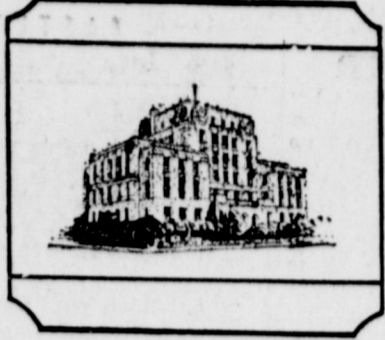

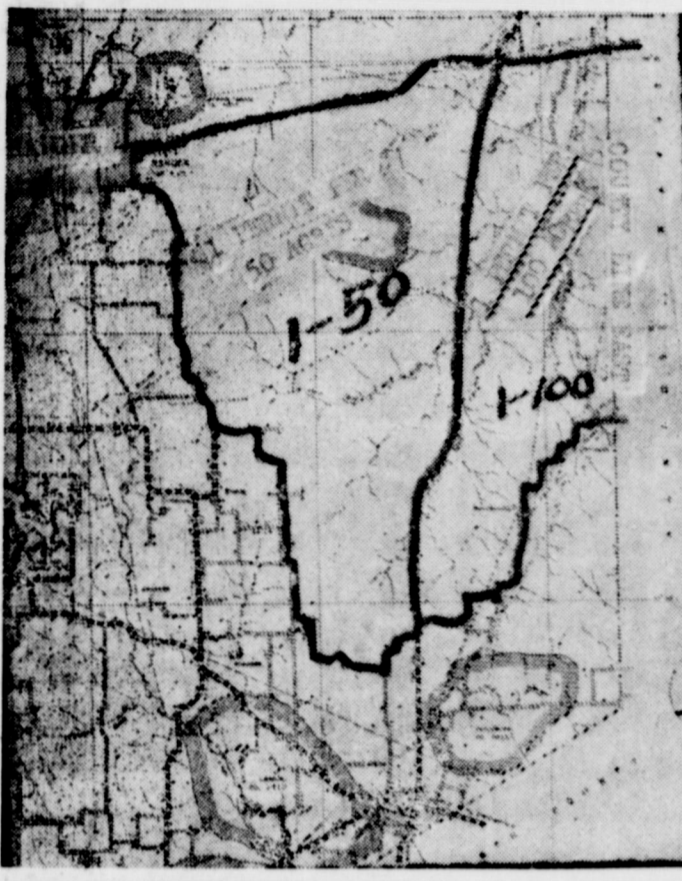
The Eastland committee will attend the meeting for the purpose of gaining more information enabling it to continue the preservation of historical sites in Eastland County, Collins said.

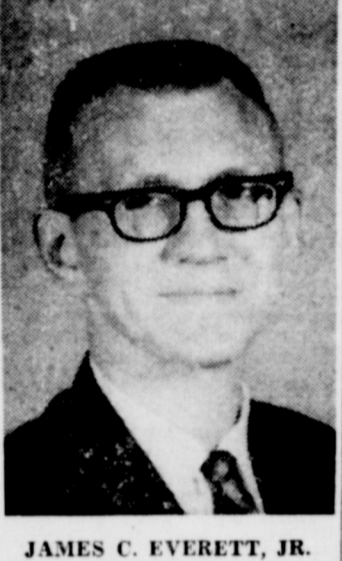

Local hopes are pegged on seeing the Mavericks fired up as much for out-of-county competition (such as DeLeon and Cross Plains) as they have shown for county competitors (such as for Cisco and Ranger). Quarterback Jerry McCullough, who has been sidelined with injuries, probably will be able to go back into action as needed. The Mavericks rallied with small, but oh-so-spirited Gene Wilson at the signal-calling slot and played 11-man football for four quarters the way it's intended to be played during the Ranger battle.

The name of the game is football and seldom is anything less predictable than high school contests, so it looks like a down-to-the-wire contest all around. Head Coach Millard Glass and his staff, Backfield Coach Shirley Frazier and Line Coach Harold Price were keeping the Mavericks limber and drilling during this week. Whether the coaching staff planned to permit the local boys to view their forthcoming opponent Friday remained to be seen, but guesses are good that the Ranger-DeLeon game will be well-scouted by fans and those who feed information to the Maverick warcamp.

Railroads Pay \$28,549, in Taxes In This County

Current annual taxes paid to the various government agencies in Eastland County totaled \$28,549, it is announced by the Texas Railroad Association.

That amount was the county's share of the nearly \$10,000,000 the railroads paid in Texas on their own right of way and other property.

The biggest railroad contribution was to the school systems throughout the state. Large sums were also distributed to city, village and county governments and for road and bridge funds.

In addition, of course, was the large total in taxes the railroads' nearly 35,000 Texas employees contributed on their own property. The vast majority of rail workers, many of whom live in Eastland County, own their own homes.

"With the future of our country and state depending to a great extent upon the education of our youth, I am delighted that nearly half of the taxes paid by the railroads go to support the schools," said Walter Caven, general counsel of the Texas

Railroad Association. "Recognizing this need for education, many of the railroads operating in Texas also make scholarships available to a large number of students every year."

'Yes, Deerslayer, There Is A County Bow Season,

Deer bow-hunters have but eight days (including today) to legally pursue their sport in Eastland County, according to a report from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, received late last week. Unknown by most in the

county until the report was received, is the fact that Eastland County is included this year in the list of counties having a legal bow season. Recent legislation has placed the county under the Parks and Wildlife Department for means and methods, and a proclamation-acceptance by the commission is being awaited on that point. At a recent public hearing

here, much interest was expressed by countians as to whether this county was to have a bow season during October. It apparently was not known at that time, although adjoining counties were slated for bow and arrow hunting.

The P&W report shows that bow hunting for buck deer is legal in this county from Oct. 1 through 31, inclusive, and the same time for turkey gobblers. (No bow season on bear or javelina).

Bow hunting excludes cross-bow equipment, and local Game Warden Maurice Dry explained legal bow equipment as follows:

"The bow must be capable of shooting a hunting arrow equipped with a broadhead hunting point for a distance of 130 yards; arrows must have broadhead hunting point at least seven-eighths inches in width and not over one and one-half inches in width; arrows must be marked with the name and address of the user in water-proof ink; and poisoned, drugged or exploded legal bow equipment arrows are unlawful.

Deer must have three points or more, he said.

Winfrey and James M. Day of the Texas State Library and Archives will participate.

Naming Natural Features for historical recordation will be emceed by R. Don Thorne of El Paso and panelists will be Will Davis, TSHSC vice president, Austin; Thomas C. Unis of Dallas and Harold L. Kennedy, Washington, D. C.
