Voter Registration Begins at Courthouse

The temporary voter registration period will begin at the County Tax Assessor-Collector's Office at the Courthouse in Eastland Thursday, March 3, and will continue through Thursday, March 17, Edgar Altom has announced.

Only those persons who were subject to payment of the poll tax levied for the year 1965 (that is, those persons who were between 21 and 60 years of age on Jan. 1, 1965 and were legal residents of the State of Texas on that date) may register during this period, he said.

A person subject to the tax who has been issued either a paid poll tax receipt or a "Poll Tax Not Paid" (the federal-free receipt) during the

regular registration period which ended on Jan. 31, 1966, need not and should not register, Mr. Altom pointed out.

Those persons 60 years of age and over who do not reside in a city of 10,000 or more, (and no one in Eastland County does) do not register in this period, he said, but they will vote as usual.

The county is not being paid by the state for this special registration, he said, but the new legislation does provide that the county will be re-imposed 25 cents per receipt issued next year.

Sub-stations are not being established for the special registration.

The Texas Supreme Court overruled without comment Wednesday a request from Ranger Mayor Morris L. Newnham that his name be placed on the Democratic primary ballot as a candidate for state representative, according to a report received here.

The court refused to hear arguments in the case, automatically denying the plea. The appeal came after A. E. Crawley, County Democratic Chairman, refused to put Newnham's name on the ballot because he was holding "a lucrative public office."

Newnham claimed the mayorship is not a "lucrative public office" because since 1957 the Ranger mayor and city commission members have drawn no pay for their services in office.

Funeral services for Tom B. Barton, 47, were held at the First Methodist Church in Baird Monday.

Owner-manager of Barton Oil Company here, Mr. Barton had operated the Humble Oil Company in Eastland for many years. He had been a Callahan County resident all his life and had lived in Baird for the past 20 years.

County Public Work Policy Is Asked Of Commissioners Court

Two county commissioners were singled out for verbal attack and the entire court challenged for a statement of policy regarding the use of county material, men and equipment on private property, by a group of citizens at the Monday meeting of the court in Eastland.

The spirited meeting came in two parts. The first consisted of a group of county truckers whose spokesman was Cisco Attorney W. B. Wright. The second stanza was in the form of an airing of complaints by a former employe of the county in Precinct Two (Carbon-Gorman). Mr. Wright, who told the

court he spoke as an interested citizen, introduced the truckers: W. H. McCullough of Cisco, Bryan Johnson and Prentiss Jones, both of Eastland. Mr. Wright asked the court if it has a policy on doing work on private property. Mr. McCullough reported that the county had done work on property belonging to Lee Starr, Alvis Taylor and Grover Taylor, all of Eastland County.

Mr. Starr recently completed a new home some eight miles northwest of Cisco and Mr. McCullough said that crews from Commissioner C. B. Dill's precinct hauled some 200 yards of materials about

4.2 miles in county trucks to build a circular drive of from 100 to 200 yards at the residence.

Mr. Wright asked if such work was done and Mr. Dill replied "Yes," and introduced charge-ticket books, which he said had been used for 25 years by the county for charging for such work. It was not brought out whether the work at the Starr residence was billed or not.

Mr. Wright asked: "Do you legally have the right to work on private property?"

Mr. Dill: "Yes, I think so, but let me assure you all that I don't solicit that kind of

Fort Worth Angler's Club Plans Annual Tourney At Lake Leon

A fish fry Saturday, March 19, will highlight the big annual spring tournament of the Fort Worth Anglers Club at Lake Leon to be held Sunday, March 20. Headquarters for the tournament will be at Lake Leon Boat-Tel, according to Don Rogers, tournament chairman.

The tournament will start at 5 o'clock Sunday morning and weighing will be at 2 p.m. About 200 contestants are expected to enter. A preliminary contest will be held Saturday, March 19, with \$1.00 entry fee and the prizes will be percentages of the entry fees. Contestants in the Saturday contest will be asked to donate fish caught to the fish fry.

Trophies will be awarded to the winners of the various divisions in the Sunday tournament. Entry fee will be \$2.50 per angler, and the tournament is open only to members of the club. However, membership cards will be available at all places selling entry blanks for those who are not club members.

Fishing will be by teams of two to a boat, and trophies will be given to each member of the winning teams. Entry blanks are available at Lake Leon Boat-Tel and Leonard Bros. and other places in Fort Worth.

Trophies will be awarded in the following divisions:

- 1 - Largest black bass. 2 - Open team competition (largest string). 3 - Husband and wife (largest string). 4 - Women's team (largest string). 5 - Children's division (largest string).

1 - Teams must declare division 2, 3 or 4. 2 - Any team that places in string of bass competition and the largest bass may choose to take the largest bass trophies. However, there will be only one set of trophies per team. 3 - Parks and Wild Life Commission Laws will prevail at all times. 4 - Contest is open to all Fort Worth Anglers Club members. 5 - Entry fee is \$2.50 per angler (\$5.00 per team.)

Division 2 and 3 anglers will fish as a team of two to a boat. Division 4 may fish from a boat or on the bank as a team. 6 - Contestants is for black bass 7 inches or longer. These to be caught by any legal means except set lines or trot lines. Fish must be caught from Lake Leon. 7 - Fishing will be from 5 a.m. to 2 p.m. All contestants must be at headquarters at 2 p.m. for weigh-in. 8 - All fish will be weighed in as live weight only. 9 - No fishing will be allowed by participants 5 days preceding the tournament in Lake Leon.

When you purchase your entry blank, please check if you will attend the fish fry.

Club membership dues are: Adults \$3.00 per year and children \$1. They do have to be members to fish.

ASCS OFFICE SENDS OUT IMPORTANT REMINDER

The following important reminders and announcements have been made by J. G. Meredith, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office manager:

Final date to release or ask for reapportioned peanut acreage is Friday, April 4. Producers who do not intend to plant their allotment this year are encouraged to release it to the County Committee for reapportionment to other producers in the county for one year.

Deadline to sign an intention to participate in either or all of the programs, cotton, wheat and feed grain, is April 1. Cotton producers who do not plan to plant cotton acreage may sign up to divert 12.5 percent of their allotment and release the balance. Producers electing to do this will receive full history protection for future cotton allotment determinations.

Workers at the ASCS office are in the process of completing applications for contracts under the Cropland Adjustment Program. The Program is for allotment crops, bases, and in some cases non-allotment cropland will be taken. Designated acreage must be devoted to a permanent type grass and can not be grazed during the full term of the contract period. Cost-share assistance will be paid to assist in the establishment of this cover where one does not exist at the present time. Annual payments will be made the latter part of each year.

Funds are available to carry out any approved conservation practice for 1966, Mr. Meredith says. These practices include establishing permanent grasses, control of brush and mesquite, con-

structing earthen dams, establishment of waterways, constructing field and diversion terraces. Before beginning any work, requests must be signed at the ASCS office.

Farmers, if you have recently changed your farming operations, if you have purchased or sold land or if your address has changed, you are urged to inform the ASCS office of these changes.

An important message from your Department of Health, Education and Welfare is this — crop insurance, livestock vaccination, equipment maintenance and medicare are all forms of protection to you as a farmer or rancher. If you are 65 years old you are urged to contact your local Social Security Office to learn about Medicare.

(Continued from Page 2) for \$2.25 from Battles at his place in Ranger on Oct. 10, 1965, and Lloyd Owens, LCB Supervisor of Abilene, who testified that Battles did not have a permit to sell liquor.

A motion to quash the indictment, introduced by Pearson, was over-ruled by Judge Sparks, and the jury heard the rest of the case, but returned the instructed verdict.

Two other liquor cases against Battles, one for possession and the other a sale charge, were continued until March 15.

Serving on the jury were J. C. Nance, M. L. Forgey, James H. Greer, James C. Jones, J. L. Stroud, Truman Bryant, G. M. Hargus, James Horn, Billy A. Highsmith, Gayland Ashton, Mrs. H. E. Brooks, and Ardera Fox.

Pertinent parts of the indictment reads as follows: "... then and there unlawfully sell an alcoholic beverage, to wit, whiskey, to Quinton R. Vonner in a wet area without having first having procured a permit to sell such liquor from the Texas Liquor Control Board, or such a permit from the administrator of such board, and said county was then and there a county in which the sale of such liquor could be legally carried on under a legal permit."

(Continued from Page 1) work." He later said that he averages a request a day for such work, and recommends others for the work.

Mr. Dill cited recent legislation which indicated that the county might have the right to do such work. All agreed to take the matter up with the county attorney and meet back on March 14, next meeting date, to determine a final decision.

A simple resolution of policy would help clear the air, and make for a better understanding, Mr. Wright said.

Commissioner Glenn Justice of Precinct Two came under similar fire in 1964 when a group of citizens from Gorman asked and was granted an injunction in 91st District Court, prohibiting the county from doing work on private property. (However it was reported that the injunction never became effective because bond was not posted to secure it.)

P. C. (Cass) Frazier of Gorman joined the commissioners at their table after the truckers retired, to air a series of complaints and lodge a number of accusations against Commissioner Justice, his former employer. Mr. Frazier introduced a little book in which he reportedly had recorded all the information on which he was basing his complaints against the commissioner.

He accused Mr. Justice of using county materials for his own use; doing work for friends to "gain votes"; driving his own vehicle "only four days" to earn the \$75 expense allowance; and a multitude of other things — closing his tirade by saying: "You aren't going to get by with this politician."

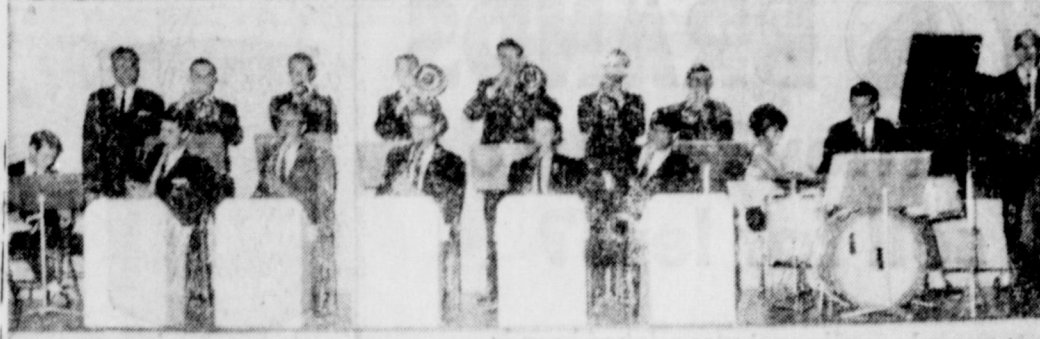
