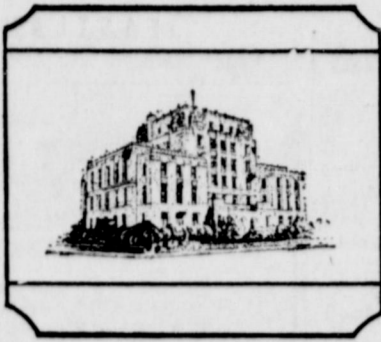

Special guests of the Club will be Mr. and Mrs. Maguire, formerly jewelry store operators in Arlington. Mr. Maguire is a long-time Lion himself, and his wife, now totally blind, spent 81 days at the Kerrville camp where she learned to walk unaccompanied in a city and to make a number of handcraft items. She will relate some of her experiences at the camp and explain how she was taught to accept her unsightedness.

The camp is operated for crippled children during the summer months but the program for the adult blind was held during the other months of the year. The program is conducted by the Lions.

Mrs. Maguire says of the camp: "I believe the greatest gift from the training at the camp is a renewal of self-confidence which I had just about lost. My vision had been a progressive diminishing to now of light perception, contrasts, and some motion."

"Although I had worked in our jewelry store until 1960, and could read extra large print, by 1962, I could not read at all or proofread my typing. I am beginning to gain my sense of typing. Although I have never quit keeping house, cooking, etc., I had not been going out of my yard alone for too many years, not even to the curb. But now I can walk on the city streets with my Hoover cane, board city buses, etc."

Mrs. Maureen Johnson and Lion Gilbert Meredith have arranged for Mrs. Maguire's appearance here, and Mrs. Johnson will introduce her. Special music has also been arranged for the Ladies Night event.

Temps Drop, Moisture Is Light As Harvest Nears End

Perfect peanut-harvesting weather continued through the week after temperatures tumbled, with dry, sun-shiny days continuing.

Rains, heavy in September, remained light through November, providing the dry harvest weather necessary. Total rainfall for the year through the last day of November, Tuesday, is 26.22 — just a fraction below the Texas Almanac 26.54 average for 12 months.

Total this year is above the first 11 months last year which amounted to 19.63 inches.

The mercury really took a tumble as the month neared its end. On the 26th, Friday after Thanksgiving, high reading was 85 degrees, according to official County Weather Observer James Smith. It dropped to 31 the next night, then on down to 28 on the 28th; 25 on the 29th; and 25 on the 30th.

Rain during November amounted to 1.79 inches and fell on four days — .25 of an inch on the third; .38 on the

fourth; .30 on the eighth; and .86 on the ninth.

First freezing temperature in November last year was a 29, registered on the 20th, and the month closed out last year with a 24 low on the 30th day.

Two years ago, in 1963, first freeze in November came on the second day with a low of 28 recorded. Neither 1963's nor 1964's November had highs as great as this year's 85.

The ASCS office reported late last week the peanut harvest 60 per cent complete, and estimates are that that last 40 per cent will move fast this week and next—if the weather stays dry, and the long-range forecast indicates that it will.

Mrs. Maureen Johnson expected her Santa Derby decorations to be in place by week-end as various clubs and organizations made preparations in downtown vacant and occupied store windows to erect their Santa-inspired displays. The chamber is sponsoring the Derby contest, offering cash prizes for the best displays.

Lower temperatures and all the pretty decor reminded that the Christmas season lies just ahead.

Medicare Plan Will Be Explained For Elderly in Special Meetings

The Eastland County Committee studying problems of the aging, and visitors heard H. L. Weatherly of Abilene explain provisions of Medicare at a meeting in Eastland Tuesday evening and voted to set up special meetings throughout the county to carry the same message to elderly people.

A tentative schedule was arranged and either Mr. Weatherly or another representa-

ive of the Social Security will be at each meeting to explain the incoming program and answer questions.

Most important data at this time, he said, is that persons who are 65 years of age, and who have not made application for social security, must do so for the Medicare benefits whether they ever plan to draw social security. Also persons who are on the S. S. roles, and who have received intentions

cards, should mark their intentions as to whether they plan to participate in the supplementary medical provisions or not. Those already on the roles automatically are enrolled in the hospitalization part but must consent, and agree to pay \$3 monthly, for the supplementary service he explained.
