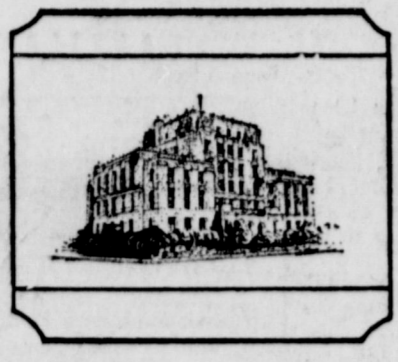

Eight County High Schools Get Approval For Work-Study Funds

Eight public high schools in Eastland County have been approved for a \$123,000 federal work-study program to begin in the next few days, according to an announcement this week by County Superintendent O. L. Stamey. News of Federal approval was received from Congress a n Omar Burleson of the 17th District.

Mr. Stamey's office will supervise the program in the high schools of the county. Approval was given for the various schools as follows: Cisco, 95 students; Eastland,

40; Ranger, 30; Rising Star, 20; Gorman, 20; Carbon, 10; Olden, 10; and Desdemona, 5. R. B. Golemon of the county superintendent's office, who was assisting in setting up the program, said the project is part of the Department of Labor's economic aid program for underprivileged youths.

Eligible for the jobs, which will pay \$1.25 per hour for a maximum of 10 hours per week, are students between the ages of 16 and 21, inclusive, whose family incomes do not exceed a certain bracket. Applications for the jobs will assist supervisors in determining individual eligibility, Mr. Golemon said. The job classifications include custodian aids, cafeteria, library, office and bus duty workers. Interested students were asked to make application for the jobs to their high school principal or superintendent. Mr. Golemon said that each applicant would be interviewed by the county coordinator. The program provides for the employment of a county coordinator and an office secretary-bookkeeper. It was understood that the individual schools would pay ten percent of their program with the balance or 90 percent coming from the federal program. The colleges in Cisco and Ranger have been approved for work-study programs for the past year.

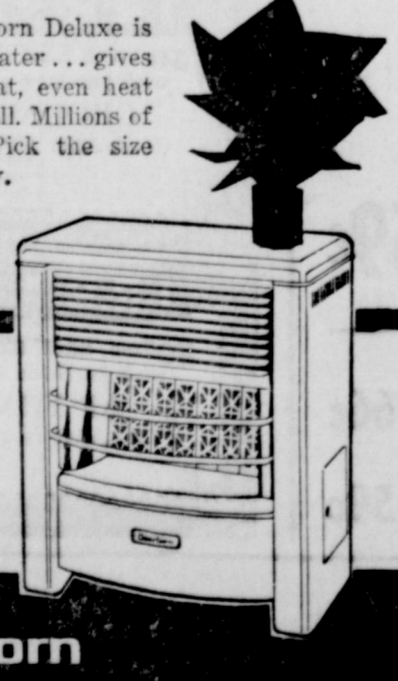

**Fewer Credits
Needed By Those
Passed 72 Years**

A sizeable number of persons now past age 72 have inquired about social security benefits in recent years only to find that they did not have the minimum of six quarters of coverage required by the law then in effect. A quarter

of coverage is given for having been paid wages of at least \$50 in a calendar quarter, or \$150 in wages for agricultural work for one employer in a year, or, if self-employed, four such credits are given for a year in which at least \$400 in net profit was made.

The 1965 changes provide that some persons aged over 72 may now qualify with as few as three such quarters of coverage. All persons past age 72 who are not now re-

ceiving social security checks, and who think they might now qualify, are urged to write their social security office, giving their full name, date of birth, and social security account number. The records will be checked and arrangements made to secure necessary applications from those who will now qualify for the special \$35 per month benefit. A wife or dependent husband past age 72 can also be paid an additional \$17.50. Age proofs will be necessary.

Any widow past age 72, who was denied social security benefits because her husband had not worked long enough under social security to be insured, should also write her social security office, giving her full name, her husband's full name and social security account number, each date of birth, and his date of death. After checking the records, arrangements will be made to secure claims from those now qualified. Age and marriage proofs will then be se-

ured. For example, Mr. A was born in 1880, and worked only 3/4 of a year in all on a job covered by social security. If he now has 3 quarters of coverage, he is due \$35 per month, beginning with September of 1965. If he had died some time ago, and his widow is now 72 or older, she will be due \$35.00 per month.

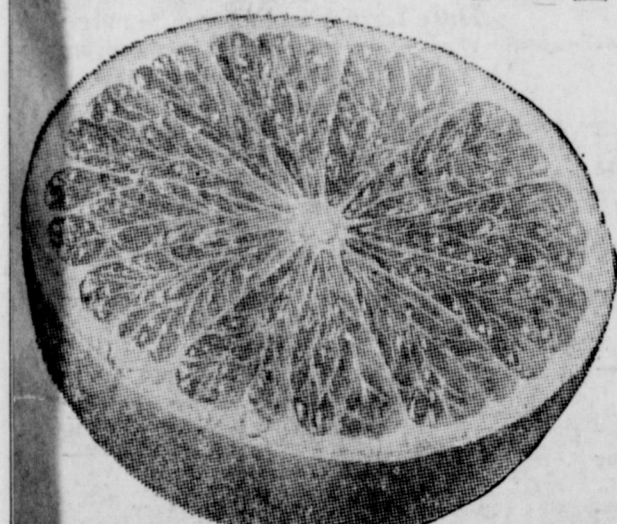

Plentiful Stock Of Turkeys Are Ready For Month

COLLEGE STATION—November in the United States traditionally has been "Turkey Month."

Turkey Month 1965 will be just that, for turkeys are plentiful, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Also termed plentiful this month are onions, cabbage, rice, split peas and sweetpotatoes, as well as apples, prunes and frozen concentrated orange juice.

Potatoes, onions and rice all are scheduled to be on hand in abundance, reflecting record crops. The fall potato crop is estimated at 20.9 billion pounds, 22 per cent above last fall, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Production of late summer onions for storage is set at over 20 billion pounds.

Better than average split pea supplies this November should make excellent low-cost food buys, while cabbage is expected to be in better supply than last year—about 8 per cent more.

Apple production this year is expected to rank second largest since 1949, with a total

SOME NAMES DO DOUBLE DUTY FOR TEXAS PLACES

AUSTIN—Names sometimes have to do double-duty in Texas, especially on the Official State Highway Map published by the Texas Highway Department.

You'll find Dallas in Dallas County, El Paso in El Paso County, Lubbock in Lubbock County, Nacogdoches in Nacogdoches County. But that doesn't prove a thing.

You might suppose that Huntsville would be in Hunt County. But it isn't. It's in Walker County. And Jefferson, the town, should be in Jefferson, the county. Actually, it's a good 200 miles north of Jefferson County, in Marion County.

Jefferson County does include the community of Sabine, but Sabine County is about 75 miles away. Sabine County, on the other hand, is the site of a town named Milam—but Milam County is a far piece west in central Texas.

Cameron is the county seat of the county—Milam County, that is, not Cameron County. Brownsville is the county seat of Cameron County and Brown County is hundreds of miles north in west central Texas. Oddly enough, Brownwood is its county seat.

Not confused enough? Okay, let's look again. Start with Caldwell County. Don't bother to look for the city of Caldwell there. It's in Burleson County. Burleson, the town, is in Johnson County; and Johnson City—you've heard of this place—is miles away in Blanco County.

Or take Houston. Houston is in Harris County, but Houston County is three counties north, and the city of Crockett is its county seat. Crockett County is in far west Texas.

Look up Dimmitt County on the map. It's in south Texas. But the town of Dimmitt (with an extra 't') is in Castro County in the Panhandle.

Yes, Castroville is back down in south Texas, in Medina County. Medina is in the next county north, Bandera.

If you still aren't dizzy, check Smithville—in Bastrop County. Smith County is in east Texas and includes the City of Tyler. Tyler County is further south, and it includes the town of Woodville. Wood County is further north, in east Texas next to Smith County.

There are others, but by now you should have got the idea. You can find them all on the Official State Highway Map. And at the same time you may want to start planning your next vacation or week-end outing in beautiful Texas—America's Fun-Tier.

Burleson Urges Study Of Gov't. Medicare Plan

ABILENE — Congressman Omar Burleson has expressed a concern that people over 65 year of age may not be aware of certain advantages to them under the new Medicare legislation.

For instance, Burleson says that the Abilene Social Security Office advises him that out of some 32,000 persons over the age of 65 in the 14-county area covered by that office, only 10,000 are enrolled in Medicare.

there are at least 6,000 persons who will not be automatically notified of their eligibility under the Program. Only those receiving Social Security Benefits, Railroad Retirement or Old Age Assistance will be notified. This has caused Congressman Burleson and the Social Security officials to feel that attention should be called to the provisions of the new Law.

Burleson says that all those over 65 years of age should be reminded that they are eligible for certain benefits under the Medicare Program. Choices in this matter must be made prior to March 31, 1966 by all who wish to enroll in the Health Insurance Program, commonly known as Medicare under Social Security.

The hospitalization portion is automatic for those receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits. Others must apply for it.

All persons over 65, who wish to enroll in the Supplementary Medical Insurance part, must make that decision known to the Social Security Administration by March 31, 1966, for they cannot enroll after that date until October-December, 1967.

That part of medicare will

cost \$3.00 per month. All Social Security offices have leaflets explaining the provisions and the people in those offices will be glad to answer your particular questions so that you may make an informed decision.

It would be most unfortunate if, by inadvertence or otherwise, there were those who did not exercise their right of choice, in order to benefit in the best possible way in accordance with their needs.
