### Another Deputy Is Needed

(An Editorial)

Ordinary talk suggests, and statistics prove, that there has been an increase of crime in Eastland County. News accounts punctuate the increase.

Pleas have been heard from competent law enforcement officials for funds to update their forces and provide the tools to combat modern crime. The Eastland County sheriff's department has been provided with some new equipment, including a tear-gas gun, roadblock signs and miniature two-way radios.

And these are ideal pieces of equipment, but neither of them can arrest a prowler take a prisoner to Huntsville or Wichita Falls, or patrol at night. It takes manpower to do that.

And that's what Sheriff L. E. Sublett has asked for repeatedly — another deputy. Another man to assist with the regular duties and so that more night-time patrolling, a major crime preventive, can be done. Right now the sheriff and one deputy handle all the "outside" work which includes investigations, transportation of prisoners, delivering of citations, etc., with precious little time for patrolling the individual towns in the county.

The sheriff has been told that the constables in the various towns should be called on to help as needed. That won't work because constables aren't under the sheriff's jurisdiction, and he has no authority to request or demand their assistance, although they are most cooperative. And, too, they have their local jobs to do.

It is significant that Sheriff Sublett is not asking for luxury for his men or his office but rather for what he considers to be the bare minimum needed to operate his department. In a way, it is a pity that an elected official of a county that can boast of so many good things practically has to beg for funds to provide an absolutely essential service for the people who pay for it.

Surely the people of Eastland County would be horrified at the thought that our county might someday become one of those where it is not safe to be out of our homes at night. It has happened in much larger areas and smallers areas, and it can happen here.

This discussion is intended more as an expression of our views than a criticism of the commissioners court. All of us appreciate the fact that they have a big job to do in managing the affairs of our county.




