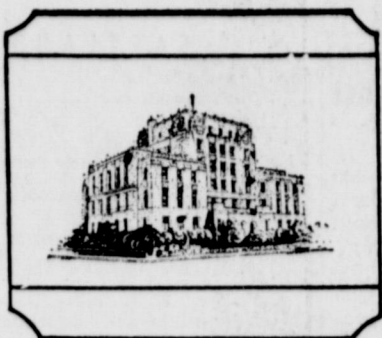

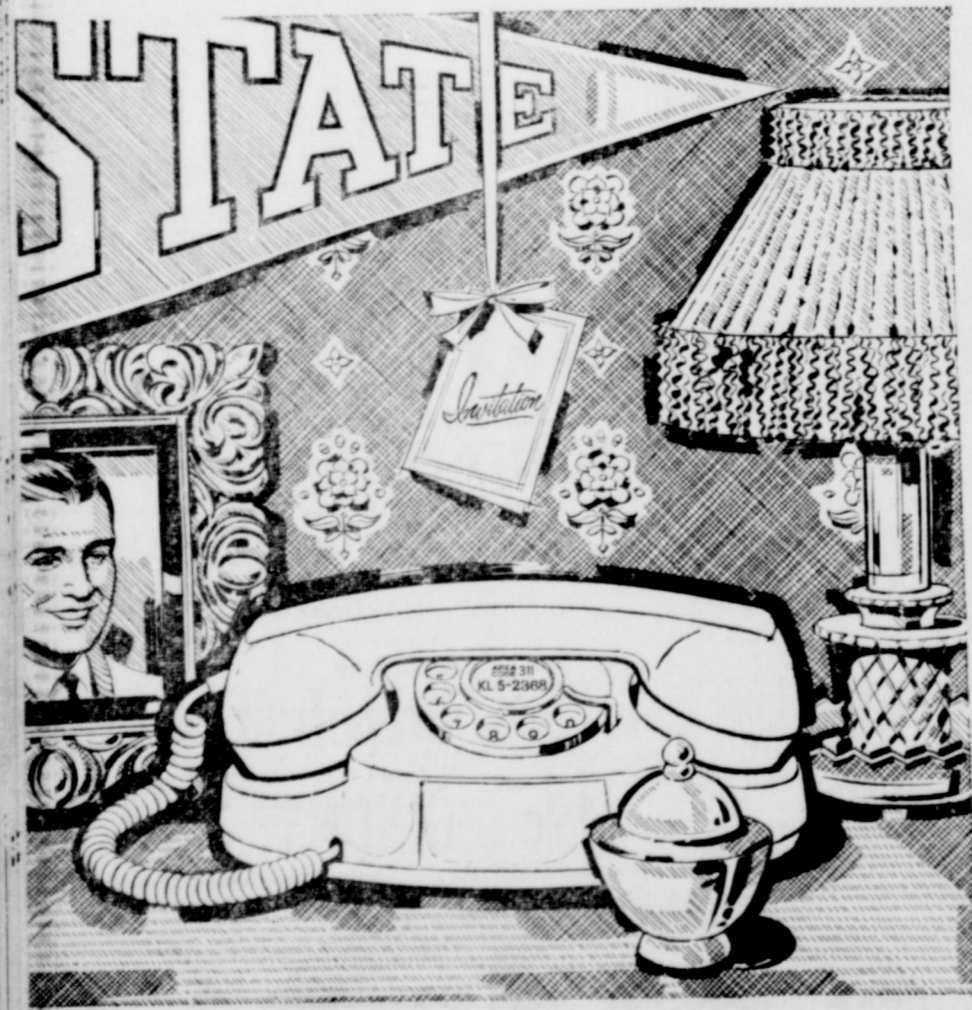

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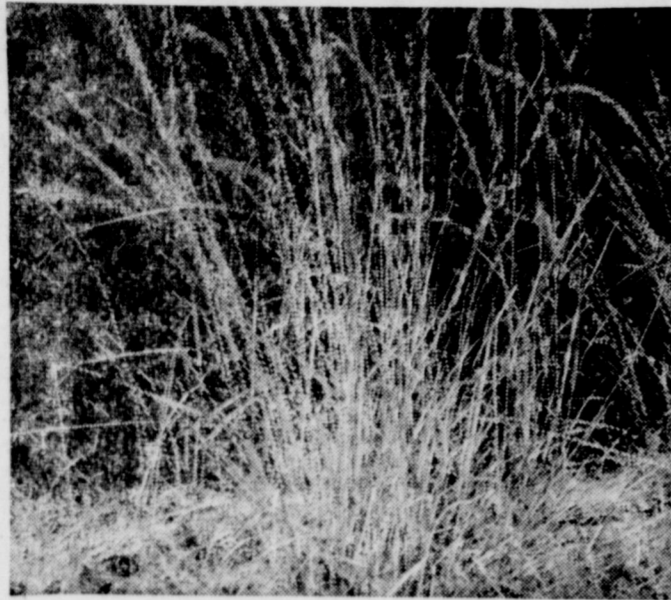

Summer-Rested Native Grasses Providing Top Forage in County

Eastland County Conservation Service summer grazing season. Fall is in the air, and the country has a brilliant hue. Pe-grass seed are rapidly ripening their outside only a crisp frost to make the season. Winter can be away. The scenic sights in the country side number of pastures on grazing last summer. September these pastures generally stayed green but made dry due to absence of rainfall since today, due to fall delayed frost, these pastures are overgrown with grass. Seed heads



vigor needed for recovery when September rains finally fell.

No seed heads are seen in these pastures as livestock cropped the scattered heads while they were in the dough stage.

Some 40 pastures in this area, totaling about 6-7,000 acres are known to have been rested this past summer in this vicinity. Others were rested for a portion of the summer. A large portion of these pastures had some type of brush control and reseeded treatment this spring or in 1964. Incidentally many of the pastures reseeded in 1964 and rested the second time this year showed very few grass seedlings until this fall.

For wintering cattle and goats the fall produced forage in these rested pastures is more valuable in many respects than hay in the barn. The better native grasses cure out into palatable forage needing only a small amount of protein supplement to make a balanced diet. In addition to the cured out warm season grass, these pastures have ankle-deep Texas winter grass and winter annuals on many sites. Texas winter grass is well known for its ability to fatten livestock. On continuously grazed pastures Texas winter grass is making little growth as the stock are keeping it bit off to the ground and the plants are stunted.

The majority of the operators resting pastures this summer were able to do so

by producing their summer grazing with Coastal bermuda. Due to dry weather the production of Coastal was much below what would be considered normal for this area. Nevertheless the Bermuda remained green practically all summer and furnished ample forage for many herds during most of the summer. Due to extended favorable fall weather, Coastal is being grazed even today several weeks past the normal grazing season. This is being overdone in some pastures as they have been grazed even or below the minimum six inch stubble height considered as proper use for Coastal Bermuda.

The combination of Coastal Bermuda in summer and native rangeland in winter holds much promise as a new system of livestock and land management for this area. This system provides perfect conservation of our land as cropland is put under permanent grass cover and on native range the better grasses such as little bluestem and side-oats grama are allowed to grow unmolested all summer. Forage production can be expected to increase each year with improved soil conditions and better grass vigor. The old system common to this area of grazing native grass year long and attempting to provide additional winter forage with hay and small grain on cropland is becoming less profitable each year. Under this system native grass can be improved only if stocking rates are drastically reduced.

are waving in spite of scorching drought while the grass was in the boot stage last August. In contrast, native grass-land which was pastured all summer even under light stocking, has produced much less forage. Grass grazed all summer just did not have the

8 Officers Shake Down Freight For 3 Escapees

Ranger police officers, the Texas Highway Patrol and the Eastland County Sheriff's Department collaborated on the pickup of six transients here early Monday night following a tip that three escapees from the Jones County jail at Anson were believed to be traveling on a west-bound Texas & Pacific freight train.

Chief of Police Bill Ogden said local officers were alerted by a phone call from the Parker County Sheriff's Department at Weatherford. The message indicated that the wanted trio might have boarded the train at Weatherford.

Eight heavily armed officers conducted the search of the train when it was flagged to a halt in downtown Ranger.

They included Chief Ogden and Patrolmen J. W. Vinson and J. D. Clements of the Ranger Police Department, Patrolmen Kenneth Perry and B. C. Rivers of the Texas Highway Patrol, Ranger Constable Ralph Veal, and Sheriff Lefty Sublett and two deputies, Loy Williams and John Shook of Eastland.

Pulled off the freight and held for investigation shortly after 8 p.m. Monday were two Wheatland, Calif. men, ages 21 and 18, and a 40-year-old Latin American from Houston. The trio was released later Monday night.

Three other men — Negroes ages 48, 27 and 25 — were

also picked up at the same time and jailed on drunk charges. One of the men was from Portland, Ore., one from Dallas, and the third was from Chicago, Ill. The Chicagoan had \$526.26 in his possession at the time of his arrest.

The trio was released Tuesday morning following an extensive check by officers to determine if any of them were wanted for any possible crimes.

They were assessed fines for the drunk charges by Judge M. D. Underwood in the city corporation court.

The dramatic shake-down of the freight train resulted from a statewide alert issued for accused kidnapper and rapist Gerald David Knight and two other inmates escaped early Monday from the Jones County jail at Anson after someone apparently broke into the jail, grabbed the keys and opened their cell.

Knight, 32, of Dallas, was scheduled to go on trial Jan. 17 on charges of abducting a Dallas girl, twice raping and nearly beating her to death with a tree limb, in May.

Escaping with Knight were Pete Guerrero, 20, and Kenneth E. Chase, 31, both of Stamford, both were trustees.

The fugitives were still at large Wednesday at noon.

Charles Underwood at Gorman was luckier. He hit water at 150 feet that would furnish 155 gallons per minute to 20 acres. Irrigated fields yielded 702 bushels, compared with 16 bushels on those that depended on rainfall.

"Having water when we needed it saved our shirts," Underwood said. "Extra peanuts paid for equipment the first year. I think some farmers will make up to 150 bushels per acre after they get experience in handling the water."

J. M. COOPER, Eastland County agent, said about 1,000 farmers raise peanuts in the county. They plant in June and dig in November and early December. Supplemental water in summer is vital.

Bill Andry, two miles north of Gorman, was among the first to irrigate. He dug 80 bushels per acre on 50 irrigated acres and 25 bushels on 150 unirrigated acres.

"The yields tell how strongly I feel about irrigation," Andry said. "I plan to water 100 acres, and I can if I handle water with care."

A neighbor to Andry, J. O. Jackson, Jr., seemed more fortunate than most farmers. He said he didn't have any trouble finding water or handling it on the crop. Jackson said extra peanuts on 50 acres paid for his irrigation facility the first year. His yield was 82 bushels on irrigated land and 15 on dryland.

Bill Irwin, manager of the Stephenville Production Credit Association, said financing would be available if a farmer were considered a good risk.

Adequate water would be a big factor," Irwin explained. "There's more involved in lending than just to drill a well and equip it for watering a crop. Across the board lack of financing shouldn't be a barrier."

WARREN SAID a crop of peanuts required six or seven waterings with three inches applied about every 10 days. He said the well and pipe to irrigate, using sprinkler type, cost from \$120 to \$140 per acre and that the average increase in peanuts would pay initial costs within two years.

Warren said he would pump water from small wells to recharge a big well that will furnish water during the growing season.

Cooper said some farmers plan to construct surface reservoirs to store well water.

He said most farmers apply about 200 pounds of 10-20-10 fertilizer per acre, but with irrigation they could increase the fertilizer and reduce space between rows from 38 to 30 inches, all of which would contribute to higher yields.

ROSS WILSON of Gorman cited progress and predicted more. He is manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association.

"Our local bank has 22 customers for irrigation. Last year it had one," Wilson said. "I look for the activity to triple by next fall."

Wilson said farmers in Eastland County could irrigate much more economically than in other peanut growing areas where wells were 300 to 400 feet in depth.

He summed up the impact, "Any one of the farms may not have water to irrigate their entire acreage allotment. "But with enough water to irrigate 35 to 60 acres where yields can be tripled, farmers will come out with more income and profit than on large acreage depending on rainfall."

Gun-Toting Punk Asked To Steer Clear Of Signs

Austin — Highway signs are erected for the safety and convenience of the motoring public — not to provide gun-toting punks with a handy target for plinking.

Yet, a major share of the \$450 thousand vandalism to Texas highway signs annually is caused by gunfire, according to D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer.

Bullet-riddled roadside markers accounted for 85 per cent of all signs which had to be replaced in one Texas Highway Department District in West Texas in one year.

Even a small highway sign costs about \$10 to replace. Larger, more elaborate signs costing hundreds of dollars have been targets for wanton vandalism too, Greer said.

If apprehended, vandals can be made to pay for the destruction they cause. But the person who operates a motor vehicle in Texas foots the greater portion of the bill for

Friday Is Deadline To Enter Pecans In Show

Noon Friday, Dec. 10, is the deadline for entering the 13th annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held Friday and Saturday in the Corral Room of the Victor Hotel, according to J. M. Cooper, county agriculture agent.

Pecan growers throughout west Texas, Mr. Cooper said, have been invited to enter the show, which is sponsored by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and the county pecan growers organization.

One or more quart jars containing at least 35 nuts each will constitute an entry. Kinds of Pecans that may be exhibited include 33 different improved or papershell varieties, native seedlings and hybrid types now being tested through horticultural research.

Those who cannot attend the show may mail entries to replacement through his motor fuel taxes and licensing fees, Greer said.

More important, destruction of signs causes inconvenience — and many times deadly peril — to motorists using the highways.

"So be a good sport during this hunting season," Greer said. "Point your gun only at game, not our highway signs."

Medicare Is Not Geared To Size Of SS Payments

The size of your social security check has nothing whatever to do with the amount of hospitalization or medical expenses that will be paid under "Medicare," states R. R. Tuley, Jr., district manager for the Social Security Administration in Abilene.

Tuley says a number of aged 65 social security beneficiaries in two sections of the Abilene district have reported to his field representatives that some non-local insurance salesmen have called at their homes, claiming otherwise. He reports that the "pitch" is to the effect that if a person's social security check is \$50 per month, then only \$150 can ever be paid for hospital or medical expenses.

There is no maximum dollar figure in the law, and there is no sliding scale geared to the size of a social security check, Tuley emphasized.

Beginning next July 1, a social security beneficiary aged 65 or over, will find that "Medicare" will pay all but the first \$40 of the reasonable costs of up to 60 days of hospitalization, except for private duty nursing costs and personal comfort items. Too, on doctor bills, if the patient is

enrolled, after the first \$50 for which he is responsible, "Medicare" can pay for 80 per cent of the remainder, again with no maximum dollar figure. Tuley added that such would be true whether the social security beneficiary was getting a minimum or maximum monthly benefit. Actually, any one over 65 at this time may enroll for the health insurance benefits, familiarly known as "Medicare," regardless of his normal social security status.

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34-Year-Man Gene Harrison Retires Navy

A Navy career spanning 34 years and covering the ranks from petty officer second class to full commander came to a close this month with the announcement by the Bureau of Navy Personnel of the retirement of Commander Luther E. Harrison, USNR, of Dallas, formerly of Eastland,

and Ranger, Texas. He was president of the 1965 Eastland Homecoming. One of the first members of the Fourth Organized division of the Naval Reserve in Dallas during the 1930's, in civilian life Commander Harrison is an engineer with the Dallas Power and Light Company.

As an active radio amateur radio operator and former engineering student at Southern Methodist University he joined the Navy Reserve in 1931 as a communication specialist with the rank of radio-man second class. With the outbreak of World War II Commander Harrison

was ordered to active duty and granted a direct commission as ensign, communication specialist. During World War II he was credited with 3 1/4 years of sea duty aboard such aircraft carriers as the Yorktown, Ranger and Bunker Hill. He took part in the invasion of North Africa, high speed convoys between the East Coast of the United States and India and is a veteran of seven battle campaigns in the Pacific.

A long time amateur radio operator, Commander Harrison is a member of the Institute of Electronic and Electrical Engineers, the Dallas Radio Club and the Reserve Officers Association of which he is a director in the Dallas Chapter. Shortly after World War II Commander Harrison was recalled to active duty and played a key role in the establishment of the present Naval Reserve program and armory

in the Dallas area. For his duty during World War II Commander Harrison earned the American Defense medal with "A" for combat, American-European-Middle East theater medal with one battle star, Asiatic-Pacific medal with seven battle stars, the Naval Reserve medal and the World War II Victory Medal. Prior to his present employment, Commander Harrison held various posts with the Federal Civil Defense Agency

and was also associated with the Inman Radio and TV company of Dallas. Born in Ranger, Commander Harrison later attended schools in Ranger and Eastland. (He is believed to be the only man born in Ranger who has served aboard the aircraft carrier of the same name.) He is a graduate of Eastland High School.
