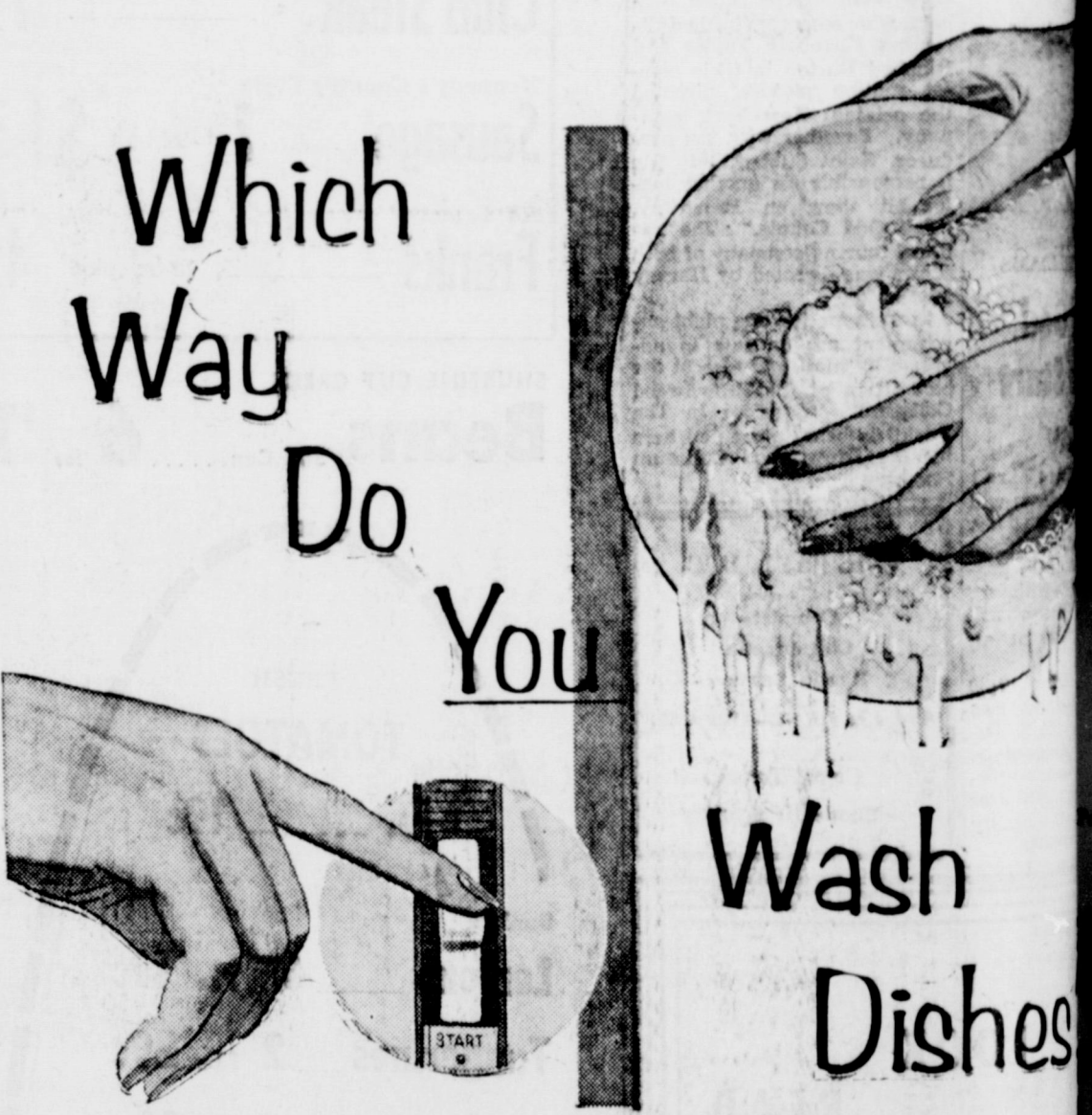

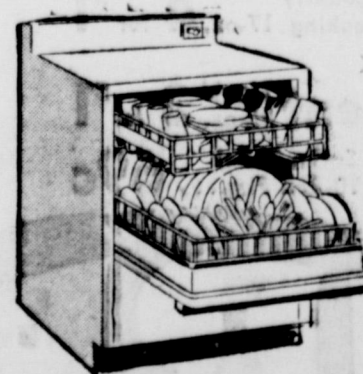

Las Leales Club  
Hear Review Of  
Book At Meeting

"The Aim Was Song" by Jean Gould was reviewed by Mrs. Wendell Siebert when the Las Leales Club met Monday, Feb. 21, at the Woman's Club House. The book is a biography of the famous poet, Robert Frost.  
In the book, Frost describes the actual act of writing poetry as "words flowing like magic from an unseen power," Mrs. Siebert said. Frost was named for the Southern General.  
Frost started to school for the first time when he was twelve years old and entered high school less than three years later. The following year, his grades moved him to the head of a class of 92 students. He was valedictorian of the graduation class, an honor which he shared with Eleanor Wright, whom he later married.  
Mrs. Siebert stressed that Frost suffered personal tragedies, his wife and three of his children preceded him in death; also, he suffered disappointments in his chosen career. Although he became America's foremost poet, his first efforts were rejected. His books were first published in England, where he lived for three years prior to World War I.  
"Mr. Frost was close to God and close to nature and one finds his faith in both in his poetry," Mrs. Siebert stated.
