MILLER YIELDS HIS FAMOUS 101 RANCH

Col. Zack T. Miller, last of the Miller brothers of wild west fame, gave up control of the historic 101 Ranch white house today.
Ending a long fight to retain the house, once headquarters for a 101,000 acre "spread," Miller surrendered it to a U. S. deputy marshal and said he was "heading for Oklahoma City to see about a job with the state board of affairs."

TWO MURDER CASES REVERSED BY COURT

AUSTIN, Mar. 31 (AP)—The court of criminal appeals reversed and remanded today death sentences for murder convictions against Huey Fulton of Henderson county and Lonnie Mitchell of Taylor county.
The trial court's failure to grant Fulton's application for a change of venue caused reversal. Fulton was convicted of killing W. T. Germain by shooting him Sept. 24, 1934 and then pouring kerosene on Germain's home and burning it. It was a companion case that of Elmer Pruitt whose death sentence was affirmed Jan. 27.

INCREASE SHOWN IN SCURRY CO. TEST

An increase in oil shows below 1,775 feet Wednesday gave the Bristol and Cantrell No. 1 Tomlinson, located in the northeast 1-4 of the southeast 1-4 of section 12-87-R, H&TC survey, Scurry county, about a quarter barrel of free oil every four hours.
The test, 3-4 of a mile northwest of a 30 barrel producer, topped its first show about 1,707 feet. Log of a nearby test listed no shows above 1,785.

TESTIMONY IN GREEN CASE IS COMPLETED

DALLAS, Mar. 31 (AP)—Testimony seeking to establish Texas as the legal residence of Col. Edward H. R. Green was completed at noon today before special commissioner Raymond C. Prime, conducting a hearing in the Green dispute here.
Commissioner Prime, appointed by a New York court to take depositions in Texas, said he would probably hear expert testimony from several attorneys here tomorrow on Texas laws bearing upon the case. He said he hoped to complete it tomorrow, and leave tomorrow night for Miami, Fla., to take additional testimony regarding Colonel's Green's residence.

KILLED IN MISHAP

DALLAS, Mar. 31 (AP)—Lemuel Edward Moore, Jr., 35, was killed last night near Livingston when the car in which he was riding overturned in a ditch.
Moore was a salesman for the General Motors truck department.

MINIMUM WAGE FOR ALL

The president himself provided the latest hint. At a press conference late yesterday, he expressed the opinion that state minimum wage legislation should not be confined to women—as in the Washington law just upheld—but should cover all persons.
If Attorney General Cummings wishes that the District of Columbia were statute for women and minors is imperative, he said, congress will be asked to enact another covering men as well.
The law was invalidated by the supreme court 14 years ago, but was upheld on Monday when the court sustained the Washington law.
It was said in official quarters that a division existed within the administration as to whether to press for federal wage and hour legislation at this time.
The ultimate decision apparently will depend on studies being made by Assistant Attorney General Robert Jackson and others. The president said it was much too early to discuss the subject publicly.

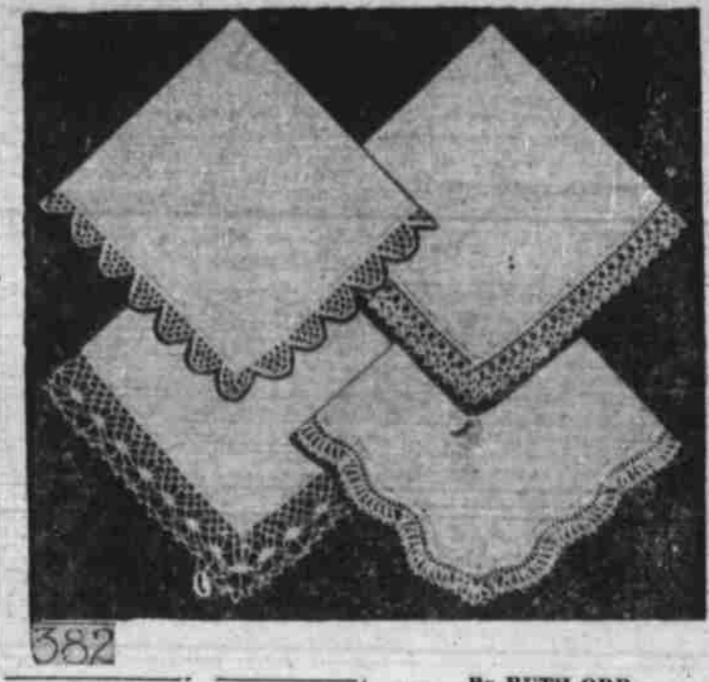

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Hughes' hand seen in supreme court decisions.

Comprehensive grouping held answer to new deal charges. Rulings mark clear path for administration. Switch on minimum wage law causes surprise.

Guiding Hand

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31—Those who know their certiorari will tell you Chief Justice Hughes has done as neat a job of rebutting President Roosevelt as ever was performed by a judge upon an executive.

The flock of supreme court rulings which came over the bench all at once Monday could have been joined together or by natural circumstances, but no legal authority believes they were. The remarkable executive talents of Mr. Hughes are seen by all to be behind the comprehensive grouping. Also to his inside leadership is attributed the altered line of majority thought on the bench.

No court follower missed the point of how Mr. Roosevelt could accomplish minimum wages, maximum hours, abolition of child labor, some farm price fixing, and farm mortgage protection, least of all the white house.

The matter of farm price fixing may be handled constitutionally by state legislatures, to the extent of fixing arbitrary minimum prices, (Virginia milk decision). The states may also legislate to protect labor with an arbitrary rule of minimum wages and maximum hours for men, women or children, (Washington minimum wage decision).

Intervale labor can be protected by the federal government, even to the extent of forcing exclusive collective bargaining under majority rule (Virginia railway decision). As for farm mortgages, they can be carried through this period of stress of federal legislation (Frazier-Tamm decision).

New York, Mar. 31 (AP)—From a \$4-a-week bundle wrapper in a mid-western department store, Jack Polansky, now a New Yorker, has made himself into what Broadway calls an "angel."

A little over 20 years ago, Bundler Polansky became interested in his spare time in what was then known as a faintly vulgar game called pool. Since then the game has become refined and has changed its name to pocket billiards. The measure before the committee followed general recommendations of the president and Secretary Wallace. The Resettlement administration would be granted \$75,000,000 for small loans to farmers facing loss of their homes and to other low-income farmers and tenants. Another \$70,000,000 would be expended over a four-year period to take farm families off submarginal land. Opponents object that the tenancy measure would put the government into the farming business. The agriculture department would have authority to supervise operation of the farms, while tenants served a five-year period as lessees. To meet objections, house sponsors abandoned several administration recommendations. The president's committee on farm tenancy had urged that the government retain control for at least 20 years on land it sold to tenants. The bill would give the tenant-buyer title as soon as he paid 50 per cent of the purchase price. Pat Adams, Big Spring, has been admitted to the Hendrick hospital in Abilene for a surgery.

I believe was the one that had been used to block the road. "It was evening and we were in front of an adobe hut. One of the men took a rifle from the car and pushed me inside the hut. I was kept there until last night. "My kidnapers remained with me all the time. I was treated well and fed three times a day. x x x "It was asleep last night when the kidnapers awoke me and bound and blindfolded me again. They put me in a car and we drove for about an hour and thirty minutes. "Without saying a word they took my blindfold off and also my bonds and put me out on the desert. They drove away toward the west. "All night long I walked. I didn't know whether I was on the main highway or a side road, but I didn't meet a car. Several times I stopped and built a fire. Corporations Are Blamed For Affairs Causing Strikes WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (AP)—Senator Wagner (D-NY) told the senate today the sit-down strike had been "provoked by the longstanding ruthless tactics of a few great corporations." The New York senator, author of the labor relations act now pending before the supreme court, said the "root cause for the present economic warfare," which flared up so spectacularly in the General Motors and Chrysler sit-down strikes, was "the lack of power in the federal government" to enforce the Wagner law. Taking cognizance of what he called "the hue and cry for new federal legislation" to curb the sit-down strikes, Wagner said "new legislation is never a remedy for the disobedience of existing law." "Let the federal government have the power and the determination to enforce that (the Wagner) law on a nation-wide scale," he said, "and we shall have on a nation-wide scale the methods of justice and peace."

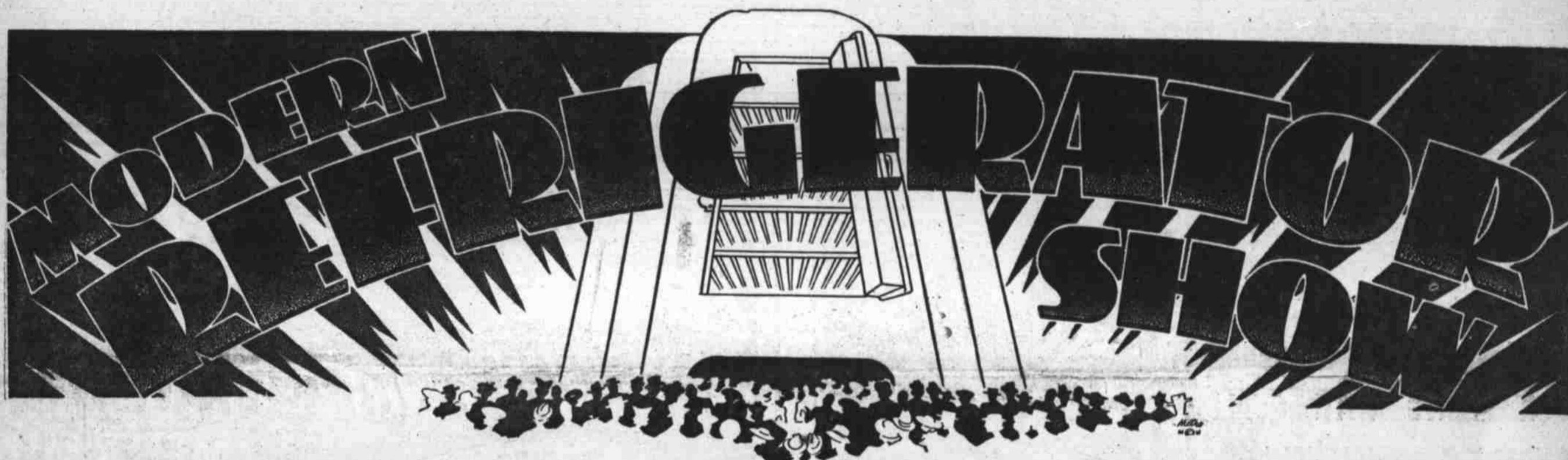

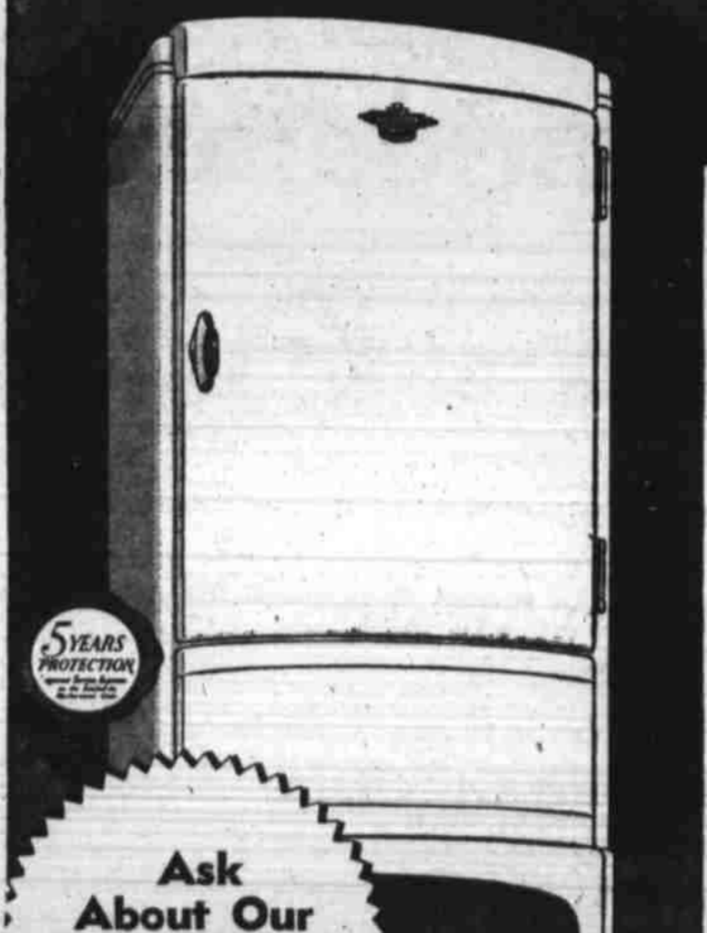

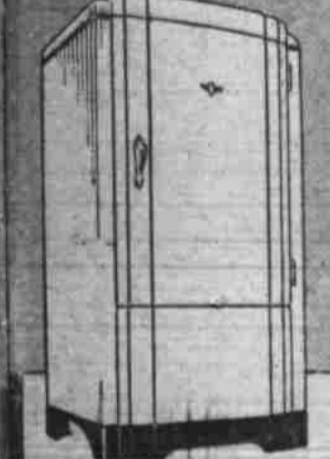

Laborer Sharing In Increase In US Farm Income

CHICAGO, Mar. 31 (AP)—Farm labor is sharing in the farmer's increased income and has prospects of getting a bigger slice of the financial melon, a nationwide survey disclosed today.

Pay of farm labor practically everywhere in the nation has been boosted from five to 20 per cent during the last year. The possibility of still higher prices for 1937 products carried a promise of further pay hikes.

The "hired man" is receiving more money today than at any time since 1931, and in some of the more productive areas, agricultural economists said, further increases may be forthcoming.

Averages compiled by the U. S. department of agriculture showed Rhode Island has the highest average monthly pay, \$41.75 with board and \$67.25 without. The 1936 average was \$34.50 and \$59.25, respectively. The low average was reported from Georgia, \$11.75 with board, up 75 cents over last year. California was second high with an average of \$41 with board. In the corn belt states the average with board ranged from \$20.75 in Nebraska to \$26 in Illinois.

Practically all states, excepting Ohio, a few in New England and the south, reported the supply of farm labor in excess of the demand.

His Big Spring force today consists of R. H. Vick, repair man and mechanic; Herbie Smith, helper; H. H. McSwaney, salesman; J. L. Spencer, electrician; and Mrs. Beth Rice, office work.

Taylor's territory on GE refrigerators, which this year featured forced oil circulation for the unit which in turn is changed from the top to the bottom of the box, extends east to include Sweetwater and north to include Lamesa. His commercial territory for GE appliances covers the same territory in addition to extending west to Monahans.

Salesmen from the company here will be stationed in Colorado and Lamesa, and a commercial salesman is to work the west end, says Taylor. With business definitely on the upgrade here, he sees no good reason why, with more territory this should not be the best year on record since he started in the trade 12 years ago.

MESSAGE FROM FD ON FLOOD CONTROL IS EXPECTED SOON

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (UP)—Legislative leaders said today they expected President Roosevelt to send congress a flood control message within a few days, calling for a nationwide system of conservation agencies similar to the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Mr. Roosevelt will propose establishment of at least eight huge watershed areas, they predicted, each supervised by a federal authority empowered to erect dams, reforest lands, build levees, and check soil erosion.

Production of vast quantities of publicly-controlled electric power, they said, probably will be an incidental by-product of such a program.

RESTRICTION ON CITRUS PROPOSED

AUSTIN, Mar. 31 (UP)—A bill which would prohibit importation of citrus fruit from California and Florida if necessary to prevent introduction of diseases has been approved by the Texas house of representatives.

Also finally passed by the house were proposals to prorate citrus sales with the consent of producers and shippers, to permit the department of agriculture to destroy fruit in abandoned orchards to check the spread of the Mexican fruit fly and to bond and license citrus shippers.

Rep. Homer Leonard of McAllen did not seek approval of a bill to impose a five cent per box tax on citrus for advertising purposes, saying his constituents felt the levy was too high.

Improvements In Refrigerators 'Drive Out' Old Models

Economy Of Operation Is Top Feature

Beauty And Labor Saving Devices Add To Appeal Of '37 Lines

Advances made by engineers of automatic refrigeration have been so great during the development of the new models for 1937 that experts on homemaking are declaring that the new refrigerators have forced great numbers now in use in homes into irretrievable obsolescence.

Typically every manufacturer of mechanical refrigerators has stressed both of these features as the detailed description of the new lines, which is to be found in this section of The Herald, will illustrate.

Beauty Enhanced
In addition all manufacturers have given most careful consideration to the outward appearance of the new boxes with the idea of making the modern kitchen a beautiful as well as a practical spot.

They have, in some instances, offered color selections and in others they have provided contrasting colors for hardware. Lines of the new boxes have been carefully designed and moulded to make them an attractive centerpiece for any kitchen.

The more practical aspects of the new refrigerators have been carried to almost unbelievable lengths which make for convenience and labor saving. Sliding shelves, removable trays, controlled cold in various parts of the box, and in one instance at least a completely removable shelf unit which enables the housewife to lift a whole compartment out of the refrigerator with all its contents and take it to her kitchen table.

Needs Greater, But Little Gain Seen In School Revenue

Tax Collection No Higher, While Enrollment Reaches Highest On Record

(This is the first of a series of four articles dealing with financial and other problems confronting the Big Spring independent school district.—Editor's Note.)

While business in general and other public tax units in particular are looking forward to marked gains in revenues this year, the Big Spring independent school district faces the gloomy prospect of a very small gain—plus ever increasing crowded condition in schools.

At the end of the first six months of the fiscal year, the district had collected \$50,517.53 on the 1936 roll as compared with \$61,572.19. With all taxes now delin-

quent, the district can not hope to exceed the record of last year by any great margin.

Record Enrollment
At the same time the number of scholars has steadily increased until the roll for 1936-37 reached an all-time high of 3,220. This has resulted in crowded classrooms and consequential heavy teacher loads.

Looking back over the last ten years, 1926-37 will show no great gain in revenue (except for scholastic apportionment payments) over 1927-28, while the scholastic census had shown a 104 per cent gain. Turn back a little more than five years to note that in 1932 \$76,862.67 from tax collections and \$47,329 from scholastic apportionment came in as revenue with 2,704 scholars to serve. Compare this with about \$62,000 taxes and \$50,599 apportionment this year with 3,220 scholars to serve. Here you have a sad picture of about \$3,000 less revenue with 500 additional students to care for.

District Unchanged
In 1901 the district was organized with an area of 25 square miles, small for a city of any consequence. Population in the district then was 1,255, according to the federal census. In 1930 the population had soared to 12,735 and in the seven succeeding years is estimated to have increased another four thousand. Still the district size is the same.

Evolution Argument Is Revived

Teaching Of Theory In India Arouses Stir Among Chicago Leaders

CHICAGO, Mar. 31 (AP)—Chicago religious and educational leaders referred today to the Rev. Verdi Allen's announced "flight to the finish" against the teaching of the theory of evolution in Indiana public schools as "whipping the devil around the post again."

Use of Henrik Van Loon's "The Story of Mankind" in Indianapolis public schools recently aroused the ire of the Indianapolis Baptist pastor who said, "If these highbrows want to believe in evolution, so far as I'm concerned they can go live in the zoo with their cousins."

Superintendent of Education William Johnson of Chicago said he hadn't "paid any attention to the monkey row in Indiana." "Evolution or its teachings is never commented upon in Chicago. This isn't Tennessee, you know. I have never yet heard a complaint against teaching the theory in our schools."

Clarence Darrow, criminal lawyer and principal defense lawyer in the famous John T. Scopes trial in

Dayton, Tenn., a decade ago, said, "What? Are they reviving that thing again? Certainly, I shall always uphold the theory of evolution."

The Rev. M. A. Morrell of the board of education of the Methodist Episcopal church said "liberal protestantism long ago adjusted its thought to acceptance of the possibility that the theory of evolution is a correct account of the coming of man."

The Rev. T. Veneklasen, pastor of the suburban Wilmette Presbyterian church, said, "if evolution were taught from a christian point of view, I would approve, but they do not and therefore I'm not in favor of it."

NATION'S IMPORTS ARE ABOVE SALES

WASHINGTON, Mar. 31 (AP)—The commerce department reported today that American purchases abroad exceeded sales by \$83,826,000 during the first two months of this year.

This so-called "unfavorable trade balance" compared with a \$331,000 balance of exports in the same period a year ago.

In the 1937 two months, exports totaled \$454,375,000, increasing \$73,788,000 over the same period a year ago. Imports were \$538,201,000, climbing \$137,945,000.

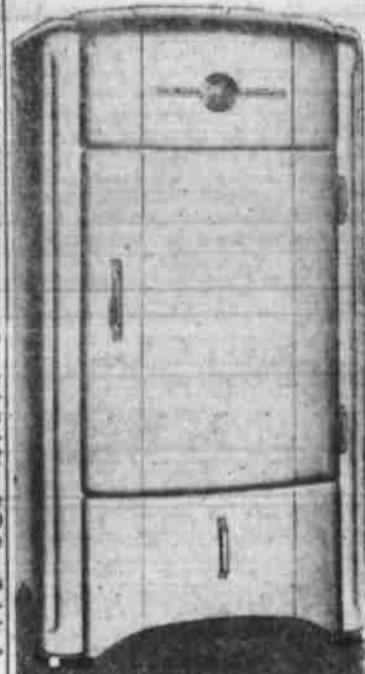
In February, exports totaled \$232,504,000, falling \$45,301,000 short of the \$277,805,000 aggregate of imports.

The department said that in every month since the end of 1935, imports had increased in value over the corresponding month of the previous year. Exports increased in all months but four.
