Pecan Show Is Expected To Draw Many Entries

A large number of entries from throughout central and west Texas, as well as local pecans, are expected at the 13th annual Eastland County Pecan Show at Cisco, December 10 and 11, according to officials in charge of the exhibits.

Both the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the county pecan growers organization, co-sponsors of the show, advise that a greater number of entries than shown in recent years is expected due, perhaps, to the excellent large crop now being harvested.

Besides the 33 different improved or papershell varieties there will also be many entries of both the native seedlings as well as the hybrid varieties now being tested through horticultural research.

According to Oscar Schaefer, Cook, president of the grower group the rules this year have been relaxed to permit anyone with pecans anywhere in the state to have an entry of their nuts. A quart jar or more containing at least 35 nuts constitutes an entry.

Ribbons and other trophies will be awarded the winners. Growers are requested to have their entries in by 12 o'clock noon on December 10th. They may be removed by their owners at 4:00 p. m. the following day except the first three place entries of each variety which will be entered in the state pecan show at A&M University and will not be returned. The show will be held in the Corral Room of the Victor Hotel in downtown Cisco.

A pecan queen contest, a bake show, and a centerpiece division are other sections of the annual affair it was explained by Jim Smothers, Manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

The pecans are to be judged on their size, color, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality and percentage of meat to shell as well as other factors. Judges will be from the horticultural department of A&M University.

Patrolmen Get Range Drill, Code Review

Area Department of Public Safety Patrolmen and officials spent Monday of this week on the firing range for periodic sidearm practice and some four hours of classroom work learning about the state's new Code of Criminal Procedure.

The morning was spent at the Eastland Rifle Club's range east of Eastland, firing the regulation FBI practical pistol course. A planned riot control study was scheduled, but early-morning fog forced postponement, the sergeant reported.

Eleven Highway Patrolmen, two license and weight men and the motor inspection supervisor participated in the day's drills. Lt. Homer Bailey of Abilene taught the new code during the afternoon as the patrolmen gathered in the county grand jury room at the courthouse.

Patrolmen from Sgt. Sosebee's area including Brownwood, Coleman, Cross Plains, Albany, Breckenridge and Eastland were present as well as Breckenridge and Brownwood W&M men and the local inspection supervisor.

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'It's a Way of Life' Speaker Says at Joint Thanksgiving Service Wednesday Night

The Community Thanksgiving Service at the First Methodist Church Wednesday evening was well attended and an attitude of real thanksgiving was evident as all faiths worshipped together.

In the Psalm, the speaker pointed out, the writer enumerates the blessings he received from God, and, on that basis, makes declarations of the things he will do in return.

Choosing as his title "Genuine Thanksgiving," the Rev. Eugene H. Terry, pastor of the First Baptist Church, selected as his text, the 116 Psalm.

Counting these blessings the Psalmist noted that the Lord had heard his prayer, had delivered his soul and had dealt bountifully with him.

Stressed by Rev. Terry was the fact that more is involved in Thanksgiving than just a proclamation of Thanksgiving as a holiday. "It is," he said, "rather a way of life."

"Then he asks himself," Rev. Terry said, "What shall I do for Him?" "I will take the cup of salvation. I will call upon the name of the Lord. I will walk before the Lord. I will pay

my vows and I will make a sacrifice of Thanksgiving." The community service began with the prelude "Song of Thanksgiving" played by Miss Jennifer Pryor at the organ, followed by the call to worship and invocation by the host pastor.

The responsive reading was led by the Rev. Eugene H. Terry, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church and president of the sponsoring Eastland Ministers' Association.

The scripture reading of Psalm 116 was by Rev. Terry. The Rev. H. B. Terry, pastor of Bethel Baptist Church, and vice president of the Eastland ministers group, delivered the Thanksgiving Prayer. The Rev. Clayton W. Jackson, pastor of First Christian Church, and secretary-treasurer of EMA, gave the offertory prayer.

The anthem "Praise Ye the Father" by the Choir of the First Methodist Church, was under the direction of Mrs. R. Pat Miller, music director of the church. Benediction was by the Rev. W. M. Harry, pastor of the Assembly of God Church.

Taxi-Nabbers Get 20-Year Sentences

The two Georgia taxi-nabbers pleaded guilty to robbery with a firearm Monday and were sentenced to 20 years each in the state penitentiary by a 91st District Court jury.

The district attorney had recommended the 20-year sentence to the jury.

The two men were placed in the Eastland County Jail on Sept. 12, after having been captured in Louisiana. They eluded a gigantic search by officers in Weatherford where they went after Jones, who was able to escape from them at the Brazos River bridge.

The three guilty pleas to DWI brought probated sentences, as did the violation of TUC regulations.

A jury deliberated three hours Monday afternoon before announcing itself deadlocked in the fourth DWI trial.

Another DWI case, second offense, one for theft and another for hunting deer at night were continued Monday, as was a civil suit. Another civil case was settled.

A non-jury civil case was scheduled to begin Wednesday morning.

A civil suit styled Jarrett vs. Ranger Peanut Co. began Tuesday morning before a jury.

Ranger Man Is Cited Two Counts Assault Officers

An 18-year-old Ranger man is free on \$2,000 bond after having been charged in Justice of the Peace M. L. Underwood's court in Ranger with two counts of assault on a peace officer.

The man reportedly attacked Ranger Police Chief Bill Ogden and Department of Public Safety License Patrolman D. L. Buckley in Ranger Monday morning. The man came to the police station and entered into the fray reportedly after his wife returned home and told him that she had failed to pass a driving license test.

The two officers immediately locked him in the city jail and County Sheriff L. E. Sublet and Deputy John Shook transferred him to County jail Monday afternoon. Bond was set at \$1,000 on each of the charges and these were quickly made and the man released.

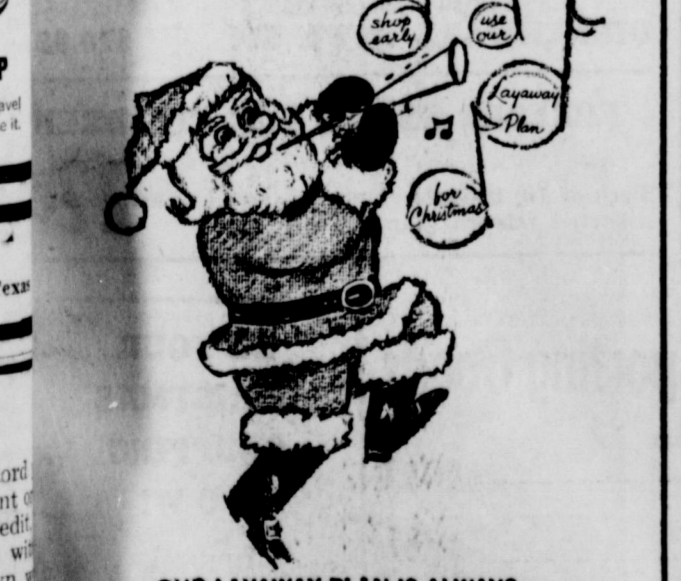

County, Area Highway Work Included In New Project

Reconstruction of an Eastland County highway and extensive work in adjoining counties on highways which traverse this county are included in the new \$350 million Consolidated Highway program, it has been announced here.

District Engineer E. M. Pritchard has announced projects follows in his nine county district:

In Eastland County, reconstruction of U. S. 183 is planned from the south city limits to Cisco south to Romney.

Complete reconstruction of U. S. 183 from U. S. 180 in Breckenridge south to Farm Road 1032 is planned for Stephens County. Also on U. S. 183 additional surface is planned from the Shackelford Co. line to a point 6.7 miles east; and on two miles of this highway in Breckenridge.

In Comanche County, reconstruction of State Highway 16

is planned from US 67 south to the Mills County Line and additional surface and paved shoulders is planned on State 6 from Eastland County Line, southeast to St. 16 in De Leon. Also in Comanche County additional surface will be applied on St. 36 from FM 1476, southeast to the Hamilton County Line.

In Brown County reconstruction is planned on US 84 from East City Limits of Bangs to Bluffview Drive in Brownwood a total of 7.2 miles; and on St. 279 from Callahan County Line South to 3.4 miles South of Cross Cut a distance of 6.9 miles.

In Coleman County, reconstruction is planned on US 84 from the Taylor County line Southeast 4.7 miles.

US 281 in Lampasas County is to be reconstructed from North of Lampasas, North to FM 1690 and the approaches on the railroad overpass North

of Lometa on US 183 will be widened.

Funds for purchase of right of way for reconstruction of US 87 in McCulloch County from FM 2028 near the south City Limits of Brady, South to the San Saba River were provided.

In Mills County reconstruction is planned on US 84 from the Brown County Line, Southeast to Mullin; and bridges and approaches are to be widened on U. S. 84 east of Goldthwaite and on U. S. 183 south of Goldthwaite.

Funds were also included in this program for certain other projects which have been previously approved and on which planning has already started.

Pritchard said the total cost of all the projects as programmed for this District is \$8,347,500.

The Texas Highway Commission approved the two-year program, described as one of the most important in the history of the Texas Highway Department.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said the 1967 - 1968 program includes work on 9,469 miles of roads under the Department's jurisdiction and called it one of the "most meritorious programs ever formed by the Department."

He stressed the program's many safety features, the protection of investment previously made from highway user tax funds and the immediate benefits that will add to the safe and efficient movement of traffic over the Texas highway system.

The Commission approved projects to cost \$337.9 million, with \$12.7 million being held in reserve for future assignment. The ultimate program will approximate \$350.6 million.

The program includes 1,809 miles of construction and reconstruction on highways that carry U.S. or State numbers at an estimated cost of \$262.8 million.

It also includes the state's portion of the cost of 587 miles of right of way on U.S. and state-numbered highways at an estimated cost of \$19.3 million.

Betterment work for the improvement of travel conditions and protection of investment and state-numbered highways is included in the program at

an estimated cost of \$24.1 million.

Also covered is betterment work on 3,930 miles of existing Farm and Ranch to Market Roads at an estimated cost of \$31.6 million.

Considering all features and types of roads covered in the program, some 1,900 miles which will cost an estimated \$174.7 million to complete, fall in the category of highway safety.

The safety work included in the program represents about 52 per cent of the total monies involved.

This covers widening of the existing lanes, construction of additional lanes, paving of shoulders, widening of structures, grade separations, barrier fences and guard fences.

The safety projects included in the program take on added significance considering a recent report showing a decrease in traffic accidents and deaths on U.S. and State-numbered and Interstate highways.

A third - quarter report by the Department of Public Safety showed 94 fewer deaths on U. S. and State numbered and Interstate Highways as of last October 1 than in the same period in 1964. Fifty-seven fewer accidents were reported.

The program's safety projects, by types of work, include:

Widening pavement, reconstruction and widening of grading, structures and surfacing on 1,463 miles at an estimated cost of \$98.7 million.

Construction of additional lanes or 295 miles at an estimated cost of \$59.5 million.

Construction, improvement and or stabilization of shoulders on 122 miles at an estimated cost of \$3.3 million.

Construction, reconstruction and widening of structures on 15 miles at an estimated cost of \$6.1 million.

Grade separations on seven miles at \$6.8 million.

Barrier fences, guard fences, signing and miscellaneous projects on 14.8 miles at \$159,000.

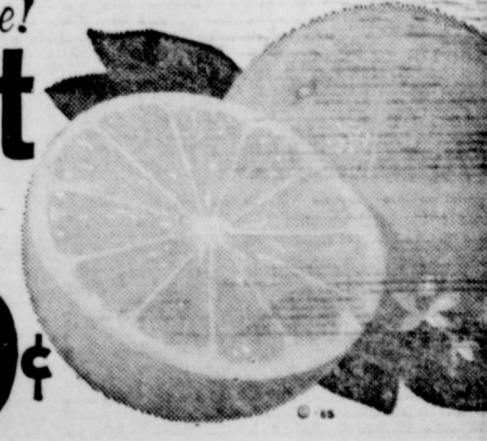

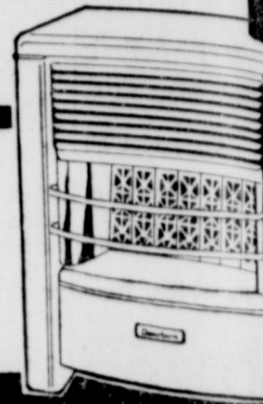

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Microwaves Approved For TV Antennas Here

The Federal Communications Commission has approved the application of Southern Television Antenna Systems, Inc., for use of microwave signal transmission for Cisco, according to an announcement here by Glen Scallorn, manager of the firm's southwest operations.

Approval was given for use of microwave transmission on two channels—Dallas Channel 8 and Fort Worth Channel 11—and a construction permit has been issued Mr. Scallorn said. Approval for microwave at Eastland is expected at any time, he added.

Equipment has been ordered for installation at the firm's antenna tower in Southeast Cisco, and delivery is expected in six to eight weeks. Mr. Scallorn said the Cisco tower has been equipped with additional guy wires to make ready for installing heavier equipment. Microwave reflectors have already been erected in readiness for use

when the necessary equipment arrives, he said.

The company has been seeking the microwave permit since 1962 and has an application pending for another channel.

The antenna system, which serves all sections of Cisco, provides its patrons with five channels of television and FM radio. The company also operates systems in Eastland and Ranger and recently purchased the system in Abilene.

Report On Cover Crops Is Urged By ASCS Office

The Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has urged farmers to report cover crops when seeded, by signing and sending in approval. If you have an approval and will not plant the cover, please report this to the ASCS office, in order that the costshare funds can be made available to your neighbor, Office Manager J. G. Meredith said.

The earlier you report, the earlier the cost-share can be paid, according to Jesse Meredith, office manager. If a farmer's full peanut history is not already protected by picking and threshing 75 per cent of his allotment in 1963 and 1964, and he will fail to pick and thresh 75 per cent of his allotment in 1965, he may file a request for waiver of this provision stating the abnormal condition and on approval, his history will be preserved. His 1966 allotment will be affected if the 1965 history is not protected.

Farm program legislation recently approved by Congress and signed into law, provides a program for voluntary participation on the following programs: Wheat and Feed Grain—price support, diversion and certificates very similar to the program for 1965. Cotton—price support and division payments with a provision for sale and lease of allotments (this part of the program depends on the outcome of the referendum on Nov. 23).
